What Can Psychotics Hope for Today?



In 2008, the city of Quebec will be celebrating the 400th anniversary of its foundation by Samuel de Champlain in 1608. As the first francophone city in North America, it is the birthplace of French America. The festivities and new infrastructures being developed for this anniversary are mobilizing large financial investments on behalf of our governments. Administrations outside of Canada, particularly the city of Bordeaux, in France - the sister city - and the French government, have confirmed their participation in the event. On March 20th 2006, Jean-Pierre Raffarin was named president of the organizing committee in charge of coordinating all of the French initiatives for the 2008 celebrations.

In addition to activities taking place in France, a number of events will be held in other countries as well as in other parts of Canada in acknowledgment of this important anniversary. Great Britain has already confirmed its participation at the *Jardins Éphémères* event and cultural exchanges between artists and the Liverpool museum - the official cultural capital of Europe in 2008 - will also be taking place. Ireland is also expected to contribute to the cultural events. For the occasion, the Quebec-Irish community will be erecting a monument on the bank of the St-Laurence River to commemorate the arrival of Irish immigrants in Quebec. Through the French-American community of New England, the United-States which is also celebrating Jamestown's 400th anniversary in Virginia, will be participating with the presence of the McClure schooner at the port of Quebec. A special Quebec theme Festival will also be held at the Washington Smithsonian Museum. In Canada, the Quebec Symphonic Orchestra is expected to perform in Toronto and in Ottawa. Other special events will be hosted by the cities of Calgary, Toronto and Ottawa.

Outline

Twenty-five years of clinical practice show that a personalized approach of psychoses responds remarkably well to the expectations of the persons suffering from such problems and their entourage, with a different effectiveness and different results. The war on psychoanalysis, seen as a useless or even dangerous approach, nevertheless goes on. However, in Quebec, it tends to go nowhere, as it holds as its main argument that psychoanalysis is not based on evidence-based data. Such an argument may however apply to a problematics of research and care practices centered on a medicine for client groups. The more personalized approaches, such as the psychoanalytical treatment of psychoses, can now pass the test of verifiable results that establish the relevancy of practices that became evidence-based and whose specific conditions and logic must be studied.

The psychoanalytical treatment of psychoses can report clinical practices that efficiently helps psychotic patients re-enter social life as citizens. It can account for the possibility to evaluate the results of more personalized approaches of psychoses that re-open or keep open the debate on various problematics of care and treatment, or even on the difference between care and treatment in the field of psychoses in particular.

The dialogue between neurosciences and biological psychiatry, on one hand, and psychoanalysis on the other, can re-center the debate and stimulate research on both sides. It remains that, for the ordinary patients and their entourage, the issue tends more and more to boil down to this: What can psychotics hope for today? What can they hope for, between competent care aimed at remediating their neurobiochemical or genetic deficiencies while improving their life in society, and a treatment based on an offer made to the subject to allow him to become aware of his implication in what is happening to him and, with the help of a multidisciplinary team, to take on the ethical responsibility for his health?

A conference devoted to this issue will allow for an in-depth reflection and an open discussion on what supports and opposes these two paths.

In May 2008, as part of the celebrations of the 400th anniversary of Quebec City, Gifric's psychoanalysts, known for their unique contribution to the treatment of psychoses developed over the last 25 years, invite the community of care providers and research scientists in mental health to a discussion that will review these issues.

The Scientific Committee

Willy Apollon, Ph.D., philosopher and psychoanalyst; founding president of GIFRIC; consulting analyst in charge of clinical training for the staff at the Psychoanalytic Treatment Center for Young Psychotic Adults, the "388"; director of the Psychoanalytic Clinic for Family; research director for the Center for Training, Research and Cooperation of GIFRIC and a member of the Clinical Council of GIFRIC.

Jacinthe Baribeau, Ph. D., neuropsychologist. Since 1978, Dr. Baribeau has been dedicated to research on the cognitive and emotional impairment of individuals suffering from mental problems. Since 1984, she has also been developing evaluation of treatment and psychotherapies for depression, anxiety, compulsions and mania, psychosis (schizophrenia) and neuropsychological impairment (cerebral lesions and head traumas). Dr. Baribeau has been a titular professor since 1994. She is presently a professor and director for the *LANNH* (*Laboratoire de Neuropsychologie et de Neurophysiologie humaine*) at Laval University. She is also a clinical psychologist and member of the *Ordre des Psychologues du Québec*.

Danielle Bergeron, M.D., psychoanalyst and psychiatrist; director of the Psychoanalytic Treatment Center for Young Psychotic Adults, the "388"; in charge of the short-term analytic therapy program at Robert-Giffard hospital; associate professor at Laval University; coordinator of education and training for the Center for Training, Research and Cooperation of GIFRIC and head of the Clinical Council of GIFRIC.

Jean-Pierre Boisvert, general director of GIFRIC; member of the Clinical Council of GIFRIC; coordinator of the Social Sciences program and professor of psychology at Limoilou College.

Lucie Cantin, M.Ps., psychoanalyst and psychologist; associate-director of the Psychoanalytic Treatment Center for Young Psychotic Adults, the "388"; clinical professor of the Psychology program at Laval University; vice-president of GIFRIC; coordinator of the internship program and the publishing division at the Center for Training, Research and Cooperation of GIFRIC and member of the Clinical Council of GIFRIC.

Raymond Lemieux, sociologist; retired professor of sociology (Sociology of Religions and History of Christianity) at Laval University and president of GIFRIC. In 2001, he was a recipient of the very prestigious André-Laurendeau prize, presented by ACFAS (*Association canadienne-française pour l'avancement des sciences*), for his influential work in the social sciences.

Kareen Ror Malone is Professor of psychology at University of West Georgia. She is co-editor of *The Subject of Lacan : A Lacanian Reader for Psychologists* and *After Lacan : Clinical Practice and the Subject of the Unconscious* (papers by Willy Apollon, Lucie Cantin & Danielle Bergeron). Both books are published by State University of New York Press. She is a fellow of the American Psychological Association and a current recipient of a Spencer Foundation Fellowship to study gender and science at Georgia Institute of Technology. She has trained with GIFRIC for many years, is an associate member of the Freudian School of Quebec and is a member of *Après Coup* in New York.

Yvan Simonis, anthropologist, titular professor (retired) in anthropology at Laval University, director of the Department of Anthropology from 1976 to 1979 where he founded, in 1977, the Journal "Anthropologie et Sociétés", and acted as chief-editor from 1977 to 1988. He obtained his doctorate in Paris in 1967 at the *Institut d'Études sociales*, which was published under the title: *Claude Lévi-Strauss ou la "passion de l'inceste"*, as edited by Aubier-Montaigne and Flammarion. He is a member of GIFRIC.

France

Jacques-Alain Miller, psychoanalyst in Paris, editor of Jacques Lacan's Seminaries, founder and president of the *World Association of Psychoanalysis*. He is the director of the Psychoanalytic program at ParisVIII University and teaches a weekly public seminar on Wednesday afternoons at the amphitheater *des Arts et Métiers*, entitled "*L'orientation lacanienne*". He has presided over *L'École de la Cause freudienne*, founded by Jacques Lacan, in 1981.

Catherine Clément, philosopher and novelist. Since 2002, she has organized and is in charge of *L'Université populaire du Quai Branly*, held at the Claude Lévi-Strauss theater, at the museum du Quai Branly. She is Commander of the *Ordre national du mérite* and Commander of the *Legion of Honor*. She is also the author of numerous papers, including *Vies et légendes de Jacques Lacan* (1981) and *Pour Sigmund Freud* (2005).

He was a recipient of the *National Alliance for the Mentally Ill's Exemplary Psychiatrist Award* and of the *International Federation for Psychoanalytic Education's (IFPE) Distinguished Psychoanalytic Educators Award for outstanding contributions to psychoanalytic education.*

Gilles Bibeau, Ph.D. (Laval), M.Sc (Laval), Certificate (Kinshasa), Doctorate (Kinshasa), Licence (Gregoriana), B.A. (Montreal University), MSRC. He is a titular professor at Montreal University and has been taking an active part animating the *Groupe interuniversitaire de recherche en anthropologie médicale et en ethnopsychiatrie* (GIRAME). His theoretical framework and methodology are based on a interpretative and critical perspective.

Marc Bourgault, is a journalist and reporter for Radio-Canada, radio. A university graduate literature, he has been working for the movie industry and has been a documentary film director for private television and an interviewer for Radio-Quebec's television.

Ellen Corin, Ph. D. psychoanalyst, is a researcher and professor for the Psychiatry and Anthropology programs at McGill University. She has many ongoing research projects, outside of Canada. She first participated in a series of research projects here in Quebec, then in Africa, in Latin America and in India. She is committed to furthering knowledge and developing mental health services that are both culturally and socially relevant for their users.

Yves Lecomte, Ph.D. (psychology). He is a professor at *Télé-université*. He was the founder and has been the director - for 25 years - of the *Journal Santé mentale au Québec* - a reference for mental health professionals in Quebec. He was also founder of the psychoanalytic journal, *Filigrane*. He has trained and supervised numerous clinical professionals and has contributed to the development of clinical research on mental health.

Emmanuel Stip, M.D., M.Sc., CSPQ, accredited member of the Pharmacology department and of the Medical faculty at Montreal University. He is an associate professor for the *Centre de recherche Hôpital Sacré-Coeur* of Montreal and for the *Centre de recherche Fernand-Séguin Hôpital Louis-Hippolyte Lafontaine*. He is also titular of the Eli Lilly Chair for research on schizophrenia at Montreal University.

France Nadeau, journalist. She has been training spokespersons for 18 years. She is presently one of the most distinguished specialist in image-making, of both verbal and non-verbal communications and is a sharp interviewer.

François Ansermet, psychoanalyst, professor of child-pediatric psychiatry for the Biology and Medicine faculty at Lausanne University (UNIL). The Center for Training, Research and Cooperation

The Center for Training, Research and Cooperation is a comprehensive psychoanalytical training program. It offers a six years basic program to health professionals and university professors from Quebec province who practice or teach in the mental health system or in associated fields where a psychodynamic approach is appropriate, for individuals with psychological and/or social difficulties. The same program is also offered to a group of approximately fifty American professionals and academics from across the United States.

The Training Center offers a number of clinical seminars (control seminars, clinical seminars, seminars on the treatment of psychosis, etc.) in which psychoanalysts in training at the Freudian School of Quebec must participate.

The Center also organizes or participates in organizing Symposia, Conferences and Clinical Days on psychoanalytic practice and applications of psychoanalysis in the field of mental health and family clinic.

Futhermore, the Center has created and presides over the GIFRIC Clinical Research Process (*Observatoire clinique*). The mandate of the Clinical Research Process is to gather and analyze treatment data gathered for all of the clinical activities concerning the five hundred or so psychotics or schizophrenics patients who are or have been treated at the Psychoanalytic Treatment Center for Young Psychotic Adults, the "388", which was created by GIFRIC in 1982. The Clinical Research Process, which also includes research data on the families of these patients, is the main instrument organizing the research and analysis of results that take part in the elaboration of guidelines for the psychoanalytic practice and treatment of psychotics under the agency of GIFRIC.

The Center for Training, Research and Cooperation of GIFRIC also administers the Research Consortium on psychoanalytic treatment, which brings together researchers from Quebec and the United States as well as from Europe.

Finally, the Center heads a publishing division that promotes publication in the various fields of specialty including the social sciences, psychoanalysis, the psychoanalytic treatment of psychosis, the family clinic, socio-cultural intervention and research.

Psychoanalytic Treatment

Center for Young Psychotic Adults

The Psychoanalytic Treatment Center for Young Psychotic Adults is the most concrete example of the psychoanalytic practice promoted by GIFRIC. Founded and developed by GIFRIC in 1982 and financed by the Ministry of Health through the Robert-Giffard's Hospital, the “388” provides highly specialized treatment to patients suffering from schizophrenia and other psychosis. It offers an alternative to conventional hospitalization by providing, in-site, intensive treatment services during periods of acute crisis and psychotic episodes. Located in the heart of the city and in close proximity to local community life, the Center provides an integrated and global treatment which is based on a psychoanalytic approach to psychosis. The Center is open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. It offers long-term treatment services to an average of one hundred patients at a time, throughout all of the various phases of their evolution, including that of periods of acute crisis.

For the excellence of its treatment services, the Center has earned an international acknowledgment attracting numerous visitors and student interns yearly, from countries including the United States, France, Belgium, Argentina among others. In 2004, the GIFRIC was named recipient of the Hans W. Loewald Prize issued by the IFPE (International Federation for Psychoanalytical Education) in recognition of the exceptional and unique contribution of GIFRIC to the history, theory and practice of psychoanalysis and most specifically, for the development of the psychoanalytic treatment for psychosis. In 2005, a research group from the NIMH (National Institute for Mental Health, USA), combining Harvard Medical School and Columbia University researchers, responsible for the American government to document the best practices in social rehabilitation for patients suffering from severe and chronic mental health problems, asked to meet with the analysts from GIFRIC to discuss, study and collaborate in order to integrate the “388” into their research. After visiting the Center, meeting and discussing with the analysts, psychiatrists, the clinical professionals and dozens of patients, and after studying each important treatment component, the research group concluded that the “388” had to be included in their research project. It represented the framework of treatment which offered an excellent link between theory and clinical practice with the most substantial results.


Discussions about the clinical practice at the "388" center and its associated results led the NIMH researchers to raise the standard criteria for social integration and to redefine the concept of social integration itself, what they did in their recent paper (April 2007) entitled "Connectedness and Citizenship: Redefining Social Integration". In fact, during the period they visited the "388", the Clinical Research Process of GIFRIC was showing that 65% of the patients treated had returned to active life and had become contributing citizens in society. Never have such encouraging results been obtained in the treatment of psychosis and schizophrenia in either North America or Europe.


