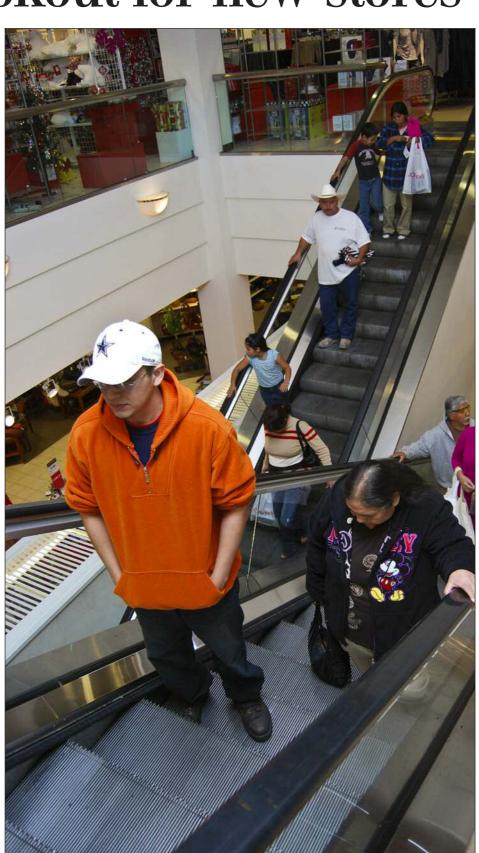

## Start-ups can look to state for answers

### Program helps small business succeed

Those wishing to start small businesses of their own have state resources to call on.

Several state agencies offer important resources for persons interested in starting small businesses. The Office of Small Business Assistance, for example, offers a program called the Texas Small Business Summit (TXSBS), which hosts informative forums across the state each year. The forums help Texans obtain critical information ranging from defining a market niche to starting a new business or growing an existing one.

Texas.Gov, the official web portal of the State of Texas, is a wonderful resource for Texans and for anyone interested in starting a business in the state. The website provides a useful guide and poses the four key questions every potential businessperson should ask before starting a new business:

What is my business structure?

What taxes will I have to pay?

What licenses and permits do I need?

What business requirements must I meet? Answering the questions can open a gateway to a thriving marketplace. Despite the national economic downturn, Texas has one of the best climates in the nation for business. It is one of the few states that experienced a net increase of jobs last year — approximately 93,000 — and has weathered the recession much better than many other states. CNNMoney-.com named Texas the number one state to launch a small business in in 2010, and CNBC named it "America's Top State for Business." Meanwhile, Webb County was among five Texas counties that Money magazine ranked among the nation's top 10 places

"Where the Jobs Are." Texas' public institu-tions of higher education also offer small businesspersons access to significant resources and information. Texas A&M International University (TAMIU), for example, is home to the Small Business Development Center (SBDC), whose mission is to "work with existing and startup businesses to help them grow and compete in today's global economy."

SBDC carries out its mission by providing business owners with oneon-one counseling regarding a variety of timely topics. What's more, it offers multiple training workshops throughout the year.

Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, filed Senate Bill (SB) 63, which would authorize a program to provide savings incentives and opportunities for eligible persons to pursue home ownership, post-secondary education and business development.





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
