Uniform Details:

Black Blazer with Academy Logo

Plain white school shirt

School Tie

Plain black skirt or trousers

Plain black socks

Plain black or skin coloured tights

Plain black sweater / cardigan (optional)

Plain black sensible shoes

NO hooded tops, hats, caps or denim

NO jewellery on grounds of safety and security (except for watches and one small plain sleeper or stud for pierced ears, no more than one per ear). Nose studs, tongue studs and other facial piercings are not allowed.

Discreet make-up is permitted.

Hair should be neat and tidy. Extreme or "attention seeking" styles are not suitable. Coloured hair braids are not acceptable.

Long black socks

Short white socks

Poetry GCSE Live

Year 11s went to Poetry Live in London on 1 December. Nikita Walker was one of them and here is her version of events:

"On Friday the 1st of December a group of year elevens visited London to watch GCSE poetry live with Mr Brayley, Mrs Bower and Mr Wilson. They arrived at the Mission Hall in central London at 10 o'clock and were taken into the hall. They were seated at the front of the hall and had a really good view. Poetry Live is an event where poets who are featured in the AQA exam anthology read and discuss their poems with students from across the country.

The first poet who performed her poem was Gillian Clarke. Gillian Clarke is a Welsh poet who writes in English. She was brought up in a Welsh family in Cardiff and although she now speaks fluent Welsh her upbringing was English-speaking. The poems she performed were Catrin, Baby-sitting, The Field Mouse and On the Train.

We then had an examiner come on who was called Peter Buckroyd. He told us what GCSE exams are like, what not to do and what to remember.

The next poet who performed was Carol Ann Duffy. Carol Anne Duffy was born in Glasgow in 1965 into what was once called a working-class family. Her first poetry collection was published in 1985. The poems she performed were Havisham, Elvis's Twin Sister and the last poem she performed was Anne Hathaway.

Simon Armitage was the next poet to perform. He started with a new poem called Luddendon Foot which was extremely funny; this poem was not in the programme that everyone was handed when they entered the Mission Hall. The poem he performed was Kid.

Imtiaz Dharder was the next poet to perform, This Room was the poem she performed and she also performed some of her new poems.

John Agard was the audience's favourite! The hall erupted with applause as he entered the stage. He was wonderful and read his magical poem 'Half Caste'. Year Eleven had a very productive day and were especially pleased that Mr Norman Wilson. Chair of Governors, joined them for the day!"
