The best football game of the present season was witnessed yesterday at the fair grounds by about 1,500 people when V. M. I. lined up against Davidson of North Carolina. The game was the hardest fought game played here in Roanoke for some years, and the hundreds of football enthusiasts who journeyed out to the fair grounds felt doubly repaid for their time and trouble. There were girls and women by the scores and the waving of colors intermingled with college yells lent plenty of excitement to the game. The rivalry was intense between the two teams and their supporters and the players on both sides fought until they were completely exhausted. If V. M. I. had won the game yesterday she would have been entitled to consideration for the championship of the South this year. Davidson defeated V. P. I. by the score of 12 to 5, and V. P. I. in turn defeated V. M. I. by the top heavy score of 22 to 0, so it can easily be seen that the respective merits of the teams cannot be based on the scores they made. V. M.
