## Home Team Defeated by a Score of 10 to 2

In a most interesting game our team received its first defeat of the season from the hands of St. John's College of Maryland. It might be mentioned that this is the first time for two years an opponent has made a touchdown on the V. M. I. field. We cannot and do not desire to attribute the result directly to hard luck, although with MacMillen, Maclean and Scott out of the game at the start we were certainly handicapped. Our opponents were heavy; excellently trained, and, in every way, played such a game that we have no reason to feel chagrined because we lost. With the exception of several instances of holding on the part of their interference, the game was an exceptionally clean one-a well fought battle between noble enemies.

The chief strength of St.John's team lay in "Chick" Bosly, their brilliant quarterback; Johnson and McAlpine, exceptionally fast ends: Ruhl, right half, and War-field(ex-Governor Warfield's son) their left half back. Throughout the game these men made remarkable plays. The features of the game were Ruhl's 80 yard run through an open field for a touchdown, and Bosly's drop kick from the 40 yard line for a goal.

I. received the kickoff on 10 yard line; retúrned 15 yards by Porter; Porter 13 yards around left; Davant thrown back five yards on run around right; Pattison five yards through line; Ferebee kicks and St. John's downed in tracks. 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## LECTURE ON THE <br> PANAMA CANAL

Mr. C. H. Bennett of Washington, D. C., delivered an illustrated lecture on the Panama Canal in Jackson Memorial Hall last Tuesday evening to the corps of cadets. A number of Washington and Lee students and residents of Lexington were also present.
Nir. Bennett spent a month in the Canal Zone studying the conditions there. He gave an accurate description of the immensity of the work and the nethods employed in doing it. He also compared the methods of the French engineers with those used by the Americans today, and showed pictures illustrating both. The sanitary condition of the Canal Zone as it was when the United States began the work and as it is now was thoroughly discussed. The quarters of the officers and the laborers were described and illustrated, and some of the details of the commissary department were given. Part of the lecture was devoted to the habits and customs of the natives of the Canal Zone, and illustrations showing the changes that have taken place since the United States has had control over them were given. Mr. Bennett treat ed the Panama Canal as the eighth wonder, and compared it by illustrations and figures with the other seven wonders, showing that it is more wonderful than any of them, and that it is the greatest work man has ever undertaken. The lecture was most instructive and was enjoyed by all.

Great Improvement at Last Made
