AMENDMENT OF TITLE 2, CHAPTER 120 OF MUNICIPAL CODE OF CHICAGO BY FURTHER REGULATION OF PERMIT APPLICATIONS FOR ALTERATION OR DEMOLITION OF LANDMARK STRUCTURES.

A Joint Committee, composed of the members of the Committee on Buildings and the members of the Committee on Historical Landmark Preservation, submitted the following report:

CHICAGO, September 1, 1999.

To the President and Members of the City Council:

Your Committee on Buildings and your Committee on Historical Landmark Preservation, having had under consideration an ordinance (which was referred June 9, 1999) regarding the powers and duties of Commissioners for landmark buildings, Chapter 2-120 of the Municipal Code of Chicago, begs leave to recommend that Your Honorable Body do *Pass* the substitute ordinance which is transmitted herewith. This recommendation was concurred in by the members of the Committee on Buildings and the Committee on Historical Landmark Preservation with no dissenting votes.

The following is said ordinance as passed:

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. Chapter 2-120 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by inserting a new Section 2-120-825 and by amending Sections

10909

2-120-810 and 2-120-830 by adding the language in italics and deleting the language in brackets, as follows:

2-120-825 Permits For Demolition Of Landmarks -- City Council Approval Required.

(a) Notwithstanding any other provision of this ordinance to the contrary, except as provided in subsection (c), in the case of any permit application for the demolition of 40% or more of any building or other structure designated as a "Chicago Landmark" or located in any district designated as a "Chicago Landmark", the commission's decision approving an application issued under Section 2-120-770, Section 2-120-790 or Section 2-120-800 shall be subject to review by the city council. Upon issuing its decision approving an application, the commission shall forward a recommendation for the approval of the permit application, in writing, to the committee on historical landmark preservation of the city council. Within 75 days after the receipt of the commission's recommendation, the committee on historical landmark preservation shall consider the commission's recommendation and vote to recommend that the city council accept or reject the commission's recommendation. At the next regular meeting of the city council following the committee's vote, unless the matter is deferred and published in accordance with state law, the city council shall, by passage of an appropriate order, accept or reject the commission's recommendation. If the matter is deferred and published, the city council shall, by passage of an appropriate order, accept or reject the commission's recommendation at the next regular meeting of the city council following the meeting at which the matter was deferred and published. If the city council does not accept or reject the commission's recommendation within the time specified herein, the commission's recommendation shall be deemed to be accepted. The city council's decision shall be based on whether the proposed demolition will adversely affect any significant historical or architectural feature of the improvement or the district, and is in accord with the Standards for Rehabilitation set forth by the United States Secretary of the Interior at 36 C.F.R. 67, as amended from time to time, as well as the criteria to review demolitions as set forth in the Rules and Regulations of the commission.

(b) For purposes of this section, 40% or more of a building or structure shall mean 40% or more of the significant historical or architectural features identified in the ordinance designating the building or structure or the district in which the building or structure is located a "Chicago Landmark"; provided that, if no significant features were identified in the designation ordinance, the entire building or structure shall be deemed a significant feature for purposes of this section.

(c) This section shall not apply to permit applications for the demolition of: (i) any building or structure that is necessary to remedy conditions imminently dangerous to life, health or property, as determined in writing by the department of buildings, the board of health or the fire department; or (ii) auxiliary buildings or structures such as garages. Within 30 days of the commission's decision approving a permit application for a building or structure pursuant to subsection (c)(i) of this section, the commission shall forward to the committee on historical landmark preservation of the city council a written report informing the committee of the commission's decision and stating the reasons for its decision.

2-120-810 Application For Permit-Final Commission Decision.

Unless the decision is subject to city council review under Section 2-120-825, the [The] written decision of the commission approving or disapproving an application for a permit under Section 2-120-800 shall be on the date it issues a final administrative decision appealable to the Circuit Court of Cook County under the provisions of the Illinois Administrative Review Act, Illinois Revised Statutes, Chapter 110, Section 3-1001, et seq.

2-120-830 Economic Hardship Exception -- Application.

Upon final notification from the commission or the city council of a [its] decision to deny an application for a permit to construct, reconstruct, alter, add to, demolish or relocate property given a preliminary recommendation for landmark status or designated as a "Chicago Landmark," the applicant may within 30 days apply to the commission for an economic hardship exception on the basis that denial of a permit will result in the loss of all reasonable and beneficial use or return from the property. The commission shall develop regulations that describe factors, evidence and testimony that will be considered by the commission in making its determination.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication.

TRIBUTE TO LATE MR. PHILIP M. KLUTZNICK.

WHEREAS, Philip M. Klutznick passed away on Saturday, August 14, 1999, at the age of ninety-two; and

WHEREAS, Philip M. Klutznick was born in Kansas City, Missouri to Orthodox Jewish parents; and

WHEREAS, After attending the University of Kansas and the University of Nebraska and receiving a law degree in 1930 from Creighton University in Omaha, Nebraska, Philip M. Klutznick began his career as an attorney in Omaha, then shifted his talent and energy to the field of urban renewal; and

WHEREAS, During World War II, President Franklin D. Roosevelt placed Philip M. Klutznick in charge of building houses for defense workers throughout the eastern half of the United States; and

WHEREAS, After serving his country in wartime, Philip M. Klutznick was head of the federal Public Housing Authority from 1944 to 1946, then he moved to the Chicago area, where he developed several suburbs, including Park Forest, the first postwar planned community, where he and his beloved wife Ethel were the first residents; and

WHEREAS, Philip M. Klutznick was a pioneer in shopping mall development, and he built some of the Chicago area's first malls, such as Chicago's own Water Tower Place, as well as Old Orchard in Skokie, Oak Brook Center in Oakbrook,

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and River Oaks in Calumet City; and

WHEREAS, In addition to his incomparable skills in property development, Philip M. Klutznick was also a statesman, who had close personal and political ties with former Illinois Governor Adlai E. Stevenson, and he served as a delegate to the United Nations under President Dwight D. Eisenhower, as an ambassador to the United Nations Economic and Social Council under President John F. Kennedy, and was also secretary of commerce under President Jimmy Carter in 1980 and 1981; and

WHEREAS, All his life, Philip M. Klutznick gave generously of his time to Jewish causes, and he was president of the international service organization B'nai B'rith from 1953 to 1959, president of the World Jewish Congress from 1977 to 1979; chairman of the American Housing Committee for Israel, president of the Memorial Foundation for Jewish Culture, and chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, among others; and

WHEREAS, Philip M. Klutznick is survived by five devoted children, his sons Robert, Samuel, Thomas and James, and his daughter Bettylu Saltzman; and

WHEREAS, Philip M. Klutznick was a dear friend to his thirteen grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren; and

WHEREAS, Philip M. Klutznick, a pioneer and a philanthropist, a cherished friend of many and an inspiration and source of strength and courage to all, will be greatly missed and fondly remembered by his many family members, friends and associates; now, therefore,

TRIBUTE TO LATE KING HASSAN II.

WHEREAS, King Hassan II of Morocco died on July 23rd, 1999, at the age of seventy, after a thirty-eight year reign; and

WHEREAS, Moulay Hassan was born July 9, 1929, the eldest of six children of Sultan Sidi Mohammed, and educated in Morocco and France, where he served for a time in the French navy; and

WHEREAS, When the French granted Morocco independence on March 2, 1956, his father became King Mohammed V, and on January 9, 1957, Moulay Hassan became minister of defense and crown prince; following his father's death in 1961, at the age of thirty-one, Hassan became King Hassan II; and

WHEREAS, During decades of great population growth and numerous challenges, while many Arab monarchies were ended, he warded off the threats of revolution and religious extremism with consummate political skill and increasingly modified his rule with some of the features of democracy; and

WHEREAS, King Hassan survived at least ten attempts on his life, including an army rebellion that invaded the King's birthday party in 1971 and an attack on the royal jets in 1972; and

WHEREAS, King Hassan II preserved an admirable record of religious tolerance in Morocco; he bore the title of Commander of the Faithful, while resisting Islamic fundamentalism; and

WHEREAS, From the 1970s on, King Hassan II was a force for peace in the Middle East: he worked for agreement between Israel and the Palastinian Liberation Organization, including hosting a Middle East economic summit in 1994, attended by both Yitzhak Rabin and Yasser Arafat; and

WHEREAS, In the 1990s, King Hassan II lead Morocco into a new era of greater freedom and democracy: in 1990, he released political prisoners; in 1997, constitutional reform led to elections to a bicameral parliament; in 1998, he appointed a socialist prime minister, thus giving an independent leader substantial political power; and

WHEREAS, King Hassan II is survived by his wife, Lalla Latifa; his eldest son, the new King Mohammed VI; another son and three daughters; and many other beloved family members; and

WHEREAS, King Hassan had a distinguished career as a ruler and statesman,

and he will always be remembered as a king who brought stability to a troubled region, and was beloved by his people and the world; now, therefore,

WHEREAS, With this small beginning, ten pupils and one professionally trained teacher, the school proved that education for these children was valuable and its success stimulated parents to start schools throughout Illinois and the nation; and

WHEREAS, During the 1950s, Mr. Neumann worked diligently in Illinois for education for all children with mental disabilities and in 1953, Governor William G. Stratton, with Victor Neumann at his side, signed the bill mandating public education for mentally handicapped children in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The mission of the Victor C. Neumann school expanded as the children became older and required a different, more specialized training, resulting in the opening in 1959 of an Industrial Training Center to teach vocational skills to mentally disabled adults; and

WHEREAS, In 1968 a permanent site for the Neumann School was built and financed totally through Lions Club contributions and in 1978 expanded services to include children with severe emotional and behavioral problems who require uniquely specialized education due to the complexity of their needs; and

WHEREAS, Today, Neumann School West (elementary education) and Neumann School East (high school education) continue to serve children with complex and profound mental disabilities and the Department of Children's Services has expanded to include therapeutic residential foster family services to children with severe sexually aggressive behavior while the mission and services of The Neumann Association has continued to expand in response to the needs of the entire community from young children to older adults; and

TRIBUTE TO LATE MR. PHILIP M. KLUTZNICK.

WHEREAS, Philip M. Klutznick was a citizen of singular force and vigorous action and his death Saturday, August 14, was a blow to the spirit of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, Philip M. Klutznick was a savant of urban life, a builder and steward of Chicago, a great international city on an inland sea, which he served with intelligence, sophistication and compassion; and

WHEREAS, His vision embraced a concept of rapidly constructed housing in several regions of the nation with flourishing cities at the heart of each; and he began with the sweeping land clearance and public housing initiative of President Franklin D. Roosevelt during the economic depression of the 1930s; and

WHEREAS, Philip M. Klutznick's vision was further illuminated during the Second World War years when Franklin D. Roosevelt asked him to supervise rapid housing development and he positioned entire residential cities around national defense manufacturing enclaves; and

WHEREAS, His labor and prescience served Presidents Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry S Truman who called on him to serve as chief of the national Public Housing Administration; and he served as envoy to the United Nations for presidents Dwight D. Eisenhower, John F. Kennedy and Jimmy Carter, who appointed him Secretary of Commerce; and

WHEREAS, Philip M. Klutznick's personal triumph was the building of Park Forest, Illinois, an entire suburban town covering twenty-five acres of land twenty-seven miles south of Chicago, and built for returning war veterans desperate for housing, built following his concept of low density land-use -- duplex, townhouse and ranchhouse homes -- which launched strong community organization, in a community of winding streets and roads all leading to a commercial mall; and

WHEREAS, Philip M. Klutznick founded the suburban regional mall and developed several more, all considered the best ever built, and while the regional mall sustained surging consumer demand, he counseled small town merchants to compete by rehabilitating and modernizing to keep up with change; and

WHEREAS, His early regional malls were prototypes for the nation and architects and scholars of suburban development agree Philip M. Klutznick's practical vision changed the face of America, as well as the country's form of shopping; and

WHEREAS, Visionary Philip M. Klutznick anticipated the "return to the city" movement and built the first urban mall, Water Tower Place, a revolution in big city land-use which combined a vast high-rise shopping mall with condominium homes and a hotel; and he followed that with Dearborn Park, another low density use of land in the heart of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, Philip M. Klutznick was champion and philanthropist for many notprofit Jewish organizations and was named international president of B'nai B'rith, Israel Bond Man of the Year, president of the World Jewish Congress and he devoted great energy and influence on behalf of the young State of Israel; now, therefore,

Sister Rosemary was appointed administrator of Misericordia Home in 1969 and is the executive director of the two Chicago campuses.

WHEREAS, Misericordia Home/Heart of Mercy Center has been singled out for special public praise and featured on several national telecasts. Sister Rosemary's work with children and adults with Downs Syndrome has merited the National Caritas Award of the Kennedy Foundation; and

WHEREAS, In 1982 the Doctor of Humane Letters, Honoris Causa, was conferred upon Sister Rosemary by Loyola University. In March of 1984, the Association of Chicago Priests presented Sister Connelly with "The Coordinating Board Award for Outstanding Christian Service to the Chicagoland Community". In 1985, Sister Rosemary was the recipient of the Chicago Bible Society's honored Guttenberg Award for "her extraordinary love and concern for so many children and young adults who suffer physical and mental disabilities". On April 19, 1986 Sister was chosen from outstanding Chicago women in a particular field for her "Outstanding Achievements in the Field of Social Work" by Lourdes High School. In 1987 Sister Rosemary received the Chicago Special Olympics "Ann McGlone Burke Olympian Service Award" which was presented by the Joseph P. Kennedy Foundation of the Illinois Special Olympics Board. Honorary Membership in the Chicago Pediatric Society was granted to Sister Rosemary in May of 1988 for her "dedicated contribution to children". In 1992, Sister Rosemary Connelly received the prestigious Sword of Loyola Citation from Loyola University's Stritch School of Medicine. In June 1993, Sister Connelly accepted the Professional of the Year Award from the Young Irish Fellowship Club of Chicago. In 1994, Sister Connelly was chosen the first woman Grand Marshall of the City of Chicago's Saint Patrick's Day Parade. In that same year North Ridge Boulevard, which constitutes the eastern border of Misericordia's north campus, was named "Sister Rosemary Connelly Drive" in her honor. In 1996, Sister Connelly was invited to Ireland where she received the International County Mayo Peoples' Award in Castlebar, Ireland. In 1997, Sister Rosemary was presented with the degree of Doctor of Laws, Honoris Causa, by the University of Notre Dame. In addition to the awards and citations indicated here Sister Rosemary Connelly has received many other well deserved awards; and

WHEREAS, Sister Rosemary Connelly is a dedicated and caring person and in her own words her credo can be summarized, "We are no longer willing to accept anything less than a good today and a better tomorrow for all people, but especially for those who need our help to make this a reality"; now, therefore,
