Gioachino Rossini's *Stabat Mater* stands alongside the Verdi *Requiem* as one of the great operas of the liturgical repertoire. At its first performance in 1842, the composer's name "was shouted out amid the applause. The entire work transported the audience: the triumph was complete. Three numbers had to be repeated... and the audience left the theatre moved and seized by an admiration that won all Paris." Depicting Mary's anguish at the foot of the cross in a musical language drawn from the stage, Rossini's emotionally translucent score brings the theatrical urgency and narrative flair vividly to life.
