Fifteen Critical Years of The Melody Maker British Jazz Polls

<u>The Melody Maker Jazz</u> <u>Polls British Section</u> <u>1960–1974</u>

The 1960s and the beginning of the 1970s were very exciting decades for British modern jazz and were almost totally dominated by the phenomenal Tubby Hayes. However, at this point there were other musicians who had made a big impact on the scene, notably Johnny (now Sir John) Dankworth and Humphrey Lyttelton who was initially a traditional jazz musician but later 'defected' to a rather more modern (mainstream) jazz style. Trad had been a dominant feature of the music scene in the 1950s thanks to its rise in popularity and a later subgenre of trad, skiffle, spawned initially by Ken Colyer and Chris Barber and which was consolidated by the chart success of Barber's guitarist and singer Lonnie Donegan. Whilst Donegan was known to have, to some extent, influenced the Beatles, who started out playing in skiffle bands, John Dankworth's compositions,

particularly his writing and arrangements for his big bands in the 1960s, undoubtedly had a big influence on the modern / contemporary jazz scene. Other major players at this time included Kenny Ball and Acker Bilk both of whom (like Humph) achieved pop chart success. John Dankworth also dominated the polls in the 1950s as did Humphrey Lyttelton in the early to mid 1960s. The Melody Maker, which was launched in 1926, was the premier popular music newspaper of the 20th Century. Its annual jazz polls were a major event in the jazz world but also were an important historical public record of the state of British jazz through the years. The Melody Maker ceased publication in 2000 and these polls have been cited verbatim in an attempt to provide qualitative context to the main section of musical criticism above. Additionally, the quoting of these polls attempts to preserve some historical perspective on British jazz, which the Melody Maker dutifully reflected for many years. The British jazz sections normally accompanied the World jazz sections which are not included here.

This list covers the 15 years of jazz polls from 1960 to 1974, during which time there were several major changes in jazz. There was an obvious move away from traditional jazz to modern jazz. The domination of the former is shown to diminish in the polls from the early 1960s in favour of the latter genre. Also, later in the 1960s there is a burgeoning presence in the polls of some free players such as Derek Bailey and Tony Oxley (although Oxley also played some 'straight' jazz too). From the early 1970s there was a notable divergence towards fusion with John McLaughlin in the guitar section and Ian Carr's Nucleus and later Soft Machine dominating the small group section. This list of British jazz poll winners also aims to provide an illustration of what has often been referred to as a 'golden age' of British jazz, when for the first time British jazz musicians were being taken very seriously indeed by their American counterparts. Dankworth was friends with the likes of Duke Ellington and Charlie Parker, Hayes recorded with some great American stars, whilst McLaughlin and Dave Holland

were eagerly snatched away to the USA by Miles Davis (although they were not the first British musicians Miles had employed, nor the first to achieve jazz stardom in America). Stan Tracey had been highly lauded by Sonny Rollins when, as house pianist at Ronnie Scott's, Tracey accompanied him. By the late 1960s and early 1970s, Ian Carr's Nucleus having won the Montreux Jazz Festival and played at Newport were now international stars. Others were gaining or later gained international status, such as Derek Bailey, Tony Coe, John Marshall, Tony Oxley, John Surman and Kenny Wheeler. Other factors in the growing international reputation of British jazz were the lifting of the Musicians Union ban on American and British musicians visiting each others' countries and the subsequent increasing popularity and commercial success of Ronnie Scott's jazz club in London which acted as a pivotal base at that time for both home grown and international musicians. Several other jazz clubs were thriving at that time including the 100 Club but jazz musicians were also being given stage room at

rock venues. Certainly this was the case with Nucleus, Soft Machine, IF, Mike Westbrook's Solid Gold Cadillac and many others. Jazz was also benefiting from the rise in The Beatles and rock music, thus 'electric' jazz started to become more widespread. There were many crossover bands who straddled both jazz and rock such as Brand X, Caravan, Colosseum, Hatfield and The North and The Keef Hartley Band. However by the mid–1970s and especially by 1976 when punk rock robustly ousted any other popular musical format for some time (particularly progressive rock) the 'golden age' of jazz was doomed and took years to recover in the UK.

Ian Carr and the Melody Maker

The inclusion of fifteen years of these Melody Maker jazz polls affords a wider perspective on the rise of Ian Carr's musical prowess and attempts to show the pre–Carr years in relation to the rise of Carr's partner Don Rendell, who was something of a jazz star even in the 1950s having been a member of Johnny Dankworth's Seven and also charts the slightly earlier rise to fame of other Ian Carr colleagues such as Jeff Clyne and Michael Garrick. This early inclusion also attempts to put a perspective on the British jazz Scene at the beginning of the 1960s and illustrates who were the major players at this time. It must be remembered that although Tubby Hayes and John Dankworth were preeminent in the British Jazz world at this time, by the mid 1960s, the Rendell–Carr Quintet had become major players on the scene and notably Ian Carr retained his popular stature until the middle of the next decade. Don Rendell had made a brave move away from mainstream jazz to original and very modern jazz, first with his seminal album Roarin' and then with the Rendell-Carr Quintet. Don Rendell came top in the British section of the 1957 Melody Maker jazz poll in the tenor saxophone section before Tubby Hayes dominated this section from 1958 onwards until 1970. Also in the 1957 poll Don

Rendell was voted into fourth place in the 'Musician of the Year' category and he was in

third place in the 'small combo' section for the same year. His trajectory was thence slightly downwards until it dramatically revived some ten years later, except in the category of tenor where he consistently figured highly apart from 1965 and from 1970 onwards. Other modernists who began to be noticed in these polls in the 1950s were Joe Harriott (top alto player in 1959) and Ronnie Ross (baritone) in 1958 and 1959. The late Allan Ganley was top drummer in 1957, 1958, 1959 and 1960. He was still playing in Dankworth's bands right up until his untimely death in 2008 following routine heart surgery. The fact that Don Rendell was already a highly regarded tenor player in the 1950s, added to the piquancy of his renaissance in the next decade with the Rendell–Carr Quintet. Table 1 (below) gives the number of times the following respective musicians or their own records were featured in any place in the Melody Maker jazz polls (British section) over the fifteen year period between 1960 and 1974. Only those who were featured for a minimum of twenty times during this period have been listed. Of

these fourteen musicians Tubby Hayes came top and unsurprisingly musicians such as John Dankworth and Stan Tracey featured in the next two places. Although trad jazz musicians did not feature much in these polls after 1963, in which year the MM published a separate trad poll, it is surprising that Sandy Brown, a mainly trad musician figured so highly in these (non-trad) polls. However, Sandy Brown did make one highly unusual album, Hair At Its Hairiest, with Brown depicted on the LP sleeve half naked and wearing a long wig. What was more unusual about this album than the cover was that it included modernists John McLaughlin and Kenny Wheeler amongst the sextet. The arrangements and performances of covers of *Hair* (the musical) were quite extraordinary and at times almost avant garde in their approach, despite George Chisholm's often successful attempts to impart a sense of humour into the proceedings. Other notable prominently featured musicians in the poll included singer and organist Georgie Fame who achieved considerable success in the (pop) charts and pianist and

vibraphonist Bill Le Sage who undoubtedly never received the more widespread recognition he deserved.

Also, crucially, though perhaps not surprisingly, both Ian Carr and Don Rendell figure highly in the polls. Although two of the musicians in Table 1 were regarded as traditional jazz musicians (Humphrey Lyttelton and Sandy Brown), Lyttleton shocked the trad world in the late 1950s by transferring his musical allegiance to mainstream jazz. Whilst even trad stalwart Sandy Brown had made a few mainstream recordings including the aforementioned Hair At Its Hairiest. By 1960 things were set in place for a movement away from mainstream and trad. John Dankworth, who started his career playing dance music but moved on to play mainstream by the late 1950s, totally embraced modern jazz by the early 1960s with his suite of four important big band albums and his collaborative recording with Kenny Wheeler, the seminal Windmill Tilter.

The top small group was now Soft Machine which had poached Karl Jenkins and John Marshall from Nucleus. To make matters worse Soft Machine then recruited bassist Roy Babbington who had replaced Jeff Clyne following his departure from Nucleus. Although Ian Carr still appeared in the trumpet and composer sections (both third place) his – and Nucleus' – luck was running out as far as the MM poll was concerned. However, the Melody Maker jazz poll itself was running out of luck too, perhaps seen as an anachronism in an increasingly rock-influenced musical world.
