ello from CCMS! Fall, football and playoff baseball ... as the Cincinnati Reds give it a go in the post-season. Your alma mater rolls along through the first decade in the 21st century with a nice strong Fall class start. As the college enters its third year under new leadership, we continue to fight for your support and feedback.

Let's talk about support...during the August Strategic Planning meeting, the Board of Trustees (BOT) reviewed a report of contributions to the college. In particular, they focused on membership to the CFME.

In the Spring Newsletter edition we wrote... we are striving for the largest Cincinnati Foundation for Mortuary Education (CFME) membership drive since I joined the college. You are all "alumni" to the college, but a Foundation member has taken the extra step to participate in the evolution of the institution. Whether some participation in the direction and leadership through exercising your CFME voting rights, or monetarily in contributing to the annual fund, you are a critical part to our overall success.

We have two primary requirements:

- To enhance our building/physical plant fund;
- To build and strengthen our grant/ scholarship fund.



The CCMS campus has been at its present location for fifteen years.
This translates into approximately 1,500 students through, 30 open houses, 30 graduation ceremonies and celebration teas, 35 CEU/training opportunities with

close to 2,000 attendees...all of this activity is wonderful and exactly what should be happening, but with it comes "wear and tear".... We need an upgrade to our HVAC (Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning) system in the clinical labs, and the college auditorium carpeting, seats and A/V (audio – visual) badly needs updating.

Only 3% of CCMS alumni are CFME members.

We are, as a result of earlier efforts, able to offer "needs-based" grants. Helping out where we can, we distributed approximately \$12,000 in funds last year to our most deserving candidates.

CCMS and Regional Accreditation A call for third party comment

The Cincinnati College of Mortuary Science (CCMS) will undergo a comprehensive evaluation visit May 16-18, 2011, by a team representing The Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. CCMS has been accredited by the Commission since 1982. Its accreditation is at the Bachelor's degree level.

The Higher Learning Commission is one of six accrediting agencies in the United States that provide institutional accreditation on a regional basis. Institutional accreditation evaluates an entire institution and accredits it as a whole. Other agencies provide accreditation for specific programs. Accreditation is voluntary. The Commission accredits approximately 1,100 institutions of higher education in a nineteen state region. The Commission is recognized by the US Department of Education.

For the past year and a half, CCMS has been engaged in a process of self-study, addressing the Commission's requirements and criteria for accreditation. The evaluation team will visit the institution to gather evidence that the self-study is thorough and accurate. The team will recommend to the Commission a continuing status for

the college; following a review process, the Commission itself will take the final action.

The public, as well as our alumni, are invited to submit comments regarding the college to:

Comments will not be treated as confidential.

Note: Individuals with a specific dispute or grievance with an institution should request the separate Policy on Complaints document from the Commission office. The Higher Learning Commission cannot settle disputes between institutions and individuals. Complaints will not be considered third party comment.

THE JOSEPH CLARKE SOCIETY FOR PLANNED GIVING




