



"I am in sympathy for the gospel preacher in the church of Christ. Why? He stands up to preach in a frigidaire. The congregation sits out there and tries to freeze him. Some good pious brother just looks like a cake of ice looking at him. When I find one trying to freeze me I don't look at him no more. I want to say a word to the young gospel preacher. Don't get discouraged when they try to freeze you, 'cause they know a little more than you do and you're just making your first effort of all and they'll try to freeze you. But don't get excited—you'll make it. I want to tell you what to do. When you see one trying to freeze you, you do like you do with your modern frigidaire—turn on your defroster. That's right. That's right. I've got a defroster on you all this evening; that's the reason you're smiling and encouraging me. You started in here freezing, but I have you defrosted."

Archie Word said, "Here I stand, my Bible and I. I dare not add to it in either large or small things. It is the divine Word of God, equipping the man of God for all things. If a thing is in the Bible I will live for it and if needs be, die for it. But if it is not in the Bible I will fight it with all the God-given strength I have. Who will meet me on this ground? I can meet you on no other!" (*The Church Speaks*, Nov. 6, 1949).

Like Jacob's, these encounters come only after intense wrestling. But coming in contact with God himself is worth the effort."

Richard John Neuhaus writes:

A good general rule for preachers is this: If a story does not serve the gospel, it will distract from the gospel. Too often, homiletical "illustrations" employed to illuminate the scriptural text displace the text. How often have you gone away remembering the cute story but forgetting the scriptural text, or even the point of the story? Richard Lischer teaches preaching at Duke University and writes in the *Christian Century*:

"In the pulpit, preachers tell the story because God got involved with a particular people in a specific time and place, and that involvement generated a history in which we are privileged to participate by faith, baptism, and the common life. We [preachers] are not generic storytellers. We are nailed to a particular plot. The preacher's task is not to tell bunches of substitute stories, which in the end deflect our attention from the searing reality of the person before God, but to tell that one story, the one that precedes the general category of 'story,' and to tell it in such a way that it makes our stories permeable to it."

"Since preaching was central in the ministry of Jesus so it should be in the church. The church always stands in need of Biblical preaching. While the church may not always want Biblical preaching, the church always needs Biblical preaching. The church needs Biblical preaching to survive as Christ's body. John Stott is correct, 'Preaching is indispensable to Christianity' (*Between Two Worlds*, 15). The message which saves is also the message which nurtures. Nothing will replace Biblical preaching unless it is better Biblical preaching." –**Mark Scott** (Excerpt from *One Body* magazine article)

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
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"I didn't try to impress you with polished speeches and the latest philosophy. I deliberately kept it plain and simple:
