





Dear Expeditioners,

We're going back to Russia! Three years ago I led Aurora Expeditions' inaugural voyages through the Kuril Islands and along Kamchatka Peninsula and was blown away by the wildlife, the people and fantastic landscapes.

Now, after a short break, Aurora Expeditions is returning, adding amazing voyages to the White Sea, remote Franz Josef Land, and most incredible of all, a 26-day adventure across the North East Passage, from European Russia to the Far East.

A warning though, Russia can be very addictive. Rosy, my wife, discovered this years ago. After annual pilgrimages to study Russian language at St. Petersburg State University, she joined Sergey Frolov, now Aurora Expeditions special guest lecturer, on a pioneering voyage through the Kuril Islands to Kamchatka. Their reports and photos inspired Aurora to run the first Australian expedition cruises to the region.


Each landing brings a sense of wildness or intrigue. There is abundant wildlife, incredible seabird rookeries, exotic cultures and the thrill of investigating abandoned military or weather outposts. The intensity of experience and sense of discovery reminds me of our first voyages to Antarctica nearly two decades ago.

Our goal is to investigate the secluded islands and spectacular coastline of this forgotten land. The lack of infrastructure makes access to many places virtually impossible by any means other than by ship.

This is definitely not a conventional cruise. If you're expecting to arrive on time at each location on our proposed itineraries, this is not the trip for you. We may wake up to find ourselves a long way from where we expected to be, thanks to weather, currents, possibly even pack ice. Flexibility is not only the key to a successful voyage, it's the essence of adventure.

We invite you to join us, along with our team of expert lecturers and expedition leaders, as we journey into one of the world's wildest frontiers.

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Voyage Highlights

Secrets of the White Sea features complex history, culture, taiga wilderness and astounding birdlife. From the Barents Sea to the White Sea, we call into isolated Pomor villages, search for prehistoric petraglyphs and labyrinths, tour medieval monasteries built by hermit monks, later taken over for Stalin's harsh gulags. Join us for optional hikes in Arctic light.

Voyage to the End of the Earth offers a rare chance to visit Novaya Zemlya and Franz Josef Land. Access to these Arctic wonderlands has been restricted for decades, due to their military sensitivity. The highly productive Kara Sea attracts diverse marine life, including walrus, whales and seals. Explorers have been drawn to this area for centuries, searching for both the North Pole and a maritime route to the east. Our own explorations take us to historic huts and abandoned research stations.

Across the North East Passage attempts one of the great geographical challenges of our time – a must for explorers and the adventure-minded. We traverse nine time zones and six seas, from Murmansk to Anadyr, following in the wake of Baron Nils Nordenskjöld – the first to succeed. We call at numerous archipelagos, huge Siberian river deltas and discover isolated Eskimo villages, polar bear dens and a treasure trove of Arctic wildlife.








Bering Sea Explorer reveals a wildlife wilderness. Chukotka's deep bays and mountainous coast blaze with autumn colour. We encounter Chukchi fishermen, brown bears, walrus and whales. Commander Islands captivate us with Aleut cultural performances, sea lions, fur seals, otters, extensive bird cliffs and explorer Vitus Bering's grave. Kamchatka's 120 or so volcanoes rise above abandoned villages and bird-filled forests. Koryak culture and geological wonders are set amidst a stunning landscape.

The Ring of Fire displays the spectacular results of the forces that shape our world – tectonic plates and volcanism. Active volcanoes, sculpted basalt sea cliffs, archways, tunnels, and lush vegetation provide habitat for an astounding diversity of wildlife. We see large numbers of seabirds, sea lions, otters and whales. Soak in hot springs, hike through megaherb forests, visit Cold War listening posts, secret Soviet Navy bases and remains of the Ainu villages.


Explore the coastline, hike across tundra, sit and photograph wildlife, or simply take in views from the ship. We aim to make two to three landings a day.

Excitement of shipboard life


Whether in Murmansk, Arkhangelsk, Anadyr or Petropavlovsk-Kamchatskiy remnant Soviet architecture and lively street scenes captivate us as we make our way from airport to waterfront. After months of planning, preparation and travel we finally arrive on the wharf, where salty sea air and clear Arctic light engulf us, and our hearts race as we spot *Akademik Shokalskiy*. Our sturdy little ship is the perfect vessel to carry us to places few have ever seen.

As we step aboard to a heartfelt welcome, we appreciate the camaraderie and the relaxed, exciting atmosphere. After our initial briefing, we gather on the flying bridge as the ship's lines are cast off, and with a blast of the horn, our adventure begins.

If the weather is kind, the bright sunshine of an Arctic evening may sparkle on the Barents, White or Bering seas before we head inside to prepare for the next day's landings. Thanks to our Captain's "open bridge" policy we have a congenial place to watch for seabirds, whales and pack ice. The outside decks also provide great viewing platforms.

Zodiacs whisk us to soaring seabird cliffs, Pomor villages, medieval monasteries, explorers' historic huts or simply ashore to stretch our legs on tundra and mountain walks. Thanks to the Midnight Sun, our philosophy of making the most of every opportunity to explore is put to practice. The sauna is especially appreciated after a Polar Plunge, a day's hiking, kayaking, or a brisk Zodiac cruise. Our excellent chefs prepare three healthy, delicious meals each day, with snacks and treats available in the dining rooms at other times.

The *Akademik Shokalskiy* bar is a homey spot to play cards and read in the afternoon, a buzzing place at Happy Hour where the day's excitement is shared, digital photos swapped and even a mini dance floor on the open seas.

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
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Welcome aboard Akademik Shokalskiy


Aurora Expeditions is pleased to present *Akademik Shokalskiy* – our newest vessel and sister ship to our famed *Polar Pioneer*. Designed and built as an ice-strengthened research ship in Finland in 1982, she has explored much of the world's polar waters. Fully refurbished in 2008, the ship provides simple yet comfortable accommodation for a maximum of 54 passengers. Her excellent reputation for polar expedition cruising is due to her strength, manoeuvrability and size.

Our highly experienced Russian captain and crew are among the best ice navigators in the world. The spacious bridge is always open to us and decks are ideal for viewing the dramatic polar landscapes and wildlife. All cabins have outside portholes and ample storage space, whilst the public areas include a lounge bar, a lecture room/library, sauna, medical office and dining rooms. Meals are wholesome, delicious and prepared by Western chefs, while Russian stewardesses attend the dining room. The vessel is also equipped with a small fleet of inflatable Zodiacs ensuring easy travel from ship to shore.

Sergey Frolov

Our special guest lecturer was born into a long line of Russian seafarers and grew up in Petropavlovsk-Kamchatskiy, where he developed a love of sled dog mushing and exploration. Between 1987-1991, Sergey lived in the Russian Arctic, where the Siberian Yupik Eskimos taught him to build "umiaks", traditional skin boats, which they used to cross Bering Strait to Alaska three times, reuniting families split by the Cold War. His entertaining talks are beautifully illustrated and give a rare insight into the places we visit.



Howard Whelan

Expedition leader, journalist and cinematographer, Howard filmed the first Australian ascent of Mt. Everest, was founding editor of Australian Geographic and led film crews to Antarctica for the Academy Award-winning feature *Happy Feet*. His passion for exploration has seen him lead expeditions to some of the planet's most remote regions, including Antarctica, the Amazon, Galapagos Islands, and the Russian Far East. He spent three months in Russia researching an article for *Outside* magazine, travelling from the Kola Peninsula, across Siberia to Kamchatka.



Rosy Whelan

Assistant expedition leader, Rosy is a researcher, writer, teacher, and adventurer, with a wide range of experience in film, television, publishing and education. As one of the first Aurora Expeditions employees, she developed environmental policies that helped shape Antarctic tourism. Rosy originally visited Russia in 1998 to study Russian language at St. Petersburg State University. She has returned many times since, and has thoroughly enjoyed sampling a variety of Russian destinations.



Dr. Alan Burger

Expedition naturalist, Alan was born and raised in the South African bushveld. He's studied albatross, petrels, penguins, and terrestrial invertebrates. Alan immigrated to Canada in 1980 and is now an Adjunct Associate Professor at the University of Victoria in British Columbia. A wildlife conservationist, Alan has worked with Aurora Expeditions in the Antarctic, Arctic and Russian Far East.



James Cresswell

Geologist, glaciologist, mountain guide and photographer, James is from the Brecon Beacons National Park in Wales and has a degree in Geology and a Masters in Oceanography. He is especially interested in Climate Change, and frequently gives Climate Change talks around the UK. Dr. Jaye Martin

Medical officer Jaye is a specialist physician based in Broome, WA. The unpredictable and varied nature of her work involves extensive 4WD travel in the remote Kimberley, and means that she is resourceful and adaptable! She grew up and graduated from Medical School in the UK, immigrating to WA in 1991. She worked in the WA Goldfields, Central Desert Wheatbelt, and Perth, before moving to the Kimberley.



Join us for our inaugural Russian Arctic voyages!

The Russian Arctic spans nine time zones, six seas and one ocean. Like an epic tale set across taiga, tundra and polar desert, the region's intriguing history can be read in the landscape and its cultural sites.


Our inaugural voyages carry us to archipelagos that were once hills and mountaintops rising from the Great Arctic Plain, savannahs where rhinoceros and woolly mammoth grazed and died, leaving fossils in the permafrost.

As sea levels rose, people settled on the White Sea coast, creating beautiful stone labyrinths and ceremonial sites. In the early 12th century, the Pomors arrived and built a string of villages from the Kola Peninsula to halfway across Siberia.

The Arctic Ocean's productive waters attracted walrus, Beluga whales, narwhals and millions of seabirds. Fishing and hunting sustained the Karelians, Eskimos, Inuit and Chukchi.

In the 14th century, two hermit monks, sailed to the Solovetskie Islands in search of solitude. A vision prompted them to build a small monastery, a project that pilgrims championed for 500 years, until Stalin's desecration reduced magnificent churches and fortresses into gulags.





Secrets of the White Sea departs Murmansk to trace the stunning Kola Peninsula coast. Birdlife is prolific and we see bearded and ringed seals, stopping at Pomor villages on our way to the World Heritage listed Solovetskie Islands. Our kayakers hope to paddle the centuries old stone channels.

When Finnish-Swedish explorer Baron Nils Nordenskjold first navigated the North East Passage in 1879, most of the Siberian coast had been mapped, and archipelagos as far north as Franz Josef Land discovered and claimed. Other polar explorers – like Barents, Lomonosov and Nansen – left a legacy of weathered shelters. Two World Wars brought Allied convoys to the White Sea, and a Russian military presence across the Arctic that remains today.

Voyage to the End of the Earth departs Arkhangelsk and sails to Franz Josef Land. Swept by pack ice and home to polar bears, walrus and whales, the archipelago's icy mountains are rarely visited. On the way we hope to land at Novaya Zemlya, one of Russia's most restricted areas.

Across the North East Passage departs Murmansk for one of the planet's greatest expedition voyages. We land on isolated archipelagos like Severnaya Zemlya and Novosibirskie Islands, explore two of Russia's great river deltas and visit World Heritage listed Wrangel Island. We hope to pass through Bering Strait, between Russia and Alaska, completing our epic journey in Anadyr.

Secrets of the White Sea



MEDIEVAL MONASTERIES, GULAG MUSEUMS AND REMNANTS OF ANCIENT CULTURES SET AGAINST A HIGH ARCTIC BACKDROP. MIGRATORY BIRDS FILL THE SKIES. PINE AND SPRUCE TREES SING BENEATH SNOW-TINGED MOUNTAINTOPS. DEPARTING FROM MURMANSK – GATEWAY TO THE ARCTIC AND FAMED FOR HOSTING ALLIED CONVOYS DURING TWO WORLD WARS - ARRIVING IN ARKHANGELSK. RUSSIA'S OLDEST SEAPORT. THIS VOYAGE CARRIES YOU FROM THE BARENTS SEA TO THE HEART OF THE WHITE SEA. **OUR EXPLORATIONS TAKE US ACROSS WATERS RICH IN MARINE LIFE** AND THROUGH NEAR-DESERTED POMOR VILLAGES. MUNCHING WILD BERRIES, ADMIRING EXQUISITE WOODEN CHURCHES. WE DISCOVER A TUNDRA-COVERED COAST SPECKLED WITH SUMMER'S REMNANT WILDFLOWERS; POLAR TERN, KITTIWAKE AND GUILLEMOT COLONIES; PREHISTORIC STONE LABYRINTHS AND AN ISLAND OF PINK GRANITE. FROM MUSHROOM GATHERERS TO ORTHODOX MONKS. WE MEET A PEOPLE PROUD AND PROTECTIVE OF THEIR REMARKABLE HERITAGE.

Day 1

After your overnight stay in Murmansk and city highlights tour, you will be transferred to *Akademik Shokalskiy* mid-afternoon to a warm welcome, and set sail on the inaugural Aurora Expeditions White Sea voyage beneath the midnight sun.

Day 2

We skirt the Kola Peninsula coast, hoping to visit Pomor villages and hike across mineral-rich tundra studded with semi-precious stones. Zodiacs carry us to seabird and seal colonies.

Day 3

We enter the White Sea and explore Morzovets Island, combining spectacular birdwatching, a leisurely hike, and a visit to the weathered, wooden houses of a remnant Pomor (meaning 'maritime') village.

Day 4

Hauntingly beautiful, World Heritage listed Solovetskiy Archipelago stretches across Onega Bay. Rare bird species, including the whooper swan, merlin and marsh harrier, are some of the 190 summer species. We plan to visit the famous, sprawling medieval monastery and fortress, founded in 1436. The monastery's collection of ancient manuscripts draws pilgrims from around the world, while the remains of Stalin's infamous camps of this Gulag Archipelago speak of darker times. An uneasy alliance between church and state means visits aren't assured. We hope to land close beneath the monastery's massive walls and tour the magnificent towers, churches and prehistoric stone labyrinths. Our kayakers may paddle the forest-bound lakes via interlinking channels, some dating back centuries.

Day 5

Wander amongst European Russia's largest array of prehistoric stone labyrinths, possibly sacred sites to the long vanished pro-Saami people. Nearby are 16th-19th century monastery buildings and a Stalin era gulag.

Day 6

Muksulma Island hosts polar tern colonies and the 1830s remains of the monastery's dairy and farmhouse. Mt. Favor hikers may pass gun emplacements once used by the Northern Fleet's training base.

Day 7

Climb Verbokolskaya or Golgotha Mountain on Anzer Island for stunning views; visit Golgotha monastery and neighbouring 19th century stone church, hike to tranquil Trinity Bay to see the beautiful, wooden Holy Trinity Monastery (1620).

Day 8

Zodiac ashore for memorable walks amongst Kuzova Island's exquisite pink granite domes, created by volcanic activity. Haven for migratory gulls, geese and ducks, and the White Sea's largest auk colony; bearded and ringed seals also frequent these waters.

Day 9

At Mudyug Island in the mouth of the Northern Dvina River, we see monuments to the allied forces imprisoned here by the Russians in 1918, along with an old gulag, a small interpretive museum and a lighthouse.


Day 10

An early morning arrival in Arkhangelsk signals the end of our White Sea adventure. Farewell to the crew and shipmates, followed by transfers to the airport.



Voyage to the End of the Earth



A RARE CHANCE TO VISIT THE ONCE FORBIDDEN NOVAYA ZEMLYA AND EXPLORE FRANZ JOSEF LAND'S DISTANT AND WONDROUS ISLANDS. LIKE MANY A POLAR EXPLORER BEFORE US, WE DEPART ARKHANGELSK AND SAIL NORTH INTO THE 'WHITE NIGHTS', TO A WORLD FEW HAVE SEEN. SEA TIME PASSES QUICKLY, WITH ENTERTAINING AND INFORMATIVE TALKS ABOUT THE REGION'S EARLY EXPLORERS, THE MARVELS OF THE LANDINGS AHEAD AND THE WILDLIFE AND PLANTS WE HOPE TO SEE IN THE RUSSIAN ARCTIC NATIONAL PARK. ON THE BRIDGE AND OUT ON DECK WE ENJOY NATURE'S DISPLAY AS WE WATCH FOR WHALES, SEALS AND SEABIRDS. APPROACHING PACK ICE, WE SEARCH FOR POLAR BEARS. SPECTACULAR BIRD CLIFFS FEATURE, AS DO LONG TUNDRA WALKS AND HISTORIC HUTS. IN TRUE EXPEDITION STYLE. WEATHER AND PACK ICE DICTATE OUR EXPLORATIONS.



Day 1

Today you will be met at the airport to enjoy the delights of Arkhangelsk and Malye Korely, Europe's largest open-air wooden architecture museum. Board *Akademik Shokalskiy* and depart down the Northern Dvina River and into the White Sea on our inaugural voyage to Franz Josef Land.

Day 2

Tide and weather dependent, we visit one of the White Sea's Pomor villages. Formerly thriving, then nearly abandoned a decade ago, young people now return to renovate old wooden homes. Morzovets Island offers walking, birding, more fascinating Pomor culture.

Days 3 - 5

Sailing north across the ice-speckled Barents Sea, we have a fantastic opportunity to hear the stories of explorers Barents, Nansen, Sedov and many more. Spend time with our enthusiastic crew and staff, watching for Arctic wildlife and distant pack ice.

Day 6

Mountainous and shrouded in mystery, the Novaya Zemlya archipelago remains one of Russia's most restricted regions.

Most lies within a closely guarded military zone, but we head north, some of the first visitors to Putin's recently extended Arctic National Park. We Zodiac cruise around island bird rookeries,

photographing glaucous gulls, Arctic terns, Snowy owls, geese and eider ducks.

Days 7 - 11

As we push north to the outer limits of the Barents Sea, an archipelago of 191 ice-covered islands rises from the horizon – Franz Josef Land, the planet's last major landmass to be discovered! Over the next five days we enter a world of exquisite Arctic beauty that few have seen. Uninhabited, bar a few Russian border guards who maintain a presence here, this is the realm of the polar bear, walrus, seals and elusive beluga whales. Summer visitors include kittiwakes, fulmars and gulls. While the archipelago is 85 per cent glaciated, the mostly ice-free shoreline of each island is unique. We may visit explorers' huts on Bell and Hall islands; Nordbrook Island's seabird cliffs; walrus haulouts at Stolichky and Appolonov Islands; Hooker Island's abandoned polar research station with its unpredictable polar bear visitors. Marvel at Champ Island's unique stone spheres up to 3m in diameter.

Days 12 - 13

As we sail southwest across the Barents Sea, we have time for lively discussions about all we've seen, to enjoy the beauty of high Arctic light, and top up our tally of whales, seals and seabirds.


Day 14

We enter Kola Bay for an early morning arrival in Murmansk – largest city north of the Arctic Circle. After bidding our crew and staff goodbye, you will be taken to your hotel and on a city tour. After an overnight stay, you will be transferred to the airport to catch your early morning flight.

Across the North East Passage





AUTUMN, WHEN ARCTIC PACK ICE IS AT ITS MINIMUM, OFFERS THE BEST CHANCE TO COMPLETE THE NORTH EAST PASSAGE. CROSS NINE TIME ZONES, TRAVERSE SIBERIA'S VAST NORTH COAST, LAND IN PLACES FEW FOREIGNERS HAVE EVER SEEN. MARVEL AT THE TUNDRA'S BREATHTAKING AUTUMN COLOURS AND MILLIONS OF MIGRATORY BIRDS HEADING SOUTH, WHILE POLAR BEARS HURRY TO FEED CUBS BEFORE WINTER'S HIBERNATION. WE EXPLORE A WILDERNESS MAZE OF MASSIVE RIVER DELTAS, AND WANDER ACROSS ISLANDS DISCOVERING SIGNS OF THE WOOLLY MAMMOTHS THAT GRAZED HERE WHEN IT WAS THE GREAT ARCTIC PLAIN. AS OUR ICE-STRENGTHENED SHIP TRACKS CLOSE TO THE COAST, WE LAND AT WHIM, VISITING HUNTING CAMPS AND HISTORIC SITES, AND MEETING LOCAL PEOPLE WHO THRIVE IN THIS SURREAL WORLD. A TRUE EXPEDITION, ONLY ADVENTUROUS SPIRITS NEED APPLY.

Davs 1 - 3

Board *Akademik Shokalskiy* late afternoon for an evening departure from Murmansk. Enjoy informative talks, preparatory briefings, bird and whale watching on the Barents Sea.

Days 4 - 5

We explore militarily restricted Novaya Zemlya and visit the historic Willem Barents' 1597 overwintering site and replica house. Make sure you look for migrating terns, grouse and Snowy owls.

Days 6 - 7

We will enter the icy Kara Sea aiming for Uyedineniya and Pakhtusova Islands, favoured by seabirds, walrus and polar bears.

Days 8 - 10

Severnaya Zemlya's four biggest islands sport mountains, ice caps, glaciers and fjords. Little auks, guillemots and kittiwakes wrap up their breeding season.

Day 11

We seek the world's biggest migrating caribou herd, a diversity of birds and woolly mammoth tusks on the Taimyr Peninsula, mainland Asia's northernmost feature.

Day 12

We enjoy the Mighty Lena River delta, the world's second largest, fosters carpets of moss, lichen, medicinal herbs and flowers. Look out for walrus, seals and the magnificent Beluga whales and narwhals forage.

Days 13 - 15

The melting permafrost on the Novosibirsk Islands reveals megafauna bones and tusks 200 millennia old, when mammoths and rhinoceros roamed the Great Arctic Plain. We may see sanderlings, sandpipers, red knots, wolves and polar bears.



Day 16

The Indigirka delta's patchy forests, autumnal grasses and mosses provide habitat for a myriad of birds in one of the world's most important breeding grounds.

Day 17 - 18

Often icebound, even during summer, the Medvezie (Bear) Islands are a popular denning area for polar bears. When winter snow melts, Chukotka's Aion Island pastures lure reindeer herds. In the 1920s-30s, Russian archaeologists unearthed ancient Eskimo artefacts here.

Days 19 - 21

Wrangel Island, the world's most northern World Heritage Site, is a wildlife paradise! Never glaciated, the low mountains, rivers and wetlands support 400 plant species and the planet's greatest concentration of polar bear dens. There are thousands of migrating birds, countless animals and the last-known stamping grounds of the woolly mammoth for you to observe.

Day 22

The Zodiacs transport us to Kolyuchin Island's sea cliffs where puffins, gulls and cormorants fledge.

Day 23

We enjoy the skilled Chukchi and Eskimo ivory carvers and hunters in Uelen village and share their culture. From Cape Dezhnev, easternmost point of mainland Asia, we visit Big Diomede Island.

Day 24

'Whalebone Alley', Yttygran's historic sculpture park of weathered whalebones, precedes our visit to the Chukchi inhabitants of Yanrakinnot village. Pintegney Bay and Seniavinskiy Strait may reveal puffin rookeries, walrus and Beluga whales.

Day 25

We explore the amazing Achen Lagoon, a favourite of migratory birds, and cruise amongst Preobrazheniya Bay's extraordinary basalt spires and overhangs.

Day 26

Disembark in Anadyr in the morning and celebrate this trip of a lifetime. You will be transferred to the airport for your onward adventures.

Wildlife wilderness of fire and ice – Russian Far East

Tightly closed during the Cold War, the Russian Far East is gradually revealing a wilderness of sublime beauty – rich in wildlife, alive with indigenous culture and steeped in history.

Snow capped volcanoes rise in symmetrical beauty above emerald forests the length of Kamchatka Peninsula, a stunning landscape born of the dark forces that continue to shape it.

Just off the coast, the Pacific plate slides beneath Asia with enough force to create magma, which escapes to the surface as volcanic Islands arcs. Of the entire Pacific Ring of Fire, the Kamchatka-Kuril Islands arc has the most volcanoes – around three hundred, sixty nine of which are active.

Pioneering adventurers arrived about 15,000 years ago. These hunters and gatherers were the ancestors of the Chukchi, Eskimo, Koryak and Aleut people who now inhabit Chukotka, Kamchatka and the Commander Islands. Interestingly, the Kuril Islands were populated by the Ainu, believed to have come from Mongolia.

Tsar Peter the Great commissioned Danish explorer Vitus Bering to seek a route from Kamchatka to America. Bering established Petropavlovsk-Kamchatskiy in 1740 and a year later reached southern Alaska. On the return journey he perished in the Commander Islands.

Bering Sea Explorer departs from Anadyr and follows the rugged wilderness coast of Chukotka, to Kamchatka Peninsula. On our inaugural voyages three years ago, the landscape and wildlife took our breath away and we can't wait to return.

Prepare yourself for rafts of sea otters, pods of orcas, flocks of a thousand whiskered auklets and such rare wonders as the grey whale and Steller's sea eagle. Our route parallels one of the greatest bird migration paths and we'll see species both abundant and rare.

With a history as volatile as the 100-odd volcanoes that built this fog-shrouded archipelago, the Kuril Islands have become a rarely visited wilderness.

The Ring of Fire unlocks the mysteries of the Kurils, taking us deep into a wildlife and geological wonderland.

Day 1

Fly to Anadyr, and receive a warm welcome at the airport before being transferred for an afternoon boarding of *Akademik Shokalskiy*. Set sail across the Gulf of Anadyr and into the Bering Sea.

Day 2

Explore Gabriela Bay's wide river mouth and lagoon. We may meet local Chukchi fisherman and inspect an abandoned polar weather station. Watch for brown bears, wolves, and Beluga whales.

Day 3

Lush valleys and jagged mountains characterise the Koryakskiy Reserve. Dezhneva Bay offers a coastal lagoon for birders and, possibly, grey whales. In Anastasiya Bay are walrus haulouts and birdlife, including the bluethroat and Siberian rubythroat.

Day 4

Wake to spectacular mountains rising above Nataliya Bay. Zodiac cruise beneath Bogoslov Island's sea cliffs, where puffins, kittiwakes, murres and cormorants breed. Walk the grand valleys of St. Peter Bay, or Glybokaya Bay.

Day 5

A Zodiac cruise takes us into stunning Lavrova fjord whose abandoned herring factory attracts bears. Orcas and Bryde's whales frequent these waters. Afternoon hike through Uznaya Glubokaya Bay's iris fields past waterfalls to a spectacular vantage on glacial moraine.

Day 6

Small, narrow Verkhoturova Island harbours cormorants, gulls, kittiwakes and auklets. A heartfelt Koryak greeting awaits at Tymlat Village, along with a feast of senses, as these wonderful, hardy folk display their unique culture through dance, games and deliciously fresh food.

Day 7

We ramble across the fantastic, terraced, recently uplifted coastline of Soldatskaya Bay. Thick vegetation draws a variety of wildlife, including long-billed murrelets and salmon-fishing bears.

Days 8 - 9

Spectacular sea cliffs, arches and stacks signal our arrival in the Commander Islands. We pay tribute to explorer Vitus Bering and visit his grave and memorial. Highlights include: Peregrebnaya Bay, summer nesting site for red-legged and black-legged kittiwakes; Cape Monati, to spot albatross and whales; northern fur seals and Steller sea lions; cruising around volcanic Ariy Kamen, surrounded by thousands of kittiwakes, puffins and murres. At Nikolskoe village, Russia's remaining Aleut community entertain us with lively performances.

Day 10

Kronotskiy Biosphere Reserve protects stunning volcanoes, dwarf pine thickets, hundreds of brown bears, a Steller sea lion rookery, salmon-rich rivers, eagles, gyrefalcons and wolverines. Enjoy soaking in the soothing hot springs of Kamenistaya Bay.

Day 11

Careful Zodiac navigation takes us past salmon fishing camps into the powerful Zhupanova River, as far upstream as we can go. Look for brown bears and Steller's sea eagles as distant mountains beckon.

Day 12

Early morning, we cruise into Avacha Bay to dock in Petropavlovsk-Kamchatskiy. Farewell fellow adventurers as you are transferred to the airport, or stay on board for a sensational Kuril Islands' voyage!

The Ring of Fire



STELLER SEA LIONS CALL OUT FROM ROCKY OUTCROPS; OTTERS FLOAT AMONGST FIELDS OF KELP; CLOUDS OF WHISKERED AUKLETS, NORTHERN FULMARS, TUFTED PUFFINS AND PODS OF ORCAS CONTRAST WITH THE HAUNTING REMAINS OF A WORLD AT WAR. ACTIVE VOLCANOES BLAST STEAM AND ASH INTO THE SKY, OR TRICKLE LAVA DOWN SNOWY SLOPES AS WE ZODIAC AROUND, SOMETIMES THROUGH, GEOLOGICAL WONDERS. SUBTLE REMAINS OF AINU VILLAGES HINT AT A ONCE STRONG OCCUPATION, WHILE FOG ADDS MYSTERY TO ABANDONED COLD WAR LISTENING POSTS, SECRET SOVIET NAVY BASES, JAPANESE BUNKERS AND AIRFIELDS. WOODEN GULAGS DECAY IN LUSH VEGETATION, ALIVE WITH THE SOUND OF RARE BIRDS. BROWN BEARS AND CUBS, TUNDRA RICH WITH BERRIES, STUNNING AUTUMN COLOURS, BLISSFUL HOT SPRINGS AND RUSHING RIVERS FILLED WITH SALMON – THE KURIL ISLANDS ARE UNFORGETTABLE.

Day 1

Upon your arrival at Petropavlovsk-Kamchataskiy airport, you will be transferred to *Akademik Shokalskiy* in the evening for a late night departure.

Days 2 - 3

We awake to lush valleys and snow-capped volcanoes of Kamchatka's east coast. Brown bears feast on berries and salmon. Expect Steller sea lions, countless breeding seabirds and seals, whales and otters.

Day 4

On Shumshu, a peaceful river snakes through grassy wetlands with remnant orchids and wild roses. Soviet gulag remains on Atlasova share a volcanic landscape with nesting cormorants.

Day 5

Of Paramushir's 23 volcanoes, five are active including Ebeko, which has erupted in the past two years. We take a hike across Onekotan's autumnal tundra and through bonsai pine forests to Black Lake, watching for red foxes and remains of Ainu dwellings.

Day 6

Ekarma offers sanctuary to many birds, including puffins, auklets, fulmars and cormorants. Sea otters swim just off the northeastern cape. Traces of Ainu culture await on Shiashkotan.

Day 7

Northern fur seals, Steller sea lions, auklets and petrels enliven the Lovushki Islands. Cruising Matua's northwest coast, we see lava flows from Sarychev, which last erupted in 2009. Ashore are WWII remains of Japanese airfield and bunkers.

Day 8

Fumaroles steam and seabirds nest on steep cliffs around Yankicha's emerald green caldera. At dawn, thousands of whiskered auklets stream out to sea. We explore the ghostly remains of a secret Soviet Navy base on Simushir.

Day 9

We Zodiac cruise in evocative mists that often engulf Chirpoy Island twin volcanoes. A roar heralds the Steller sea lion colony on Brat Chirpoy Island, while thousands of northern fulmars, albatross and crested auklets float nearby.

Day 10

Urup offers 120km of stunning volcanoes, lush vegetation, lakes and rivers. Cruise the Twins, a geological wonderland of twisted basalt sea cliffs, hike up to Japanese bunkers with spectacular views and tufted puffin nests. On the west coast, we may Zodiac through basalt tunnels of Petroskov Rocks.

Days 11 - 12

Iturup is Kuril's largest island, where harbour seals forage in Zolotoy Bay. Przhevalskya Point's black lava sea cliffs host Japanese cormorants and tufted puffins. We cruise inside Lion's Mouth Bay, caldera of an ancient shield volcano. At Kurilsk, the locals welcome us with tours and performances. Our final day offers landings depending on local conditions. Along the way we watch for minke whales, harbour seals and pods of Dall's porpoise. We may find a megaherb forest or hot springs to enjoy. In the Kurils, there's always scope for surprise!

Day 13Arrive early morning at Sakhalin's southern port, and disembark at the end of our magical adventure before being transferred to the airport for your early morning departure.

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Caring for our world

Aurora Expeditions believes that travel to remote destinations can create lifelong ambassadors for environmental protection. From our very first Antarctic voyage in 1992, we made a commitment to establishing environmentally responsible tourism practices. We were founding members of the International Association of Antarctic Tour Operators (IAATO) and continue to establish strong environmental guidelines in Antarctica.

Each year, the average Arctic temperature increases at almost twice the rate of anywhere else. As the sea ice declines, it affects polar bears, Arctic fox, seals, fish, sea birds, and the Eskimos who rely on them.

In 2003 we became founding members of the Association of Arctic Expedition Cruise Operators (AECO). The North East Passage

Wild mountain landscapes, pack ice, remote tundra, indigenous cultures and profuse wildlife draw us deep along the Russian Arctic. Dramatic cliffs swarming with sea birds, walrus breeding sites and one of the world's main denning areas for polar bears provide the backdrop for kayak cruising in one of the most truly remote areas of the world. Wrangel Island Nature Reserve, a jewel with snow geese, spoon-billed sandpipers, muskox, polar bear, arctic wolves and huge seabird colonies.

Kayaking in this dramatic scenery is a privilege few have experienced.



Visa Requirements


Foreigners entering the Russian Federation require a valid visa. A tourist visa is issued for a period of 30 days. Please refer to your appropriate Consulate in your country of residence for details. Please visit http://sydney.rusembassy.org for more information.

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A deposit of US\$1,250 per passenger, per voyage and a completed booking form should be sent to our Sydney office. The final balance and personal forms are then due 90 days prior to departure. If the personal forms and final balance are not received by the due due, we will regard the booking as cancelled. Cancellations

If it becomes necessary to cancel your holiday, you must notify Aurora Expeditions immediately in writing. Cancellation will take effect upon receipt by Aurora Expeditions of your written notice. If cancellation takes place more than 90 days prior to departure, USD\$500 per person will be payable by you. If cancellation takes place less than 90 days prior to departure, you will be required to pay the full cost of the trip. Personal travel insurance is not included in the tour price.

Delay or change of itinerary

Aurora Expeditions may for any reason change the date of departure or conclusion of the tour, the scheduled point of departure for the tour, omit or change any scheduled stop or route on the tour or change the scheduled place of conclusion for the tour whether before or after the tour has departed, without prior notice to you. Any person travelling under 18 years of age must be traveling with their legal guardian.


Authority of the Expedition Leader
