Urban Adams

hink "Ansel Adams," and one conjures up majestic images of Yosemite. But in 1940, on assignment for *Fortune Magazine*, Adams photographed the urban-scapes of Los Angeles: the Brown Derby, bowlers at the Sunset Bowling Center (now home to KTLA), workers at the Lockheed plant, City Hall, Ocean Park Pier, and more.

These images currently reside in the photo archives of the Los Angeles Public Library—and have since the 1960s, when Adams himself donated 190 negatives to LAPL. His letter had few requests, among them, "if they have value, please send me a receipt, listing a fair nominal value (for income tax purposes). I would imagine that they represent about \$100.00 minimum value."


The Library has recently placed them online, and they have been quickly discovered and posted on the Web site www.flickr.com and featured in an article in *Los Angeles Magazine*. Counting On-line

t's been said that "there are lies, damn lies, and statistics." In the case of the Los Angeles Public Library's on-line photography collection, the numbers don't lie: the "hits" keep on coming.

According to LAPL Webmaster Matthew Mattson, there were 2,401,104 picture views in the year from July of 2005 through June of 2006. (A "picture view" is tabulated whenever a full-sized image is viewed on-line.) Mattson notes that there has been "a steady progression" in the number of on-line views per month—from 84,095 in July of 2005 to over ½ million in July of 2006, because of the "acceleration of the cataloging process to get more images on-line." LAPL's on-line collection now numbers over 61,000 images. You can view these images at www.lapl.org.

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Next Stop: Hollywood

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hether he's taking the world's largest photograph in a massive air hangar in Irvine or capturing the day-by-day transformation of a strawberry field into a housing tract in Ontario, photographer Doug McCulloh views Southern California as subject and muse.

Nearly three years ago, McCulloh was commissioned to shoot the neighborhood of Hollywood, as part of Photo Friends' ongoing series "L.A. Neighborhoods Project." He will exhibit the results at the Los Angeles Central Library, beginning on February 7, 2007. "In the past two-and-a-half years, I've been to an insane array of places and events in Hollywood," the Claremont-based photographer said. "What's remarkable to me about Hollywood is the range that you find there: you can go from a million-dollar mansion in the Hills to a homeless person on Sunset Boulevard in five minutes."

Approximately 60 images will be displayed at the exhibition-a tiny percentage of the 60,000 digital photos that McCulloh snapped for the project. "Photography has always been this prolific experi-
