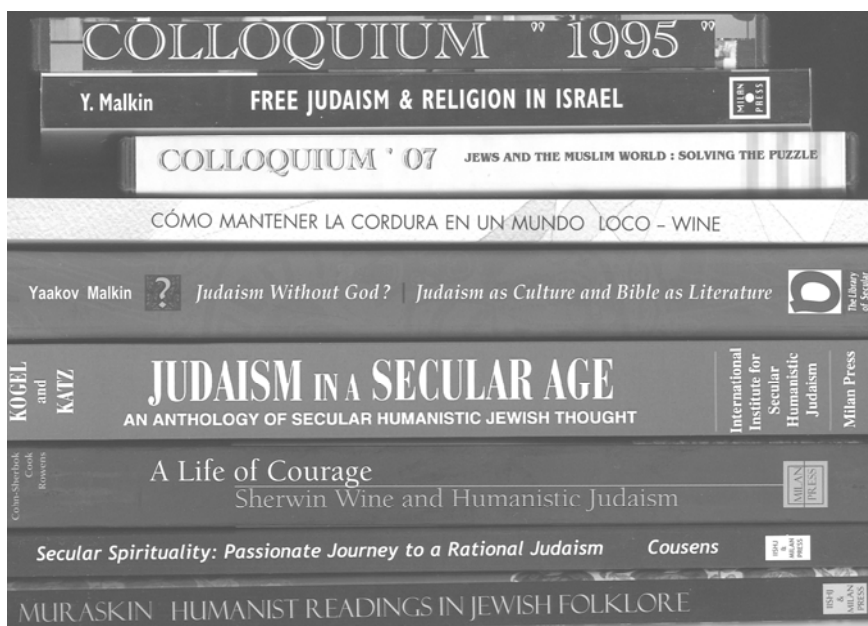

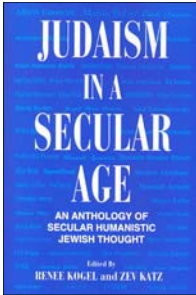

Judaism in a Secular Age

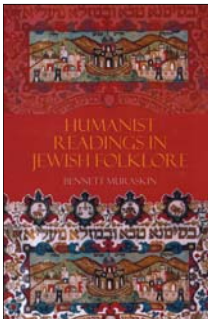
An Anthology of Secular Humanistic Jewish Thought

The selections are divided into three groups: those who first moved Judaism and Jewishness in cultural and secular directions; those who identified as secular and Humanistic Jews; and those who have laid the philosophical groundwork for the world-wide movement of Secular Humanistic Judaism in this century. Humanist Readings in Jewish Folklore

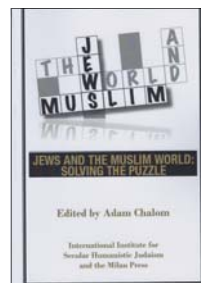

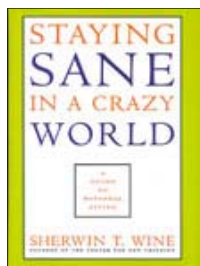

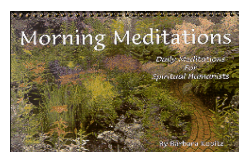

Morning Meditations Daily Meditations for Spiritual Humanists

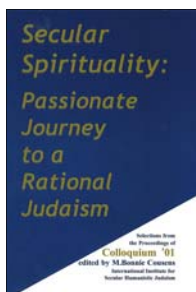

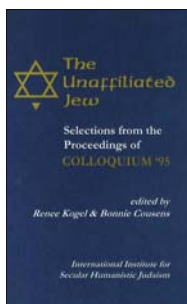
Judaism as Culture and Bible as Literature

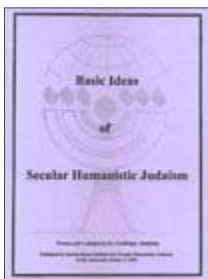

Basic Ideas of Secular Humanistic Judaism

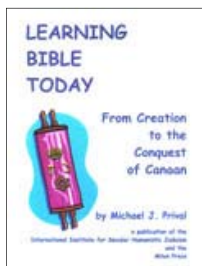

From Creation to the Conquest of Canaan

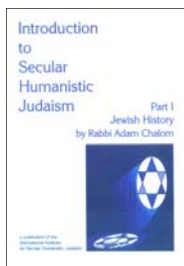

The Early Modern East European Roots of Secular Humanistic Judaism

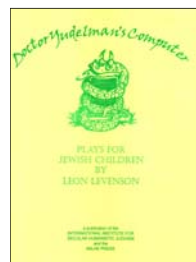
