Robert Francis Peel (30 April 1874 - August 1924) was an English soldier, Conservative politician and Governor of Saint Helena. He joined the Coldstream Guards in 1898, serving in South Africa and retiring in 1909. Peel then became Conservative Member of Parliament for Woodbridge, Suffolk from 1910 to 1920. During the Great War he served as an M.P. and Lieutenant-Colonel with the 4th Battalion, East Surrey Regiment serving in France from 3 Aug 1914. For his overseas service he received a 'special medal' (British War Medal). Peel resigned his seat in 1920 to become Governor and Commander-in-Chief of St Helena and served there until his death in 1924

The important C.M.G., O.B.E., K.P.M. group of eight awarded to Colonel John S. Wilson, Head of S.O.E.'s Norwegian Section, 1943-45, late Calcutta Police, and later Director of the Boy Scouts International Bureau.

"Lieutenant-Colonel J. S. Wilson Intelligence Corps was responsible for all the detailed planning and preparation of the operation, the selection and training of the men and their despatch. After the failure of the first attempt he immediately set to work to plan the renewed attack and without his meticulous care it is doubtful if the operation could have taken place at all."

The operation was "Gunnerside", the successful destruction by Norwegian Army personnel of the Norsk Hydro Works at Vemork in Norway in February 1043

U.S.A. Legion of Merit, Officer London Gazette 14 May 1948. The official recommendation states:

"Colonel J. S. Wilson, O.B.E., 144972, British Army, for outstanding performance of duty from 1 April 1944 to 8 May 1945. During this period Colonel Wilson, by his keen sense of imagination, sound judgment, and zealous perseverance, was responsible for the successful completion of his mission which played such an important part both in the harassment of enemy troop movements to the Eastern and Western Fronts, and in the final liberation of Norway and Denmark."

Colonel John Skinner Wilson was born on 20 May 1888, son of the Very Rev. John Wilson, sometime Dean of Edinburgh, and educated at Trinity College, Glenalmond. He joined the Indian Police in 1908 and was appointed Deputy Commissioner of Calcutta in 1916, an office he occupied until his retirement in 1923. During that period he was 'an active witness' of the Amritsar Massacre and Ghandi's arrest (Cookrideg *refers*). Returning to the U.K., Wilson next became Camp Chief of the Boys Scout's Movement. He remained with the Scouts until the outbreak of hostilities in 1939, by which time he had been appointed Director of their Intelligence Bureau, an office which he would again occupy after the war.

In early 1940, aged 52, Wilson joined Colin Gubbins' S.O.E. Staff at Berkeley Court, near Baker Street station. Shortly afterwards, in a series of appointments that laid the foundations from which this clandestine organisation would grow, he became Director of S.O.E.'s training program which based much of its training and ground rules on Scout fieldcraft.

Wilson's record as S.O.E.'s Training Director was outstanding. By the time he had been appointed to the command of the Norwegian Section on early 1942, some 50 establishments had been set up for the purpose of electing, assessing and thoroughly training agents and personnel.

In January 1942, when relations with the Norwegian High Command were at a low ebb, Wilson was invited to take to position as head of all Scandinavian initiatives. An inspired appointment, it was popular with many of the agents, and he soon improved communication between Norwegian High Command and Milorg -its Resistance arm - and S.O.E.s Staff. Before many of Wilson's improvements took shape, a number of ill-fated plans which had already been activated passed, most notably 'Operation Freshman', the utterly disastrous attempt to attack the heavy-water installation at Rjukan. As is often the case with major disasters, out of the debris emerge the foundations for substantial success. Having won the brief for S.O.E. alone to mount a similar raid. Wilson put in motion one of the most thoroughly researched plans of the War - 'Operation Gunnerside'.

Having successfully organised for a Norwegian scientist, Einar Skinnarland, to be extracted from forced German employment on grounds of illness, Wilson brought him to the U.K. for three weeks for training. Next he cleared one of his training centres in Scotland of all personnel and shipped in his hand-selected operators under a strict regime of secrecy. The target was the Norak Hydro plant at Vermork and Wilson organised the construction of a superb model of all the installations and surrounding terrain.

'Gunnerside' was a six man team which was dropped into Norway in early 1943, joining up with four men from 'Grouse', another clandestine group which had been living on the Hardanger Vidda plateau since the failed 'Freshman' operation. Under the guise of students on holiday they explored the plant at Vermork. On the night of 27/28 February, in what is probably the most important operation carried out by S.O.E. in the Second War, the vital installations at Vermork were blown up and a further hundred weight of 'heavy water' was sunk on a ferry in transit. Most of the team members got away to Sweden, and so total was the destruction reaped by 'Gunnerside' that the Germans cancelled their heavy water project and instead turned their efforts to the V1 and V2 programs. Although the devastation reaped by the rocket campaign was great and the retribution on the Norwegian people severe, Wilson and his men took Nazi Germany out of the atomic race and thus prevented a far greater evil. This did much for S.O.E.s standing, and for his part, Wilson was appointed O.B.E.

The Norwegian Section went on to have further success under Wilson before the end of hostilities including the demolition of oil supplies at Horten and the destruction of the ball-bearing factory at Oslo. Presented with the Order of St. Olav and the Liberty Medal by the Norwegians in 1945, Wilson returned to the Scout Movement after the War. In 1953 he was made Commander of the Japanese Order of the Sacred Treasure and he died in Kent on 19 Dec 1969.

Captain Sir Humphrey Clifford Lloyd, K.C.V.O., M.C., (1893-1966) was the son of Colonel Wilford Neville Lloyd, C.B., C.V.O. and educated at Eton and the Royal Military College, Sandhurst. He was commissioned Second Lieutenant into the King's Royal Rifle Corps on 3 Sept 1913 and served during the Great War on the Western Front from 13 Aug 1914. He was wounded by a gun shot to the right elbow on 14 Sept 1914, invalided to England 20 Sept 1914 and promoted Lieutenant, 15 Dec 1914. Lloyd returned to the Western Front as Aide de Camp to General Rawlinson, Commanding 4th Army, 5 Feb to 24 Sept 1916. Advanced Captain, 30 Apr 1916, he was Aide de Camp to the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, 2 Sept 1916 to 1 Jan 1917; attached Machine Gun Corps, 10 Jan to 2 Jun 1917; Seconded to the War Office, 3 Jun to 28 Aug 1917; Employed under Air Ministry upon the formation of the Royal Air Force, 1 Apr 1918 to 4 Feb 1919; served in France 18 Aug to 11 Nov 1918; Assistant Inspector of Quarter Master General''s Services, 6 Feb to 17 Sept 1919: retired 1923.

Appointed Gentleman Usher to the Royal Household, 16 Sept 1925; Assistant Chief Constable of the War Department Constabulary, 1932-36; Chief Constable of Montgomeryshire, 1936-48 (Montgomeryshire and Radnorshire 1946-48); Chief Constable of the Mid-Wales Constabulary, 1948-59.

4 A rare Second War Posthumous Albert Medal, Second Class, For Gallantry in Saving Life at Sea, group of five awarded to Sick Berth Attendant I.T. Griffiths, Royal Navy, who was killed by an explosion when attempting to rescue the Pilot of a stricken Corsair aircraft which had crash landed onto the Deck of H.M.S. Illustrious on 11th March 1944.

Albert Medal, Second Class, For Gallantry in Saving Life at Sea, bronze and enamel, the reverse officially engraved, 'Awarded by The King to S.B.A. Ivor Thomas Griffiths. D/MX.9380, for gallantry in trying to save the life of the pilot of an aircraft which had crashed while landing on H.M.S. Illustrious, 12th Mar.1944.'; 1939-1945 Star; Burma Star; Italy Star; War Medal NEF

Albert Medal (Posthumous) *London Gazette* 11 Jul 1944 Sick Berth Attendant Ivor Thomas Griffiths, D/MX.93880 (Gyffylliog, near Ruthin, Denbighshire), (listed jointly with Temporary Sub-Lieutenant (A) George McHardy, R.N.V.R. (East Finchley, N2)). The official recommendation states:

For bravery in attempting to save life at sea: When an aircraft crashed while landing on H.M.S. Illustrious and came to rest with the engine on the flight deck and the tail on top of a pom-pom gun, petrol began to pour from the wreck and within two minutes an explosion was followed by fire.

Within those two minutes Sub-Lieutenant McHardy; who had himself only just landed on, and Sick Berth Attendant Griffiths, who was a member of a party detailed for medical duties on the flight deck, climbed on to the aircraft in an attempt to free the pilot, although both were well aware of the extreme risk that they were running. They were killed by the explosion that followed."

Ivor Thomas Griffiths was born in Corris, Wales, in 1922 and upon leaving school was employed at Braich Goch, one of the local slate quarries before working as an Attendant at Denbigh Hospital. He enlisted into the Royal Navy as a Sick Berth Attendant on 29 Oct 1941 and initially served aboard H.M.S. Drake, before being posted to the aircraft carrier H.M.S. Illustrious on 24 Mar 1943. In mid 1943 Illustrious was serving in the Mediterranean and was used to help cover the Allied Landings in Sicily then joined the Eastern Fleet in the Indian Ocean in Feb 1944. Fleet Air Arm pilots from 1830 and 1833 Squadrons were using Illustrious to carry out sweeps of the Bay of Bengal. On 11 Mar 1944, Sub-Lieutenant Alan Vickers (1833 Squadron), R.N.V.R., crashed landed his Corsair on the deck of the Illustrious, whilst returning from such a sweep. McHardy (1830 Squadron) and Griffiths both rushed to attempt to rescue Vickers from his stricken aircraft as the petrol streamed out of it. Vickers and Griffiths were instantly killed by the explosion that followed, and McHardy died of his wounds the following day. Griffiths is commemorated on the Plymouth Naval Memorial and Vickers is commemorated on the Lee-on-Solent Memorial. McHardy is interred in the Madras War Cemetery,

John Samuel Champion Davis was born on 21 February 1859, the second son of Rev. S. Davis, Vicar of Burrington, North Devon. Educated at Rossall and Balliol College, Oxford, he entered the Indian Civil Service of the United Provinces in 1880. He was Junior Secretary and Joint Secretary of the Board of Revenue, 1886-91; Settlement Officer, 1893-97; Deputy Commissioner, 1900-09; Commissioner, 1903-06; and on special duty with the Viceroy, 1903. He retired from the service in 1906. He held commissions in a number of local Indian Volunteer Corps from 1888, including the United Provinces Light Horse and Oudh Light Horse. He retired with the rank of Major in 1907. Returning to Devon, he became a Member of the Devon County Council; Member of the Devon Territorial Force Association; Deputy Chairman of the Exeter Diocesan Board of Finance; County Director of the British Red Cross Society, and Treasurer of the University College of the South West, Exeter. For his work in the control of the Red Cross and and V.A.D. in Devon he was awarded the C.B.E. in 1918. Major Davis, C.B.E., D.L., J.P., M.A., V.D. died on 12 February 1926.

George Lee was born in Whitby, North Yorkshire on 6 May 1892. A Shipping Clerk by occupation, he entered the R.N.A.S. as a Petty Officer Mechanic on 3 March 1915 and in April was based on President II. He served with the Armoured Car Division in France, April-December 1915. In August 1916 he was ranked as a Chief Petty Officer 3rd Class. He subsequently served at Daedalus (Eastchurch), Barrow-in-Furness and Pulham St. Mary. He was commissioned a Temporary 2nd Lieutenant (Technical Officer) in the R.A.F. on 1 April 1918. Later in the month he was posted to Corfu Kite Balloon Station. In later life he was awarded a civil M.B.E. (not confirmed).

Percy Lovell Godley was born in the parish of St. Mary's, Rochester, Kent in 1875 and attested for the Royal Engineers in 1898. He was awarded the L.S. & G.C. medal in 1914 and embarked for service with the B.E.F. in France on 7 Oct that year. Lovell was discharged from the Army in 1920 and subsequently became an Ordnance Survey Officer. He died in 1958.

Charles Percival Parker of Swiss Cottage, Bideford, Devon, was born in 1874 and educated at Uppingham School. He was commissioned, 2nd Lieutenant, into the 4th Battalion, North Staffordshire Regiment (Militia) on 30 Dec 1899 and then transferred into the 5th Dragoon Guards on 7 Mar 1900. Parker arrived in South Africa soon after the siege of Ladysmith and was promoted Lieutenant on 3 Oct 1900. He soon fell ill and was invalided home, resigning his commission on 27 Jul 1901. He received one of only eight Natal clasps to officers of the regiment.

Commissioned into the Reserve of Cavalry following the outbreak of the Great War, he received a commission as Temporary Lieutenant in the Royal Marines on 1 Mar 1915 and served in France & Flanders from 1 Mar 1915 until 1 Aug, 1915, then again, from 2 Oct 1915 until the end of the war. Parker was promoted Temporary Captain and employed on the Staff as an Assistant Landing Officer from 5 Mar 1916 and was appointed Assistant Quartermaster-General on 3 Oct 1918. He relinquished his commission with the rank of Major on 1 May 1919.

Although Parker served in France during 1915, it does not appear that he received the 1914-15 Star. His medal index card notes that the British War and Victory Medals were issued on 22 Dec 1925, and that his 1914-15 Star was to be issued by the Adjutant-General of the Navy, although there is no indication that the star was issued.

Thomas Blackburn was born on 27 Apr 1882 and educated at Bede College, Durham, and joined the King's Own Scottish Borderer's at the beginning of the war. Promoted Captain in Feb 1915, he was severely wounded in action at the Battle of Loos on 25 Sept 1915, taken prisoner by the enemy, and had his right leg amputated. Blackburn was exchanged to Switzerland in May 1916 and repatriated to the U.K. in 1917, and then appointed to the War Office. Promoted Major in Dec 1918, he was invalided from service in Jan 1920. Blackburn died on 27 Dec 1971.

Jack Hulme Taylor was born in Ceylon on 11 December 1894. Educated at Aldenham School and the Royal Military College, Sandhurst. Commissioned on 14 January 1914 and gazetted to the 1st Battalion The Royal Sussex Regiment at Peshawar, India. Arriving in India in February 1914, he transferred to the Indian Army in October 1914, being posted to the 11th King Edward's Own Lancers (Probyn's Horse). Promoted to Lieutenant in September 1915 and Acting Captain in November 1917, he took part in the operations in Mahsud, March-August 1917, and in Iraq, October 1917-October 1918. Taylor was promoted to Captain in January 1918 and took part in the campaign in Kurdistan in 1919 and further operations in Iraq in 1919-20.

Taylor served as Aide-de-Camp to Sir William Riddell Birdwood, C-in-C. in India, 1925, and was Senior Aide-de-Camp to Lord Halifax, Viceroy of India, 1926-28. Appointed Assistant Military Secretary to the C-in-C. Northern Command, 1930-34, he was promoted to Major in January 1932. During the Second World War he raised, organised and was the first Commandant of the Indian Armoured Corps Tank School. Taylor was promoted to Colonel and retired in 1946 and was awarded the O.B.E. for his wartime services.

Post-war, he was Marshal of the City of London, 1938-57; Common Cryer and Sergeant-at-Arms of the City of London, 1957-58; and Swordbearer of the City of London, 1958-59. Colonel Hulme Taylor died on 3 November 1970.

Bertram Arthur Warry of Shapwick was born on 22 September 1865, and educated at Winchester. He served on the Staff in the Boer War and was later in command of Railway Staff at Pretoria. During the Great War he did not serve overseas and was Assistant Director of Railway Transport, H.Q. Aldershot Command. Later Warry was J.P. of Loxely, Moorlinch, near Bridgewater, Somerset and died on 19 Apr 1932.

"During the preparatory stage for the operations in Heraklion Sector, May 1st to May 19th, Lt. Jenkins was the only Signal Officer. By his personal and unremitting efforts he, with meager resources, established communications to 15 different H.Q.s. His initiative in breaking down communications which at the start all ran on poles along the road, and by the selection of cross country routes, he ensured a satisfactory system of communication throughout the operation.

In addition to his work with units on the perimeter, he, by his personality and drive ensured the moving in time of the civil telephone exchange in the town to a more secure site, and rapidly enforced the repair of the civil telephone line form H.Q. to the town when the line was broken by bombing."

The Battle of Crete began on the morning of 20 May 1941 with a German airborne invasion of the island. Greek and Allied forces along with Cretan civilians did their best to defended the island. After one day of fighting, the Germans had suffered appalling casualties and none of their objectives had been achieved. The next day, following bitter fighting in the Heraklion Sector, Maleme airfield in western Crete fell to the Germans, enabling them to fly in reinforcements and overwhelm the Allied forces. The battle lasted for just over ten days. Jenkins was one of those evacuated from the island, many allied troops were taken prisoner.

David Jenkins was commissioned Lieutenant into the Royal Corps of Signal from the ranks (Sergeant) on 12 Aug 1941. He relinquished his commission on completion of service on 6 Aug 1954 and was granted the honorary rank of Captain.

Brigadier Arthur David Rich Saunders, M.B.E., was born on 5 Jul 1917 in Chelsea, London, and was commissioned into the East Yorkshire regiment on 27 Aug 1940. He was promoted Captain, 24 Aug 1945; Lieutenant Colonel, Yorkshire Brigade, 6 Nov 1959; Brigadier, 19 Oct 1965, and retired on 5 Nov 1968. He died in 2000 in Haverford West, Pembroke, Wales.

The impressive O.B.E. D.F.C. group of seven awarded to Wing Commander Allan Hepburn, 88 Squadron, Royal Air Force, later Royal Australian Air Force, a 16 kill "Ace" who features extensively in R. S. Wortley's book 'Letters of a Flying Officer'.

Allan Hepburn was born on the 11 Oct 1896 in Melbourne, Australia, and enlisted into the Artists Rifles on 4 Aug 1916. He joined the Royal Flying Corps at Denham on 6 Sept 1916 and his early flying service included flying DH5 aircraft with 24 Squadron RFC before being slightly wounded. He continued to fly with 24 Squadron until later in the year when he was posted to 40 Squadron RFC where he took over the flights previously led by Major Mick Mannock. Unfortunately Hepburn crashed his aircraft soon after and was sent to England to recuperate. In April of 1918 he joined 88 Squadron flying Bristol Fighters where he claimed with his observers 16 victories. 88 Squadron RAF later joined 80 Wing RAF where Allan Hepburn flew side by side with the two Australian Flying Corps scout squadrons. After the Great War he joined the Royal Australian Air Force.

Allan Hepburn features in two stories in Rothesy Stuart Wortley's book, "Letters of a Flying Officer". In Wortleys book he writes of his experiences through a fictional Lt Colonel Enderby. Wortley commanded 88 Squadron late in September of 1918 and Hepburn was a Flight Commander with 88 Squadron at that time, Wortley wrote:

"... Ive had a long talk with Hepburn, one of the best patrol leaders in the Wing, about the wireless telephone.

His chief objection to it is that one cannot stunt a machine with 150 feet of aerial trailing underneath the fuselage; and that one might very well find oneself involved in a scrap before one has the time to wind it up, with a possible result that the wire might get entangled in the propeller and so wreck the machine in mid-air. I told him that GHQ had set their hearts on perfecting this device, and that the technical staff could not get on with the business without the practical experience of the pilot to help them, and that, therefore he must do his best ... to which he said nothing at all, but stared at me with a bright blue eye that bored like a gimlet into my brain, and an expression on his face as much to say ... 'You know that it's all rot, just the same as I do."

I saw that it was useless to argue with this young gentlemen, so I tried another tack...

Hepburn had been out in France for fourteen months on end; and, by all the rules, was long overdue for a rest in England. I put it to him that he had done his fair share of the fighting, and that a tour of duty at home might be welcome to him. Upon this his eye grew brighter still....

'Very good , Sir,' he burst out, with a visible effort at self control, 'You can hot-air me back to England if you like. But if you do, I will be out again in another squadron within three days. I Swear I will!. They tried that trick on once before, when I'd only been out six months. Said it was my turn for Home Establishment. I was back in France within the week.' He paused, and then, is voice thick with emotion, 'What do you think I came all the way from down under for? To muck about poodle-faking in London, where I don't know a living soul? No, Sir!'

This was the right spirit anyway. By degrees, spasmodically, I got his story out of this lion-hearted, forthright youth. He had run away from his home in the Antipodes, from a father who was a conscientious objector and who had forbidden him to enlist on the outbreak of war. The boy had smuggled his way into a ship, and had come to England as a stow-away. Quickly he had learned to fly. Now he had been a flight commander for a year or more - and had yet to lose a machine on a patrol! He wanted to fight Huns; and anything that he thought would hamper him in the object he rigidly discarded. He would not carry oxygen or electrically heated clothes, designed by kind persons for his comfort at high altitudes. Those apparati all added to the burden put upon the engine, and so tended to deprive him of just that last ounce of power which makes all the difference when maneuvering against the Hun.

I had to choose between the two ...

Was the squadron to have it's way? Was it to remain in the line and continue to destroy the German aircraft, or was it to be brought out of the order of battle and set to help perfect the new, coming, invention? Were we to look to the future.... or the present....?

Diary 23 September:

....I have made my report to the Brigade re wireless telephony. I side with Hepburn and his CO Wireless will come undoubtedly; in the near future one may see operations conducted both in the air and on the ground from the air. But the invention is not sufficiently advanced from a technical view point to sacrifice a very valuable fighting unit by placing it at the disposal of the experimentalists. Let them try it out at home...When they have contrived a rigid aerial, then lets have them here ....

Diary, 12 September;

...The Huns have taken to going about in droves of 20 to 60 strong ... They aren't the men they used to be, by all accounts, although their Fokker biplane is as good as anything we've got. But they don't display the same stomach for the fray as they did in old days of dogfighting over the Ypres Salient when the circus was abroad ... Maybe they have lost their best fellows and that their new recruits are not white of the same calibre. After all its the same with us: our average age is nothing like it was two years ago.... I suppose England is down to the dregs; at any rate, there is no doubt about it that the majority of the best pilots in the Wing hail from Canada, Australia, South Africa and so forth ... In regard to the Englishmen, I think we are getting a selection of the gentry who joined the RAF with a view to avoiding the 'ditches' and who have taken as long as they possibly could to learn to fly....

2 October:

...Twelve Bristol Fighters on an offensive patrol ran into a horde of Fokkers, some sixty strong, and shot down fifteen of them!

One of our machines was badly knocked about and had to make a forced landing just inside the outpost line of the 79th Division. The machine was written off, but both pilot and observer emerged with a few slight wounds...

I went over to see the squadron and to gather details from the pilots themselves. They were all delighted with the result of the fight. The only fellow to miss the fun, as luck would have it, was the senior Flight Commander and leader of the formation, the Hepburn already alluded to ... incidentally the best fighting pilot they have got. It was he who led them into the affray; but his gun jammed at the very outset; and he had to chuck it. His CO told me that he has never seen a man so livid with rage ... 'Missed the finest scrap of modern times!' he declared when he landed at the aerodrome to get another machine. Then, espying the armament officer sauntering slowly towards him, he turned and poured out the vials of his wrath upon the latter's devoted head. he accused the wretched man of every vice known to the denizens of darkness; cursed him and hi s ancestry with all the virulance and fluency of an experienced bargee, and demanded to be told why he had just been sent into the air with a split cartridge case....

As every serviceable machine in the squadron was in the air at the time, Hepburn spent an hour of forced inactivity fuming up and down the tarmac like a lion with a sore head whilst the mechanics laboured to get another ready.... his temper rising as the clouds closed in.... Before he could get off, the rest of the squadron landed and triumphantly announced the results of their efforts. Fifteen Fokkers! All seen to crash, and several more driven out of control ... It was more than Hepburn could bear. Fifteen Huns: and he'd missed the fun ...

Silently he slipped away from the excited groups of Flying Officers. A few minutes later, the roar of a Rolls Royce engine made itself audible above the din of conversation in the Squadron office; and I put my head outside the door just in time to see a Bristol Fighter disappear into the gathering mist.... It was Hepburn, armed to the teeth, as his Flight-Sergeant reported, with bombs, camera and machine gun, off to deliver himself of some of the pent-up fury within him....

It was only the limited capacity of his petrol tanks that brought him back at all. As it was, he landed with the last drains of fuel being sucked into the carburetor. For three hours he had been buzzing like a Hornet as about fifty feet over the towns of Tournai, Leuze and Ath, and the roads which lay in the vicinity, attacking anything which came into range of his vision. 'Some of them might have been Belgians,' he remarked laconically, but I hope to God they were Huns. I gave 'em hell anyway'."

Following hostilities, Hepburn joined the Royal Australian Air Force, becoming Commanding Officer 1 Squadron in 1929; Wing Commander, 1934; Director of Works and Building RAAF circa 1936, and Director of Works Department of Defence during the Second War. Later Regional Director Civil Aviation, New South Wales and representative in Canada, Hepburn retired on 31 Oct 1895 and died in 1976.

D.F.C. London Gazette 19 May 1944 (Flight Lieutenant Peter Arthur Knapton; it may be noted that the name 'Arthur' was incorrect.). The official recommendation states:

"This Officer has been engaged on operations since May, 1941, in England, Russia, the Middle East and India, and has completed 236 operational hours. During recent intense air operations on the Arakan Front, F/O. Knapton was leading a flight, escorting supply droppers, when they were attacked by two formations of enemy aircraft. Although heavily outnumbered, and, in spite of the fact that two of his flight were shot down, he remained supporting the D.C's., and succeeded in destroying an Oscar. He continues to show great enthusiasm and keenness, and is a great asset to the Squadron both on the ground and in the air."

Peter Alfred Knapton was born on 4 May 1921 (his original initials being 'A.P.' rather than 'P.A.'). His early flying training took place in Rhodesia in 1940 and he joined 257 (Hurricane) Squadron at Coltishall, near Norwich, in 1941. In July he and Hector Keil, a fellow sergeant pilot from Rhodesia, were summoned by their C.O., Squadron Leader 'Cowboy' Blatchford, to be told they were headed for Russia (much later, in 1972, Knapton was to discover that their names had simply been pulled out of a hat by his friend, Burmese officer Teddy Tin Thynne). Thus the 20-year old Knapton found himself with 134 Squadron aboard the Llanstephan Castle bound for Archangel, her deck space loaded with crated Hurricanes.

Returning home in late 1941, Knapton gained some Spitfire experience before being posted to the Western Desert in 1942-43. From there he was sent to India in November, 1943. During 1944 and the first half of 1945 he was flying Hurricanes, and later Thunderbolts, on operations on the Arakan Front in Burma and he was awarded the D.F.C. After the War he was a Gunnery Instructor before learning Russian and taking up the post of Assistant Air Attaché to Moscow, where he met his wife; the couple were married in 1953. His logbooks record many hours' experience on jet aircraft from 1955 and subsequent postings included Staff Officer, HQ Fighter Command, and Officer Commanding 280 Signals Unit in Cyprus. In 1963 he was attached to Lord Mountbatten's Staff for a special project before being appointed Air Attaché in Tehran (1964-67). From 1969-74 he was Air Attaché in Thailand, receiving the Order of the Crown, and his final position was as Staff Officer at the Ministry of Defence. He retired on 31 October 1979.

### 20 A Great War M.C. group of five awarded to Major C. E. N. Blake, 70th Brigade, Royal Field Artillery, late Artists Rifles, who was killed in action on 30th July 1918.

Charles Edwin Norman Blake, son of Charles Blake of 11, The Avenue, Beckenham, Kent joined the 28th Battalion, London Regiment in 1909 and served in France & Flanders from 26 Oct 1914 until 26 Jul 1915, and then from 31 Jul 1915 until 16 Aug 1915. Discharged to commission in the Royal Field Artillery on 17 Sept 1915, he re-embarked for France and was subsequently awarded the Military Cross. Blake was killed in action on 30 Jul 1918, aged 32 and is interred in the Buzancy Military Cemetery, France.

21 An extremely fine 1916 'Battle of The Somme' D.S.O. group of six awarded to Lieutenant-Colonel H. C. R. Saunders, East Yorkshire Regiment, who on the death of his C.O., took command of the 1st Battalion on the First Day of The Somme, and led this battalion with distinction through the whole of the fighting; he was later killed in action on 30th May 1918.

Harold Cecil Rich Saunders was born on 28 Apr 1882 in Kingston, Jamaica, the eldest son of Arthur Rich Saunders, Esq., F.R.C.S., M.B., formerly of Victoria Park, Dover. He was educated at Clifton College and joined the Jamaica Infantry Militia as Second Lieutenant in 1905. Saunders obtained a Commission in the Regular Army in November 1905, when he was gazetted Second Lieutenant, East Yorkshire Regiment, and posted to the 2nd Battalion. In 1909, Saunders volunteered for duty with the Kings African Rifles and served in East Africa . Shortly before the outbreak of the Great War he returned to the 2nd Battalion, now in India, and for a time served as Station Staff Officer at Kamptee.

Promoted Captain in October, 1914, he left India with the 2nd Battalion and landed in France in Jan 1915. Saunders was severely wounded during the fierce fighting in the Ypres Salient, on 6 Feb 1915 and evacuated to England. Having recovered he was appointed Commandant of a School of Instruction for Young Officers at Tynemouth and for a time was also attached to the Staff of No. 3 Section, Tyne Garrison. Saunders voluntarily relinquished this latter appointment in order to get back to the front. On arrival he was posted to the 1st Battalion, which he joined on the 20 Oct 1915. He was made second in Command and gazetted Temporary Major on the 17 Mar 1916. On 1 Jul 1916 Saunders assumed command of the regiment following the death of the CO. Of the 21 officers of the 1st Battalion to go into action, Saunders was one of only three to survive.

The grant of the rank of Acting Lieut.-Colonel followed in Aug 1916, and for his gallant leadership and good work in the great Battle (particularly in the fighting for the Bazentin Ridge in July, and subsequently at the capture of Guedecourt, in September), Saunders was mentioned in despatches and awarded the Distinguished Service Order.

Saunders was invalided home in November 1916 and in February, 1917 and rejoined the 1st Battalion in France in Feb 1917, remaining as Second-in-Command until appointed Chief Instructor of 3rd Corps School, in April 1917.

With the onset of the 1918 German Spring offensive, a Composite Battalion was formed of the Staff and Students of the School, with Major Saunders in command. They soon embarked for France and on 30 May 1918 he was killed in action.

In letters to his widow, one brother officer wrote: "The Major was very popular indeed at the School, and was one of the bravest men I have met in action." And another: "I only spent about three weeks with Major Saunders, but I found him, as we all did, one of the very best."

He married in 1915 Dorothy May, eldest daughter of Brig.-General Triscott, C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., and left one son.

### 22 An unusual bronze R.V.M. group of four awarded to Able Seaman Rigger P. Bundey, H.M. Yacht Osborne.

Percy Bundey was born in the parish of Farham, Hampshire and joined the Navy on 28 Aug 1883, aged17. He entered H.M.S Ranger on 19 Nov 1884 and was present aboard this vessel until 31 Oct 1887 during which time he saw campaign service in Burma. Bundey served as a Rigger aboard the Royal Yacht Osborne from 1 Jul 1894 until his discharge to pension on 15 Jun 1906. Bundey was recalled for the Great War but died of anemia on 4 Sept 1914. Built at the Pembroke Royal Dockyard and launched on 19 December 1870, the wooden hulled yacht Osborne measured 250 feet in length by 36 feet in he beam with a tonnage of 1,856 burden. The Osborne was the second yacht to bear this name and was used as a tender to the Royal Yacht Victoria & Albert II. It was extensively used by the Prince and Princess of Wales for cruises to the Mediterranean as well as attending Cowes Week in August. Commanded by Lord Charles Beresford from 1879-81, the Osborne served until 1908, after which it was sold for breaking at Felixstowe.

Horace Robert Hawley Drew was born on 25 Sept 1871 and commissioned 2nd Lieutenant into the 2nd Regiment of Jersey Light Infantry (Militia) on 27 Mar 1890. Commissioned 2nd Lieutenant into the 2nd Battalion, Northamptonshire Regiment on 23 Dec 1891, he served with the 1st Battalion in India 1897-98 and was advanced Lieutenant, 1 Apr 1897. To the 2nd Battalion in 1898, he was promoted Captain, 1902; Major, 26 Nov 1913, and acting Lieutenant Colonel when taking command of the 1st Battalion in France in 1915, where he was present at the Battle of Loos in late September. Wounded in late November, he was invalided home and did not return to France until Jul 1916 arriving at 24th Brigade H.Q. on 21st July. From 31 Jan 1917 he took command of the 17th (Leeds Pals) Battalion, West Yorkshire Regiment and returned to 24th Brigade H.Q. in June to then join the 2nd Battalion, Northants. Drew was serving with the 2nd Battalion at Mermissart, west of Mons, Belgium on Armistice day and promoted Lieutenant-Colonel on 2 Jan 1919. In July 1919 Drew took command of the 1st Battalion, Northants Regiment and took this battalion to Ireland for operations against Sinn Fein. He was placed on the half pay list in Jan 1921 and retired three months later.

D.S.O. London Gazette 23. May 1917. Lt. Cmmr. Ernest Cyril Brent, R.N.: "In recognition of their services in the Destroyer Patrol Flotillas, Armed Boarding Steamers, &c. during the period which ended on the 30th Sept. 1916."

M.I.D. London Gazette 8 Mar 1918 Lieut.-Cdr. Ernest Cyril Brent, D.S.O., R.N.:

"For services in Destroyer and Torpedo Boat Flotillas during the period ending 31st December 1917."

Ernest Cyril Brent was appointed Midshipman Royal Navy on 15 Sept1900 and served in H.M.S. *Gibraltar* from 5 Mar1901. He was promoted Lieutenant, 15 Nov 1904; Lieutenant Commander, 15 Nov 1912, and he served in H.M.S. *Patrol* for most of the Great War.

On the morning of 15 Dec 1914, Patrol was at anchor in the port of Hartlepool, when the harbour was subjected to a surprise attack by a German raiding party comprising of the battlecruisers Seydlitz and Moltke and the cruiser Blucher. The German ships subjected the port and harbour entrance to heavy shelling. Patrol's captain, Commander Bruce, and his officers quickly realised that rather than be caught in the harbour where they would be sitting ducks, that they needed to make a dash for the harbour entrance. Upon effecting this, Patrol came within range of Blucher and as a consequence was hit twice suffering 4 men killed and 7 wounded. Patrol had been badly holed by the German shells, which caused her to run aground but fortunately for the ship and her complement, the Germans were concentrating on making good their escape. The raid had already been going on for over half an hour before the damage to Patrol occurred and she was too low in the water to re-enter Hartlepool harbour, luckily, however she was able to limp into the docks at Middlesbrough. After repairs she joined the 7th Destroyer Flotilla for service in the Humber during 1915 where she remained stationed until March1918.Brent saw latter service aboard H.M. Ships Gibraltar and Woolwich.

Brent was presented with his D.S.O. by the King at Buckingham Palace on 18 Jul 1917 and he re-engaged as Captain (Retired) for service during the Second World War with the Naval Intelligence Division.

M.C. London Gazette 26 July 1918. 'T/Lt., R.E.' 'For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in maintaining the railway service for three days by his untiring efforts and example, throughout a period of great strain.'

Rowland William Godley received his commission in the Royal Engineers on 22 October 1914. He served in France and Turkey, 21 Jan 1916 until 11 Nov 1918. During the war he was twice wounded, promoted Temporary Lieutenant and awarded the Military Cross. After the war he became a Lieutenant in the Bombay, Baroda and Central India Railway Regiment.

### 26 An Officer of The Order of St. John group of six awarded to Major J. C. Holman, Royal Army Medical Corps and Force 136, Special Operations Executive.

The Order of St. John of Jerusalem, Officer (Brother), silver; 1939-45 Star; Burma Star; Defence Medal; War Medal; St John Service Medal, silver, (D/Sgn. J. C. Holman, Northamptonshire), mounted for wear GVF

Order of St. John, Officer (Brother) London Gazette 19 March 1984.

James Colgate Holman was born in Northampton on 30 May 1918 and educated at Eastbourne College then London University where he qualified M.B. B.S. Lond, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P. Eng. A Medical Practitioner at the outbreak of hostilities, Holman received an Emergency Commission into the Royal Army Medical Corps on 10 Jan 1942. He erved with the 185th Light Field Ambulance prior to his posting into the 14th Army and Force 136 on 5 Nov 1944.

The Roll of Honour newspaper cutting states:

"Killed - Lieut. G. Monro MacBey, M.C., Elgin. Deep regret was felt in Elgin when it became known that Lieut. George Monro MacBey, M.C., Seaforth Highlanders, son of Mr and Mrs Monro MacBey, Lossiemouth, and grandson of the late Mr David Forsyth, town clerk, Elgin, had been reported killed in action. Lieut. MacBey was 21 years of age, and was among the first of those who responded to their country's call, having enlisted as a private in the local Seaforths immediately after the outbreak of war. He proved himself a capable soldier and received his commission in the Seaforths towards the end of 1915. In the following year he went to France and took part in some of the heaviest fighting. In November he was severely wounded in the chest, but pluckily carried on, and for his bravery was awarded the Military Cross. The official statement of the deed for which he received the distinction was as follows: "Although severely wounded he remained on duty, collecting men and directing operations. He set a splendid example throughout, and himself captured 50 prisoners."

Lieut. MacBey was educated at Elgin Academy, and before enlisting, was a law clerk with Messrs Stewart & McIsaac, W.S., Elgin. Much sympathy is felt for his parents in the loss of such a gallant son, and also with the other relatives."

The official medical report for the M.C. action states that Second Lieutenant G. MacBey was struck by a rifle bullet during the action at Beaumont Hamel on 13th Nov 1916. He was in fact 20 when he was killed and is commemorated on the Arras Memorial.

Stephen Gordon MacBey was commissioned into the I.A.R.O. on 28 Aug 1918 and was discharged in 1921.

William David MacBey was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant into the 1st Madras Guards on 1 Apr 1917 and discharged in 1920.

A fine and rare 25th/26th April 1941 Greek Operations, "Corinth Canal" M.C. group of six awarded to Major J. T. Tyson, Royal Engineers, who, having set charges in preparation for the destruction of the bridge over the Corinth Canal, handed over to a Detachment of New Zealand Engineers. Early the following morning the New Zealand detachment and bridge were seized by German parachute troops, and unable to light the fuses, Tyson was instrumental in opening fire on the gelignite fuses and blowing the bridge then successfully fought his unit out when practically surrounded.

Together with the recipient's Army issue dog tags; Royal Engineers officer's cap badge; British Force in Greece Identification Card, valid to 31 Dec 1941, containing a photograph of the recipient; Military Identity Card, dated 30 Jun 1940; Army Council transmittal slip for the campaign awards; Army Release Certificate, dated 20 Mar 1946, and Officer's Release Book. Also his wife's silver I.D. bracelet "Mrs. L. Tyson, 10 Hurlingham Crt. SW5 AGDY305-1".

M.C. London Gazette 21 Oct 1941. Second-Lieutenant (temporary Lieutenant) John Tyson Tyson (137822), Corps of Royal Engineers. The official recommendation states:

"Lieutenant Tyson, Royal Engineers, made preliminary arrangements for the demolition of the Bridge over the Canal and handed over to a detachment of 6th New Zealand Field Company, Royal Engineers on the evening of April 25th

Early on 26th April the Bridge was attacked and seized by German parachute troops. Lieut Tyson who had been sleeping near the Bridge, realising that the Demolition Party had been overwhelmed, endeavored to get up to the Bridge to blow the charges, but was prevented by L.A. fire. Thereupon in conjunction with Captain Phillips, Devon regiment, he opened deliberate rifle fire on the gelignite charges to produce detonation. In face of L.A. fire this proved successful. Subsequently Lieut. Tyson collected various scattered detachments and with LMG and rifle fire attacked various enemy detachments and enabled his party to extricate itself though practically surrounded. This officer kept his head under difficult circumstances and under fire from ground and air, and it was due to his initiative that the Bridge was destroyed."

John Tyson Tyson, M.C., A.R.C.S. was born in London on 16 Feb 1916 and was a qualified chemist. He was employed with the Chemical Warfare Training Branch, Royal Engineers in June 1940 and when he embarked for overseas service commanded a demolition detachment. He was later made a Fellow of the Chemical Society.

29 A Great War 'Western Front' M.C. group of four awarded to Captain D. P. Grant, 1/4th Battalion (Hallamshire) York and Lancaster Regiment, who was the author of the Great War 1/4th Battalion history.

MILITARY CROSS, G.V.R., unnamed; BRITISH WAR AND VICTORY MEDALS (Capt.); DEFENCE MEDAL, mounted as worn GVF £2500

M.C. London Gazette 16 Sept 1918. The official recommendation states: 'For gallantry and devotion to duty during an enemy attack. He showed great coolness and ability in re-organising troops and forming them up in new positions, which he held successfully under very difficult circumstances. He showed fine powers of command'.

As a 2nd Lieutenant, Grant was appointed Adjutant of the 1/4th (Hallamshire) Battalion York and Lancaster Regiment in August 1916. He entered the France/Flanders theatre of war on 12 December 1916. With the unit at Nieuport, 2nd Lieutenant Grant was gassed on 27 July 1917 and was obliged to relinquish his position as Adjutant whilst he recovered. As a Lieutenant he returned to the battalion and resumed his duties as Adjutant on 7 December 1917, the battalion then stationed in the Ypres sector. As a Captain, he was involved in the heavy fighting resulting from the German Spring Offensive of 1918. It was for the fighting around 'Bloody Farm' near Vierstraat, that he was later awarded the Military Cross. Following on from the action, he was hospitalised on 23 May 1918 and was subsequently evacuated to England. His m.i.c. records his home address as 'Hainault House, Chigwell School, Essex'.

Captain D. P. Grant was the author of The 1/4th (Hallamshire) Battn., York and Lancaster Regiment 1914-1919, printed for private circulation by Arden Press, Stamford Street, London, S.E.1. An original edition of this work is sold with the grouping, 165pp., complete with four colour maps in pocket, original cloth, some spotting. The work is an excellent resource, providing names, dates, places and details involving the battalion. Also with a large photograph of the officers of the 1/4th (Hallamshire) Battalion York and Lancaster Regiment, dated 'British Army of the Rhine, July 1919'.

30 A fine Great War 'Sanctuary Wood' M.C. group of four awarded to Second Lieutenant E. W. F. Hammond, Honourable Artillery Company, who was killed in action at Bullecourt.

MILITARY CROSS, G.V.R.; 1914 STAR (676 L. Cpl., H.A.C.); BRITISH WAR AND VICTORY MEDALS, M.I.D. oak leaf (2. Lieut.); BRONZE MEMORIAL PLAQUE (Ernest William Frost Hammond) NEF £3850

M.C. London Gazette 29 October 1915. The official recommendation states: "For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a bomb fight at Sanctuary Wood on 30 September 1915. Although severely wounded in the right side during the afternoon and unable to use his right arm, he remained at the front using his left arm till after nightfall, when his wound compelled him to retire."

M.I.D. London Gazette 1 January 1916.

Ernest William Frost Hammond was killed in action at Bullecourt on 3 May 1917, whilst serving with the Honourable Artillery Company. He has no known grave and his name is commemorated on the Arras Memorial, France.

31 A scarce Waziristan 1921 operations M.C. group of three awarded to Lieutenant L. W. B. Jennings, Indian Army, who was attached to the 48th Pioneers at the time of the award.

MILITARY CROSS, G.V.R.; BRITISH WAR MEDAL 1914-20 (Lieut. L. W. B. Jennings); INDIA GENERAL SERVICE 1908-35, 2 clasps, Afghanistan N.W.F. 1919, Waziristan 1919-21 (2/Lt. L. W. B. Jennings, 1/61/Pnrs.) GVF

Just 29 M.Cs were gazetted in 1921 for the Waziristan operations - British Gallantry Awards, by Abbott & Tamplin, refers.

M.C. London Gazette 21 April 1921: 'For conspicuous gallantry on 4 January 1921, near Jandola, when he held on to an advanced sangar which had been vacated by the covering troops, thus enabling the wounded to get away, and though heavily fired upon from three directions he continued to hold his position until severely wounded in the face. He then brought in the remainder of his party.'

Lewis Wensley Bond Jennings was commissioned on the Unattached List in August 1918 and gained an appointment in the 64th Pioneers in the following month. He was, however, attached to the 48th Pioneers at the time of his M.C. winning exploits near Jandola in early January 1921. Very probably as a result of his severe wounds, Jennings was placed on the Retired List with effect of December 1923 (London Gazette 25 July 1924 refers).

32 A fine Great War M.C. group of four awarded to Captain J. Brockman, 139th Brigade, Royal Field Artillery, late 29th Brigade, Royal Horse Artillery, who successfully withdrew three guns under heavy shell fire and later succeeded in extinguishing a fire in an ammunition dump.

MILITARY CROSS, G.V.R.; 1914-15 STAR (14711 B.S.Mjr., R.H.A.); BRITISH WAR AND VICTORY MEDALS (Capt.) GVF £1300

M.C. London Gazette 4 Feb 1919. 2nd Lt. James Brockman, R.F.A., the official recommendation states:

"For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He successfully withdrew three guns under heavy shell fire, though one gun was overturned into a shell-hole. When an ammunition dump was set on fire he succeeded in extinguishing it."

As Battery Sergeant-Major, 29th Division, James Brockman embarked for service in Gallipoli on 25 Oct 1915. He was commissioned on 12 Jul 1917 and was resident at 'Shenandoh', Lower Road, River, Dover.

33 A 1918 'Bridging of the Sambre-Oise Canal' M.C. group of four awarded to Lieutenant L. Henshaw, South Lancashire Regiment, late Manchester Regiment

MILITARY CROSS, G.V.R., unnamed; 1914-15 STAR (2027 Pte., Manch. R.); BRITISH WAR AND VICTORY MEDALS, with M.I.D. emblem (Lieut.) GVF

M.C. London Gazette 10 December 1919. 'T/Lt., 11th Bn. S. Lan. R. The recommendation states: "For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in bridging operations near Landrecies on the 4th November 1918. His behaviour throughout the whole operation was largely responsible for his section's success in bridging the Sambre-Oise Canal. Although early on in the operations he was wounded in the shoulder he remained at duty and saw that the infantry were ferried across."

Lindley Henshaw of Davenport Park, Stockport, saw overseas service first in Gallipoli in the ranks of the Manchester Regiment from 5 May 1915. He was discharged to a commission on 19 June 1916.

A Great War 'Western Front' M.C. and Bar group of three awarded to Lieutenant Aubrey Causton Strachan, Royal Field Artillery, who was killed in action on 28 March 1918

He commanded his section for five hours under heavy fire and in pouring rain, during which time he removed the killed and wounded himself, and by his personal example of gallantry and coolness kept his men in action at a very critical time.'

Bar to M.C. London Gazette 4 February 1918; Citation 5 July 1918. 'Lt., M.C., R.F.A.' 'For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He brought his section into action under heavy artillery and machine gun fire, and assisted with the greatest skill in the capture of a village. He did most valuable work.'

Aubrey Causton Strachan was born on 14 August 1894. He was educated at Cheltenham College and at McGill University. Strachan was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant in the R.F.A. on 22 April 1915 and was promoted to Lieutenant on 1 July 1917. As a Lieutenant with "C" Battery, 70th Brigade, R.F.A., he was killed in action, on 28 March 1918, aged 23 years. He was buried in the Faubourg d'Amiens Cemetery, Arras; his name is listed on the Memorial at McGill University. He was the son of Lieutenant-Colonel E. A. Strachan (late Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers - see British War Medal above) and Beatrice Strachan, of 'Moorfield', Bodorgan Road, Bournemouth.

A very fine 1941 'Western Desert' M.C. group of eight awarded to Lieutenant J. W. Stiddard, 6th Battalion, Royal Tank Regiment, whose gallant actions were instrumental in repulsing an enemy tank attack and in doing so, preventing many casualties.

MILITARY CROSS, G.VI.R., THE REVERSE OFFICIALLY DATED 1944, and additionally inscribed "2/Lt. J. W. Stiddard, 200023, R.T.R."; 1939-45 STAR; AFRICA STAR; ITALY STAR; FRANCE AND GERMANY STAR; DEFENCE MEDAL; WAR MEDAL; EFFICIENCY MEDAL, TERRITORIAL, G.VI.R., 1ST TYPE (Lt., M.C. R.Tks.), mounted for wear GVF £3950

M.C. London Gazette 20 Jan 1942. 2nd Lieutenant Jack William Stiddard, 6th Battalion, Royal Tank Regiment. The recommendation states:

"During the evening of 24 Nov 1941, 2nd Lieutenant D. S. Bowling-Smith, Armoured Brigade, and 2nd Lieutenant J. W. Stiddard, Royal Tank Regiment arrived in our defended perimeter with 3 serviceable and two derelict tanks in tow. The following day the Brigade was engaged in repulsing a determined tank attack and the above mentioned officers at a very critical stage, on their own initiative, went into action against a vastly superior force of tanks. It is considered that this gallant action led by these two officers materially influenced the enemy into retiring. In addition the action of these tanks acted as a stimulus to a number of troops who were being heavily attacked by tanks for the second time that day. I consider that the action of these two officers was one of highest courage and great devotion to duty which in my opinion saved many casualties and it is strongly urged that this gallant action should receive official recognition."

The recommendation was made by Brigadier D. A. Pienaar, commanding the 1st South African Infantry Brigade.

### 36 A Great War M.C. group of four awarded to Lieutenant J. A. Rawlings, Royal Field Artillery.

MILITARY CROSS, G.V.R.; 1914-15 STAR (T-1597 C.S.Mjr., A.S.C.); BRITISH WAR AND VICTORY MEDALS (Lieut.) NEF £1450

M.C. London Gazette 10 Dec 1919. Lieutenant John Arthur Rawlings, R.F.A. Spec. Res. Attd. A/14th Bde. The official recommendation states:

"On 2nd September 1918, near Clery-sur-Somme, he was acting as battery leader. It was necessary to bring the battery past a cross roads which was being shelled. Standing on the cross roads himself, he took advantage of the intervals between the shelling to pass the vehicles, one at a time. By his cool courage and resource he undoubtedly saved his battery many casualties. The road by which the battery advanced was strewn with men and horses of other batteries going into action in the same area."

John Arthur Rawlings saw service in France from 16 Apr 1915 and was commissioned into the Royal Field Artillery on 19 Mar 1917.

### 37 An October 1916 "Beaumont Hamel" M.C. group of four awarded to Second Lieutenant W. Roche, Royal Field Artillery, attached Trench Mortar Battery

William Roche embarked for service in France on 1 Aug 1915.

Edward John Barton Oxenham was born on 14 Dec 1881 and was educated at Lewisham Park School then Hurstpierpoint College, Sussex. He joined the 1st London Rifle Volunteers in 1904, then the London Rifle Brigade from 1908 until 1912, qualifying for the Territorial Force Efficiency Medal. A qualified barrister, he was commissioned into the Army Ordnance Department from the O.T.C. in 1914, promoted Lieutenant, 24 Jan 1915; Capt., 14 Oct 1916; and Major, 29 May 1918.

Oxenham embarked for service in France on 31 May 1915 and later served in Italy.

### 39 A fine Company Quartermaster-Sergeant's Military Cross group of four awarded to Second Lieutenant F. S. Bonathan, 17th Battalion, Middlesex Regiment, who was killed in action at Arras on 28th April 1917.

Frank Stanley Bonathan attested for service with the Middlesex Regiment as a Boy on 25 Nov 1907. He embarked for service in France with the 1st Battalion on 11 Aug 1914, was wounded in action on 26 Aug 1915, and awarded the M.C. for bravery near Flers on 1 Oct 1916. Appointed to Commission into the 17th (Service) Battalion, Middlesex Regiment, he was reported wounded and missing at Arras on 28 Apr 1917. His body was never found and he is commemorated on the Arras Memorial.

William Egbert Leveson served with the 20th Middlesex Rifle Volunteers, 1890-93; Bombay Light Horse, 1893-96, and embarked for Salonika in August 1916.

The outstanding Bomber Pilot's D.F.C., D.F.M. group of five awarded to Warrant Officer P. E. Merrals, 49 and later 106 Squadron, Royal Air Force, an exception pilot, who flew with distinction from the first months of the War until his death on 1st July 1943 when his Lancaster aircraft was shot down on a raid to Dusseldorf - Guy Gibson was later to describe him as one of his

"On his second tour of operations, this warrant officer continued to display the greatest courage and initiative in his work. During the period he participated in attacks on Lubeck, Rostock, Warnemunde, Essen and Bremen. In July, 1942, whilst over Duisburg his aircraft was severely damaged by heavy anti-aircraft fire, but Warrant Officer Merrals coolly continued his bombing run and successfully completed his attack. He flew his damaged aircraft safely back to base with one engine out of action. Later in July, 1942, whilst returning from a daylight raid, his aircraft was attacked by two enemy fighters. By skillfully maneuvering his aircraft he enabled his gunners to shoot down one fighter and seriously damage the other (Focke Wolfe 190). He is a pilot of outstanding ability, whose enthusiasm and dash have set an inspiring example.'

D.F.M. London Gazette 18 Jul 1943. Sergeant (742016) Peter Ernest Merrals, 49 Squadron, Sorties 27, Flying Hours 193. The official recommendation states:

"Sergeant Merrals has attacked a wide variety of targets such as Berlin (twice), Hamburg (4 times), Kiel (twice), Mannheim, Frankfurt, Magdeburg, and Channel ports and targets in the Ruhr. In addition, he took part in the experimental fighter patrols by Hampden aircraft and has undertaken a number of successful mining operations. During his first period as a Navigator, he was engaged in two outstanding fights. On 19th November 1940, he was Navigator of one of the only two aircraft from this station which reached and attacked the Skoda Works at Pilsen. Another outstanding navigational trip was the celebrated attack on Munich on 8th November 1940. Sergeant Merrals has been one of the most successful Captains of aircraft in the squadron. He has shown a good grip of his responsibilities and has always displayed courage, determination and skill of the highest order. On the night on 30th March 1941, he was Captain of an aircraft detailed to lay a mine in the Goulet de Brest which is a very heavily defended locality. In spite of intense opposition from the ground defences, Sergeant Merralls spent over half an hour in the vicinity of the Goulet (during which time his aircraft received several hits from the ground defences) to make sure of the actual dropping point before finally laying the mine. On the night of 9th April 1941, whilst attacking a target in Berlin, Sergeant Merrals' aircraft was caught and held by a concentration of searchlights and intense anti-aircraft fire was experienced. In spite of this, Sergeant Merrals acted with the greatest coolness and, although he was forced down to 2,000 feet over the centre of Berlin owing to the violent evasive action necessary to get clear, be brought his aircraft safely to Base although it sustained nine serious hits from the ground defences. The great majority of Sergeant Merralls' operational flights have been performed during the worst weather conditions and on two occasions he has brought his aircraft safely to Base at night under conditions of 10/10ths cloud down to 500 feet. He has always shown the greatest enthusiasm for flying and he has volunteered for and carried out operations on consecutive nights on more than one occasion. All his operations have been characterised by competence, courage, determination and an intense desire to strike the enemy hard and

Warrant Officer Merrals of Gillingham, Kent was killed on a sortie to to Dusseldorf on 31 July 1942 when his Lancaster aircraft was shot down nine kilometers north of Cologne, at Lovenich, where he was initially interred. His grave was subsequently moved to the Reichswold Forrest Cemetery.

In his letter of condolence, then Wing Commander, Guy Gibson, officer commanding 106 Squadron wrote, "Your son had been with my Squadron for five months, and I considered him one of my ace pilots in whom I had every confidence. He was performing his operational duties with the same skill and gallantry which won for him the Distinguished Flying Medal some months ago. Many of his recent sorties have been carried out in a manner deserving of the highest praise, and his loss leaves a gap which will not be easily filled".

"On 17th November 1941 in company with six other Blenheims on a shipping sweep over the Ionian Sea, the formation sighted two merchant vessels escorted by a destroyer. During the run-up at mast height to attack one of the merchant vessels, there was intense fire from the merchant vessels, also from a destroyer. In spite of the opposition, Sergeant Gillman pressed home his attack and although his aircraft was hit several times, he scored two direct hits. The ship shortly afterwards was enveloped in thick black smoke which rose to a great height. Last seen, the ship was on fire with a pall of smoke to 2,000 feet as a result of this courageous action. One ship is claimed as seriously damaged and probably sunk."

D.F.C. London Gazette 10 Oct 1944. Lying Officer R. E. Gillman, Head Quarters Coastal Command. Citation to follow.

In his publication, The Shiphunters, Gillman writes about his experiences joining the air force and the training in the UK. When he eventually gets his qualifications (in a very accelerated manner) they send him to Gibraltar and then ultimately on to Malta. Malta is located in the middle of the Mediterranean and during the war was essentially surrounded by the German army in North

This memoir chronicles the various missions that the pilot and his tight-knit crew had to run in and around the tiny island. The fascinating thing about the Blenheim ship hunters was their MO. When the British got intelligence on a convoy of Axis ships, a group of as many planes would head out in formation. The crews flew up high until they neared their target and then would come down to near sea level often so close that there would be a wake from the planes. They would come screaming into the convoy which was usually a group of military boats surrounding a tanker or supply ship. Flying underneath and between the escort boats, the bombers would fly straight at the target boat and pull up at the last second releasing the 250 pound bombs they carried. All this went on under the heavy fire of the escort boats. Needless to say, many planes never made it back to base.

"This officer has completed 55 sorties as navigator in a heavy bomber squadron

Throughout these attacks, many against heavily defended German targets, the accuracy and unfailing efforts that he has put into his work have contributed in a large measure to the outstanding successes attained by the crew."

Flight Lieutenant Alfred Roy Chandler was born in Dulwich, London on 8 Aug 1908 and having attended Grammar School was employed in the Post Office Engineering Department prior to the Second War. He joined the Royal Air Force in 1943 and completed Air Crew training in Rhodesia before commencing his operational flying in Halifax aircraft with 640 Squadron in April 1944, transferring into 35 Squadron, operating Lancaster aircraft, on completion of his first operational tour. Chandler flew on a number of the 1000 bomber raids in addition to targets which varied from marshalling yards to V-Weapons sites.

Post war he was stationed in Germany, then served in Malaya, 1953-54; St. Morgan, Cornwall 1961-63 with 42 Squadron and retired in 1963. Chandler was subsequently employed with Shell Oil Company until his retirement in 1985 and resided at Aldbournem Wiltshire until his death 1995. Sold with extensive research.

Jack served with the 2nd Battalion in South Africa from 2 Dec 1899 until 15 Feb 1903, and would have been present in the action at Spion Kop and Alleman's Nek. Promoted Colour Sergeant on 3 Apr 1900, Jack was mentioned in despatches for his Boer War service. He received the L.S. & G.C. Medal in 1907 and was discharged on colpetion of 23 years in the Army. He is additionally entitled to a King's South Africa Medal.

D.C.M. London Gazette 19 Nov 1917. 18163 Pte. G. Bastable, Hampshire Regiment (Winchester), the official recommendation states:

"For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in an attack. With an officer and four men under heavy fire he attacked a dug-out, and when all the party except himself became casualties he captured nine prisoners single handed. Later, he was one of a very small party which held on to the captured position for thirty-six hours under most difficult conditions. He showed great courage and contempt of danger throughout."

49 A fine Great War D.C.M. awarded to sergeant D. McLeod, "B" Battery, 58th Brigade, Royal Field Artillery, who distinguished himself in action at Hulloch in April 1918.

(Glasgow), the recommendation, published on 2 Sept 1919, states: "From 8th April to 10th April, 1918, the battery was very heavily shelled with mustard gas shells near Hulloch. There were many casualties in the battery, nearly 50 per cent of the men being sent to hospital. Although suffering from the effects of gas he stayed on at the gun line, setting a fine example to all ranks by his cheerfulness and energy. On many other occasions since coming to France he has shown great courage and resource under the most trying circumstances."

Daniel McLeod was born in the parish of Barony, near the town of Glasgow, Lanark, and attested for the Royal Artillery on 30 Aug 1914, a tram driver by trade. He served in Gallipoli before embarking for France & Flanders and was once wounded in action.

50 A Great War D.C.M. group of three awarded to Private T. C. Cawthorne, East Yorkshire Regiment

D.C.M. London Gazette 11 March 1920. 'On 21st March 1918, near Saulcourt, for cool courage and devotion to duty. Whilst the camp was being heavily shelled and later on in the day for eleven hours, he assisted, under heavy shell fire, in evacuating the wounded. On 24th March and again on 28th March, it was largely due to his fine example and energy that many vehicles and horses amongst the transport were saved under heavy fire.'

Thomas Cawthorne came from Bethnal Green, London. A pre-war regular soldier serving with the 1st Battalion East Yorkshire Regiment, he entered the France/Flanders theatre of war on 8 September 1914. Serving throughout the war, he was awarded the D.C.M. for several acts of gallantry near Cambrai during the first few days of the German Spring Offensive in March 1918. Sergeant Cawthorne was one of only about a dozen men who served continually with the 1st Battalion between September 1914 and the end of war in November 1918. He survived the war and took his discharge. Entitled to the 1914 Star and clasp. With copied m.i.c., roll extracts and other research.

A fine 1918 D.C.M. group of three awarded to Sergeant F. J. Mulvaney, 2nd Battalion, Canadian Machine Gun Corps, who, although half his men became casualties, he gallantly led his mule train to a forward ammunition dump.

DISTINGUISHED CONDUCT MEDAL, G.V.R. (1113413 Sjt., 2/ Can: M.G.C.);
BRITISH WAR AND VICTORY MEDALS (Sgt., C. M. G. Bde.) GVF £1550

D.C.M. London Gazette 11 Mar 1920. 113413 Sjt. F. J. Mulvaney, 2nd Bn., Can. M.G.C., the official recommendation states:

"For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. On the 27th September, 1918, he had charge of a mule train carrying S.A.A. to the forward dumps. Although over half his men became casualties and he had four mules killed before reaching the forward dumps, he succeeded in getting all the S.A.A to the dumps".

Francis James Mulvaney was born in London, England and was living at 259 Alberta Street, Ottawa at the time of the Great War. He attested for the C.E.F. on 11 Feb 1915 and arrived in England in October 1915 with the 8th Canadian Mounted Rifles. Briefly transferred into the 39th Battalion, he was posted to the 5th Brigade, Machine Gun Battalion on 11 Feb 1916 and embarked for service in France on 29 Feb 1916. He served in France until the end of hostilities and was demobilised in England on 5 May 1919.

### 52 A Great War D.C.M., M.M. and plaque trio awarded to Acting Sergeant E. H. Long, 11th Battalion, Royal Warwickshire Regiment, who was killed in action with the 10th Battalion, on 31st May 1918

D.C.M. London Gazette 26 Jan 1918. The official recommendation states: "For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He personally captured two prisoners after a hand-to-hand struggle, and showed great courage and determination."

M.M. London Gazette 18 Jul 1917.

Ernest Long was born at Berkswell Park, Warwickshire on May 29, 1888 his father Frederic was the game keeper at 'The Park, Berkswell' where the family resided. Prior to hostilities he served at the Coventry Goods Station and enlisted into the Warwickshire Regiment in Sept 1914. His MM was most probably awarded for gallantry at Arras in April or May, 1917, and the DCM for gallantry in a raid on 'Bee Farm' in August 1917. The War Diary for the regiment states::

'Night of 26/27 August 1917

A raid was carried out on BEE FARM, where the enemy had been located and a machine gun emplacement found. Zero hour was 2.30 am on 27 August, and the ground covered was 170 yards in depth on a front ...(unreadable) ...ground was difficult owing to heavy rain and the shell torn ground. The return signal was given at 2.40 am. And at 2.50am the signal was given that all the party had returned safely. Three prisoners were captured.'

Long returned home sick soon afterwards and when he returned to France was posted to the 10th Battalion.

He was killed in action on 31 May 1918 at the Aisne. The Regimental History reveals:

'...On May 29 the 10th Royal Warwickshire was in the line at Lhery Ville. Thence during three days' heavy fighting they were gradually forced back through Ville-en-Tardenois to Bois d'Ecluss. The fighting continued at intervals till June 18 and the losses were so heavy that on June 9 the 57th Brigade had to be temporarily reorganized as a composite battalion. The strength of the Royal Warwickshire on that date was 7 Officers and 300 men.'

He was 30 and is commemorated on the Soissons Memorial Aisne France.

### A fine German East African operations K.A.R. D.C.M. awarded to Sergeant Gordon, 2nd/1st King's African Rifles, who together with two Askaris, worked their way around an enemy machine gun in action and compelled it to retire.

King's African Rifles Distinguished Conduct Medal, G.V.R. (336 Sgt., 2/1 K.A.R.) VF £975

K.A.R. D.C.M. *Nyasaland Gazette* 30 Apr 1918. The official recommendation states:

"For conspicuous gallantry at Lumembe on the night of 14/15th November 1916. This N.C.O. with two Askaris most bravely worked around the rear of an enemy machine gun in action at 60 yards and compelled it to retire with loss of a European wounded and captured and an Askari killed."

# 54 A scarce Portuguese East African operations K.A.R. D.C.M. awarded to Company Sergeant-Major Lazar Amusamba, 2nd/2nd Battalion, King's African Rifles, who always displayed great bravery and utmost contempt of danger in action.

King's African Rifles Distinguished Conduct Medal, G.V.R. (414 C.S.M., 2/2 K.A.R.) GVF

K.A.R. D.C.M. approved by General Van Deventeron 3rd January 1919 for service in Portuguese East Africa. The official recommendation states:

"For conspicuous gallantry in action and devotion to duty. This Warrant Officer has always displayed great bravery and the utmost contempt of danger in action. This was particularly noticeable at Lioma on 31st August 1918 when only one officer was left in his Company. He has always set a good example to his men, and has been untiring in his efforts to promote and maintain the efficiency of his Company."

Lazar Amusumba of the Asisia Tribe, from the village of Chiwita in the Chinteche District, enlisted into the King's African Rifles at Zomba, Nyasaland on 1 July 1910. He was appointed a Lance Corporal on 1 July 1916, Corporal, 7 July 1916, Sergeant on 1 January 1917 and attained the rank of Company Sergeant-Major on 1 November 1918. He served in the K.A.R. Reserve, June 1912 until May 1913, re-engaging into the 1st K.A.R. on 1 June 1913, and suffered from a contused wound to the foot in May that year. During the Great War he served in Jubaland, July-October 1914 and fought against German forces in British East Africa, December 1914-May 1916.

C.S.M. Lazar Amusumba, 2nd Battalion K.A.R. died on 6 May 1919 and it is interesting to note that soldiers of the King's African Rifles received their Great War medals in 1922/23. As they were not issued to those who had been killed or died in the war or during the intervening years, the K.A.R. D.C.M. to Amusumba would have been his only award. It is therefore a scarce medal to a K.A.R. soldier who was killed/died at the time of the Great War.

An extremely fine Flying C.G.M. group of six awarded to Warrant Officer 'Air Gunner' M. G. Clynes, 431 Squadron, R.C.A.F., late 104 Squadron, Royal Air Force, who in an eventful 47 1/2 sorties was involved in four crash landings and personally destroyed two enemy aircraft; his luck ran out on his 48th mission when the Halifax aircraft in which he was rear gunner, was shot down during a raid on Frankfurt.

"This Warrant Officer has successfully completed a large number of operational sorties. He has taken part in attacks against Tripoli, Naples, Catania, Benghazi and other targets in the Middle East and North Africa. He has also attacked some of the most heavily defended targets in Western Germany, such as Berlin, The Ruhr, and Brest.

On four occasions his aircraft has been attacked by night fighters and each time he has successfully directed his captain's evasive action. During these combats he has destroyed at least two enemy aircraft for certain.

Apart from this, Warrant Officer Clynes has been involved in four crash landings but his cheerfulness and courage have never flagged, and have been a shining example to all, in keeping with the highest traditions of the Royal Air

I strongly recommend that Warrant Officer Clynes' exceptionally fine operational record, he recognised by an award of the Conspicuous Gallantry Medal."

Born 1914 at Longford, Eire and resident in Edgworthstown, Longford, Eire, Clynes was a carpenter's mate prior to his enlistment in 1940.

The official recommendation states he had flown 47 1/2 sorties but could not give total hours as his logbook had been destroyed on overseas service. He had flown 45 sorties with No. 104 Squadron, commencing with a raid on Cologne (30 July 1941). In all he flew twelve trips in Bomber Command (on six of which the aircraft was damaged). He went to Egypt in mid-October 1941 and commenced operations in North Africa on 19 October 1941; his last recorded sortie in that theatre was 20 November 1942, although a certificate from the Commanding Officer of No. 104 stated he had flown nine additional trips for which no record had survived. His second tour had begun on 12 May 1943 (Duisburg) and had to date consisted of three trips (a sea search on 14 June 1943).

The operation on which he was killed was a raid on Frankfurt. Clynes was rear gunner of Halifax V LK.973 of 431 Squadron, which took off from Tholthorpe, Yorkshire on 25 Nov 1943. The aircraft was shot down over Germany and all eight crew were killed, they are interred in the Durnbach War Cemetery, Germany.

Her Battle Honours included Dieppe, 1942, North Africa 1942, Sicily 1943, Salerno, 1943 and France 1944. Taylor was Mentioned in Despatches for Operation Antidote - the clearance of a passage through Galita and Sicilian channels to to ensure safe passage for allied ships in April 1943

An account of the action is published on page 55 of *Felixtowe Flying-Boats*: 'On the morning of 24th April an S.O.S. was received from an Italian ship saying that she was under attack from a U-Boat, South of Portland Bill. Surface craft and seaplanes were immediately sent out, and a flying-boat, which had landed at Portland the previous day with minor engine trouble, also went away to search the area. The flying-boat's crew found the U-boat on the surface and, probably because the morning was misty, approached within a quarter of a mile before the submarine commander became aware of the danger which threatened him. He then prepared to dive, but while his conning tower was still awash, two bombs of 100 lb weight, dropped from the flying-boat, exploded above the submarine. Oil and bubbles came to the surface and, after a further uneventful patrol in the vicinity, the flying-boat's crew returned to their base reasonable confident that they had disabled or destroyed the U-boat.'

About an hour later, a destroyer saw a submarine breaking surface near to the where the attack had taken place. The destroyer made for the submarine but by the time she arrived, the submarine had submerged, and judging the position of the target from her wash, dropped two depth charges. Following the explosion, oil gushed to the surface and spread over a large area. The U-Boat may have been the U.B.39 which sailed on April 23rd and never returned.

Laycock's pilot was Lieutenant-Commander F. C. Waugh, and in his detailed official report of 24 Sept 1917, he gives the date of the action as 23 April 1917

An announcement of the award was made in the *Harrogate Herald* in the 20 Jun 1917 publication, in which *W. H. Breare* wrote in a letter:

"I have just received private intimation that Stanley Laycock, son of the late Mr Tom Laycock and Mrs Laycock, East Parade, has been awarded the Distinguished Service Medal for bombing a submarine from a naval sea-plane. He is expected home in about three week's time on leave, after which I shall be able to tell you how he looks with his ribbon. Modest, as usual, I bet. Stanley is the younger of two sons. Beneath his surface is a rare resource of mental strength."

Charles Stanley Laycock was born in Harrowgate, Yorkshire on 21 Jul 1898 and entered the Navy as a Boy Mechanic on 3 Jan 1916.

### The newspaper article states:

"For bravery shown during the recent advance, Private Fred Greaves of the Cheshire regiment, who formerly resided at 7, Silverlea Avenue, Liscard, has been awarded the Military Medal. Private Greaves, who is 28 years of age, joined the colours at the commencement of the war, and journeyed with his regiment to the Dardanelles, where after short service he was wounded, necessitating his removal to England. On recovering, he was sent to France, and in the recent activities was successful in capturing single-handed a number of the enemy in a dug-out. Prior to the war he was engaged by the Ajax Window Cleaning Co., Seacombe."

Private Henry Greaves served latterly with the Worcester Regiment and then East Lancashire Regiment, from which unit he was Ignominiously Discharged, by District Court Martial, on 13 Nov 1920. Having re-enlisted in September 1919, he was posted to Ireland, serving at Killarney and Tralee. His offences included absence, negligent discharge of S.A.A., Iosing by neglect, and conduct contrary to the prejudice of military discipline. In addition to various periods of detention, Greaves had his Gratuity, Campaign Medals, and prior service forfeited on discharge.

He was awarded the Military Medal for the successful raid carried out by men of the 7th Bedfordshire Regiment on the enemy's trenches near Carnoy, in the early hours of 27 April 1916. Unfortunately Joyce received gun shot wounds to both feet, and it was not until January 1917 that he was passed fit. Shortly afterwards he applied for a commission which was granted in December 1917. He was posted to the Norfolk Regiment and attached to the 12th Battalion, and died on 20 August 1918, of wounds received in action in France. He is buried in Longuenesse (St Omer) Souvenir Cemetery.

Ernest Wakely, who was born in Plymouth in October 1892, first entered the French theatre of war as a Private in the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry in May 1915, his subsequent award of the M.M. undoubtedly being for the Somme. The 6th Battalion first went into action at Delville Wood on 18 August 1916, a successful but costly attack that ended in severe hand-to-hand fighting and heavy bombardment - casualties amounted to 366 men. In the following month, in another attack against enemy trenches at Gueudecourt on the 16th, the Battalion sustained 300 casualties; Wakely's MIC entry also reveals service in the Gloucestershire Regiment and East Surreys.

Demobilised in April 1919, Wakely joined the Royal Navy as an Acting Stoker 1st Class that July, his service record noting a possible souvenir of his earlier service in France, namely 'a wound on the calf of right leg'. And he was still serving in a similar capacity at the time his record being transferred in January 1929, his L.S. & G.C. Medal being awarded to him in October of the following year - so his earlier service in the Army must have been taken into account; sold with copied R.N. record of service and other related research.

Shaw was absorbed into the establishment on 30 Apr 1918.

The M.M. was most probably awarded for the German Offensive of March 1918 and on 14 Aug 1918 he was tried by Field General Court Martial on the charge, 'when on Active Service conduct to the prejudice of good order & military discipline'. On his Company being ordered to fall in said "Do not do it men, I'm not going to", or words to that effect. The Court finding: Guilty. sentence: Reduced to the ranks. The punishment was confirmed by Brigadier-General Seagreeve, commanding 152nd Brigade the following day. Private Shaw was kept in confinement for 15 days.

Back with the 6th Battalion, Private Shaw was wounded in action on 27 Aug 1918, receiving a gun shot wound to his right thigh and was evacuated to No. 42 Casualty Clearing Station. Shaw was discharged from Army on 28 Feb 1919 and was serving with 216 DE Company, Labour Corps at the time.

"Between October, 1944, and the end of hostilities in North-West Europe, Cpl. Farrer commanded a section in a mortar platoon. On two particular occasions, Cpl. Farrer particularly distinguished himself.

First at Geffen on the night of 10th/11th October, where his section of three riflemen, which was holding a street, was attacked by some fifty Germans supported by mortar and artillery fire. The enemy got to within ten yards of his position before they were halted by the fire of his section and were forced to withdraw, leaving six dead behind. In beating off the assault by vastly superior forces Cpl. Farrer was in no small measure responsible for the fact that his company group, consisting of two platoons and a troop of tanks, were successful in repelling an attack by what turned out to be a battalion of enemy.

Later at Stadtlohn, on 29th March, 1945, when he was advancing at the head of his section, he was pinned down by heavy and accurate machine-gun fire. Ignoring his own safety, he rushed off to organize support and report to his platoon commander, and returned to his section to continue the advance. Throughout his service with the Battalion his courage and cheerfulness have inspired all with whom he has worked."

Throughout the day this sapper displayed exceptional courage and was of great assistance in helping his platoon Officer to rally the men. Sapper Thompson's example of duty was exemplary."

Private Ernest Bradbury was awarded the M.M. for his part in the superb holding action carried out when his battalion were in action at St. Leger, near Arras. Faced with the full onslaught on the opening day of the German March 1918 Offensive with overwhelming numbers of enemy troops, the battalion (part of the 103rd Brigade) fought with "stubborn and protracted resistance", as was described by Major-General L. Nicholson, C.O. 34th Division, in his Order of the Day, dated 9th April 1918. Over two days of severe fighting when ammunition ran out the battalion suffered 120 killed, wounded and missing inclusive of 6 officers. Bradbury was one of 20 other ranks to be recommended for the Military Medal for this action.

#### 77 A Great War 'Western Front' M.M. awarded to Private C. Goldfarb, 7th Battalion East Kent Regiment, who died of wounds on 1 October 1918

Cecil Goldfarb was a brave Jewish Soldier who was born in Warsaw, Poland. His family moved to London but by 1915 he was living in Canterbury, Kent. In 1917 he enlisted into his local Regiment, the 7th East Kent Regiment (The Buffs), and joined them in France as part of the 55th Brigade, 18th (Eastern) Division

In 1918, the 18th Division took part in the battles at Crozat Canal, Baboeuf, Villers-Bretonneux, Murlancourt Ridge, Trone Wood and Ronssoy but their last major battle was the breaking of the Hindenburg Line. This was a combined attack using American, Australian and British Divisions. At 0530 hrs on the 29th 55th Brigade were ordered forward but came under intense fire from Guillemont Farm and eventually the Brigade Commander ordered the 7th Buffs to halt in the Fleesceall-Pomponious Lanes area. Although German morale was low, troops were hungry and ammunition in short supply the German soldiers fought with bravery and determination. The Buffs came under "withering machine gun and artillery fire". As darkness fell the battalion was ordered to hold the line of Cochrane Avenue- Lion Trench- Egg Post and prepare for a counter attack. Gradually the German resistance slackened and on the night 30th September/1st October the 7th Buffs were ordered to advance to Vendhuile.

On 1 October 1918 Private Cecil Goldfarb died of his wounds and was buried in the Doingt Communal Cemetery near Peonne. He was the husband of Mrs W. F. Goldfarb of 5, Stour Street, Canterbury.

In the year of 2000, the British Legion in Canterbury realised that Private Cecil Goldfarb's name was not recorded on the Canterbury War Memorial. To remedy this situation a ceremony was held on the 82nd Anniversary of his death when a new memorial plaque bearing Private Goldfarb's name was dedicated. The Lord Mayor of Canterbury, the Chairman of the Canterbury Branch of the Queens Own Buffs and representatives of the British Legion laid wreaths. The Mayor stating that "It was fitting that this plaque has been dedicated on the anniversary of his death".

# 78 A good 1944 'Tripsrath and Dorset Wood' M.M. group of seven to Warrant Officer J. Boyd, Highland Light Infantry.

"C.S.M. Boyd, J was on 30 Dec. 44, C.S.M. of 'B' Coy. when a heavy attack with full artillery support was mounted by the enemy against our positions in Tripsrath and Dorset Wood. C.S.M. Boyd's company was in Tripsrath, and at an early stage in the battle, which began before daylight, it was found that Coy H.Q. had been surrounded by the enemy although other platoon localities in the village were holding out. During the enemy attack on his Coy H.Q., this W.O. performed his duties in a very brave manner under most difficult conditions. Throughout the engagement, he displayed a high degree of coolness, was always reliable, and showed a complete disregard of his personal safety in performing the tasks that fell to him. When the enemy were just outside the windows of Coy H.Q. and actually assaulting the building with grenades, C.S.M. Boyd was everywhere in evidence; strengthening the defences; and organising the redistribution and replenishment of ammunition while under extremely close and automatic fire. His absolute reliability in carrying out orders during all stages of the battle, his ability in reorganising the defences while at the same time taking a very active part in the fighting, and

his cheerfulness and bearing in the face of danger were a splendid example

to the men, and assisted greatly in the defeat of the enemy. During an action which lasted for more than twenty four hours, before the village was finally

cleared, C.S.M. Boyd's devotion to duty was worthy of the highest praise."

O A very good 1944 'Attack on Casa Spinello', Italy operations, group of seven awarded to Colour-Sergeant E. W. Flavell, 2nd Battalion, London Irish Rifles (The Royal Ulster Rifles), who commanded one of the support sections during the attack, and although wounded in the fighting, he remained at his post keeping his gun firing as the counter attacks came; later he navigated a minefield in darkness to bring up extra ammunition and grenades.

"Corporal Flavell was commanding one of the sections that was giving close fire support during the attack on Casa Spinello on 23 October 1944. At about 1900 hours, after the attack had succeeded, he was wounded in the thigh. Although he had every opportunity to be evacuated to the R.A.P. he remained at his post keeping his gun firing as counter attacks were beginning to come in

Another company with extra ammunition and grenades was ordered up to reinforce but ran into a minefield. Corporal Flavell volunteered with the help of another man to guide them round it to his own company position. This he accomplished in the dark, over rough country and under heavy enemy defensive fire. Only after this did he allow himself to be evacuated.

This N.C.O's gallantry, devotion to duty and disregard of the fact that he was in great pain resulted in much needed men and ammunition arriving at the correct spot in time, and is worthy of the highest praise."

The 2nd Battalion, London Irish Rifles (The Royal Ulster Rifles) landed in North Africa in late 1942 and saw much fighting in Tunisia in the following year. Subsequently engaged in Sicily, the Battalion crossed to the Italian mainland in September 1943, where, among other actions, it fought at Termoli and on the Barbara Line, was present at the crossing of the River Sangro and in the Cassino battle in the Spring of 1944. After a brief period of rest out of the line, it then rejoined the campaign in the Po Valley and fought in the battle for Argenta Gap.

He showed great coolness and complete disregard of his own safety and was of great help to his Platoon Commander and Platoon Sergeant in rallying and re-organising the Platoon during a difficult change of direction which had to be made in the darkness. In the subsequent advance and attack on the objective, he showed great dash and determination to close with and kill the enemy. Throughout the next day, he showed great coolness under heavy fire during consolidation. His fearless conduct was a very fine example to the rest of his platoon and is worthy of the highest praise."

Scott, Middlesex Regiment, whose platoon came under accurate and sustained enemy fire on the Neder Rijn, and despite suffering phosphorus burns and facing almost certain death, went back to find two missing men of his platoon when forced to withdraw.

"On the night of 12/13 April 1945, 49 (WR) Division forced the River Ijssel and attacked Arnhem. For this operation it was necessary for No. 12 4.2 Mortar Platoon to take up a very exposed position on the bank of the Neder Rijn immediately South of Arnhem to enable the platoon to support both the assault river crossing and the attack on the town. It was also necessary to dump a large quantity of mortar ammunition, both High Explosive and Phosphorous Smoke. Sergeant Scott, owing to the absence of his officer, was in sole command of the mortar position.

The platoon came under accurate and sustained enemy artillery fire. One ammunition dump was hit and the phosphorous smoke ammunition caused a conflagration in the houses and the other ammunition dumps in the platoon position. The area rapidly became a raging inferno and quite untenable. Sergeant Scott, with complete disregard for his own safety, personally rallied all members of the platoon and removed them from immediate danger. On checking the platoon he found that there were three men missing. Showing bravery of the very highest order, this NCO immediately returned into the inferno amidst exploding mortar bombs and still under enemy artillery fire searched for the missing personnel. He found one Private lying at the bottom of a slit trench and alight with burning phosphorous. Sergeant Scott lifted out the soldier and carried him to safety. In doing this he was severely burned about the hands and body. Despite his burns and facing almost certain death he did not desist until he had found the other two missing men, but returned again and again into the area. He then moved the platoon to safety and attended to every man's welfare. Only after he had seen to the needs of every man and made sure that his platoon was complete did Sergeant Scott think of his own wounds.

This NCO, during a sustained period of action, set an example of bravery of the very highest order. By magnificent leadership he extricated his platoon with very few casualties showing a devotion to duty far surpassing anything that could reasonably be expected."

A sudden counter-attack was launched by enemy infantry, using small arms and panzerfausts, and penetrated the forward positions reaching Sjt Gower's gun.

By this time the detachment together with the SP gun were virtually surrounded. In a display of initiative and bold leadership, this NCO so rallied and led his men that he brought to bear continuous and rapid small arms fire upon the enemy fighting them off at close range.

Under the fire power which Sjt Gower brought to bear the enemy was eventually compelled to withdraw in disorder having suffered casualties and leaving four dead behind them.

Sjt Gower's fearless command and devotion to duty were instrumental in successfully defending the SP gun and inflicting a severe reverse upon the enemy.'

An outstanding September 1944, attack on "San Sevino" M.M. group of five awarded to Bombardier P. Bennett, "E" Battery, 11th (Honourable Artillery Company) Regiment, Royal Artillery, who, armed only with a Tommy gun and exposed to sniping, bazooka and very heavy shell fire, defended his jeep when in a forward and exposed position - throughout the action he sent out vital orders which enabled heavy fire support to be brought down on the enemy.

"On 1 Sept 1944, "E" Battery, Honourable Artillery Company, were in support of 9th Lancers who were ordered at first light to attack San Sevino. Owing to mechanical breakdown the Battery Commander's tank was not available so he went forward in a jeep followed later by a White Scout Car.

The operation became very involved and both observation tanks of the battery became casualties owing to the heavy enemy shellfire. It was then necessary for the battery commander to maintain communication on three nets.

Bombardier Bennett was the Driver/Operator of the jeep and from 0700 hours until 2200 hours maintained communications even under very heavy shell fire through being in an exposed position with the tanks. At no time did he hesitate to send down the vital fire orders not only to his own regiment but the whole of the divisional artillery, even when the jeep was hit by shell splinters and one of the wireless batteries destroyed.

Through his skill, devotion to duty and disregard for his own safety he made it possible for heavy fire support. This fire was so heavy and persistent that although the enemy made three determined attacks they were pinned and a vital sector of the front was saved. It was not possible for the tanks to withdraw from the exposed forward position until about 2300 hours, when they were exposed to sniping and to the bazooka. Armed with a Tommy Gun, Bombardier Bennett defended his jeep and finally withdrew only when the tanks came in.

The splendid example of cheerfulness, devotion to duty on a lone task and complete disregard for his own personal safety was an inspiration to all present, including the tank crews."

Bombardier Percy Bennett previously served in the desert campaign from El Alemain to Tunisia and took part in the Sicily landings. Educated at Tower Road School and later at King's College, and played football for Hollington United and Hastings reserves. Resident at St. Leonard's he was 28 at the time of his award and before hostilities worked for District Motor Services Ltd.

When the enemy post was found, Cpl Sheehan with complete disregard for his personal safety, and utter contempt for the enemy, used his Bren gun so effectively that the enemy position was soon captured, and the wounded comrade located. Some form of stretcher being required, Cpl Sheehan without hesitation dashed across the open, in full view of a farmhouse known to be occupied by the enemy, to collect a door on which, subsequently, his comrade was successfully evacuated. Throughout this affray Cpl Sheehan's inspired conduct contributed greatly to the success of this patrol."

Recommended by Lieutenant General Horrocks and confirmed by Field Marshal B. L. Montgomery.

William Barnabas "Bill" Kennedy served in Egypt from 5 Nov 1914 and served in Gallipoli before embarking for France & Flanders.

Details taken from a book published by W. B, Kennedy (An Accrington Pal), when writing about a transfer from the 4th Lancs to the M.G.C. stated that his company commander was Maj E. W. C. Flavell and that one of the junior officers was Lt Gale - these officers went on to become Brigadier Flavell, one of the founders of the Parachute Regiment, and General "Windy" Gale, one of the heroes of Arnhem.

93 A very fine 24/25 April 1945 'Attack on Kattenturm' M.M. awarded to Corporal D.A. Lambourne, 2nd Battalion, Royal Ulster Rifles, who gallantry led his section, successfully clearing two houses under rifle and Panzerfaust fire, then captured an 88 mm gun and the remnants of its team - this one of the Last Awards for the Campaign in Europe.

"This NCO was commanding a section in No 8 platoon during the attack on Kattenturm on the night 24/25 April 1945.

His platoon experienced considerable difficulty fighting their way along the Bund against enemy positions dug all the way along at intervals of only a few yards.

He led his Section with determination and dash and successfully cleared two houses under rifle and Panzerfaust fire. The platoon were then held up by determined enemy of about platoon strength, well dug-in and defending an 88 mm gun. The enemy fired a considerable number of Panzerfausts and together with well directed small arms fire, caused a number of casualties in the platoon, including the platoon commander. Assisted by covering fire from the remainder of the platoon Cpl. Lambourne led his section on to the enemy position, driving some off and making the remained prisoners. The 88 mm gun was captured intact, together with a number of LMG's & the remainder of the Company was able to pass through to its next objective.

On consolidation the platoon commander had to leave on account of his wounds, the platoon Sgt. already being away suffering from blast and shock. Cpl. Lambourne took over command of the platoon, completed the consolidation and by his efficiency and cheerfulness maintained the morale at a high level."

Reece was wounded in action on the 1st Day of The Somme, suffering gun shot wounds to the shoulder and was invalided home on the 7th. Having recovered, he embarked with the Mediterranean Expeditionary Force for Egypt and Palestine on 1 Jan 1917 and transferred into the 11th Battalion on the 11th. Reece was awarded the Military Medal for gallantry on 6 Dec 1917 and having returned home on 23 Dec 1917, passed through Cadet School and was commissioned into the 11th O.C. Battalion 3 Feb 1919.

His constant fearlessness and cheerfulness in dangerous situations have been an inspiration to every NCO and man serving with him."

Following a long artillery bombardment lasting from 16 to 31 Jul 1917 and a staggering 4.3 million shells, the Fifth Army attacked the German lines north of Ypres at dawn on 31 Jul 1917. The 6th Battalion, Seaforth Highlanders were involved in the attack reaching their objectives but at a cost of 66 men killed during the course of the day. On 19 Aug the Commanding Officer read out the names of the recipients of Military Medals awarded for gallantry in the recent offensive, the 6th Battalion received 29 and one bar, which included Private Quinn. In addition there were five M.C.s, three D.C.M.s and the Victoria Cross awarded to Private Alexander Edwards.

James Quinn enlisted into the Seaforth Highlanders on 3 Apr 1918 and was discharged on 7 Sept 1918.

97 An extremely fine 1943 Pilot's D.F.M. awarded to Flying Officer F. Williams, 78 Squadron, later 640 Squadron, Royal Air Force, who was killed when his Halifax aircraft was shot down by an enemy night fighter during an operation to Bourg-Leopold on 27th May 1944.

D.F.M. London Gazette 10 Sept 1943. Flight Sergeant Frank Williams, No.78 Squadron (Captain of Aircraft). The official Recommendation states:

"This pilot is the keenest member of the Squadron. He has now completed his first tour, during which time he has set a shining example to all concerned, and has pressed home all attacks with the utmost determination. He had at all times handled his crew well and their keenness was undoubtedly due to his able captaincy. He is strongly recommended for the award of the D.F.M."

Following his operation tour with 78 Squadron, Frank Williams was commissioned Flying Officer and joined 640 Squadron at Leconfield. He failed to return from a bombing raid on Camp Bourg Leopold, near Antwerp on 28 May 1944. He was 21 and in interred in the Schoonselhof Cemetery, Antwerp, Belgium.

### 98 A scarce 1940 D.F.M. awarded to Pilot Officer James MacCoubrey, No. 10 Squadron, Royal Air Force, who died of wounds on 21st February 1941.

"Before his appointment as Captain of aircraft, Sergeant MacCoubrey acted as second pilot and Navigator during 8 successful operational missions. Since this time, he has completed a further 14 successful operational missions, involving the attacking of oil plants, marshalling yards and other important enemy targets. This airman has displayed a splendid devotion to duty snd a determination to complete his missions successfully. His work with the squadron has been of the utmost value."

James Grant MacCoubrey was born in Glasgow on 23 Feb 1915 and at the outbreak of hostilities was serving as a Sergeant Pilot with 10 Squadron. After nine months of operational flying he was posted to 19 OTU at Kinloss as an instructor. On 18 Feb 1941, the Whitley V aircraft in which he was Captain, suffered engine failure on approach to Forres aerodrome and crashed on the aerodrome boundary. Five of the crew were found dead in the wreckage, Sergeant E. Lawley and Pilot Officer MacCoubrey were seriously burned. MacCoubrey died of his extensive burns and shock on 21 Feb 1941 and was interred in Lambhill Cemetery, Glasgow.

# 99 A very fine 1941 Bomber Pilot's D.F.M. awarded to Sergeant T. E. Coogan, 77 Squadron, Royal Air Force, who was killed whilst flying on 16th March 1942.

"Sergeant Coogan has completed 32 operational sorties as second pilot and Captain and had recently been posted to O.T.U. to rest. He has at all times carried out his duties with determination. As a Captain, he has been a fine leader and his efforts in locating targets, pressing home his attacks and returning home under the most adverse weather conditions have set a high standard and example to the other members of the squadron."

The newspaper cutting states: "Twenty-four-years-old Sergt.-Pilot Thomas Coogan, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. William Coogan, "Meathway", Duncan Drive, Greasby, was last Saturday invested with the Distinguished Flying Medal by H.M. the King, at Buckingham Palace. Sergt.-Pilot Coogan, whose father and mother also attended the investiture, received the honour for outstanding devotion to duty, acts and skill and foresight. He has been over enemy territory - both Germany and Italy - many times, as the enemy has good reason to know!

educated at St. Hugh's School, Birkenhead, from where he got an art scholarship, he subsequently took an appointment with Messrs. T. J. Hughes's, London Road, Liverpool, in the window dressing department. he joined the R.A.F. in 1936 and on the outbreak of war became a pilot in the heavy bomber class of aircraft. Since then he has been in almost continuous activity."

He was killed when piloting a Lysander aircraft from R.A.F. Kinloss on a cooperation exercise in ground to air firing. The propeller came off the aircraft in flight and though Sgt Coogan successfully put the Lysander down on the beach at Findhorn Bay, he was unable to prevent his aircraft from running into some anti-tank concrete blocks. Along with his co-pilot, Sgt. B. Phillips RAAF, Coogan was killed. Both men are interred in the Kinloss Abbey Burial Ground.

The official recommendation states: "Flight Sergeant Gilbert who has been engaged in active operations since the commencement of hostilities was posted to this unit from No. 233 Squadron, Coastal Command, with whom he had completed over 90 operational sorties, many of them under fire from the enemy's defences. In addition, he has had several engagements with enemy fighters and, in his last operational sortie with N. 233 Squadron on 29th October 1940, was wounded during a battle with 5 Me. 109s. Before his recovery, he was posted to this squadron and has completed six successful operational sorties during which he has engaged enemy night fighters. This N.C.O. has displayed an extraordinary keen sense of duty in every activity he undertakes. He has proved invaluable in assisting in the training of Air Gunners. In addition, he was detailed to be N.C.O. in charge of Dinsdale Hall in which establishment over 100 aircrew are billeted. He discharged this duty with great keenness and discretion, the work involved being hard and calling for unusual diplomacy. In addition, on occasions he has assumed the role of N.C.O. in charge of Labuan, a task entailing many administrative and operational problems."

"This N.C.O. Wireless Operator/ Air Gunner has undertaken 13 long operational flights over enemy territory, many of them in very bad weather and under conditions of considerable difficulty.

As the senior Wireless Operator/ Air Gunner in his Squadron he has invariably displayed resourcefulness, coolness and determination in the face of the enemy, great efficiency as a Wireless Operator/ Air Gunner and has set a fine example."

George Edward Appleton of Newcastle on Tyne enlisted into the Royal Air Force on 24 Jan 1938. His first operation was on 21 Dec 1939, a mission to locate the German battleship *Deutschland*, in Hampden aircraft L 4093. On completion of his 'Tour', which consisted of 24 operations, Appleton was selected for a Gunnery Leader's Course. On 27 Jul 1941, at Castle Kennedy, and Air Gunnery School located in Wigtownshire, Scotland, he was killed in a flying accident. The Hampden aircraft, in which he was Air Gunner, stalled in a turn shortly after take off and crashed killing all five crew. Appleton was 21 and is interred in the West Road Cemetery, Newcastle on Tyne.

From the start he tackled his duties with great enthusiasm and energy, ... In the field the task of feeding some 75 officers in relays and normally with a move every night is not easy. Sgt. Evans never fails to provide a very high standard, far higher indeed than would reasonably be expected. Additionally he frequently has to arrange special meals for important visitors to the headquarters in the field; both military and political. ... In addition to his duties of Mess Sergeant, Sergeant Evans was instrumental in setting up a flourishing liaison between the divisional signal regiment and the village of limuiden in Holland. An annual exchange of visits now takes place and the international good will created cannot be overestimated. Sergeant Evans has put into the Service more than he has received, and by his unstinting efforts and determination has produced an Officers' Mess in barracks and in the field which is the envy of many. ...

James Bradley was born in the Parish of Batleigh, Moneymore, Co. Derry, enlisted into the 13th Foot at Colerain, Co. Derry, on 12 March 1806, and was discharged in Guernsey on 24 November 1818, in consequence of defective vision.

122 MILITARY GENERAL SERVICE 1793-1814, 2 clasps, Albuhera, Vittoria (J. Sturton, 57th Foot) minor edge bruise NEF £2800

Less than 40 "Albuhera" Military General Service 1793-1814 Medals are known to have survived to men of the 57th.

Joseph Sturton was born in Nottingham and first served with the 16th Light Dragoons between 1793 and 1802. He rejoined the Army in 1804 and served with the 57th until 1816, being present in the regiment's most famous action, that of Albuhera.

During the early part of its service in the Peninsula, the Regiment, which contained a number of turbulent characters in its ranks, received the nickname of the "Steelbacks", from the amount of flogging administered to its men and the way they bore their punishment. Following its famous part at the battle of Albuhera in May 1811, they became known as the "Die Hards", their Colonel having called out on being carried wounded from the battlefield, "Die Hard, 57th! Die Hard!" And so they did, suffering terrible casualties in a close range "fire fight" perhaps never equalled in military history. Thus from an original strength of 31 officers and 616 men, two officers and 87 men were killed, and 21 officers and 318 men wounded. Marshal Beresford, not normally noted for his eloquence, paid this magnificent tribute to the British infantry under his command: "It is impossible by any description to do justice to the distinguished gallantry of the troops; but every individual nobly did his duty; and it is observed that our dead, particularly in the 57th Regiment, were lying as they fought, in ranks, and every wound was in front".

Aged 54 and 'worn out' in 1816, it was not until October 1846 that Private Joseph Sturton became a Chelsea In-Pensioner. He died in October 1848 having just claimed his medal and an interesting endorsement to his service papers states, "Medal of this deceased in-pensioner sent to Regimental collection - the regiment promising to return it if claimed by the relatives of the deceased". This note dated 22 Oct 1895, the Royal Hospital apparently no longer willing to hold onto the medal.

He later worked in a brewery in Blackburn and died there on 18 January 1848, his death certificate giving cause of death as 'received a gun shot in 1813 July which never healed but lately has been more troublesome. 34 years 6 months.'

"On the morning of Sunday, November 5, and hour before daybreak, and alarm was sounded through the English camp.....

General Codrington, the first to give the alarm, turned out the Light Division and the 2nd Battalion assembled at once. Three companies only were on parade, one wing having gone to the heights of Balaklava and Captain Foreman's company being in the five gun battery. Of these three companies, one had just come in after twenty-seven hours in the trenches. However they at once advanced and General Codrington having placed his brigade on the Victoria ridge, these Rifleman extended along the left bank of the Careenage ravine on the extreme left of the line. Soon after they took up their position, a column of Russian, part of Solomonoff's force, advanced up the Careenage ravine and after opening fire on the Riflemen, attempted to ascend its left bank; but Captain Alrington, with two companies of the 2nd Battalion, at once attacked them and drove them down at the point of the bayonet. They retreated by the bottom of the ravine and did not again make their appearance in the part of the fight. In this attack a Rifleman named Hewitt put on a greatcoat and cap, late property of a Russian soldier deceased, followed the retreating Muscovites down the ravine and picked off a number of them. He narrowly escaped however, being shot by his own comrades. This man as well as a brother in the same battalion, afterwards died in the Crimea"

In the neighborhood of Tafel Kop, the troops of Colonels Rimington and Damant were moving by night in a fierce thunderstorm by parallel roads three miles apart to cover an extension of the blockhouse line. Damant's advance guard suddenly spotted a force approaching. This force was khaki clad, and in a formation typical of regular mounted troops. They also, as they advanced, fired volleys in the direction of some Boers who were escaping across the front of the British. The British forces were deceived, and this clever ruse enabled the Boers to seize the crest of a kopje which commanded the whole field and also the guns and the main body of the British troops. But even in their inferior position Damant's troops fought gallantry to save the guns which accompanied the advance guard — so nobly, indeed, that every officer and man, except four, of the leading troops were shot down before reinforcements from the main body and Colonel Rimington's column came to the rescue. When these loomed in the distance the Boers wisely relinquished their attack and fled, pursued for many miles by Colonel Rimington's troops. Colonel Damant himself was wounded in four places, and many of his staff were killed and wounded as they fought gallantly with their revolvers till shot down.

Albert Edward Bathurst Wood was born at Plymouth on 3 Feb 1876 and qualified LRCP&S Ed., LRFP&S Glas; MB ChB Ed. He served as a Civil Surgeon in South Africa during 1901-01 and was commissioned Lieutenant, 31 Jan 1903. He was promoted Captain, 31 Jul 1906; Major, 31 Jan 1915; Temporary Lieutenant-Colonel 9 Jun 1915 to 18 Mar 1918, and was placed on retired pay on 8 Jan 1924 granted the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. Re-employed in the rank of Major, 20 Mar 1928 to 31 Oct 1932, and 15 Apr 1940 then finally retired on 3 Dec 1948. Wood served in India, 1904-09; Hong Kong, 1911-12; N. China, 1912-14; Tsingtau EF 1914; Hong Kong 1914-15; France 1915-18, and India 1918-24.

He embarked as a Medical Officer with the 2nd Battalion, South Wales Borderers, part of the North China Field Force for operations against Tsingtau in 1914. The field medical unit was organized as a modified field ambulance with bearer and tent sections. Its equipment, personnel and transport had to depend upon the resources obtainable in Tientsin. The tent section had six 160 lb. tents, ten camp beds and ten palliasses, with medical and surgical material, and a personnel of two officers, Major J. A. Hartigan and Captain A. E. B. Wood, and twelve other ranks R.A.M.C. The bearer section was formed of 55 Chinese coolies, engaged and specially trained for the purpose at Tientsin, with nine dandies and a reserve of eight field stretchers.

Later, in France, as CO of the 46th Field Ambulance, he was commended for his work at Base Hospital No. 5:

"The first call from the Armies of our Allies came for medical men. The fact that our unit was among the first, if not the first to answer this call and report early for duty with the A. E. F. in France, is well known. For several months after our arrival well-trained and experienced officers and men of the B. E. F. were assigned to duty with the new hospital personnel for the purpose of enabling us to take advantage of the knowledge and comprehension of the work which our Allies had gained during the three previous years of war. Among these was Major A. E. B. Wood, R. A. M. C. Although far from being accustomed to a spirit of friendship and a common-cause feeling between officers and men Major Wood did his utmost to adapt himself to the methods of the American Army and rendered great assistance to officers, nurses and men in the solving of perplexing problems with which all were so often confronted. His own work as registrar of the hospital was very successfully accomplished. Major Wood left his unit in the summer of 1918 for duty with the British Army in India."

Wood died on December 4, 1961, at Hawkmoor Chest Hospital, Bovey-Tracey, Devon.

On 30 November 1918 he was given a commission in the Royal Air Force but relinquished it on 17 May 1919. ### LIFE SAVING AWARDS

### 715 The R.N.L.I. Medal with Second Service clasp awarded to The Reverend Chancellor Owen Lloyd Williams, the "Lifeboat Parson" of North Wales.

ROYAL NATIONAL LIFEBOAT INSTITUTION, V.R., SILVER (The Revd. Owen Lloyd Williams. Voted 3rd Feby. 1870) with Second Service clasp (Voted 2nd January 1879) with uniface 'double dolphin' suspension, edge bruising. Sold with a quantity of copied research and copied photographs, also included several letters to a previous owner regarding the recipient and his family.

R.N.L.I. Medal: '14-15 January 1870: The Liverpool ship Kenilworth, homeward bound from New Orleans with a cargo of cotton, was caught in a severe squall during a north-west gale and grounded on St. Patrick's Causeway, Cardigan Bay, north-west of Barmouth, Merioneth. Eight men were saved by the Barmouth lifeboat before it was forced to leave by rising seas and by the gale that had increased to hurricane force. The Abersoch self-righting lifeboat Mabel Louisa had launched from her station on the Lleyn Peninsula, Caernavon, but was unable to find the casualty. Shortly after her return the Honorary Secretary arrived and with him on board, the lifeboat relaunched. After a three hour search in dreadful seas, they found the wreck and, going alongside, took off the 13 survivors in hazardous circumstances. The Reverend Lloyd Williams had been instrumental in saving 52 lives from various wrecks' (Ref. Lifeboat Gallantry, by Barry Cox). Second Service clasp: '10 October 1878: The Reverend Williams came of a family devoted in every way to lifeboat service and took an active part in their activities. Not for him the Honorary Secretary staying ashore directing operations - he preferred to be in the thick of things and this award was made in recognition of his long co-operation and intrepid services.

A gale was blowing when the Liverpool barque Dusty Miller, St. John's to Holyhead, with a cargo of timber, was seen in distress riding at anchor near St. Patrick's Causeway in Cardigan Bay, off Barmouth, Merioneth. The Barmouth lifeboat could not launch in the gale, so the Abersoch lifeboat Mable Louisa put off and, arriving at the scene, was asked to stay alongside until the weather moderated. Despite the gale and heavy sea, the lifeboat, with the Reverend Williams on board, remained on station until a steam tug arrived at 6 a.m. and took the barque into St. Tudwall's Roads off Abersoch' (Ref. Lifeboat

Chancellor Owen Lloyd Williams was born in 1828, the son of the Reverend James Williams and Mrs Frances Williams. Some years previous to his birth his parents had witnessed the sinking of the Alert with heavy loss of life and they had been moved to raise funds to provide for boats which could be used to save life. Owen Lloyd Williams followed his father into the Church and, unsurprisingly, given his parents great interest, followed them enthusiastically into all aspects of the R.N.L.I.

More at home at sea than in the pulpit, he is recorded as saying, 'I am happiest when I am rescuing people at sea'. As curate at Rhoscolyn, he went out to sea and saved 24 lives. He was in charge of the Cemlyn lifeboat when he was 20 and was later the Honorary Secretary of the Abersoch R.N.L.I. In 1858 he rescued 2 men from the Liverpool schooner Isabel when she ran aground on the North Bar, off Barmouth; in 1862 he is recorded as having saved 34 men and in 1870 he was instrumental in saving 13 from the stricken Kenilworth (see above) for which he was awarded the R.N.L.I. Silver Medal. In 1879 he received a clasp to his medal for his continued service and for standing by the Dusty Miller (see above)under hazardous circumstances. As Rector of Bodfaen on the Lleyn Peninsula he was coxswain of lifeboats on both sides of the peninsula.

Battling for most of his life against the sea, his last battle was against the hierarchy of the R.N.L.I. when they decided to withdraw the Cemlyn lifeboat. Williams, then Rector of Llanrhyddlad, near Cemlyn, regarded the lifeboat stationed there as the 'family lifeboat' and most necessary for safety of the coast. One story records him, a sprightly 85 year-old, traveling to London to the headquarters of the R.N.L.I. armed with a marlin spike to make his point to the powers that be. Roaring that only over his dead body would the Cemlyn boat be moved, his eloquence (and marlin spike) carried the day and it was agreed that the boat would remain until after his death. The promise was kept, the redoubtable Reverend died in 1918 aged 90 years, and in the following year the Cemlyn boat was withdrawn.

'18 March 1911: During a terrific south-easterly gale, the Montrose schooner Teaser was driven ashore near Ardmore Bay, Co. Waterford, Ireland, in a very heavy sea. The rocket apparatus was brought to the scene and lines were thrown over the vessel, but her crew, exhausted and cold, could not make use of them. Aware of this, Messrs. Barry and Neal tried to swim out, but were beaten back to the shore. Father O'Shea then obtained a boat in which he put out with others, including the two coastguardmen. They boarded the wreck, but two of her crew were already dead and the other succumbed shortly afterwards'. (Ref. Lifeboat Gallantry, by Barry Cox).

For their services, The Reverend John O'Shea, Parish Priest of Ardmore, was awarded the R.N.L.I. Medal in gold; Petty Officer Richard Barry and Leading Boatman Alexander Neal, H.M. Coastguard, Ardmore, were each awarded the R.N.L.I. Medal in silver.

Corporal C. A. W. Lowen, Princess Patricia's Light Infantry had previously been awarded the Military Medal for bravery in Italy (*London Gazette* 6 Feb 1945). The M.M. recommendation states:

"On the morning of 31 August 1944, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry attacked a section of the Gothic Line. The objective of C Company was road junction MR 016755. Number 13 Platoon was leading and H.16558 Corporal Charles Albert Willoby Loweb was in command of a section of his platoon.

A heavily sown minefield about six hundred yards in depth lay between the company and its objective. The ground was flat and completely bare except for a large patch of scrub two hundred yards from the right flank. At least three snipers were in this scrub ad were sniping at the company. The line of advance was covered by enemy artillery fire.

Number 13 platoon reached their objective, but three casualties from mines remained about one hundred yards in the rear. Corporal Lowen asked for and received permission to go back to the casualties and to clear a lane for stretcher bearers, and the remainder of the company who had provided covering fire for 13 platoon.

Throughout the time he was finding a route back, Corporal Lowen was sniped at and was under other enemy fire. He was wounded in the left hand and arm by an exploding mine. Not withstanding these difficulties, Corporal Lowen continued to clear a lane and finally reached the wounded men and the balance of the company.

The coolness and skill of Corporal Lowen, coupled with his complete disregard for his personal safety, enabled the remainder of the company to reach the objective without casualties and enabled the wounded men to be recovered. His conduct and devotion to duty were and inspiration to all who took part in the operation."

He joined the Coast Guard in September 1866, was stationed at Hector Station, and was pensioned on 28 September 1876.

He served in the Nile Expedition 1884-85 (Medal with clasp, and Khedive's Star); in the Soudan with the Frontier Force, 1885-86; and in the operations near Suakin in December 1888, including the engagement at Gemaizah (mentioned in despatches, London Gazette 11 January 1889, 3rd Class Medjidie, and clasp to Egyptian Medal). He was promoted to Surgeon Lieutenant-Colonel in March 1894, went on retired pay in September 1896, but was employed when on the Retired List at Golden Hill Fort, Isle of Wight, 1896-97, and at Cork, 1899-1902. He died at Kilkenny on 30 September 1902.

Captain Mona James Nathaniel McCreery, son of Nathaniel McCreery, embarked for service in France with the Royal Dublin Fusiliers, on 26 Jan 1915. He died of influenza on 21 October 1918 at the Military Hospital, Grimsby, whilst serving with the 3rd Battalion, Royal Dublin Fusiliers. George Hyatt was born on the island of Malta and enlisted for the 1/1st Regiment at Westminster on 17 December 1866, aged 14. He again transferred, in March 1881, as a Conductor of Supplies to the Commissariat and Transport Staff, and later the Army Service Corps, where he served until discharged with mania on 19 April 1892. His Meritorious Service Medal was announced in Army Order 127 of 1932.

In July 1881 the 60th King's Royal Rifles were retitled the King's Royal Rifle Corps. With the 3rd Battalion K.R.R.C. Burdall then served in Egypt, taking part in the battles of Kassassin, 9 September 1882, and Tel-el-Kebir, 13 September 1882. Major Reginald John Ponsonby Cox was born in Edinburgh on 2 April 1874, son of Major John Ponsonby Cox and educated at Moffat and Haileybury College. He was gazetted Second Lieutenant (from the Militia) into the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, 4 Dec 1895, and joined the regiment in India. Cox was promoted Lieutenant, 1 Dec 1897; Captain, 3 Jul 1901, and Major, August 1915. He took part in the operations on the North West Frontier of India, 1897-8, with the Tochi Field Force (Medal and clasp); was employed with the Egyptian Army, 29 Nov 1901 to 29 Jan 1908, and was Adjutant of the Territorial Force, 20 May 1909 to 26 Oct 1910. On the outbreak of the Great War he was sent to train the newly raised 10th Battalion, Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders at Aldershot, and in April 1915 was appointed Second in Command of the 8th Gordons and went with them to the front in early May. He was killed in action while leading a successful attack on a portion of "Dump Trench" during the advance to Loos on 27 Sept 1915. The Adjutant, Captain Maxwell wrote: "Colonel Wright put Major R. P. Cox in command of the battalion, 8th Gordons, which led the attack. Just as he was stepping into the trench, Major Cox was killed instantaneously," and Private James Ireland, in a letter stated: "On 27 Sept I saw Major Cox, when word came down the line for all to be over them. The Major, in a hail of lead ran forward shouting: "Come, Gordons, let them know what we are made of boys!, and away we went. The Major acted like a hero all through until he fell.'

Major Francis Taylor Duhan was born in Calcutta on 3 Jan 1873, fourth son of Harry Duhan of Douro Terrace, Jersey, and brother of Colonel W. W. T. Duhan, R.A. He was educated at Bedford Grammer School, of which he was head boy in 1892, and after passing through the R.M.C., Sandhurst, was gazetted to the Unattached list of the Indian Army in October, 1894. He carried out his training with the Hampshire regiment and joined the 24th Punjabis in Jan 1896, being afterwards transferred to the 19th Punjabis. He was promoted Lieutenant in January 1897 and in that and the following year saw active service on the North West Frontier of India, being present at the Relief of Malakand and Chakdara, the action at Landakai, operations in Bajaur, and in the Mamund county. Promoted Captain in Oct 1903, he saw service in Tibet and in 1908 was again on the North West Frontier, taking part in operations in the Mohmand Country, for which he received his Majority.

In early 1915 Major Duhan was attached to the 57th (Wilde's) Rifles (Frontier Force), then serving in France and Flanders. During the Second Battle of Ypres in April 1915, the Germans breached the allied line by the first use of poison gas in warfare, and the 57th were ordered up the the Ypres salient to plug the gap. On topping a small ridge some 700 yards from the German line they were met by a withering fire and Major Duhan, along with two other British officers, was killed instantly.

The battalion had gone into action with eight British officers, twelve Indian officers and 560 rank and file. It came out with three British and three Indian officers and 216 men. A photograph and obituary appear in *The Bond of Sacrifice*, Vol.II and also in Jersey College *Book of Remembrance*.

Alexander Murray MacGregor Bell was born in Weymouth on 4 September 1880, the second son of William Bell of Stirling, late Lieutenant-Colonel, 56th Regiment. Educated at Queen Elizabeth Grammar School, Kingston and Stirling High School, he was gazetted into the 3rd (Militia) Battalion Arayll & Sutherland Highlanders on 30 December 1901. With them he served in South Africa and was awarded the Queen's medal with two clasps. He was gazetted into the Royal Garrison Artillery in February 1903 and was transferred to the Dorset Regiment in May 1905. He was promoted to Lieutenant and transferred to the Royal Scots Fusiliers in January 1907 and advanced to Captain in May 1912. From May 1904 to May 1905 he was A.D.C. to the Governor of Natal and was Superintendent Gymnasia, Scottish Command, February 1913 until November 1914, when he rejoined his battalion in Flanders. He was appointed Adjutant in December 1914. Captain Bell was wounded at Ypres on 19 February 1918 and died of his wounds in London on 28 April 1918 and was buried in All Saints Cemetery, Kensall Green, London. He was mentioned in Field Marshal Sir John French's despatch of 31 May 1915.

The officer commanding his battalion, writing to his parents, said of him, 'The regiment was moving across some open ground under heavy shell fire, and your son and I were together at the moment we were both knocked over. He was hit on the back and right arm. I can only assure you that his gallantry and devotion to duty has been most marked'.

Frederick Wilmot Bennitt was educated at Pembroke College, Cambridge and gained a B.A. in 1895 and M.A. in 1899. He was ordained a Deacon in 1896 and a Priest in 1897 at Rochester, Kent. He was Curate of St. Margaret's, Plumstead, 1896-98 and then of Rugby, 1898-1901 and 1902-03. During the Boer War he served as an Acting Chaplain to the Forces, 1901-02. The Rev. Bennitt was then Curate of Hagbourne, 1903-05 and of Buxton, 1905-06. He then served as Rector of Bletchley, 1906-34 but served in the R.A.M.C. during 1918-19. Bennitt was appointed the Rural Dean of Bletchley, 1923-34, after which he was Vicar of East Peckham, 1934-42 and Curate of Sunninghill, 1943-45.

The R.101 was a British rigid airship completed in 1929 as part of the Imperial Airship Scheme. The airship crashed on 5 October 1930 in France on its maiden overseas flight. The R.101 departed its shed at Cardington, Bedfordshire, on 4 October, for a flight to Karachi, British India, with an intended fuel stop at Ismailia, Egypt. However, when travelling at a low altitude in poor weather over France the next day, the R.101 hit the ground near the Beauvais Ridge and burst into flames - 46 of the 54 passengers and crew were killed immediately and 2 others died later in hospital. The loss of 48 dead surpassed that of the Hindenburg disaster of 1937. The tragic loss of the R.101 effectively ended British involvement with rigid airships.

A special memorial to the dead of the R.101 was held by the Royal Antediluvian Order of Buffaloes in the airship's shed at Cardington on Sunday 16 November 1930. The memorial service, led by the Rev. Frederick Bennitt, was attended by some 7,000 R.A.O.B. members, in remembrance of the many victims of the disaster who were members of the Order.

Tilbrook was severely wounded at Paardeberg on 18 Feb and was subsequently recommended for the D.C.M. by Lieutenant Sinclair-Thomson, who was himself wounded at Paardeberg when rescuing a wounded NCO under fire - it is therefore almost certain that Tilbrook's D.C.M. recommendation relates to this incident.

In the event, he received no formal award but was selected to represent the 1st Battalion at Edward VII's Coronation in 1902 in company with other reservists who had distinguished themselves during the course of the South African Campaign. He is additionally entitled to a bronze 1902 Coronation Medal

During the Great War he saw home service with the Royal Defence Corps.

Arthur Patrick Bird Harrison was born on 16 January 1874, the only son of General Sir Richard Harrison, G.C.B., C.M.G. He was educated at Harrow and Trinity College, Cambridge and was commissioned into the 1st Battalion Rifle Brigade on 14 October 1896. He was promoted to Lieutenant on 20 February 1899 and to Captain on 5 November 1901, being posted to the 3rd Battalion. Harrison served in the Boer War with the 1st Battalion, taking part in the relief of Ladysmith, including the actions at Colenso and Vaal Kranz; then in operations in Northern Natal, including the action at Laing's Nek; and in operations in the Transvaal, east of Pretoria, July - November 1900. During the Great War he was employed as Lieutenant-Colonel on the Special List. He served as Military Attaché to the Serbian Army and was awarded the Order of the White Eagle 3rd Class (sic). In April 1916 his wife was awarded the Order of St. Sava.

Joseph Corban was born in the Parish of Church near Accrington, Lancashire. Of no occupation, he attested for service in the K.R.R.C. on 3 November 1893, aged 14 years, 10 months. He was posted as a Boy in the 3rd then 1st Battalion, and was appointed a Bugler, September 1896 until December 1897 and then a Bandsman, December 1897 until June 1898. With the 1st Battalion he served in India, 9 March 1894 until 17 January 1897.

Posted to Mauritius, he sailed on the Warren Hastings from Bombay, via the Seychelles to Cape Town. There, part of the 1st Battalion K.R.R.C. disembarked; remaining on the ship for the journey to Mauritius were the H.Q. and A., C. and G. Companies, Joseph Corban being amongst them. Leaving Cape Town on 6 January, the ship ran aground on 14 January on the French Island of Reunion. Such was the discipline of the K.R.R.C. and other troops aboard the stricken ship, that aside from two native crew members, all made it safely ashore. The officers and men received many commendations for their stalwart behaviour and the wreck of the Warren Hastings became a symbol of British steadiness and discipline in adversity.

Corban finally arrived at Mauritius on 18 January and remained there until 21 March 1899. He was then posted to South Africa, where he served until 21 September 1902 and was promoted to Lance-Corporal in February 1902. For his services in the Boer War he was awarded the Q.S.A. with clasps for Cape Colony, Talana, Defence of Ladysmith, Orange Free State, Laing's Nek and Belfast, and the K.S.A. with two clasps. He then served in Malta, 22 September 1902 until 26 February 1905 and Egypt, 27 February 1905 until 12 February 1909, being promoted to Lance-Serjeant in July 1906 and Serjeant in November 1907. He was awarded the Army L.S. & G.C. in 1912. Having returned to England, on 14 January 1913 he was appointed a Serjeant-Instructor in the Army Gymnastic Staff. With the onset of war he served with the B.E.F. in France, 12 August 1914 until 6 December 1916, being transferred to the Army Cyclist Corps in January 1915. With them he was appointed Regimental Sergeant-Major on 10 May 1916. In December 1916 Corban was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant in the York and Lancaster Regiment (London Gazette 12 January 1917) and was mentioned in General Sir Douglas Haig's despatches. Acting Lieutenant Corban, 10th (Service) Battalion, York and Lancaster Regiment, was killed in action, in Belgium on 17 July 1917. He was buried in the Pond Farm Military Cemetery, Wulverhem. Lieutenant Corban's next-of-kin was his sister, Miss Mary Corban of 28 Castle Street. Blackburn. Sold with a quantity of copied service papers, quite a number relating to the recipient's Will and effects. With other copied research. During the Great War he embarked for France in September 1915 and was killed in action on 25th of that month. An account by a Private James Harding of the Royal West Kent Regiment who last saw Captain Edwards states: "On Sept. 25th 1915 at Loos, the Royal West Kents made an attack; Captain Edwards was shot next to the informant, he fell down and was left behind after calling out to his men to get on. The informant was then shot in the leg and fell. The Royal West Kents had to retire and the Germans took Prisoner all those wounded men who could not walk. Captain Edwards did not seem

Edwards was 40 and is commemorated on the Loos Memorial.

He was killed in action during the allied assault on the Turkish Army which was falling back over the Diala River toward Kifri and along the Tigris River in Mesopotamia. He was promoted to Captain in January 1902, and served in East Africa in 1904, including the operations in Somaliland and the action at Jidballi (Two clasps).

Captain Bennitt was recalled from the Reserve of Officers and appointed to the 7th (Service) Battalion, Seaforth Highlanders, on 18 December 1914. He died of wounds in France on 7 October 1915, and is buried in Etaples Military Cemetery. He was aged 45 and was the son of Pynson and Mabel Bennitt, of Pomeroy Lodge, Totnes, Devon.

On 2 November 1914, the squadron was detached to reinforce the Channel Fleet and was rebased at Portland. It returned to the Grand Fleet on 13 November 1914. Hindustan served in the Grand Fleet until April 1916, Parham having been discharged to shore on 9 May 1915. On 20 Sept 1916 Parham was drafted to the newly built Renown and served aboard her until March 1920. He received the L.S. & G.C. Medal on 4 Jun 1915 and was invalided from the Navy, suffering from heart disease, on 6 Aug 1920.

He was awarded the Volunteer Force Long Service Medal, notified in I.A.O. 493 of May 1917. He was appointed a Substantive Lieutenant in the I.A.R.O. on 16 October 1916 and was attached to the Supply and Transport Corps. For most of the war he was employed as a Supply Officer at Umballa and the Simla Hills. During 1919 he was Brigade Supply Officer of the 58th Brigade Supply Section serving at Umballa, Kasauli and Kchat. Rivett was promoted Captain in the I.A.R.O. in October 1919 and was released from military service on 31 March 1920

Midshipman Archibald Douglas Moir was born on 19 Jul 1900, son of James Whitehead Moir (Solicitor), of Dunmar, Alloa, Clackmannanshire. He passed out of Dartmouth on 15 Jul 1916 and entered H.M.S. *Mary Rose*.

In early October 1917, the German high command decided to make a surprise attack on convoy traffic between the Shetlands and Norway, aiming to assist the U-boat campaign by forcing the British to divert forces to protect the Scandinavian traffic. They chose the fast minelaying cruisers *Brummer* and *Bremse*. The Admiralty learned through wireless intercepts that these ships were out, but as they thought of these ships as minelayers they did not think they would venture far to the north to attack the convoy.

On the morning of 17 October 1917 the German ships intercepted a westbound convoy 65 miles east of Lerwick, consisting of twelve merchantmen (two British, one Belgian, nine neutral Scandinavians) escorted by destroyers Mary Rose and Strongbow and two armed trawlers. Strongbow was just astern of the convoy, while Mary Rose was six to eight miles ahead of it. Strongbow sighted the German cruisers in poor visibility at no more than 4,000 yards, and took them for British light cruisers, which they had evidently been rigged to resemble. She challenged several times before going to action stations. By this time Brummer had closed to within 3,000 yards and opened a devastating fire, immediately knocking out Strongbow's main steam pipe and wireless; just before this the destroyer had been attempting to transmit a warning, but the German cruisers jammed the signal, as they did all similar efforts by the Allied ships.

The cruisers then turned to the merchantmen and quickly sank nine of them. British historians severely criticized the Germans for sinking the merchantmen without giving the crews time to escape. (The German official history notes the need to prevent the Allied ships from transmitting wireless warnings; while the mention is apparently not made in this context, this might account for the actions of the two cruisers. British historians also claim that the Germans later fired on the survivors of the destroyers in the water. The Germans deny this.) Mary Rose heard the firing astern and closed and fought the Germans. She was rapidly sunk, and Strongbow was finished off. Later official inquiries praised the courage of the two destroyers but criticized them for rashness in closing the enemy, contending that they should have stood off and transmitted warning signals.

George Reginald Pike from Davenport, Devon, joined the Navy on 11 Jul 1899, aged 15. On the outbreak of the Great War, Pike was drafted to H.M.S. *Highflyer* which in the year before the start of the war had been serving as the training ship for Special Entry Cadets, but in August 1914 she was allocated to the 9th Cruiser Squadron, under Admiral John de Robeck, on the Finisterre station. She left Plymouth on 4 August, in the company of the admiral on HMS *Vindictive*. They then captured the liner *Tubantia*, which was carrying German reservists and gold. *Highflyer* escorted her to Britain, before returning to her station

She was then transferred to the Cape Verde station, to support Admiral Stoddart's 5th Cruiser Squadron in the hunt for the German commerce raider Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse. She had been sighted at Rio de Oro, a Spanish anchorage on the Saharan coast. At the Battle of Rio de Oro, on 26 August Highflyer found the German ship taking on coal from three colliers. The Highflyer demanded that she surrender. The captain of the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse claimed the protection of neutral waters, but as he was breaking that neutrality himself by taking on coal and supplies for more than a week, his claim was denied. Fighting broke out at 3.10pm, and lasted until 4.45pm, when the crew of the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse abandoned ship and escaped to the shore. The Kaiser Wilhelm de Grosse was sunk, the Highflyer losing one man killed, and six injured in the engagement.

On 15 October *Highflyer* briefly became the flagship of the Cape Verde station, when Admiral Stoddart was ordered to Pernambuco. Later in the same month she was ordered to accompany the transport ships carrying the Cape garrison back to Britain. Towards the end of the month she was ordered to search the Atlantic coast of North Africa for the cruiser SMS *Karlsruhe*.

After the Battle of Coronel *Highflyer* came back under the control of Admiral de Robeck, as part of a squadron formed to guard West Africa against Admiral Maximilian von Spee. This squadron, consisting of HMS *Warrior*, HMS *Black Prince*, HMS *Donegal* and *Highflyer* was in place off Sierra Leone from 12 November, but was soon dispersed after the battle of the Falklands. *Highflyer* then took part in the search for the commerce raider *Kronprinz Wilhelm*, coming close to catching her in January 1915. She remained on the West Africa station until 1917, making up part of the Cape Verde division. Pike left *Highflyer* on 21 Apr 1917 and served at Davenport until his demobilisation on 26 Feb 1919.

Having then qualified as a Regimental Signaller, he served three tours in Northern Ireland (December 1973 to February 1974, February to April 1976 and November 1980 to March 1981), following which he passed the basic course for Observation Post Assistant, a timely qualification in light of looming events in the South Atlantic.

In May 1982, as one of 16 members of 132 (Bengal Rocket Troop) Battery, R.A., under Major Mike Fallon, he was selected for service in a Forward Observation role, in support of 1/7 Gurkha Rifles. Among the first elements of 5 Infantry Brigade to be disembarked, Neil and his fellow gunners advanced to Bluff Cove via Goose Green, and provided valuable support in the attacks on Mounts Tumbledown and Harriet, as well as controlling naval gunfire and Harrier air strikes. In the course of the Tumbledown operation, the Gunners and Gurkhas walked into an enemy fire zone, two Bombardiers being wounded by shrapnel and an officer being shot by a sniper - the unit's history crediting Neil with working alongside his Battery C.O. to establish the true direction of the enemy's artillery fire and, thereafter, moving forward to join Captain G. M. Pugh, to replace one of the wounded Bombardiers: it was clearly a nasty moment, two "blind" rounds coming within 20 metres of the Gurkhas' C.O. and the Battery Commander's group.

Wilfred Nunn entered the Royal Navy as a cadet on 15 Jul1887; advanced Midshipman on 15 Feb 1890; Sub-Lieutenant, 14 Nov 1893; Lieutenant, 01 Apr 1896; Commander, 31 Dec 1907; Captain 31 Dec1914; Rear-Admiral 12 Aug 1925; and Vice-Admiral 8 May 1930 on retired list. He served with great distinction in Mesototamia during the Great War. A fellow Officer described Nunn as " ... one of the very best, and a born leader."

Originally published in 1932 and written by Vice Admiral Nunn, formerly commander of the British naval forces, *Tigris Gunboats* is a gripping account of the three -year British expedition in Iraq. (Aside, the vice-admiral stated that, "To be in the East at that time was a great disappointment to all in the Force. Most of the soldiers were wishing themselves in France, while our hope had been in common with that of every one else in the navy, to be present in the North Sea...."). Launched as an attempt by the Indian army to secure Western oil supplies, the British campaign yielded startling successes followed by now-familiar challenges, including intertribal rivalry.

"The Espiègle (Nunn aboard) was instructed to protect British interests up—river; the Odin to await the expedition off the mouth and to accompany it, dealing with the Turkish battery near Foa, a few miles off, which commanded the entrance." Having established themselves at Basra, Kurn—a town forty—fives miles father up river (at the principal situation where the Tigris and Euphrates combine to form the Shatt al Arab) was next and then onto Amara, Kut and finally Baghdad. Along the arduous journey are the usual hot—beds of action in Nasiriya and Feluja [sic]. Most interesting however is the role played by the Sheikh of Mahommerah (a more than welcome ally).

Charles Beresford Maule Harris was born on 13 Jan 1866 and qualified at the Royal Veterinary College, London before beoing commissioned into the Army Veterinary Department on 27 Aug 1890. Haris served on the North-West Frontier in 1897 and in South Africa throughout the Boer War. He was later appointed Inspecting Veterinary Officer in Somaliland, for which service he was mentioned in despatches and appointed to the Distinguished Service Order (London Gazette 2 Sept 1904). Having been romoted Captain, 27 Aug 1900, Harris was advanced Major on

Having been romoted Captain, 27 Aug 1900, Harris was advanced Major on 27 Aug 1905 and retired on 8 May 1912. Recalled for the Great War, he as appointed Lieutenant-Colonel in the Reserve of Officers on 13 Dec 1915, serving on the Staff of the 48th Division in France. Mentioned in despatches twice, he left the Active List in December 1922 and was later living in Leamington Spa, where he died in late 1928.

Allan Henry Shafto Adair was born on 3 November 1897, the only son of Sir R. Shafto Adair, 5th Baronet. Educated at Harrow, he served in the Grenadier Guards from 1916 to 1941. In the Great War he was awarded the M.C. in 1918 and Bar to the M.C. in 1919. In the Second World war he commanded the 3rd Battalion Grenadier Guards during 1940 and was awarded the D.S.O. He was placed in charge of the 30th Guards Brigade in 1941 and the 6th Guards Brigade during the following year. During 1942-45 he was Commander of the Guards Armoured Division. He was awarded the C.B. in 1945 and placed on Retired Pay in 1947. He was Lieutenant of H.M. Bodyguard of the Yeoman of the Guard, 1951-67. Created a C.V.O. in 1957, he was appointed Colonel of the Grenadier Guards for the period 1961-74, during which time he was created K.C.V.O. in 1967 and G.C.V.O. in 1974. Succeeding his father as Baronet in 1949, he was at times D.L. for Co. Antrim, J.P. for Suffolk, Governor of Harrow School, 1947-52 and Deputy Grand Master of the United Grand Lodge of Freemasons, 1969-76. Major-General Adair died on 4 August 1988.

Gerard van Rossum Reyne was born on 29 March 1886, son of Major J. F. Reyne, late 37th Foot. He was educated at Wellington and Sandhurst, and appointed 2nd Lieutenant, attached 2nd Cheshire Regiment, on 5 August 1905. He was posted to the 76th Punjabis on 7 December 1906.

Reyne served during the Great War in Mesopotamia from November 1914 until the fall of Kut in April 1916. As part of the Suez Canal defence force he was present at the repulse of Djemal Pasha's determined attack on the canal on 3 February 1915. The subsequent pursuit of the Turkish forces saw Reyne in all the ensuing operations of the 76th Punjabis on the Euphrates. He was awarded the Distinguished Service Order for his part in the battle of Ctesiphon in November 1915 and was with General Townshend's force besieged at Kut, during which he was wounded. He was taken prisoner of war by the Turks at the fall of Kut on 29 April 1916 and remained in Turkish captivity until December 1918. Appointed M.V.O. in August 1919 for services as the British Officer in charge of the King's Indian Orderley Officers, Reyne went to Waziristan at the end of that year to participate in the operations against the unruly Mahsud tribes. He was promoted to Major in August 1920, to Lieutenant-Colonel in 1930 and retired in 1933.
