Message from the Head



Dear Parents, Students and Friends

Welcome to the edition of @shmole that launches our 50th birthday activities.

It was in the summer of 1958 when boys attending a small secondary modern school in Russell Lane went to school one morning to be told, literally, to pick up their chairs and walk with their teachers to the new school called Ashmole in Cecil Road. The official opening for Ashmole came some months later and in 1971 girls from Southaw School, also in Russell Lane, joined Ashmole.

Since then the school has changed so much but the interest, spirit and character of Ashmole students has continued through the decades. It was when we were preparing for our first 50th birthday reunion that we discovered some memorabilia that gave us the history of the Ashmole crest. The school took its name from Elias Ashmole (1617-1692), Windsor Herald and eminent antiquarian, and founder of the Ashmolean Museum in Oxford. Elias Ashmole resided in the area for a short period and the school crest, designed by Mr D Abbott of New Barnet, is based on Ashmole's coat of arms.

In 1660 Elias Ashmole was appointed as Windsor Herald by Charles II. The Caducean rod on the school crest refers to his Heraldic Office. The Fleur-de-lys, besides being in the first quarter of Elias Ashmole's arms, is the symbol of St Mary to whom the ancient church at East Barnet is dedicated.



into the future and then it went into retelling the whole story. My favourite character was Mickey and when he went crazy I cried."



Biology Trip to Juniper Hall









For our biology coursework we went to Juniper Hall in Dorking for 5 days to learn about ecology and the environment and then conducted our coursework on the fourth day there.


Jack Petchey Achievement Awards
