Whitehills Gaelic Medium Class

The Angus Gaelic medium class was opened at Kirkriggs Primary School, Forfar in August 1995 and was re-sited to Whitehills Primary School in August 2007.

Although it occupies its own classroom it is very much part of the whole school community. The children join the rest of the school for assemblies, school trips, specialist teaching, playtimes, and general activities.

Parents are strongly involved in the work of the class and the wider school, and there is close collaboration with the Gaelic teacher.

At present, one child comes from a Gaelic speaking bilingual family.



What is Gaelic Medium Education?

Gaelic Medium Education has expanded rapidly and successfully over recent years across Scotland. The aim of Gaelic Medium Education is to achieve competency in both Gaelic and English. Children are taught the curriculum in Gaelic, followed by the gradual use of English. By the end of primary seven children educated in Gaelic Medium Units will have completed the curriculum and also be fluent in Gaelic. Primaries one to three are the 'total immersion' stages in which all teaching is done through Gaelic language. In the last term of

Primary three, English reading and writing are gradually introduced.

What are the benefits?

Research has found that there are a range of benefits to children from learning Gaelic through the total immersion approach. They have deeper understanding of language from an early age and their ability to learn other languages is enhanced. They are also more confident in tackling new languages at a later stage. Children educated in Gaelic Medium classes grow up with a deep knowledge of and respect for the culture of Gaelic-speaking Scotland. The Gaelic experience will promote a wider and forward looking approach to the opportunities in multi-lingual Europe in which Gaelic sits happily beside other European languages.
