

Debate on teen shelters plan

PLANS TO install teen shelters on recreation areas in Loughton have raised great interest among local residents. We hope to address some of those issues in this article.

The project is to be funded by a £13,500 grant from Epping Forest District Council to enhance youth outdoor facilities in partnership with local councils.

The installation of teen shelters is seen nationally as an effective way of combating anti-social behaviour and neighbourhood nuisance. They give young people a special place of their own to go, rather than hanging out in public places, such as a local bus stop, car park, station or shop doorway.

Young people attracted to the shelters often come from the 'hard to reach' groups uninterested in more formal activities, such as organised clubs and sports. The shelters are designed to withstand the rigours of teenage users.

Of course, the shelters are not restricted to young people. They are available to everyone and offer a pleasant place to sit and rest or shelter from a sudden shower.

The Town Council is now consulting on a choice of locations that will both avoid direct nuisance to local residents and allow safe observation from a distance.

A shelter is planned for the Roding Valley Recreation Ground, either between the tennis courts and the children's play area or at the Highwood Lane end away from the estate. Another is planned next to farming land on the Willingale Road playing field, away from the school grounds and houses.

Residents living near the proposed teen shelters are understandably likely to be sceptical about the potential benefits. However, in similar projects across the country, shelters have successfully cut nuisance and improved investment in the local area, with regular litter picking, increased police presence and the involvement of agencies such as youth services.

The Town Council will be liaising with relevant local groups, including Essex Police, the Crime & Disorder Partnership and Essex Youth Services to ensure the project's success.

saga of delays in getting the accounts audited. The auditors are appointed by the Audit Commission, so the council has no say in the matter. It seems unlikely the 2004/05 accounts will be audited in the near future, so they will be published in accordance with the deadline set by statute, but without an audit opinion.

New drive on youth crime

OVER THE last year, there has been growing concern about the level of youth nuisance across Loughton. Youth nuisance forms the majority of anti-social behaviour and related crime in the town.

The Broadway, Loughton High Road, Oakwood Hill and Limes Avenue have all been identified as hot-spot areas.

Our intention is to cut youth nuisance through a focused tactical approach, by reducing associated crime and providing public reassurance.

In 2003, we successfully introduced Operation Girton, which was designed to deal with exactly this problem. We will follow the Operation Girton guidelines so that, for example, if an individual is spoken to more than three times, a letter will be sent to his or her parents.

This brings the parents' attention to their child's behaviour and invites them to address the issues raised. They also receive a home visit with a view to signing up to an acceptable behaviour contract.

If the behaviour continues after this intervention, the police and local authority would seek an anti-social behaviour order.

known as an ASBO, through the courts

We also aim to use other measures incorporating positive action in dealing with offences. This will include the confiscation of alcohol from under-age drinkers and the use of our powers under section 30 of the Anti-Social Behaviour Act 2003 on the dispersal of groups.

We plan to apply for an order covering The Broadway, Old Station Road, Station Road, Sainsbury's car park and the High Road, and Debden and Loughton stations in association with British Transport Police.

We are using a new power under Section 59 of the Police Reform Act 2002, which allows us to deal with the seizure of motor vehicles being used in anti-social ways and those being driven or ridden in a careless or dangerous manner. Any offences related to the above measures will involve the use of our Restorative Justice Scheme to deal with offenders.

This operation is to last for six months, starting from November.

Jazz it up with a trip to the library

DID YOU KNOW that Loughton Library, in Traps Hill, houses the National Jazz Archive on the first floor? And that Essex County Council has been its principal supporter since the archive was launched in 1988?

Founded by the distinguished jazz trumpeter Digby Fairweather, it has grown dramatically and, today, there are some 2,500 books and 25,000 magazines covering around 250 titles, as well as programmes, photographs and general information on jazz.

Magazines include copies of *Melody Maker* from 1926 to 1981, and the archive also holds the Charles Fox collection of memorabilia and the Chris Hayes collection which is mainly cuttings and correspondence accumulated from his 50 years as a writer for Melody Maker

The archive is used by researchers, authors, journalists, students, members of the public who just want to come in and browse – in fact, anyone who is interested in jazz.

It is free to use the archive and, for a reasonable fee, the staff can even

conduct some research for you on request.

The archive is open between 10am and 1pm on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday but the archivist, David Nathan can organise designated material to be taken into the main library area when the archive closes especially to allow anyone who has travelled a long way to be able to stay until the library closes. Rugby club celebrates 50 years of scrumming

LOUGHTON RUGBY Football Club, which has been based off Hornbeam Road, Buckhurst Hill, since 1970, reaches its 50 year milestone this season. Originally, Loughton Old Boys RFC was started by staff and mainly ex-pupils of Brook Secondary School in Roding Road – alas the school is no more.

The club was initially an offshoot of the Youth Centre based in the school and owed much to the enthusiasm of two members of staff at the time – Gordon (Steve) Stephens and Vivian Gwynne – who gave great encouragement to the mostly 16 to 17 year olds who initially made up the side, some of whom had played for their county at schoolboy level.

The first club match was played against a Chingford RFC XV on Saturday 24th September 1955, which was lost 19 to 11 and set the trend for several years. Steady progress was made over the years and gradually as the players gained maturity, matters improved.

In 1969 Loughton RFC was amalgamated with the Riverdale Cricket Club and we obtained the use of the ground in Hornbeam Road, on a long lease from the then Chigwell UDC. This move allowed the club to expand its playing and social activities considerably, due to the building of a Clubhouse with bar.

Eventually, this led to the club's most successful period. In 1980, we went



on our first foreign tour to Holland. As the side grew in stature, we made the Final 16 – for two years running – in the Pilkington Shield, which was a nationwide competition for junior clubs.

Several players continued at representative level for County, Eastern Counties and three players even made it to the England National Association of Boys Clubs side, with David Lodge captaining the side in his final year.

It has been a constant source of surprise, and pride, to three founder members (who until quite recently were still actively involved) that after 50 years the club is still going strong.

The founding members are Malcolm Wallace, who was club president for many years and is again 50th

Cedric Salter, who became a
regional Assessor for the London
Society of Rugby Referees.


Hospice shop opens on The Broadway

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

Council honours past masters

MORE THAN 50 members of the Willingale family and their friends were joined by Loughton Town Mayor Cllr Mike Wardle and Cllr Chris Pond to unveil a heritage plaque at St John's churchyard to commemorate Thomas Willingale (1799-1870).

As mentioned in the spring Think Loughton, Thomas Willingale was one of the prime movers in the fight to save Epping Forest. Chris Pond, of Loughton Historical Society, gave a short talk on the historical significance of Thomas Willingale to Loughton and the forest.

Mike Wardle defined the plaque's location given that Willingale is buried in St John's churchyard, Church Lane, and Ken Hoy, Friends of Epping Forest, outlined the current position regarding the forest.

The plaque was unveiled by Danielle Willingale, who was the youngest

member of the Willingale family

The event was organised by Keith Willingale, a west country vintner, who is Chairman of the Willingale Family Society.

Mr Willingale had produced a special limited edition of his own prize winning wine for the occasion which he named 'Epping Lopper'.

Former Chairman Chigwell Urban District Council and Epping Forest District Council Ian Beattie, made an impassioned appeal for us all to be very vigilant to preserve the forest and its 'buffer land' in the face of any proposed building in the south east of England.

LOUGHTON TOWN COUNCIL has recently erected three blue heritage plaques to commemorate the following people on the properties listed below: **ARCHITECT** James Cubitt (1836-1912)



has been honoured with a plaque at 311 High Road, the former site of Monghyr Cottage, 2 Traps Hill.

James Cubitt was renowned for his chapel designs. His best known buildings were Emanuel Church in Cambridge, Union Chapel, Islington, and the Welsh Church in Charing Cross Road.

In Loughton, he designed Southbank, Sunnybank, additions to Ash Green for W C Waller, as well as Staples Road schools and Loughton School (now demolished). He was an associate and relative of the Vivians (Loughton Union Church pastor), and he had a wide nonconformist clientele.

James Cubitt lived at Brook Villas and Cotsall Eaton Villas, all in the High Road, now demolished, and Monghyr Cottage, 2 Traps Hill, where he died. Born in Suffolk, he was a long-term Loughton resident circa 1880 to 1912.

He was buried in an unmarked grave in Loughton Cemetery.

The Town Council has also unveiled a plaque in honour of medical psychologist Millais Culpin (1874-1952) at Meads, 77 Church Hill.

Millais Culpin was a medical doctor, who became a psychiatrist. He lived at Slyder's Gate, Church Hill (owned by the Wallers), just after his marriage in 1913, and then bought Meads, 77 Church Hill.

Culpin was attached to the London Hospital. He was an associate of Loughton residents Major Greenwood and Sir Leonard and Austin Bradford

Culpin was a leading psychiatrist, and an early proponent of occupational health and well-being. His study of telegraphists' cramp in 1927 foreshadowed modern research on repetitive strain injury.

THE LIFE AND WORK OF

palaeontologist and geologist Samuel Hazzledine Warren (1873-1958) has been commemorated with a plaque at 49 Forest View Road.

> He was an antiquary and archaeologist, a "prehistorian of international repute"

(The Times). He lived at Sherwood, 49 Forest View Road, an arts and

crafts/vernacular style house built in about 1905.

After his wife's death in 1937, he had a smaller house built in the garden. Sherwood was

effectively operated as a geological museum open to students from all over the world.

AGE CONCERN Essex Home

Workers go to the same clients each week, which enables both to get to know each other.

Clients look forward to their worker coming, and there is no doubt that the service helps them to remain independent, maintain a pride in their home, prevent falls and combat isolation.

one-third of their clients, either by regular amounts or one-off payments, and this money is often spent locally.

"If I hadn't got help from Loughton CAB, I would not have found out that I could claim benefits and ask for them to be backdated," said one of our clients. "The extra money we got made such a difference to my family - I could afford to buy some fresh food instead of tins and packets," said another.

Loughton CAB is an independent registered charity reliant on grants and donations as well as the dedication and commitment of all our volunteers.

It has been estimated that the total value of time provided by CAB volunteers is worth around £70m each year, with more than 3,000 new volunteers being trained, which increases their employability and develops their skills, with some going on to find paid work.

Many people who have never even come to see us here at St Mary's Parish Centre are helped, because we can spot trends in problems and campaign to bring about changes.

Due to a successful CAB campaign. evidence presented to the government resulted in an amendment to the Housing Act 2004.

This will help stop landlords who unfairly refuse to return deposit monies to tenants, which is estimated to affect as many as 1.5m people each year. If you have a problem which you think might be shared by others, please let us know so that we can work together to make things better.

Loughton CAB Manager Sue Britton said: "If we are to carry on making a difference for people in our local communities, we need your support.

"We continue to struggle to maintain adequate funding levels, not only for our core activities and costs, but also towards development of new projects, enhanced outreach services and home visits to the elderly and disabled.
