New York, NY, (January 14, 2009) — For the second year in a row, the top prize in the oldest Jewish literary award in the nation goes to a book about the Good Book. Last year, James Kugel won that honor with his book, *How to Read the Bible.* Dr. Tamara Cohn Eskenazi and Rabbi Andrea L. Weiss are the winners of the Everett Family Foundation Jewish Book of the Year Award with their pioneering work, *The Torah: A Women's Commentary* (URJ Press and Women of Reform Judaism).

With distinguished winners in sixteen categories, the **58**th **Annual National Jewish Book Awards, to be held on March 5**th **at the Center for Jewish History in New York City**, honors a diverse roster of authors and subjects.

Winners include rabbis and a priest. The current war in Gaza is contextualized with the help of a groundbreaking work on the history of the first Arab-Israeli War. A book that explores the Jewish history of Greece wins the top award in Sephardic Culture. The Torah is also the subject of the winning entry in the field of Jewish Family Literature.

This year's top honorees include **Julian Levinson**, author of **Exiles on Main Street: Jewish American Writers and American Literary Culture** (Indiana University Press), winner of the American Jewish Studies: Celebrate 350 Award; **Benny Morris**, winner of the Gerrard and Ella Berman Memorial Award in History for **1948: A History of the First Arab-Israeli War** (Yale University Press); **David Patterson**, author of **Emil L. Fackenheim: A Jewish Philosopher's Response to the Holocaust** (Syracuse University Press), winner of the Modern Jewish Thought and Experience prize; and **The**

Holocaust by Bullets: A Priest's Journey to Uncover the Truth Behind the Murder of 1.5 Million Jews (Palgrave Macmillan) by Father Patrick Desbois, winner of the award in Holocaust Studies.

The field of Jewish education is enhanced by the winning entry in that category, the exhaustive *What We Now Know About Jewish Education:**Perspectives on Research for Practice* (Torah Aura Productions), edited by Roberta Louis Goodman, Paul A. Flexner and Linda Dale Bloomberg. The esteemed Nahum M. Sarna Memorial Award in Scholarship goes to *The Kuzari* and the Shaping of Jewish Identity, 1167-1900* (Cambridge University Press) by Adam Shear. *Greece: A Jewish History* (Princeton University Press) by K.E. Fleming is the winner in the Sephardic Culture category. And rounding out the feminist flavor of this year's winning works, *A Jewish* Woman's Prayer Book*, edited by Aliza Lavie* (Spiegel & Grau) takes this year's Barbara Dobkin Award in Women's Studies.

The winners of the 2008 National Jewish Book Awards will be honored on March 5th, 2009 at a gala award ceremony to be held at the Center for Jewish History in Manhattan, located at 15 West 16th Street. The awards ceremony, which begins at 7:30 p.m., is free and open to the public.
