## A Remarkable Journey

#### In the Beginning...

Although it's an American creation, basketball was introduced to Virginia by a Welsh immigrant—Henry H. "Pop" Lannigan. The "veteran trainer," who coached or trained most of UVa's athletic teams for a quarter of a century, organized the first basketball team in the fall of 1905. The first game, against the Charlottesville YMCA, was played on January 18, 1906, at the Monticello Guard Armory. Virginia, as it would often do under Lannigan's tutelage, prevailed, 30-9. In 24 years at the helm, Lannigan's program enjoyed its finest moment in 1915 when the "Famous Five" of Wellington Stickley, Bill Nickels, Jr., John Luck, Bill Strickling and Andrew Dittrich vanquished all comers on the way to a perfect 17-0 record. Only North Carolina (30-29) and Catholic University (29-28) came close.

Most of the Lannigan-era triumphs were achieved in Fayerweather Gymnasium, a small facility built in 1893. Fayerweather Gym, which featured the University's first bathtubs, was replaced in 1924 by \$300,000 Memorial Gymnasium. "Mem Gym" served as Virginia's basketball home for 42 winters.

For exactly half of the 42 Memorial Gym years, Virginia basketball was under the guidance of Gus Tebell. Lannigan, who died on Christmas Eve of 1930, had been replaced by UVa assistant football coach Roy Randall in the fall of 1929. Randall's first and only team went 3-12, prompting a search for a more experienced basketball mentor. Tebell, who had guided North Carolina State to a 75-35 record in six seasons in Raleigh, N.C., was lured to Charlottesville.

A colorful character who served as mayor of Charlottesville from 1948-50, Tebell employed the "Meanwell System," an innovative pattern offense which he had learned as a student-athlete under Dr. Walter Meanwell at the University of Wisconsin. The "Meanwell System" proved successful enough for Virginia to post a 240-190 record during Tebell's 21 seasons.

The '41 Cavaliers earned Virginia's first postseason invitation. The only school from the South selected to participate in the eight-team National Invitation Tournament in New York City, Virginia lost in the first round to City College of New York.

In the summer of 1951, UVa athletic director Norton Pritchett died and Tebell was named to replace him. Tebell relinquished his basketball coaching duties to one of his former players, Evan J. "Bus" Male.

As athletic director, Tebell's greatest achievement came late in 1953 when, despite the opposition of UVa president Colgate Darden, he persuaded the Board of Visitors to accept an invitation to join the Atlantic Coast Conference.

#### "Buzzy" Steals the Show

UVa basketball in the 1950s can be summed up with one word—Buzzy. Richard Warren "Buzzy" Wilkinson, a quick, 6-2 guard-forward with a repertoire of shots, set school and ACC scoring records in 1953-55 that have withstood the test of time. He averaged 22.7, 30.1 and 32.1 points per game in his three varsity campaigns, becoming the first collegian to average 30 points a game in back-to-back seasons. He totaled 2,233 points for his career.

## Gibson and Parkhill Make a Difference


Apart from Wilkinson, Cavalier basketball fans didn't have much to cheer about in the '50s and '60s. Male had resigned following the 1956-57 season, with Billy McCann taking over. McCann was replaced by Bill Gibson for the 1963-64 campaign. A fiercely determined man, Gibson slowly brought Virginia basketball out of its coma.

University Hall opened in December 1965, a giant step in the right direction. Gibson procured a second full-time assistant in 1968 and recruited UVa's first black scholarship player (Al Drummond) in 1970.

The '69-'70 Cavaliers weren't very talented, but they played so hard and with such resolve that they earned the respect of Virginia fans. The final record of 10-15 was better than many had predicted but more importantly UVa created some waves in the ACC Tournament. With Tim Rash scoring 25 points and Chip Case and Bill Gerry each adding 21, the Cavs upset Charlie Scott-led North Carolina, 95-93, in the first round.

The following night, Virginia just missed advancing to the championship game, losing to N.C. State, 67-66, in the semifinals. The '69-70 season served as a genesis. With Gerry returning for his senior season along with the dedicated junior class of Rash, Scott McCandlish, Frank DeWitt and Chip Miller, and the addition of stylish sophomore guard Barry Parkhill, the "Amazin' Cavaliers" were born in 1970-71.

Virginia opened the '70-71 season with six straight victories, its best start in over 30

years. With four wins in eight days in mid-January, the record went to 11-2 and the Cavs cracked the Top 20 (No. 19 AP) for the first time ever.

The media dubbed Gibson's eighth team the "Amazin' Cavaliers." U-Hall attendance nearly doubled, from an average of 4,000 a game the year before to 7,500. Although the Cavs ran out of gas down the stretch, they finished 15-11, the first winning season in 17 years at Virginia.

The 1971-72 Cavaliers went beyond "Amazin." Parkhill and company won their first 12 starts and stood at 18-1 in mid-February, good enough to garner the No. 6 spot in The Associated Press' Top 10. Virginia won at Duke for the first time in 32 years, embarrassed No. 5 Maryland 78-57 in U-Hall, and joined the 20-win club for the first time in 44 seasons. The Cavs, who lost to Lafayette in the first round of the NIT, finished 21-7.

The charismatic and unflappable Parkhill enjoyed one of the finest individual seasons ever by an ACC player. He led the conference in scoring (21.6), was the only unanimous choice on the All-ACC team and outpolled UNC's Dennis Wuycik, 80-12, in ACC Player of the Year balloting. He was named to a number of All-America teams and finished

third in AP balloting for National Player of the Year.


Parkhill led Virginia to a third-straight winning season in 1972-73, marking the first time since 1943-45 that had been achieved. Parkhill's No. 40 became the second UVa jersey to be retired, joining Wilkinson's No. 14 in the trophy case.

## Holland-Led Cavaliers put UVa on the Map

The winning continued in 1975-76 under second-year head coach Terry Holland. Seeded sixth for the ACC Tournament in Landover, Md. (Capital Centre), Virginia pulled the execution switch three straight times, knocking off No. 17 NC State (75-63), No. 9 Maryland (73-65) and No. 4 North Carolina (67-62) to capture the tourney championship. Wally Walker, whose quick release and velvety touch enabled him to average 22.1 points a game in his final season, earned the Everett Case Award as the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

After the "Miracle in Landover," Virginia fell to 12-17 in 1976-77. But the following year, with the addition of a pair of Kentucky schoolboys, Jeff Lamp and Lee Raker, Virginia basketball underwent a metamorphosis. In four years, the two Ballard High School teammates combined to play over 7,300 minutes in Virginia uniforms, scoring over 3,700 points.

The Cavaliers won 92 games while losing

only 33 during the Lamp-Raker regime and participated in postseason play all four years. Lamp, one of those rare players who wanted the ball in critical situations, scored 24 points in his very first collegiate game and went on to record 2,317 career points, eclipsing Wilkinson's record. His No. 3 jersey was retired moments after his final U-Hall appearance in 1980-81. Raker, a tenacious player who television commentator Bones McKinney dubbed "The Marine," earned Top-10 status on Virginia's career scoring ladder at the time of his graduation with 1,423 points.

As freshmen, Lamp and Raker, along with senior Marc Iavaroni, led Virginia to a 20-8 season. The Cavaliers climbed as high as No. 11 in the AP poll, ending the season with a tough 70-68 loss to Georgetown in the first round of the NIT.

In 1978-79, Virginia finished 19-10 and earned third place in the ACC. Lamp led the conference in scoring, his 22.9 points per game average the best by a Cavalier since Bob McCarty tallied 23.1 an outing in 1955-56. An eight-footer by Lamp with six seconds to play gave Virginia its first-ever postseason triumph, a 79-78 win over Northeast Louisiana in the opening round of the NIT.

#### **The Sampson Years**

A household name before he played a single minute of college basketball, Ralph Sampson ended an intense recruiting war and announced he would play for Virginia on May 31, 1979. The 7-4 freshman was a catalyst for reinless expectations. Virginia was tabbed No. 9 and No. 13 in the two 1979-80 preseason wire service polls.

The blending process was a bit uneven, but following a roller-coaster regular season, the Cavaliers proceeded to best Lafayette, Boston College, Michigan, Nevada-Las Vegas and Minnesota to win the NIT championship. Sampson became the first freshman to be named MVP of the NIT as Virginia finished with a school-record 24 victories.

That record didn't last long. The 1980-81 Cavaliers sprinted to a 23-0 start before Notre Dame's Orlando Woolridge ended the nation's longest winning streak with a last-second shot. It was a season of giddy firsts. Virginia climbed to No. 1 in the AP poll before getting upset by the Fighting Irish. The Cavaliers ran away with the regular season ACC crown, winning 13 of 14 league starts. And Terry Holland's seventh team earned a trip to the Final Four.

Sampson averaged 17.7 points and 11.5 rebounds per game on the way to the first of three straight national Player of the Year

awards. The redoubtable Lamp averaged 18.2 points a game and joined Sampson on the U.S. Basketball Writers Association 10-player All-America squad.

Tennessee (62-48) and Brigham Young (74-60) were disposed of as Virginia claimed the East Regional championship in Atlanta, Ga. Lamp earned MVP honors with Sampson

and Raker joining him on the All-Regional tourney team. It was on to Philadelphia and a third meeting with North Carolina in the national semifinals. Virginia had rallied to beat the Tar Heels twice in regular season play, but this time Al Wood scored a semifinal-record 39 points to spark UNC to a 78-65 triumph. Virginia bested LSU for third place to complete a 29-4 season. The Cavs were ranked third (UPI) and fifth (AP) in the final wire service polls.

With Lamp and Raker gone, Virginia was an unknown quantity when the 1981-82 season opened. But not for long. The Cavaliers won 27 of their first 28 games, with a 74-58 blowout of UNC in early February catapulting Sampson and company into the No. 1 slot in both the AP and UPI polls. Sampson again earned National Player of the Year laurels, while Virginia shared the ACC regular season title with North Carolina. Handicapped by the loss of first-team All-ACC guard Othell Wilson, Virginia lost to Alabama-Birmingham 68-66 in the NCAA Mideast Regional semifinals to conclude a 30-4 season. The Cavs finished third in both final wire service polls.

The winter of 1982-83, Sampson's last season at Virginia, saw the Cavaliers fashion a 25-3 regular season record. That included a 68-63 triumph over Patrick Ewing and Georgetown in the most ballyhooed collegiate confrontation since Lew Alcindor and UCLA locked horns with Elvin Hayes and Houston in 1968.

Sampson averaged 19.1 points and 11.7 rebounds in his swan-song season. He led Virginia to the West Regional title game, where the Cavaliers lost a seven-point lead in the final seven minutes in a heartbreaking 63-62 setback against eventual NCAA champ N.C. State.

Virginia finished 29-5, making the collective total for the Sampson era 112-23. During the Ralph regime, Virginia was 50-2 in U-Hall, 63-5 against non-ACC teams and a member of the AP's Top 10 for 49 consecutive weekly polls. Sampson finished with totals of 2,228 points and 1,511 rebounds, becoming only the sixth player in NCAA history to score 2,000 points and grab 1,500 rebounds.

#### Ralph-less Cavaliers Continue to Win

In what marked the first season of "Life after Ralph," Coach Holland's 1983-84 Cavaliers left little doubt that Virginia basketball would continue to remain in the national spotlight. Led at the end of the season by an unheralded starting five that included guards Othell Wilson and Rick Carlisle, forwards Jimmy Miller and Kenton Edelin, and center Olden Polynice, Virginia made its second trip to the NCAA Final Four in four years by stringing together impressive postseason victories over Iona, Arkansas, Syracuse and Indiana.

During the 1987-88 season, Virginia became the 52nd Division I program in the nation to win 1,000 games (with a 69-50 win over Dayton) and the fourth ACC school to reach that plateau.

The Cavaliers closed out the decade of the 1980s the following season by posting a remarkable 22-11 record and advancing all the way to the 1989 NCAA Final Eight with postseason wins over Providence, Middle Tennessee State and Oklahoma. The Cavaliers were sparked by the steady, heads-up play of sophomore point guard John Crotty, whose 208 assists set a UVa single-season record, the explosive scoring (20.4 points per game average) of senior guard Richard Morgan and the consistent inside play on both ends of the floor by freshman forward/guard Bryant Stith (15.5 points, 6.5 rebounds per game).

Morgan, a first-team All-ACC selection, finished his career as Virginia's sixth all-time leading scorer with 1,540 points. Stith, meanwhile, set a UVa freshman scoring record with 513 points and was named the 1989 ACC Rookie of the Year.

## Holland Leaves Winning Legacy

Following Virginia's 1989-90 campaign, Holland departed after 16 seasons as UVa's head coach to become athletic director at his alma mater, Davidson College. Determined to make Holland's final season at UVa a memorable one, the Cavaliers did just that—posting a 20-12 record, while advancing to the championship game of the ACC Tournament and earning a bid to the 1990 NCAA Tournament. Stith, a first-team All-ACC selection, led the Cavaliers in scoring (20.8 ppg), while Crotty dished out 214 assists to break his own previous single-season record of 208.

Bryant Stith became the sixth Cavalier to have his number retired following his senior season in 1991-92.

Largely responsible for establishing Virginia as a perennial powerhouse on the conference and national level, Holland guided Virginia to postseason play 13 times (nine NCAA, four NIT), leading UVa to the NIT championship in 1980 and to NCAA Final Four appearances in 1981 and 1984. His Virginia teams compiled an overall record of 326-173 (.653), making him the winningest coach in UVa men's basketball history.

## Jones Continues Winning Tradition

Holland was succeeded as head coach at Virginia by Jeff Jones, a member of the UVa basketball coaching staff from 1982-1990 and a former standout player for the Cavaliers from 1979-1982. The eighth head coach in UVa men's basketball history, Jones led the 1990-91 Cavaliers to a 21-12 record and a trip to the NCAA Tournament. In the process, he became the winningest first-year head coach in ACC history.

Jones enjoyed continued success in 1991-92 as Virginia overcame one of the toughest schedules in the country to post a 20-13 record and win the National Invitation Tournament. Jones became the first individual in basketball history to win an NIT championship as both a player (in 1980) and a head coach. The Cavaliers edged Florida 62-56 in the semifinals before defeating Notre Dame 81-76 in overtime to clinch UVa's second NIT title.

#### **Stith Finishes in Style**

Adding to the luster of Virginia's historic 1992 championship season was the incomparable all-around play of Stith, who was busy making a little history of his own.

The sixth Cavalier to have his jersey number retired, Stith passed Lamp as UVa's all-time leading scorer with 2,516 career points and became Virginia's second all-time leading rebounder (859) behind Sampson. He posted the fourth-highest point total in ACC history and became the all-time Division I scoring leader in the state of Virginia. The three-time All-ACC selection averaged 20.7 points per game as a senior in 1991-92 and his 684 points marked the third highest season total in UVa history. The 6-5 swing-man scored a team-high 24 points and grabbed eight rebounds against Notre Dame in the NIT finals as he captured tournament MVP honors.

Virginia soared even higher during its first post-Stith season. The 1992-93 Cavaliers climbed as high as seventh in The Associated Press poll and reached the NCAA Tourna-

ment "Sweet Sixteen." UVa finished with a 21-10 overall record (9-7 ACC) after opening the season with an 11-game winning streak. Sophomore sensation Cory Alexander led the 1992-93 Cavaliers in scoring and assists while establishing himself as one of the nation's top point guards. Jones became the first coach in ACC history to win at least 20 games in each of his first three seasons.

The 1993-94 Cavaliers were forced to get by without Alexander, who was lost for the season after suffering a broken ankle only 11 minutes into Virginia's opening game. The Cavaliers nonetheless defied the critics by reaching the ACC Tournament finals for the first time since 1990 and clawing their way to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. The Cavaliers finished the season 18-13 while laying a solid foundation for the future.

## Comeback Cavs Advance to Final Eight

With Alexander fully recovered, expectations once again were high in Charlottesville for the 1994-95 Cavaliers. Virginia began the season ranked 14th in the nation in The Associated Press media poll and returned four starters along with Alexander. But Virginia finished its early season non-league schedule at a disappointing 6-3 and fell from the rankings.

Rallying from behind, however, was no problem for this Cavalier team, which relished its underdog role throughout the season. Virginia opened its ACC campaign with a 4-0 start, including a 91-88 double-overtime victory on the road against 16th-ranked Duke. Down 23 points early in the second half, the Cavaliers posted one of the greatest comeback wins in school history.

Virginia also refused to fold following the sudden loss of Alexander, who suffered a season-ending broken ankle against N.C. State in early February. With numerous players again stepping up in his absence, UVa won 11 of its final 14 games.

For their effort, the 1994-95 Cavaliers were rewarded with one of the finest seasons in Virginia basketball history. Ranked eighth by USA Today/CNN and 13th by the AP in the final polls, UVa finished with a 25-9 record (12-4 ACC) and advanced to the Midwest Region finals of the NCAA Tournament for Virginia's first "Elite Eight" appearance since 1989. The Cavaliers also claimed a share of their first ACC regular season title since 1983.

UVa's NCAA Tournament success was highlighted by a 67-58 win over fifth-ranked and number-one seeded Kansas in the regional semifinals.

Senior forward Junior Burrough turned in an outstanding senior season, leading the Cavaliers in both points (18.1 per game) and rebounds (8.7 per game).

With a thrilling 63-62 victory over Virginia Tech in Richmond on Feb. 28, Jones gained his 100th career victory in only 155 games and became the second-fastest in UVa history to reach the century mark.

Faced with the departures of front line stalwarts Burrough, Jason Williford and Yuri

Barnes, and NBA first-round draft choice Alexander, Virginia suffered its first losing season in eight years in 1995-96.

The Cavaliers resumed their winning ways in 1996-97, finishing 18-13 and advancing to the NCAA Tournament for the fifth time in seven years under Jones. Virginia fought its way through a rugged regular season schedule—defeating three nationally-ranked opponents—before losing to Iowa in the first round of the 1997 NCAA West Regional.

## Staples and Nolan Leave Indelible Mark

Although the 1997-98 Cavaliers enjoyed little team success—finishing 11-19 overall, 3-13 in the ACC—Curtis Staples and Norman Nolan gave two of the finest individual performances in school history.

Staples averaged a career-high 18.1 points per game and led the nation with a school-record 130 three-point field goals (4.3 per game average). He finished his collegiate career with NCAA records for three-point field goals made (413) and attempted (1079). He scored 1,757 career points to rank eighth in school history.

While Staples excelled from beyond the arc, Nolan did most of his damage inside the paint. The power forward averaged 21.0 points and 9.2 rebounds per game in 1997-98 to rank third in the ACC in both categories. His 21.0 points per game average marked the highest by a Cavalier since Jeff Lamp led the conference with a 22.9 scoring average in 1978-79.


Jones resigned as Virginia's head coach in March of 1998 after compiling an eight-year record of 146-104. He led UVa to five NCAA tournament appearances and the 1992 NIT championship.

## Gillen has Cavaliers Off and Running

Pete Gillen was named Jones' successor on March 28, 1998. He accepted the Cavalier coaching post after previously directing nationallysuccessful programs at Xavier and Providence.

Rallying behind their new coach and his trademark up-tempo style of play, Virginia finished the 1998-99 season with a deceiving 14-16 record under difficult circumstances.

UVa entered the season with just seven scholarship players (no seniors) and seven walk-ons, five of whom were added from open tryouts among the student body. The Cavaliers were also hit hard by injury and illness, losing starting center Colin Ducharme for all but one game due to a broken ankle.




Harold Deane scored a game-high 22 points to lead Virginia to a 67-58 win over top-seeded Kansas in the 1995 Midwest Region semifinals.

In spite of such obstacles, Gillen's first UVa team captured the hearts of Virginia fans and gained praise from opposing teams and the media alike for its all-out effort, exciting play and courage. Picked by many observers to go winless in the ACC, Virginia notched conference wins over 25th-ranked Clemson, Florida State, Wake Forest and NC State.

Freshman Chris Williams became the third Cavalier in school history to earn ACC Rookie of the Year honors, joining Sampson (1980) and Stith (1989).

With a renewed sense of optimism surrounding the Cavalier basketball program, Virginia returned nine lettermen in 1999-2000, including four starters from the previous season and Ducharme. Joining the veterans were Keith Friel, a sharp-shooting transfer from Notre Dame who sat out the 1998-99 season, and five new scholarship players.

It didn't take long for the increased depth and talent to make a positive difference.

In the first season of the new millennium, the Cavaliers went 19-12 overall and tied for third in the ACC with a 9-7 finish. Virginia defeated North Carolina both times during the regular season, winning in Chapel Hill and sweeping the Tar Heels for the first time since 1981. The Cavaliers also defeated 17th-ranked-Maryland at home (89-87 in overtime).

UVa returned to postseason play for the first time in three years, losing to Georgetown 115-111 in triple overtime in the opening round of the 2000 NIT at University Hall.

#### **Dancing Again**

The positive momentum surrounding the men's basketball program continued to build throughout the 2000-01 season as Virginia compiled a 20-9 overall record (9-7 ACC) and reached the NCAA Tournament

UVa was ranked in both major polls for all but one week of the 2000-01 season, climbing as high as sixth in the AP poll (in early February) and ninth in the USA Today/ESPN coaches' poll (on five occasions). Virginia received final rankings of 16th in the AP poll and 21st in the USA Today/ESPN poll.

Returning to NCAA postseason play for the first time since 1997, Virginia fell to Gonzaga 86-85 in the opening round of the South Region Tournament in Memphis, Tenn.

Ranked 11th by the AP in the preseason, the 2001-02 Cavaliers soared to No. 4 in the national polls (AP and USA Today/ESPN) after racing to a 9-0 start that included notable road wins over Auburn and against 16th-ranked Georgetown in the John Thompson Foundation Classic.

Despite Virginia's early-season momentum, injuries, youthful inexperience and other factors took their toll on the Cavaliers.

Virginia dropped 10 of its last 13 games to finish 17-12 overall (7-9 ACC). One of the three victories was a nationally-televised 87-84 upset over No. 3 Duke in the Cavaliers' final home game of the regular season.

The Cavaliers ended the 2001-02 season with a 74-67 loss to South Carolina in the first round of the NIT at University Hall.

Junior Travis Watson led the ACC in four statistical categories in 2001-02, including rebounding (272, 9.7 rpg) and double-doubles (17). He became the first UVa player to lead the ACC in rebounds since Sampson in 1983.

The loss of four starters signaled a season of major transition for the 2002-03 Cavaliers.

After a promising start, a schedule that featured 10 games against ranked opponents eventually took its toll on the Cavaliers. Virginia dropped 12 of its final 17 regular season games, including a first-round ACC

Tournament loss to Duke.

Despite falling out of contention for the NCAA Tournament, Virginia received a bid to the 2003 NIT. Making their fourth consecutive postseason appearance under Gillen, the Cavaliers defeated Brown at home before losing on the road in the second round to St. John's. Virginia finished the 2002-03 season with a 16-16 record (6-10 ACC).

Virginia's 2003-04 team reached postseason play for the fifth consecutive season as the Cavaliers finished with an overall record of 18-13 and advanced to the second round of the National Invitation Tournament for the second consecutive year.

Gillen won the 100th game of his Virginia career when the Cavaliers won at Clemson on Feb. 21, 2004. He is the sixth UVa men's head basketball coach to win 100 games with the Cavaliers.

#### **Celebrating 100 Years**

Virginia opened its 100th season in 2004-05 with six consecutive victories, including a 78-60 win over 10th-ranked Arizona at University Hall and a 48-44 victory at North-



western in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge. The Cavaliers stood 8-1 as they celebrated New Year's Day 2005.

That would be the apex of the season for Virginia. The Cavaliers struggled the rest of the way, compiling a 6-14 record over the last 20 games to finish 14-15 overall and 4-12 in the ACC. It was UVa's first losing season since Gillen's first season in Charlottesville in 1998-99.

Gillen stepped down as Virginia's men's head basketball coach on March 14, 2005. His seven UVa teams compiled an overall record of 118-93 and competed in five postseason tournaments (one NCAA and four NIT).

Virginia Athletics Director Craig Littlepage announced the appointment of Dave Leitao as men's head basketball coach on April 16, 2005.

#### **The Leitao Era Begins**

The 2005-06 season marked the beginning of one era in Virginia's men's basketball history and the end of another. The season was Dave Leitao's first as head coach of the Cavaliers and Virginia's last with University Hall as its home court.

The Dave Leitao era at Virginia began better than most experts and fans had anticipated. Picked to finish last in the 12-team Atlantic Coast Conference in the 2005-06 preseason, the Cavaliers finished the regular season tied for seventh and won seven conference games, three more than the previous season. UVa also won its opening round game in the ACC Tournament and returned to postseason play with an invitation to the National Invitation Tournament. Virginia finished the season with an overall record of 15-15.

UVa's invitation to participate in the NIT provided the program with its sixth postseason appearance in the last seven years. The Cavaliers' 65-49 loss at Stanford in the opening round of the tournament ended Virginia's season.

The team was led all season by guards and co-captains Sean Singletary and J.R. Reynolds.

Singletary, a sophomore, averaged 17.7 points, 4.4 rebounds and 4.2 assists a game, and earned first-team All-ACC honors. He was the first Virginia men's basketball player to earn first-team All-ACC honors since Bryant Stith in 1992.

Reynolds, a junior, averaged 17.0 points, 3.1 rebounds and 3.1 assists a game, and earned third-team All-ACC honors.

The University Hall era as Virginia's home

court came to a bittersweet end on March 5 when Maryland edged the Cavaliers 71-70 in the team's final game in the building. Many of UVa's former players were in attendance for the game.

Virginia compiled a home record of 11-3 in its final season at University Hall and in 41 seasons in the building had a record of 402-143 (.738 winning percentage).

After calling University Hall home since the 1965-66 season, the Cavaliers moved across the street to their new facility, the John Paul Jones Arena, for the 2006-07 season.

#### John Paul Jones Arena Opens

The Cavaliers enjoyed a banner 2006-07 season in their first year in the John Paul Jones Arena. Virginia tied for the Atlantic Coast Conference regular season championship with a conference record of 11-5, finished the season with an overall record of 21-11 and advanced to the second round of the 2007 NCAA Tournament. It was the first 20-win season for the Cavaliers since 2000-01 and the most conference wins in a season for the program since 1994-95 when Virginia finished 12-4. The Cavaliers defeated four teams ranked in The Associated Press Top-25 during the regular season. The postseason tournament appearance was the seventh for UVa in the last eight years and the first NCAA Tournament appearance since 2001.

The Cavaliers clearly enjoyed playing in the John Paul Jones Arena as they compiled a 16-1 record at home. Virginia established program season records with the 16 home victories and an average per game attendance of 13,521 for 17 home games. UVa was 8-0 at home against ACC opponents.


Virginia head coach Dave Leitao was named the ACC Coach of the Year and was honored as the District 5 Coach of the Year by the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC). He is the first UVa men's basketball coach to be named ACC Coach of the Year since Terry Holland in 1982.

Singletary earned numerous All-America honors in 2006-07, including third-team All-America recognition by the NABC and Collegehoops.net. It marked the first time a Cavalier player had been named a first, second or third-team All-American since Ralph Sampson in 1983. Singletary was a finalist for the Bob Cousy Award, one of 11 players on the Wooden Award ballot and a candidate for the Naismith Trophy.

Singletary also earned first-team All-ACC recognition for the second consecutive season. He is the first UVa player to earn first-team

all-league honors twice since Bryant Stith garnered the honor three consecutive years – 1990, 1991 and 1992. He is only the fifth Virginia player to be a first-team All-ACC selection more than once (Stith and Ralph Sampson – three times, Buzzy Wilkinson and Jeff Lamp – twice).

Reynolds earned All-ACC recognition for the second consecutive season. He was a second-team All-ACC selection in 2007 after receiving third-team recognition in 2006.




Dave Leitao became UVa's 10th men's basketball coach on April 16, 2005.

The season also featured a seven-game conference-winning streak in January and February. It's the longest ACC winning streak for the Cavaliers since they had 11 consecutive conference victories in the 1981-82 season. There were three road wins in the winning streak, including a remarkable victory at Clemson when UVa scored the final 15 points to win 64-63. Virginia defeated Maryland, Wake Forest, Duke and Miami at home, and also won at NC State and Maryland during the successful stretch.

## University Hall and

An era in University of Virginia basketball history ended on March 5, 2006, when the Virginia men's basketball team played its final game in University Hall. After 41 seasons, the Cavaliers headed across the street to the new John Paul Jones Arena.



While the 8,392-seat University Hall may no longer be the home of the Cavaliers, the memories of great games, players and coaches remain with Virginia fans. Many of the most recognizable names in UVa men's basketball history called University Hall home during their collegiate careers. Jeff Lamp, Barry Parkhill, Ralph Sampson, Bryant Stith and Wally Walker spent their entire Virginia careers in the building, while Terry Holland was the head coach of 16 UVa teams on his way to becoming the winningest coach in the program's history.

Virginia played its home games in Memorial Gymnasium for 42 years before the construction of University Hall. The building was dedicated on Nov. 21, 1965, and Virginia played its first game in University Hall under the direction of head coach Bill Gibson on Dec. 4 against Adolph Rupp's Kentucky Wildcats. "Rupp's Runts," a team that featured Pat Riley, defeated the Cavaliers as the University Hall era got underway.


Over the years there were many special moments in the building and Cavalier fans no doubt have their list of favorites. One that long-time Virginia fans would no doubt mention as a turning point for UVa basketball came on the evening of Jan. 11, 1971. That night Parkhill, a sophomore guard, made a baseline jumper in the closing seconds to give UVa a 50-49 victory over second-ranked South Carolina. That win was part of a stretch of four wins in eight days at U-Hall that enabled the Cavaliers to move into The Associated Press Top 20 rankings for the first time.

The following season Parkhill scored 51

points, still a UVa single-game record, in a victory over Baldwin-Wallace at University Hall and had 21 points in a 78-57 win over fifthranked Maryland. The Cavaliers went on to finish the 1971-72 season with a 21-7 record, the program's first 20-win season in 44 years.

Virginia's Other Basketball Venues

Players like Walker, Lamp and Lee Raker followed Parkhill to University Hall. Walker averaged 22.1 points a game during the 1975-76 season and led the Cavaliers to their only Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament Championship. The addition of Lamp, one of the

great clutch performers in Virginia basketball history, and Raker to the Virginia program for the 1977-78 season was a significant recruiting victory for Holland.

Lamp's eight-foot jump shot with six seconds remaining gave the Cavaliers their first postseason win, a 79-78 victory over Northeast Louisiana in an NIT game at University Hall on March 7, 1979.

With Ralph Sampson joining the Virginia program in the fall of 1979, University Hall became known as "Ralph's House." During Sampson's four years, the Cavaliers compiled an overall record of 50-2 at University Hall, participated in three NCAA Tournaments, reached the Final Four in 1981 and won an NIT Championship in 1980.

UVa started a program-record 34-game home winning streak with a 73-69 victory over 10th-ranked Duke at U-Hall on Feb. 6, 1980, and the Cavaliers won their first home game as the nation's top-ranked team with an 83-73 victory over sixth-ranked Wake Forest on Jan. 28, 1981.

"Senior Day" for Lamp and Raker came on Feb. 28, 1981, and UVa defeated Maryland 74-63 at University Hall. Lamp's No. 3 jersey was retired shortly after the game.

Sampson had many outstanding games at University Hall, including a performance against Ohio State when he scored a careerhigh 40 points and had 16 rebounds in an 89-73 win before a national television audience on "Super Bowl Sunday" in 1981. He scored 35 points in a 98-81 victory over eighth-ranked Louisville on Jan. 29, 1983.

One of the most unforgettable afternoons at U-Hall came on March 6, 1983, when a packed house tearfully said goodbye to three seniors, including Sampson, a three-time National Player of the Year. With a national television audience looking on, Sampson made a game winning jump shot as the Cavaliers edged Maryland. As part of the special postgame



ceremonies, Sampson's jersey number was unrolled from the rafters, signifying the retirement of Virginia's number 50 for all time.

UVa's only victory over a No. 1 ranked opponent came on Jan. 30, 1986, when the Cavaliers upset previously unbeaten (21-0) North Carolina 86-73 at University Hall behind 19 points

from Olden Polynice.

The 1990 season was Holland's final one as head coach of the Virginia program. He coached his final game at University Hall on March 1, 1990. UVa unfortunately suffered a 51-50 loss to a Wake Forest team coached by Holland's former assistant coach and close friend Dave Odom.

Bryant Stith, the Cavaliers' all-time leading scorer (2,516 points), said goodbye to U-Hall late in the 1991-92 season. In his final regular season home game on March 3, 1992, he scored 29 points and had nine rebounds in a 74-68 victory over North Carolina State. After the game, he was honored as the sixth Cavalier to have his number (20) retired.

Norman Nolan (35) and Curtis Staples (16) combined to score 51 of UVa's 59 points in a 59-56 victory over North Carolina State on Jan. 18, 1998. Staples established an NCAA record with 413 three-point field goals during his Virginia career. He held that record until Duke's J.J. Redick broke it during the 2005-06

The memorable games continued at University Hall in more recent years. In 2001, the Cavaliers had victories over third-ranked Duke and second-ranked North Carolina in an 11-day period.

The following season, the Cavaliers trailed third-ranked Duke by 13 points at U-Hall with 7:39 to play, but outscored the Blue Devils 24-8 the rest of the way for an 87-84 upset victory on Feb. 28, 2002.

During the 2005-06 season, Virginia won its 400th game in University Hall by defeating in-state rival Virginia Tech 81-77 in overtime on Feb. 11. The Cavaliers' final win at U-Hall was a 72-58 victory over 11th-ranked Boston College on Feb. 21, 2006.

Many former Virginia men's basketball players returned to Charlottesville for the "Last Ball in U-Hall" celebration at the end of the 2005-06 season. Those players helped

Virginia compile an overall record of 402-143 (.738 winning percentage) in University Hall and a record of 179-112 (.615) against ACC opponents in the building. Like the fans in attendance for the tough 71-70 loss to Maryland on March 5, 2006, each of those players had their own special memories of University Hall. Those memories will remain as Virginia basketball creates new ones in the John Paul Jones Arena.

#### **UVa's Earlier Basketball Venues**

In addition to University Hall and the John Paul Jones Arena, the Virginia men's basketball team has played home games in two other venues on the University's Grounds, Fayerweather Gymnasium and Memorial Gymnasium.

Fayerweather Gymnasium was built in 1893 and featured the University's first bathtubs. The Virginia men's basketball program's first season of competition was in 1906 and many of the Cavaliers' early victories under coach Henry H. "Pop" Lannigan were achieved in Fayerweather Gym.

Lannigan's 1915 team finished the season undefeated with a 17-0 record. The team was known as the "Famous Five" and featured Wellington Stickley, John Luck, Bill Strickling, Andrew Dittrich and Bill Nickels, Jr. Strickling, the team's center, became the first UVa player to earn first-team All-America honors after averaging 17.8 points a game that season. He made the winning foul shot in a 30-29 overtime victory against North Carolina in Raleigh, N.C., on Feb. 8 to keep the Cavaliers undefeated. Strickling led Virginia to a 40-3-1 (.920 winning percentage) record from 1914-16, the best three-year winning percentage in school history.

Now known as Fayerweather Hall, the structure is still in use at the University. The building houses the University's art history program and

art department offices, and features Fayerweather Gallery.

Memorial Gymnasium replaced Fayerweather Gym for the 1924 season and was built as a memorial to the University's World War I casualties. Built at a cost of \$300,000, "Mem Gym" served as Virginia's basketball home for 42 seasons. Among the highlights of those 42 seasons were the 1941 team which earned UVa's first postseason tournament invitation, Virginia's joining the Atlantic Coast Conference and the exploits of Richard Warren "Buzzy" Wilkinson.

The 1941 team compiled a record of 18-6 and was the only school from the South invited to participate in the eight-team National Invitation Tournament in New York City. Virginia lost in the first round to City College of New

UVa accepted an invitation to join the ACC in 1953 and Wilkinson was a prolific scorer for the Cavaliers at that time. He averaged 22.7, 30.1 and 32.1 points a game in his three varsity seasons, becoming the first collegiate player to average 30 points a game in back-to-back seasons. Wilkinson scored 2,233 points during his career (currently third on Virginia's career scoring list) and finished with a career scoring average of 28.6 points a game. He still holds the conference and school record for season scoring average of 32.1 points a game during the 1954-55 season.

The Cavaliers compiled an overall record of 286-158 (.644 winning percentage) at Memorial Gymnasium in 42 seasons.

Memorial Gymnasium is still in use as an athletics venue. Virginia's volleyball and wrestling teams hold their home competitions at "Mem Gym." The structure continues to play a vital role in the athletic, recreational and physical education kinesiology programs on Grounds.

#### 3 · Jeff Lamp · 1978-81

Jeff Lamp set a standard of class in the Atlantic Coast Conference which few have matched. Best when the pressure was on, he was an outstanding clutch performer who tied or won no fewer than 14 games for UVa in the final minute of play.

Lamp was an All-ACC selection in each of his four seasons at UVa (1978-81). He finished


with 2,317 career points which was a school record until broken by Bryant Stith (2,516) in 1992.

A two-time All-American, the talented 6-6 guard helped lead the Cavaliers to the NIT championship in 1980 and a berth in the 1981 NCAA Final Four. Virginia opened the '81 campaign with 23 consecutive wins before finishing with a 29-4 mark. Lamp earned Most Valuable Player honors in the NCAA East Regional that year and was an All-Tournament selection at the finals in Philadelphia, Pa.


Lamp was chosen in the first round of the 1981 NBA draft (15th pick overall) by the Portland Trail Blazers. He also played with a number of other NBA teams, including the San Antonio Spurs, the Milwaukee Bucks, the Indiana Pacers and the Los Angeles Lakers.

Lamp joined Barry Parkhill and Ralph Sampson as one of three former Cavaliers who were chosen to the ACC's 50th Anniversary Men's Basketball Team before the start of the 2002-03 season.

#### 40 • Barry Parkhill • 1971-73

One of the greatest all-purpose guards in Atlantic Coast Conference history, Barry Parkhill was chosen Virginia's first ACC Basketball Player of the Year after the 1971-72 season. He was also named ACC Athlete of the Year

The 6-4 Parkhill led the conference in scoring in 1971-72 (21.6 ppg) as he guided the Cava-

liers to a 21-7 record and a first-ever Top-10 ranking in both wire service polls following an 11-0 start. He still holds the UVa (tied for sixth in ACC) single-game scoring record (51 points vs. Baldwin-Wallace) and ranks ninth in career assists (369 in three seasons).

The two-time All-American (1972 and '73) was drafted by both the Virginia Squires (ABA) and Portland Trail Blazers (NBA) and went on to play three seasons in the ABA. Parkhill then moved to William & Mary, where he served as an assistant and head coach. He was an assistant basketball coach at the U.S. Naval Academy for two seasons after spending a year as head basketball coach at St. Michael's College in Winooski, Vt.

Parkhill is in his tenth year as associate athletics director for development at the University of Virginia. He previously served three years as director of alumni development for the UVa Alumni Association and director of capital projects for athletics. Before that, he spent three years as associate director of regional development at UVa. Parkhill was inducted into the Virginia Sports Hall of Fame (Portsmouth, Va.) in April of 2001.

Parkhill joined Jeff Lamp and Ralph Sampson as one of three former Cavaliers who were chosen to the ACC's 50th Anniversary Men's Basketball Team before the start of the 2002-03 season.



## 50 • Ralph Sampson • 1980-83

One of the most heralded cagers of all time, Ralph Sampson dominated the collegiate game during his brilliant four-year (1980-83) career.

Leading Virginia to a new level of national prominence and success, the 7-4 center helped guide the Cavaliers to an NIT championship as a freshman in 1980 and to three NCAA postseason tournaments, including the Final

Four in 1981. In addition, the Sampson-led Cavaliers won 112 of 135 games and were ranked in the Top 10 by The Associated Press for 49 consecutive weeks.

The three-time National and ACC Player of the Year also left his mark in the UVa record books. Known almost as much for his unselfish team play as he was for his outstanding athletic ability, Sampson nonetheless finished as Virginia's third all-time leading scorer (currently fourth with 2,228 points) and holds UVa career records for rebounding (1,511), most field goals made (899), most blocked shots (462) and most dunks (253).


Among his numerous accolades, Sampson was a four-time All-American and won two straight Eastman Awards, two John R. Wooden Awards and three consecutive Rupp trophies.

Following his four-year collegiate stint, Sampson was picked by the Houston Rockets as the NBA's number-one draft choice and went on to earn NBA Rookie of the Year honors. During his nine-year NBA career, he helped lead Houston to the 1986 NBA finals and later played for the Golden State Warriors, Sacramento Kings and Washington Bullets.


Sampson joined Jeff Lamp and Barry Parkhill as one of three former Cavaliers who were chosen to the ACC's 50th Anniversary Men's Basketball Team before the start of the 2002-03 season.

## 20 • Bryant Stith • 1989-92


Bryant Stith starred on Virginia teams from 1989-92. During that time, the versatile 6-5 swing-man helped propel the Cavaliers to four 20-win seasons, three NCAA appearances and the 1992 National Invitation Tournament championship.

Stith finished his career in 1992 as UVa's all-time leading scorer (2,516 points) and

second-leading rebounder (currently fourth with 859 rebounds). He posted the fourth-highest career point total in Atlantic Coast Conference history and established himself as the all-time Division I scoring leader in the state of Virginia.

A three-time honorable mention All-American and first-team All-ACC performer, Stith averaged 20.7 points per game as a senior. The four-year letter winner scored in double figures in all 33 games of his senior season and in the final 51 games of his career.

He was named the Most Valuable Player of the 1992 NIT after leading UVa to an 81-76 overtime win vs. Notre Dame in the championship game at Madison Square Garden. Sinking five of six free throws in the overtime period, Stith finished the game with eight rebounds and a team-high 24 points.

2007-08 CAVALIER BASKETBALL

Arguably the greatest clutch performer to wear a Cavalier uniform since Jeff Lamp, whose old UVa scoring record of 2,317 points he eventually broke, Stith provided many late-game heroics and often seemed unstoppable. Playing at Notre Dame as a junior during the 1990-91 regular season, he scored Virginia's final 19 points, including 17 in the last 3:14, to lead UVa to a dramatic 68-67 come-from-behind victory. In all, Stith accounted for 20 of Virginia's 39 second-half points as the Cavaliers rallied from a 57-51 deficit with 6:20 remaining.

He capped off his outstanding freshman season in 1988-89 by being named ACC Rookie of the Year. The Cavaliers—paced by Stith's 28 points and seven rebounds—advanced to the finals of the NCAA Southeast Regional that season with an 86-80 victory over heavily favored Oklahoma.

Stith is listed in the top six of several UVa career statistical categories. The 1992 Wooden Award finalist ranks: first in scoring (2,516), minutes played (4,391) and free throws made (690); second in field goals made (856); fourth in rebounds (859); and sixth in steals (177).

The sixth Virginia men's basketball player to have his jersey number retired, Stith was selected in the first round of the 1992 NBA draft (13th pick overall) by the Denver Nuggets. He played a total of 10 pro seasons—eight with the Nuggets, and one each with the Boston Celtics and Cleveland Cavaliers—before retiring prior to the start of the 2002-03 NBA season.

#### William Strickling 1914-16


William Strickling starred at center on three of the greatest Virginia teams of the head coach "Pop" Lannigan era (1905-29). Lettering from 1914-16, Strickling helped lead UVa to the best three-year winning percentage in school history (.920, 40-3-1).

In 1915, Strickling became the first Virginia basketball player to earn first-team All-Amer-

ica distinction after leading the team to a perfect 17-0 record. He averaged 17.8 points per game that season as a member of Virginia's "Famous Five" starting lineup and scored the winning foul shot in a 30-29 overtime victory over North Carolina in Raleigh, N.C.

Strickling captained the 1916 squad, which posted an 11-2 record. Virginia's 21-11 loss to Catholic in the fourth game of the season snapped a 22-game winning streak.

During Strickling's first season at Virginia in 1914, UVa compiled a 12-1-1 record and captured the South Atlantic Championship. Executing Lannigan's sophisticated pattern offense to precision, Virginia averaged 50.9 points a game that season and tallied 60 or more points on five occasions. No Virginia team would surpass the 1914 squad's offensive production until the 1946 Cavaliers averaged 54 points per



#### 41 • Wally Walker • 1973-76

A prolific frontcourt scorer, "Wonderful" Wally Walker led Virginia to its only Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament championship and its first NCAA Tournament berth in 1976. He is the only Cavalier to receive the Everett Case Award as the ACC Tournament's Most Valuable Player following Virginia's upset of three nationally-ranked teams en route to

the ACC title. Enjoying one of the finest individual seasons ever by a Cavalier cager during the 1975-76 season, Walker scored 21 points and grabbed seven rebounds in the 1976 tournament championship game against North Carolina.

Walker's scoring average of 22.1 points during the 1975-76 season ranks as the sixth best in UVa history and his 1,849 career points rank sixth on the all-time Cavalier list.

Walker was the fifth player chosen in the 1976 NBA draft, taken by the Portland Trail Blazers. He was a reserve forward for the 1977 Portland World Championship team and, the following year, was traded to the Seattle Supersonics, who won the 1978 NBA title. Walker was then traded to Houston where he teamed with another former Cavalier, Ralph Sampson.

Following his pro basketball career, Walker attended graduate business school at Stanford and started his own financial investment company. He returned to the NBA in 1994, becoming president and general manager of the Supersonics.

In March of 2001, Walker was one of five former collegiate players named to the 2001 Hillyard Silver Anniversary All-America basketball team, as selected by the National Association of Basketball Coaches. Walker was joined on the team by Quinn Buckner (Indiana), John Lucas (Maryland), Ron Lee (Oregon) and Phil Sellers (Rutgers).



## 14 • Buzzy Wilkinson • 1953-55

One of the most prolific scorers in UVa history, Buzzy Wilkinson lettered for the Cavaliers from 1953 to 1955.


Among his many outstanding on-thecourt accomplishments, the 1955 team captain became one of the first three collegians to average 30 points or better per game over the course of a season. He finished with a

career scoring average of 28.6 points—still a UVa and ACC record. Wilkinson also holds the conference and school record for season scoring average (32.1 ppg) in 1954-55.

Wilkinson's UVa career scoring record of 2,233 points stood for nearly 26 years before it was broken in 1981 by Jeff Lamp. Nonetheless, he still holds the season scoring record with 898 points, as well as season records for most free throws made (282) and most field goals made (308) in 1954-55.

An outstanding pure shooter, the 6-2 guard was drafted by the Boston Celtics, but his career was shortened by an automobile accident.

## 44 • Sean Singletary • 2005-Present

Sean Singletary earned third-team All-America honors from the National Association of Basketball Coaches and Collegehoops.net, and was a first-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference selection for the second consecutive season in 2007. He is the first Virginia player to earn first, second or third-team All-America honors since Ralph Sampson in 1983 and the first Cavalier to earn first-team All-ACC honors twice since Bry-


ant Stith earned that recognition three times (1990-92).

Singletary averaged 19.0 points, 4.7 assists, 4.6 rebounds and 33.2 minutes played a game for the 2006-07 season. He declared for the NBA draft in April of 2007, but did not hire an agent and withdrew his name from consideration for the draft by the deadline in June.

The 6-0 point guard from Philadelphia, Pa., enters his final collegiate season for Virginia in 2007-08 tied for 18th on UVa's career scoring list with 1,426 points. He ranks fifth on the Cavaliers' career three-point field goals made list (164) and eighth on the career assists list (385).

A team co-captain as a sophomore and a junior, he scored a career-high 37 points in a victory over Gonzaga at the John Paul Jones Arena during the 2006-07 season.

## 5 • Curtis Staples • 1995-1998

One of the top three-point shooters in NCAA Division I basketball history, Curtis Staples' jersey was retired in halftime ceremonies during UVa's victory over Arizona in the first men's regular season basketball game at the John Paul Jones Arena on Nov. 12, 2006. Staples, a 6-3 guard from Roanoke, Va., finished his Virginia career in 1998 as the NCAA's leader in three-point field goals made with 413. His mark held

until Duke's J.J. Redick established a new NCAA record for three-point field goals made (457) during the 2005-06 season.

In addition to being Virginia's career leader in three-point field goals made, Staples holds UVa records for three-point field goals made in a season (130) and in a game (9). He also holds Virginia records for most three-point field goals made by a senior (130), junior (98), sophomore (82) and freshman (103). He led the Atlantic Coast Conference in three-point field goals made per game during each of his four seasons at UVa.

Staples ranks ninth on the Cavaliers' career scoring list with 1,757 points. He lettered four times for Virginia and was a team captain as a senior during the 1997-98 season. Staples averaged a career-high 18.1 points a game during the 1997-98 season and earned third-team All-ACC honors.

## **UVa in The National Polls**

The Associated Press poll began with the 1948-49 season. The coaches' poll was started by United Press International in 1950-51 and administered by UPI through the 1990-91 season. The coaches' poll has since been administered by *USA Today*.

Virginia appeared in the AP poll for the first time in school history with a No. 19 ranking for the week of January 19, 1971. UVa has appeared in the AP's Top 10 on 75 occasions, including a span of 49 consecutive weeks from the 1980-81 preseason to the 1982-83 final poll. The Cavaliers have been ranked first in the nation by AP on 12 occasions. Virginia's highest-ever finish in the AP poll is third (at the end of the 1981-82 season).

UVa appeared in the AP poll for 19 consecutive weeks during the 2000-01 season. The Cavaliers spent six weeks in the Top 10, climbing as high as sixth, and were ranked 16th in the final AP poll. Virginia was ranked 21st in the final *USA Today*/ESPN poll that season. It marked the first time since 1994-95 that UVa finished a season ranked in both final polls.

Virginia's ranking of 11th in the 2001-02 preseason AP poll was its highest preseason AP ranking since the 1982-83 season when the Cavaliers were ranked number one in the nation. UVa ranked in the Top 10 of the AP poll and/or the USA Today/ESPN poll for 12 consecutive weeks during the 2001-02 season. Virginia was ranked fourth in the December 24 and December 31 AP polls during the 2001-02 season, its highest ranking in the AP poll since the 1982-83 season.

## **Cavaliers In The Pros**

In 102 years of Virginia basketball history, dozens of Cavaliers have played professional basketball both overseas and in the United States. Former UVa players have also competed on NBA championship teams and been honored as NBA All-Stars.

Seven Virginia players have gone on to become NBA first-round draft picks, including center Ralph Sampson, who was chosen by the Houston Rockets as the number-one selection of the 1983 draft. UVa's other first-round draft choices include Barry Parkhill (1973, Portland Trail Blazers, 15th), Wally Walker (1976, Portland Trail Blazers, fifth), Jeff Lamp (1981, Portland Trail Blazers, 15th), Olden Polynice (1987, Chicago Bulls, 11th), Bryant Stith (1992, Denver Nuggets, 13th) and Cory Alexander (1995, San Antonio Spurs, 29th).

Former UVa forward Mark Iavaroni is currently the head coach of the Memphis Grizzilies and former Virginia guard Roger Mason, Jr. was a member of the Washington Wizards in 2006-07.



## **President John T. Casteen III**



Professor of English John Casteen became president of the University of Virginia in August 1990. As president, he has overseen a major restructuring of the University's administrative and governance structures, one of the largest capital funds campaigns ever undertaken, significant improvements in academic programs, and major expansions of the University's physical facilities. In this period, also, the University has been recognized for its leadership in educating minority students, for the quality of its undergraduate teaching, and for its success in refinancing itself following historic reductions in state tax support at the beginning of the decade.

After teaching English at the University of California (Berkeley) and the University of Virginia, Mr. Casteen became Virginia's secretary of education in 1982. He served until 1985. While secretary, he directed reforms in both secondary and higher education, revamped Virginia's college desegregation efforts, and initiated programs of state support for research. From 1985 to 1990, he was president of the University of Connecticut.

In April 2007, Mr. Casteen was elected chairman of Universitas 21, a global educational consortium. He has been a director of the American Council on Education, a director of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, trustee and chair of the College Entrance Examination Board, commissioner of the Education Commission of the States, member of the Board of Control for the Southern Regional Education Board, commissioner of the New England Board of Higher Education, and chair of the Association of Governing Board's council of presidents. From 1991 to 1993, he chaired the National Board on Oceans and Atmosphere.

In 1997, Mr. Casteen completed a term as chair of the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) as well as a term as president of SACS. In 2000-2002, he chaired the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA). He recenty completed a term as chair of the Association of American Universities (AAU). Mr. Casteen is currently a member of AAU's Institutional Data Committee.

Mr. Casteen's business career has included service as director of Connecticut Bank and Trust Company (CBT) in 1986-1989-CBT was acquired by Fleet Bank, and as a member of CBT's audit and corporate responsibility committees; as a director of the New England Education Loan Marketing Corporation (Nellie Mae) and the successor foundation (1988-1997 and 2000), and as a member of Nellie Mae's executive committee; as a director of Sallie Mae (1999-2004), following the sale of Nellie Mae to SLMA, Inc.; as a director of Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Connecticut, Inc., now a component of Anthem (1989-1990, resigned to move to Virginia), as a member of the audit and medical affairs committees, and as a director of Calico, a wholly owned subsidiary providing employee life insurance services for client corporations; as a director of the College Construction Loan Insurance Association (Connie Lee) and a member of the finance committee (1993-1997)-Connie Lee was acquired by AmBac in 1997; as a director of Allied Concrete Company, Charlottesville (1995-1998); as a director of Jefferson Bankshares, Inc. and Jefferson National Bank and a chair of the executive compensation committee (1990-1997)-JBI was acquired by Wachovia in 1997; a director of the old and new Wachovia Corporation (1997-present), member and chair of its audit and compliance committees, and subsequently member and chair of the audit committee of the new corporation formed by the merger of Wachovia and First Union, currently serves on audit committee. He is a newly elected member of the Board of Trustees of the Chesapeake Bay Foundation and chair of the Jefferson Science Associ-

Mr. Casteen was named the Outstanding Virginian of 1993. The state conference of the American Association of University Professors (AAUP) presented its Jackson Davis Award to him in December 1993. In February 1996, he received the doctor honoris causa from the University of Athens in Greece. In 1998, he was named the University of Virginia's outstanding alumnus of the year. In December 1998, he was awarded the Gold Medal of the National Institute of Social Sciences. In November 2002, Mr. Casteen was selected as the inaugural recipient of the Higher Education Center for Alcohol and Other Drug Prevention's Presidents Leadership Group Award. The Virginia Society of the American Insitute of Architects selected Mr.

Casteen as the recipient of the Architecture Medal for Virginia Service in

Mr. Casteen writes short fiction as well as essays and papers in medieval literature, bibliography, and public policy. A collection of his short stories received the 1987 Mishima Award for fiction.

Mr. Casteen holds three degrees in English from the University of Virginia (B.A. with high honors in 1965, M.A. in 1966, and Ph.D. in 1970). He served as UVa's dean of admissions from 1975 to 1982. Born and raised in Portsmouth, Va., he is married to Betsy Foote Casteen. They have five children.

# **Athletics Director Craig Littlepage**



Committed to preserving and building on UVa's longstanding tradition of academic and athletic excellence, Craig Littlepage is in his sixth year as Virginia's Athletics Director. He was named to that post by University President John T. Casteen III at a press conference on August 21, 2001.

Before becoming the University's ninth A.D., Littlepage served as interim athletics director beginning June 1, 2001, following the retirement of former athletics director Terry Holland who became a special assistant to Casteen. Littlepage also served as interim athletics director at Virginia from December of 1994 to July of 1995, while a search was conducted to replace former UVa ath-

letics director Jim Copeland.

The first African-Åmerican athletics director in Atlantic Coast Conference history, Littlepage was named the Black Coaches Association's "Athletics Administrator of the Year" in 2003 and 2006. He was also listed on Sports Illustrated's list of the 101 most influential minorities in sports in 2003 and 2004. In March of 2005, Littlepage was named one of *Black Enterprise Magazine*'s "Most Powerful African-Americans in Sports."

Littlepage has been a member of UVa's athletics administration since 1990. He served six years (1995-2001) as senior associate director of athletics, managing all aspects of the athletics department's day-to-day operations. Before that, he spent four years as associate director of athletics for programs. He originally joined Virginia's athletics administrative staff in 1990 as an assistant athletics director.

The 56-year-old Littlepage presides over a vibrant 25-sport athletics program that regularly vies for state, conference and national titles in many sports. At the same time, Cavalier student-athletes graduate at a rate comparable to the student body as a whole. Annually, UVa student-athletes rank among the top Division I-A public universities in the country in graduation rates.

Five years ago, Littlepage outlined a number of ambitious 10-year goals for the department-to be achieved by 2012: graduate 100 percent of its student-athletes; win 12 national championships and 70 conference titles; fully endow all scholarships and provide the operational support required to meet all other stated goals; build and maintain high-quality facilities; annually recruit the best student-athletes in the country (based on how coaches rate their top prospects); and fully comply with Title IX.

Such goals reflect Littlepage's vision of "uncompromised excellence in intercollegiate athletics" as well as the department's overall mission to "enhance and support the intellectual purpose of the University and its exemplary academic standards and traditions."

During the 2006-07 academic year, Cavalier teams and individual student-athletes continued the department's ascension toward achieving broad-based success in all sports.

Virginia claimed three ACC titles (women's lacrosse, women's rowing and men's tennis) in 2006-07. Somdev Devvarman won the NCAA men's tennis singles championship and the varsity four crew team captured the NCAA title while helping the women's rowing team to its third second-place finish at the event. Women's lacrosse reached the finals of the NCAA Championship. Overall, individuals or teams from 21 sports represented UVA in postseason play. The Cavaliers also won the Commonwealth Challenge athletics competition with state rival Virginia Tech for the second straight year.

Great progress has also been made in the area of athletics facility improvements during Littlepage's watch. In the summer of 2006 John Paul Jones Arena, a new basketball arena/special events center opened to rave reviews. Other facility projects completed recently include a 5,000 square foot Olympic sport training room at a cost of \$1.7 million; a \$7.5 million tennis center expansion at the Boar's Head Inn complex that adds nine indoor courts, three specifically for intercollegiate team use (the Boyd Tinsley Indoor Courts) along with seating for 1,000 fans; the Lou Oehmig Short Game Practice Facility at Birdwood Golf Course dedicated in November 2005; and the installation of FieldTurf on three practice fields. The addition of a state-of-the-art video system in JPJA allowed the department to add new video boards at Davenport Field and Klöckner Stadium. In the summer of 2007 the first floor and main lobby of the McCue Center were renovated to showcase the history of the Cavaliers' football program.

In February of 2003, the athletics department received a \$1.5 million gift

from an anonymous donor to renovate Memorial Gymnasium and Onesty Hall, significantly benefiting UVa's wrestling and women's volleyball programs. The University received \$2 million in gifts from anonymous donors in June of 2001 to launch a construction project to build the UVa Baseball Stadium. Much of the work on the stadium, including a 1,500-seat canopied grandstand, stadium lights, new dugouts, and a new press box, was completed in time for the 2002 season. The baseball playing field is named Ted Davenport Field and was dedicated in April of 2002. Virginia has hosted one of the 16 NCAA Regional sites for the Division I Baseball Championship in three of the last four years. UVa also hosted an NCAA Regional in men's tennis each of the last four years.

Littlepage has held many leadership roles within the NCAA, ACC and University-at-large. In February of 2002, he was appointed to the 10-member Division I Men's Basketball Committee by the NCAA Championship/Competition Cabinet and served a five-year term which was completed Aug. 31, 2007. In 2005-06, Littlepage served a one-year stint as the chair of the Men's Division I Basketball Committee and administered a selection process that produced one of the most exciting tournaments in NCAA basketball championship history.

Littlepage previously was a member of the NCAA Division I Infractions Committee and the NCAA Academics, Eligibility and Compliance Cabinet, serving on the Recruiting and Student-Athlete Reinstatement Subcommittees. He chaired the Reinstatement Subcommittee in 1999-2000.

Littlepage is a member of the Associate Faculty for the University's Center for Alcohol and Substance Education, and participates in various alcohol and drug prevention/education conferences. He also served the NCAA on committees that studied sports wagering, postgame crowd control, basketball issues, and the College Basketball Partnership and also participated as a presenter to the NCAA's Ethnic Minority Male Institute. He has previously chaired the ACC Student-Athlete Welfare Committee, the ACC Men's and Women's Swimming/Diving Committees, and the ACC Men's Soccer Committee; and he currently is the chairman of the ACC Women's Basketball Committee, and the ACC Committee on Awards. He also has been active in the local community, having served on the Board of Directors for the Charlottesville Ronald McDonald House and serving as a Trustee with the Mount Zion Baptist Church. He is also on the Board of Trustees at Saint Anne's Belfield School.

Before beginning his career in athletics administration, Littlepage served two stints as an assistant coach with the Cavalier men's basketball program, from 1976 to 1982 and from 1988 to 1990.

Littlepage held head coaching positions at Pennsylvania (1982-85) and at Rutgers (1985-88) before returning to Virginia. While he was at Penn, the Quakers won the Ivy League championship and participated in the 1985 NCAA Tournament. Littlepage was an assistant basketball coach at Villanova for two years and at Yale for one year before joining the UVa basketball program as an assistant coach in 1976. The LaMott, Pa., native earned his Bachelor's degree in Economics from the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania in 1973. He was a member of three Ivy League basketball championship teams at Penn and was instrumental in the Quakers' drive to three consecutive NCAA Eastern Regional playoff appearances.

He also was an All-Conference wide receiver on the football team and captured the state high jump championship as a senior. He was named to the Carnation All-American track and field team.

Oliver is a member of the University of Idaho Law School Advisory Board and served on the NCAA's Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee. He is a member of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and the Black Coaches Association. He is a past president of the Idaho Sports Law Association and a former member of the Collegiate Athletic Business Managers Association.

# Jane Miller Senior Associate Director of Athletics for Programs



Jane Miller has worked in the Virginia athletics department as a coach and administrator since 1983. Miller was promoted to senior associate director of athletics for programs in November of 2001. She spent the previous six years as associate director of athletics for programs/senior woman administrator. Before that, she was the head women's lacrosse coach at UVa for 12 years and an assistant athletics director and senior woman administrator since July of 1992. She resigned her coaching

position to assume full-time administrative duties in 1995.

Miller serves on the University Calendar Committee and Judicial Review Board. Miller is a member of the NCAA Division I Champion-ships/Competition Cabinet, the Chair of the ACC Men's and Women's Lacrosse Committees, and is a member of the ACC Women's Basketball Committee, Equity Committee and Student-Welfare Committee.

In September of 2000, Miller was appointed by UVa President John Casteen III to serve as a member of the Women's Leadership Council, a standing University advisory committee. The broad mission of the WLC is to consult with, counsel and inform the president about institutional policies, objectives, procedures and actions with regard to developing an equitable gender climate.

Miller is the winningest coach in UVa women's lacrosse history, compiling a 12-year record of 145-44 from 1984-95. During that time, she led the Cavaliers to six NCAA Final Four appearances and to two national championships (1991 and 1993). She was named NCAA Division I National Coach of the Year in 1991.

She was head field hockey coach at Virginia from 1983-91 and her teams compiled a record of 100-65-7 in nine seasons.

The native of Easton, Mass., came to Virginia from Longwood College, where she spent two seasons as head coach of women's basketball and four seasons as head coach of women's lacrosse. Her lacrosse teams compiled a combined record of 30-20-1 and captured a Division III state title. Miller also had coaching stops at Milton Academy in Milton, Mass., and at the University of North Carolina-Greensboro.

Miller graduated from Northeastern University in 1973 and was elected to her alma mater's Hall of Fame in 1983. She was a three-sport standout at Northeastern in basketball, field hockey and lacrosse.

Miller coached the South team to three United States Women's Lacrosse Association (USWLA) national championships (1983, 1985 and 1987). She was a U.S. lacrosse squad coach for six years and was an assistant coach for the 1986 U.S. World Cup lacrosse team. She was elected to the Virginia chapter of the Lacrosse Hall of Fame in 1996, the New England chapter of the Lacrosse Hall of Fame in 2000, and the U.S. Lacrosse National Hall of Fame and Oliver Ames High School Hall of Fame in 2003.

Miller is a member of the National Association of Collegiate Women Athletic Administrators and the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics. In May of 1999, she received the Woman of Achievement Award from the UVa Women's Faculty and Professional Association.

### **Dirk Katstra**

Executive Director of the Virginia Athletics Foundation/Associate Athletics Director for External Affairs



Dirk Katstra is in his 12th year as executive director of the Virginia Athletics Foundation and his fourth year as associate athletics director for external affairs with the athletics department.

In June 2004, Katstra was named Fundraiser of the Year by the National Association of Athletic Development Directors (NAADD) in recognition of his outstanding leadership and success in fundraising on behalf of Virginia athletics.

This year, the annual campaign will

raise \$14.3 million to support student athletes in all 25 sport programs in the form of scholarships, summer school funding, academic affairs funding and operational costs. Additionally the Foundation is responsible for all fund raising efforts for capital projects and endowments for scholarships and operational costs. The endowment has a current value of \$61 million. In addition to providing all of the funding for athletic scholarships, the Foundation is responsible for supporting operational costs for the athletics department and all fund raising efforts for capital projects, including the John Paul Jones Arena, UVa's \$129 million basketball arena and special events center, which opened in July 2006.

As associate director for external affairs, Katstra oversees the long range planning and daily operations for media relations, sports publications, and the ticket office. From 1992 to 1996, Katstra served as director of annual giving for the Foundation.

A native of Stilwell, Kan., Katstra is a 1991 graduate of UVa with a degree in sport management. A member of the Cavalier basketball team from 1987 to 1991, Katstra played on three NCAA Tournament teams at Virginia and was a senior captain on the 1990-91 squad.

sibilities include managing the athletics media relations and publications unit at UVa, and directing and assigning media relations responsibilities for all intercollegiate sports.



Harrison III field at Scott Stadium; completion of Klöckner Stadium, including lights; the creation of the artificial turf competition field and renovated football practice fields; a new 22-acre outdoor field complex known as The Park; the Aquatic & Fitness Center; Memorial Gymnasium renovation; Carr's Hill Field and Building installation; the Sheridan Snyder Tennis Center; and the North Grounds Recreation Center. More recent projects have included the renovations of Madison Bowl Field and Lambeth Field.

Fletcher was responsible for all athletics facilities and operations at the University from 1992 until 1997.

# Barbara Kelly Assistant Director of Athletics for Planning and Special Projects



In her 36th year as a member of the Virginia Athletics Department, Barbara Kelly is one of the driving forces behind the creation and development of a national class women's athletics program at the University of Virginia. As assistant director of athletics for planning and special projects, Kelly oversees a number of special assignments, including the athletes' lettering program for 600 men and women athletes, and the annual production of the student-athlete

handbook. One of her most enduring projects is the written and photographic history of women's athletics at the University of Virginia.

Kelly was the pivotal force that led the Atlantic Coast Conference to offer championships to its member women student-athletes. She was honored by the ACC, as the founder and inaugural tournament director, during the 25th Anniversary of the ACC Women's Basketball Tournament, held in Greensboro, N.C., in March of 2002.

She is co-founder of the University of Virginia Women's Faculty and Professional Association and was a recipient of its Woman of Achievement Award. Kelly has been honored by both the University of Virginia Women's Center and the Athletics Department as a pioneer and builder of women's athletics.

Shortly after undergraduate women were admitted to the University in 1970, Kelly was hired to develop a women's athletics program. She became Virginia's first full-time female athletics staff member when she was appointed assistant director of intramural and physical education. Kelly planned and developed a successful women's intramural and club sports program, setting the stage for the creation of the University's first three women's varsity teams (field hockey, basketball and tennis) in 1973-74. Today, the University fields 13 varsity sports for women, with golf becoming the 13th women's intercollegiate sport at UVa during the 2003-04 academic year.

Kelly coached UVa's first two women's basketball teams from 1973-74 to 1974-75, leading the Cavaliers to a two-year record of 25-12. She resigned as head coach to focus on the continued development of women's athletics at the University and throughout the ACC. She served as director of women's sports and as the primary senior woman administrator, working quietly and diligently behind the scenes for equitable treatment of female student-athletes and coaches.

The Garner, N.C., native attended Campbell University and played basketball for two seasons prior to transferring to East Carolina University.

Kelly earned her bachelor's degree in health and physical education from East Carolina in 1961. She was honored in October of 2007 as one of 100 Incredible ECU Women as part of East Carolina's centennial celebration. She received her master's of education degree from the College of William and Mary in 1971.



## **Corbin Hunt**Associate Director of Athletics for Ticket Sales and Operations



Corbin Hunt is in his second year as associate director of athletics for ticket sales and operations. Murray came to UVa in 1983. Before that, he was the sports information director at James Madison University since 1972 and the school's public information director since 1975. He also spent two years as host of the football and basketball coaches' television shows at JMU.

Murray is a member of the College Sports Information Directors of America and the Virginia chapter (VaSID) of that group. He served as president of VaSID from 1983 to 1984. Murray received the 1996 Bus Male Service Award, recognizing untiring and devoted service to University of Virginia athletics.

A native of Valatie, N.Y., Murray received his bachelor's degree in journalism from Washington & Lee University in 1971. Following graduation, he served as news director for WAYB-Radio in Waynesboro, Va., where he handled the news operation and did basketball and baseball play-by-play.

Murray is married to the former Sara Tourgee of Harrisonburg, Va. The couple has two sons, Patrick and Colin.



## **Barry Parkhill**Associate Director of Athletics for Development



Cavalier basketball legend Barry Parkhill is in his 10th year as associate director of athletics for development. He previously served dual roles as director of alumni development for the UVa Alumni Association and director of capital projects for athletics since September of 1995. Before that, he spent three years as associate director of regional development in UVa's Office of Development.

Parkhill's first association with the University began in the fall of 1969 when he enrolled as a scholarship basketball player. During his three seasons of varsity competition from 1970-71 to 1972-73, he established himself as one of the greatest all-purpose guards in Atlantic Coast Conference history. He was named ACC Basketball Player of the Year and ACC Athlete of the Year as a junior in 1972 after leading the conference in scoring. Virginia posted a 21-7 record that season and advanced to postseason play (NIT) for the second time in school history. Following his senior season, the two-time All-American was a first-round draft choice by both the Virginia Squires of the American Basketball Association and the National Basketball Association's Portland Trail Blazers.

The second player in school history to have his basketball jersey number (40) retired, Parkhill earned his bachelor's degree in education from UVa in 1973. He then played three seasons in the now-defunct ABA, first with the Squires and later with the St. Louis Spirits. He returned to his alma mater in 1977 to take additional courses in education and to serve as a graduate assistant coach under former head coach Terry Holland (now the athletics director at East Carolina University).

In following years, Parkhill was the head basketball coach at The College of William & Mary (1984-87) and St. Michael's College (1989-90). In between those two head coaching jobs, he worked as a consultant with Blue Cross & Blue Shield Insurance Company. He served as an assistant basketball coach at William and Mary from 1978-83 under his brother Bruce and at the U.S. Naval Academy from 1990-92.

Parkill was inducted into the Virginia Sports Hall of Fame (Portsmouth, Va.) in April of 2001 and was selected to the ACC's 50th Anniversary Men's Basketball Team. The men's basketball practice court in the John Paul Jones Arena is named the Barry Parkhill Court in recognition of his many contributions to Virginia athletics.

He and his wife, Pat, have two children - a son, Chris, and a daughter, Jill. Jill is married to David Kavanagh and the couple has three children.

## **Brett Schnell**Assistant Athletics Director for Human Resources



Brett Schnell joined the administrative staff of the Virginia athletics department in July of 2004. He is responsible for providing professional level support to administration, supervisors and staff in the functional areas of recruitment and selection, compensation and performance management, training and development, and employee relations. He also serves as the departmental liaison to the University Human Resources Office.

Schnell was an administrative programs coordinator in the University of Virginia Health System from November of 2003 until joining the athletics department staff. Prior to that, he was a senior human resources representative at Technicolor, Inc., in Charlottesville from March of 1999 to August of 2003. He served as the acting

# **Dennis Womack**Assistant Director of Athletics for Facilities and Game Operations



Dennis Womack retired as Virginia's head baseball coach in June of 2003 and is in his fifth year as an assistant director of athletics for facilities and game operations. Womack assists in the management of athletics facilities, and game and event operations.

In 23 years as UVa's head baseball coach, Womack's teams compiled an overall record of 594-605-7, won an Atlantic Coast Conference Championship in 1996 and twice participated in

the NCAA Tournament. He was named the ACC Baseball Coach of the Year in 1985. He coached 39 All-ACC selections (17 first-team selections), three All-Americans, three Academic All-Americans, and had 40 players selected in the Major League Baseball draft, including two first-round selections.

Womack joined the Virginia athletics department staff in 1978 as athletics ticket manager and assistant baseball coach. After two years as an assistant coach he took over the head coaching responsibilities prior to the 1980-81 academic year. In addition to his coaching responsibilities, he was athletics ticket manager from 1978-84 and an assistant athletics director with responsibilities including facilities, compliance, housing, transportation and event management from 1984-93.

Womack earned bachelor's and master's degrees in physical education from Auburn University. He is married to Catherine Womack, a UVa law school graduate and a partner in a local law firm.



## **Cavaliers On The Air**

#### **RADIO**

Cavalier basketball game broadcasts are produced for the University by Virginia Sports Properties (VSP) and the Virginia Sports Network in association with the Charlottesville Radio Group and cleared in each major market in the Commonwealth. This season the games will be distributed by CRG and AM 1070 WINA. All of UVa's broadcasts are carried live worldwide and later archived on the Cavaliers' official web site, www.virginiasports.com.

Virginia's flagship stations are AM 1070 WINA and 50,000-watt FM 97.5 3WV of Charlottesville, locally owned and operated by the Charlottesville Radio Group. Coverage begins 30 minutes before tip-off with in-depth analysis, interviews with coaches and players, and updates of other games around the nation.

Mac McDonald, Director of Broadcasting for VSP, returns for his 12th consecutive season as the play-by-play voice of the Cavaliers. He came back to Charlottesville in 1996 after previously serving as the "Voice of the Cavaliers" from 1980 to 1985. A five-time state sportscaster of the year, McDonald hosts a charity golf tournament that in seven years has raised over \$500,000 for the UVa Children's Hospital. This past year, the Mac McDonald Invitational netted \$130,000.

Joining McDonald as analyst is former UVa basketball standout Jim Hobgood, a three-year letter winner for the Cavaliers from 1971-73. Hobgood joined Barry Parkhill as co-captain of the 1972-73 squad and was named a second-team Academic All-American following his senior season. He was the second-leading scorer on the "Amazing Cavaliers" of 1971-72, averaging 12.2 points a game as a starting forward. Virginia posted a 21-7 record that season and advanced to postseason play (NIT) for the second time in school history.

#### **CAVALIER SPORTS WEEKLY**

This year marks the fourth season of Cavalier Sports Weekly. This half-hour television program features game highlights and in-depth analysis of each Virginia basketball game. The show is hosted each week by a UVa student-athlete. Cavalier Sports Weekly also includes student-athlete profiles, behind the scenes footage and other interesting feature stories as each of UVa's 25 sports strives for Uncompromised Excellence. The program runs for 31 weeks and is produced and distributed by Virginia Sports Properties and the athletics department's Video Services staff.

#### **PRESS CREDENTIALS**

Please allow ample time for credentials to be mailed to you. We would like to receive credential requests no later than 10 days prior to the game if at all possible. Credentials that can't be mailed will be held for pickup at the will call window at John Paul Jones Arena. You must have a press pass to be admitted to the media area and the press room.

#### **PHOTO CREDENTIALS**

All photographers and camera operators must wear a visible credential issued by the Virginia athletics media relations office. Photographers and television camera operators approved to work on the floor must secure an armband before the game. It is requested that photographers please wear the armband on their arms to make it easier for event staff to see they are properly credentialed. Photographers work from the baselines at both ends of the court at John Paul Jones Arena. Live television is given top priority for courtside space.

#### **PRESS PARKING**

Press parking passes are provided upon request on a limited basis. If you need a parking pass, please be sure to inform the UVa athletics media relations office when making your press or photo credential request.

#### **INTERVIEWS**

All requests for interviews with Virginia basketball coaches and players should be made through the athletics media relations office. It is requested you allow the athletics media relations staff at least one day, preferably longer, to arrange an interview.

#### **POSTGAME INTERVIEWS**

Virginia head coach Dave Leitao and the visiting head coach will meet with media representatives in the press room after each game at John Paul Jones Arena. The first coach will be available in the press room approximately 10 minutes after the conclusion of the game and the second coach will be in the press room approximately 20 minutes after the game. Virginia players will be available in the team meeting room adjacent to the men's basketball locker room after home games.

#### RADIC

Each visiting school is allowed one free radio broadcast from John Paul Jones Arena. The Virginia athletics media relations office provides two ISDN lines and three business touchtone lines for use by the visiting broadcast crew. Radio network crews work from a courtside location at the scorer's table. Three seats are available at the table and one seat behind the visitor's broadcast location.

#### **GAME SERVICES**

Information packets are available before each game at John Paul Jones Arena, and a full statistical summary and play-by-play sheets are distributed at halftime and after the game. Quotes from both coaches and two or three players from each team will be available at the conclusion of the game. A pregame buffet meal is served for working members of the media in the press room on the event level of John Paul Jones Arena.

#### **TELEPHONES/WIRELESS**

The Virginia athletics media relations office will have a limited number of telephones available for postgame reporting. Should you require your own telephone for game coverage, please contact Darlene Craig, Rich Murray or Jim Daves in the Virginia athletics media relations office.
