

The Gamecocks have a rich history of competing in the NCAA Championship in men's soccer. Carolina has appeared in 18 NCAA Tournaments since the program's inception in 1978, beginning with their first trip to the NCAA Championship in 1979.

South Carolina has played in the NCAA quarterfinals on four occassions and made two trips to the NCAA Final Four (1988, 1993). The Gamecocks played in the National Championship match in 1993.

Heading into the 2006 season, the Gamecocks have advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 12 of the last 15 years.

College of Charleston registered the first goal of the match in the 27th minute. Darren Toby headed in Troy Lesesne's free kick to put the Cougars on top, 1-0.

The Cougars took a 2-0 lead at the 61:15 mark when Jeremy Gold drove the ball downfield on a counter attack, all the way into the box and knocked it into the back of the net

Facing a two-goal deficit, USC picked up the pace, and got on the scoreboard in the 73rd minute. Sophomore forward Ayo Akinsete took a pass from Jose Ramos and fired a shot into the lower left corner of the goal from 10-vards out.

USC continued to fight, but Charleston answered with its third goal at 79:37. Toby struck again, playing give-and-go with Gold before firing the ball in from 12-yards and making it 3-1.

The Gamecocks would not go quietly, though. Just over two minutes later, junior Greg Reece rifled a shot and Wiggans earned the save with a deflection, but Deter hustled after the loose ball and headed the ball just across the goal line to bring USC back to within a goal.

Carolina's furious rally continued, but came up short. After being out-shot 13-7, the Gamecocks turned the tables, out-shooting Charleston, 18-7, in the final 45 minutes.

Both goalkeepers had busy nights. Sophomore goalkeeper Brad Guzan finished with seven saves, while USC forced Wiggans to stop 10 shots.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. — South Carolina men's soccer team fell to Wake Forest, 2-0, in the first round of the NCAA Tournament at Spry Stadium. The Gamecocks played a man down for the final 37 minutes of the contest and the Demon Deacons scored both of their goals during that stretch to advance to the second round.

The Gamecocks came out firing, forcing Wake goalkeeper Brian Edwards to make a two of his three first-half saves in the opening five minutes. Ryan Deter took a shot inside the 18-yard box, and a minute later, Ayo Akinsete beat the Demon Deacon defense to go one-on-one with Edwards, who cut down the chance.

The action continued back and forth throughout the half, with both teams mounting dangerous scoring opportunities. In the 31st minute, Wake's Lyle Adams fired a shot from near the top of the box of from left to right that was saved off the line by Makan Hislop. The Demon Deacons' follow-up attempt from Jamie Franks sailed high.

Carolina freshman goalkeeper Mike Gutavson came up with a big save with 3:22 remaining in the half. Wells Thompson booted a volley shot from 15 yards out on the left side, but Gustavson reacted quickly, knocking down the ball for the save, his third of the half.

Neither team was able to crack the scoring column in the opening 45 minutes. Wake Forest held the shot advantage, 11-8 while South Carolina took two corner kicks to the Deacons' one.

With 37:31 to play in the match, Hislop was tagged with a red card following a tackle on Moose, forcing the Gamecocks to play with 10 men the rest of the way.

Wake Forest broke the scoreless tie at the 68:32 mark. Sam Cronin played the ball from the right side to a waiting Solle inside the box. Solle drove the ball into right side of the net to make it, 1-0. The goal was his first of the season.

Carolina continued to battle and threatened to tie in the 74th minute. Ralph Pace controlled the ball at the top of the 18-yard box and played it wide right of the goal to Deter. Deter crossed the ball to Akinsete. Akinsete's shot sailed wide right.

Wake exploited its one-man advantage with 1:49 left to play as Thompson scored on a breakaway. Solle was credited with an assist on the goal.

Gustavson finished with five saves for the Gamecocks while Edwards had four stops for Wake.
