Victory CC in semis



Wonder kid

23-year-old Red Bull driver, Vettel wins at Abu Dhabi to pip Alonso for the title

The kid could just not choose between emotions. Standing on the podium while the German national anthem played, Red Bull Racing driver Sebastian Vettel looked like he would break down at any moment. But then he would smile again after looking at his team standing below the podium at the Yas Marina Circuit, the venue of the season-ending Abu Dhabi Grand Prix.

Vettel is now 23 years and 135 days old and has become the youngest world champion. McLaren Mercedes driver Lewis Hamilton was 23 years and 166 days when he became the champion in 2008. This win is something the German will surely remember for a very long time. The season has been pretty tight but he has stuck to the job with utmost dedication and support from the team. Three wins in the last four races of the season is testimony to that. For an energy drink manufacturersponsored team to beat some of the best in the business and clinch the constructors' and drivers' title is no ordinary achievement.

There was surely quite a bit of pressure on the young man from Heppenheim and he admitted later that he was having trouble falling asleep on Saturday night. But it all

Red Bull boss Christian Horner, Australian Mark Webber and Vettel have maintained throughout the weekend that they would just focus on winning and who becomes champion depends on how the others end up. But this pole-tochequered flag win from Vettel proved that he has really done his homework, put his head down and stuck to the

must not forget the service Renault drivers Robert Kubica and Vitaly Petrov have done them. With Vettel always in the lead, Hamilton, who finished second, was putting up a very good pace. But the Brit struggled quite a bit in his bid to get past Kubica, who was ahead. That probably was one of the crucial aspects of the race that kept making Vettel's bid stronger lap after lap.

While Hamilton took things in his stride after he ended up fourth in the championship, Ferrari driver, and championship leader before the final race, Fernando Alonso was grim as anyone could be after his seventh place finish. He is one driver who has really worked hard and stayed in the fray throughout the season. But to lose the world drivers' championship by a margin of just four points (256 for Vettel and 252 for Alonso) is nothing short of heartbreaking. It was written all over his face as the Spaniard sat in the Ferrari pit garage dejected, all the while being consoled by his team members.

Webber was another disaster on Sunday. He went into the pits on lap 11 but dropped to the 16th place. He gained some places to eventually finish eighth. While Vettel will be celebrating, it will be mixed feelings for Webber in the Red Bull camp.

Missing players may cost dear

India are set to take on Japan in the pre-quarters of football event sans a few key players

The Indian football team has been the surprise package of the 16th Asian Games here. Coached by Sukhwinder Singh and captained by Joaquim Abrances, this under-23 batch has exceeded all expectations by qualifying for the knock-out round of the tournament, advancing from a tough group comprising of defending champions Qatar, Kuwait and Singapore.

football nation, Japan. Commonsense says that it's a match where the Indian team should be playing its best men. But thanks to senior team coach Bob Houghton's decision to ignore the Asian Games, it will be a second-string Indian side that will take on the mighty Japanese on Wednesday.

Houghton has convinced the All India Football Federation (AIFF) to focus completely on preparing for the AFC Asian Cup to be held in Qatar in December and hence has neglected the Asian Games team.

The British coach's decision not to release eight key players from the under-23 age-group for the Asian Games might cost India the chance to make a mark in the event after a long time. The last time India won a medal in the Asiad was in 1970 at Bangkok.

One of the AIFF official told DNA that the Indian team would have been stronger if goalkeeper Arindam Bhattacharya, Govind Singh, Mohan Raj, Rakesh Masih, Jagpreet Singh, Baldev Singh, Baljit Saini and Sushil Singh would have been here. All these players were in the 38 names selected by Houghton In the pre-quarterfinals, India is himself in the list first submitted for lined-up against Asia's No 1 ranked the Asian Games. "Four of these players were in the first eleven of the Indian team which won the SAFF Cup in Bangladesh this season. The biggest setback is the absence of goalkeeper Arindam. Our firstchoice goalkeeper Laxmikanth Kattimani is out with injury and against Japan we will have only one goalkeeper, Gurpreet Singh, in the squad," said the official.

Kattimani suffered a back injury during the match against Qatar and is ruled out for the tournament. India had a good record in Asian Games in the period from 1950 to 1970, winning the gold in 1951, New Delhi, and 1962 in Jakarta, and taking the silver in 1954 in Manila.
