

Fr. Albin Gurklis Retires after 58 years



When Fr. Albin Gurklis came to attend Marianapolis College in 1935 (yes, College), he also found his vocation, his home and his life's work. At the time Marianapolis offered high school, junior college, and a four year college program. It

was here that the Waterbury, CT, native would meet lifelong friends and fellow future Marian Fathers John Pretrauskas, Albin Sheputa, Peter Remeika, Frank Bulovas and Jerry Augunas. And it was here that he found his future.

Upon graduation in 1939 with a Bachelor of arts, he and three other classmates made the decision to enter into the Marian Order. That journey led him to Chicago, IL, where he attended seminary. After his ordination he spent a year teaching in Kenosha, Wisconsin, and then another year teaching at Marianapolis. He went on to complete more studies in teaching and ultimately obtained his Master's degree in Mathematics at Marquette University in Wisconsin.

In 1950, Fr. Gurklis returned to Marianapolis as a math teacher, and has taught here every year since—or for 57 consecutive years! (58 total years).

Fr. Gurklis is a humble man with a true love for teaching. When asked if there was one thing he would say to his students, he replied, simply, "study mathematics." He always told his international students to "first learn English, next learn math," knowing the logic of mathematics would serve them well as a foundation for all learning.

As he approaches his 90th birthday, failing health has led him to the decision to retire, "it's time," he says. His future is wherever the Marian Congregation assigns him, although he hopes to stick around Marianapolis for some time to come.

Art Teacher Tom Perkins, "The Perkulator," Retires after 18 Years

Known as "The Perkulator" and "Mr. Halloween," Tom Perkins is leaving his mark on Marianapolis. And he's not done.

After 18 years at Marianapolis, and 41 years as an educator, art teacher Tom Perkins retired in January. As an artist and advisor, Perkins has more than left his mark on the school. His legacy includes an expansive mural in the dining room, years of community art projects and two dozen students who have gone on to make a living with their art.

The epitome of a "colorful character," Perkins admits he lives, eats and breathes art. Which is why his nickname, "The Perkulator," is so fitting. Besides the obvious play on his name, it represents his love for coffee, and the continuous perking of creative ideas that flow effortlessly and endlessly.

A resident of Manville, RI, 40 minutes from Thompson, CT, Perkins and his wife Lorraine, a teacher's aid in a School for the Deaf in MA, have been married since 1973 and have two children. Their daughter Andree, age 24, works at Citizens Bank in Providence and is pursuing her MBA at Bryant University. In her spare time she loves photography. Their son Jack, age 29, lives in Valencia, CA, and followed in his

father's footsteps. A Marianapolis class of '96 alum, Jack works as an animator and storyboard artist for FilmRoman, the company that produces the animated series "King of the Hill" and "The Simpsons."

Perkin's passion for art showed up early—he remembers in third grade asking permission to paint holiday murals on the school's windows. Perkins grew up in Bowling Green, Ohio, a college town where his brother has been mayor for three terms, and who at 75, still serves as a county commissioner. Tom is the third oldest of four children. After high school, he went on to earn his Bachelor's of Fine Arts degree at Bowling Green State University, and "started to get the feeling I wanted to teach." Everything fell into place, and he began teaching art to grades 3 through 6 in Michigan. Within the year, Rhode Island School of Design (RISD) drew him to New England, and he later earned his Master's degree at Assumption College in Worcester. He continued teaching

7th-12th grade art in Central Falls, RI. In 1990, he accepted the position at Marianapolis, where he thought he'd "died and gone to heaven."

Over the years he has taught more than 500 students at Marianapolis, serving as the sole art teacher for many of those years. He stays in touch with many of them, proudly noting that more than two dozen MPS students have gone on to ma-

jor art schools, and to establish successful careers in product design, jewelry design, painting, fashion design, film animation, computer animation, and architecture.

Perkins is known to all at Marianapolis as "Mr. Halloween," for his creative costumes. Over

Boys Basketball Dominates in Semi-Finals; Finish #2 in Division

Depth of talent with six new players gave Marianapolis the strongest team Coach Dave Vitale has seen in the 4 years he's been coaching here. "Having 10 strong players meant it wasn't a one-or two man show, and the team was able to withstand injury and just wear the other teams down," comments Vitale.

The team had an exciting season with 24 wins and 6 losses total, going into the playoffs seeded #1. They beat a very determined Deerfield Academy in the quarterfinals, and toppled Salisbury School in the Semi-Finals, sealing their spot in the championship game. This was the third consecutive year the team has made it to the Championship round in their NEPSAC Division, two years ago winning the championship in Division D, and last year losing the Class B title by a last minute shot at the buzzer. This year's championship was also a nail-biter. Marianapolis had

split during the season with Tilton. The New Hampshire powerhouse has standout players, two of whom are going on to play college ball at UCONN. But that didn't deter Marianapolis from fighting back from the brink twice. Tilton came out of the gate with an early lead, but Marianapolis fought back to one point down by half time. The Golden Knights then came back again in the second half, managing to tie the game at 55 points with 6 minutes left. But a key foul and a fast break by Tilton gave them the momentum

to win, with a final score of 73-62. The bottom-line, says Vitale, is he is "very, very proud of the effort the players made in the championship game and all season. We were right there with 2 minutes to go and a couple of bounces of the ball didn't go our way. I couldn't ask for anything more out of this hard working high character team."

Vitale counts one of the season's landmark games the win against Class A Winchendon-ranked 10th in the country-in early December. But the season wasn't without its challeng-

es. Aaron Strothers, a key forward, broke his finger a month before the playoffs, but even surgery didn't keep him from returning to the court. A sprained ankle and a flu epidemic affected the team for a couple of weeks, but they "held down the fort," noted Vitale. Leading the offense in scoring this year were Michael Meyers Keitt, Corey Wright and Aaron Strothers. "We only had only 7 losses this season, so I feel we took care of our end. And these losses were not against inferior teams."

"This team was the best team collectively we've had in 4 years, top to bottom," Vitale reiterates, explaining they had good chemistry, were hard workers, and had good character. He looks forward to next year, when returning players Ryan Lehane, Toso Adebamowo, Corey Wright and Ruben Cabrera will anchor another exciting season.

Wrestling

Coach Lee Post and Assistant Coach Mike Whelan started coaching the Marianapolis Wrestling Team this season, bringing decades of experience coaching winning teams. Post has run the Killingly Youth League Wrestling Program for the past 19 years, with Whelan working with him the past 10. "Wrestling is in my blood and my family's blood," adds Post. So this season he took on a young Marianapolis team, knowing this would be a "building year." "We had 3 or 4 students with experience, but the rest of them have only a year under their belts." The team grew from a group of 12 to 26 grapplers. What the team lacked in experience, they made up for in effort. "These kids are driven," says Post. Knowing even a couple of pounds can land you in a new weight class, Post has introduced a weight management program including diet informa-



tion and strength training. Post will also train the team year-round to build them up and help them gain experience. "We will participate in some summer tournaments, and train together one night a week off season." The team's season record held more losses than wins, but that doesn't discourage Post or Whelan. "It's a great bunch of kids, and we're having a lot of fun. We're motivated, we're hitting the weight room, doing conditioning and gaining match experience and well on our way to having a successful program."

Girls' Basketball submitted by Ed Dabrowski, Coach

The team completed its season with a tough quarterfinal playoff loss to St. Andrew's from RI. Down by 12 early in the 2nd half, the girls fought back bravely but ran out of clock, losing 51-49. A 9-14 record was some-

what misleading, however, as the girls lost 4 games down the stretch by a total of only 9 pts. These are games the team hopes to win next year and turn that record around. Sickness and injury also plagued the Golden Knights late in the season, as exemplified by one late season game against SENE league rival Wheeler, when only 6 (of 14) players dressed. The team will play

summer ball and await next season with great anticipation, as the entire team is expected back.

The team was led in scoring (9.2) and rebounding (10.4) by junior Shannon Cain. Other leading scorers were Vicki Dabrowski at 6.4 pts. and Marissa Siedzik at 5.2 pts., also both juniors. Marissa

also added 5.2 rebounds/game. Freshman Alyson Stolz was a pleasant surprise, averaging nearly 5 pts. a game. A fine group of sophomores and freshmen who played both JV and Varsity ball during the season will add great depth to next season's squad, as this year's JV team, coached by Charlie Baron, was only once beaten, ending the season 19 and 1.

Author Ishmael Beah Visits Marianapolis Former Child Soldier, Human Rights Activist and Best-Selling Author

Marianapolis marked International Day with a visit from best-selling author Ishmael Beah. His book, "A Long Way Gone: Memoirs of A Boy Soldier," details his compelling journey to survive as a child soldier in a brutal civil war, his eventual rehabilitation, and the reclaiming of his humanity. Marianapolis students read Beah's account of his days as a child soldier in war-torn Sierra Leone as part of their summer reading. "The students were a bit shocked by the violence, and we had some lively debates about what choices we would make in similar circumstances," noted English teacher Karen Carter.

Adds Headmistress Marilyn S. Ebbitt, "On International Day we celebrate our global connections. Who better to open our eyes to world issues than someone who has been on the front lines as a soldier and victim of war? After fighting to regain his sense of self, Ishmael Beah used his experiences to open the world's eyes to the plight of children in wars throughout the world."

Beah spoke to a standing-room-only crowd in the school's chapel. Articulate, thoughtful and

insightful, he spoke of his decision to write the book. He said he realized when he left Sierra Leone that the world had no concept of the conditions there. "Immigration kept asking me if I had any financial documents," said Beah, who tried to explain that he was lucky to get out with his life, never mind possessions. He also wanted the world to see his home country as more than just a place of war, but rather a country of high moral and ethical standards. "In war people descend into hell and these standards are disrupted." But Beah points out there is a resilience of the human spirit that allows victims of war to reclaim their humanity given time and the right help. "When you believe someone can be saved, it brings a sense of responsibility." Beah counts himself lucky to not only have survived the war, but to get an education. He told Marianapolis students to "think of school as a journey, not a destination. Education is a way to discover what your role is in society."

After his talk, students waiting to get their books autographed, shared their thoughts: "Amazing--he is a world leader in human ethics and overall human dignity," commented senior Dominique Dufresne. "It was an eye opener," said Angelica Pascone. When Susan Ouellet asked her son Trevor about the presentation, he replied "it was amazing and life-changing."

After enjoying our International Day buffet, Beah spent an hour visiting with English classes, where students asked him questions about the book, his life today, and even his favorite soccer team.

the years he's dressed as everything from a ninja turtle, to a little old lady, a large candy corn, to a security guard from (where else?) the Louvre. He also co-founded *Calliope*, a literary magazine published as a collaboration of Marianapolis Art and English students.

His words of advice to his students are to "find something you like and be really passionate about

it, and don't give up. Just love life and be daring." Something Perkins knows a little bit about...in 1984, he was diagnosed with glaucoma, and multiple eye diseases. Surgeries for detached retinas and cataracts took their toll. Today, he uses a magnifying glass to read and see details. "I'm visually challenged, but that's not going to stop me." These conditions hastened his retirement, although he says, "it's time...I'm happy to rest up and do some things I'm ready to do." His feelings about Marianapolis? "I love this place. It will always be home."

So what will the future bring?: Perkins hopes to get a photograph into the "Kodak Picture of the Day," enjoy his lovely family, and visit MPS a lot. And finally, continue work on his "unfinished symphonies."

O'Leary Signs Letter of Intent for Soccer Scholarship

In February, Marianapolis Senior Jessica O'Leary signed her national letter of intent to Lees-McRae College in Banner Elk, NC, the first such signing on record for a female athlete at Marianapolis.

O'Leary, a soccer all-star who scored 85 goals in her years here, will receive an athletic scholarship to the division II school. O'Leary earned team MVP for each of her 4 years. "Jess became more of a leader and team player each year," comments Coach Michelle Parker. "Not only are her skills solid, but she is a good all-around player."

The mid-fielder, a resident of Millbury, MA, recently fought her way back from a knee injury, and is back playing soccer. Said her parents, "we are the happiest parents at Marianapolis today." The family had been fielding offers from a half dozen or more schools. "It's overwhelming," adds Jessica, "I've been working toward this for three years."

O'Leary says her skills grew a lot in her years at the school, but so did her friendships; "I never had camaraderie like I had here. Especially this year-even though I was injured, the team was like family," Jess says.

Marianapolis Junior Leads a Drive to Bring Vitamins to Haitian Children

Inspired by her family, Hannah Schwartz of Moosup saw a need, and decided to do something to help.

Her uncle, aunt, and cousin became involved in an organization that helps the poor in Haiti. The organization, Foundation Good Samaritan in Action (FGSA) assists the people of Haiti both medically and socially to improve their living conditions.

Hannah and her family started donating toothpaste and first aid kit items. Shipping to Haiti is risky and costly, Hannah explains, and often goods are stolen or intercepted. So family members bring duffel bags filled with necessities to ensure the donations reach their intended destination.

"There is just so much need," com-

ments Hannah, "and I wanted to do more." So she spoke with her fellow class leaders about finding a way to help. Malnourishment is a major problem in Haiti,

ity rate of 1 in 8, so the class decided to conduct a "vitamin drive" to collect chewable children's vitamins.

To educate the Marianapolis community, Hannah's cousin showed a video of his work in Haiti at an all-school assembly. Then she and her classmates set up sales tables asking for donations of chewable children's vitamins, and/or cash donations. In one week more than 200 bottles of chewable children's vitamins were donated, PLUS \$1,000. "It was more than I expected," said Hannah. "We're a small school, so I was amazed at the generosity."

The donations were delivered to Haiti by her cousin in January, who

took photos to send back so Marianapolis could see the difference their support is making.

For herself, Hannah sees a future in helping people. "Knowing what we've done helps these people touches my heart," she says. She hopes to go to Haiti herself next year with her family. "I really want to do anything I can to help because they are truly in need and we have so much," she adds, commenting that socks, clothing, a bed, enough food, are all things we take for granted. "Doing this really helped me find out more about what I want to be, and it inspired me to do more."
