President's Project, 1981-82:

Sisters Join World Commemoration of Disabled

The National President's Project for this year is working with the disabled. This ties us in with the current international recognition of these individuals. As a service organization and a sisterhood of friends, we are in an excellent position to work with physically challenged persons. Now would be an excellent time to actively recruit and welcome handicapped members into chapters. Or you may work on ways to reduce barriers on your campus that prevent these people from fully participating in all activities. Or provide some activities that disabled people in your area may need — reading for blind students, or putting on a play in sign language for deaf children.

The U.S. Council for the International Year of Disabled Persons makes these recommendations:

- If you don't know what to do or say, express your hesitation to the person with the disability. She or he may help put you at ease.

- Offer assistance if asked or if the need seems obvious, but don't overdo it or insist on it. Respect the person's right to indicate the type of help she or he needs.

- Let the person with a disability set the pace in walking or talking. Remember it may take her or him longer to say something or get something done.

- Speak directly to the disabled person. Don't assume their

companions are conversational go-betweens.

- Don't move a wheelchair, crutches or cane out of reach of someone who uses it.

- Never push a wheelchair without first asking the occupant if you may do so.

- Ask the person in the wheelchair how she or he wants you to proceed when pushing the wheelchair up or down steps, ramps, curbs, or other obstructions.

- Don't lean on someone's wheelchair when talking to her or him.

- Speak calmly, slowly and distinctly to a person who has a hearing problem or other difficulty understanding.

Boosting Membership #1 Priority

For the second consecutive year, "increasing expansions efforts to form new colonies" is the number one goal set by the National Executive Board (NEB) for 1981-82.

This priority was set after delegates to Convention '81 voted to accept a proposal from expansions workshop participants. It states that each chapter's liaison will make five contacts at either high schools or colleges to seek individuals interested in joining Omega Phi Alpha. Each liaison will submit a progress report and verification of these contacts to the National Expansions Director, Cindy Viktorin, on December 1, 1981, and May 1, 1982.

What does all this mean? Simply this: the issue of expansions is a serious one. Omega Phi Alpha is losing more chapters than it is gaining, and no organization can exist for very long that way.

National sororities normally lose chapters from time to time. However, OPA is a smaller organization which cannot afford too many setbacks. Theta chapter went defunct in 1979. Today, Eta and Iota chapters are on the brink of doing so.

The delegates to Convention agreed that OPA is an organization that many would like to join — if they only knew about us.

It is up to all of us to spread the word. This is why the delegates committed their chapters' active participation to expansions.

HOW TO HELP

The first step is for each chapter to notify the expansions director of who their respective expansions liaison is. A postcard for this was enclosed in the chapter packet sent to each local president.

Sorority Inducts Eleventh Chapter

Delegates to the 1981 National Convention voted to accept a colony at the University of Connecticut as the eleventh chapter of Omega Phi Alpha.

Ceremonies to induct Lambda Chapter were held on Saturday evening, June 20, in the University of Bridgeport's Bernhard Arts & Humanities Tower Room, overlooking Long Island Sound. Margie Gronski, 1980-81 National Vice President, presided over the candlelight ceremony held before other banquet activities.

Ellen Hayden accepted the charter for Lambda Chapter on behalf of the 11 members.

Charter members of Lambda include Ellen Mary Hayden, Judith A. Smith, Roberta A. Reed, Fana Robin Reisenberg, Nancy P. Keatings, Lisa Mittleman, Jeanne M. Dubiel, Diane Reekie, Mary Lynn McEvoy, Deborah Wyant, and Sandy L. Liss. The advisor to the group is Susan L. Council, Assistant Dean of the School of Business at UConn.

Service projects the group carried during colonization include offering assistance to a Motor Skills Clinic for the mentally and physically handicapped; conducting an interview of Wilimantic area elderly for a needs assessment survey; observing National Environment Day by cleaning up the Mirror Lake area.

The second step is to evaluate your geographical area, and figure out just where you can best concentrate your efforts. Preferably it will be at one of these: 1) at a university near yours; 2) one where you know someone who could organize a group; 3) one where an alumnae sister has transferred from your chapter; 4) at a high school where interested students could remember OPA when they reach college.

You are limited to one important restraint in considering where to concentrate on. Limit your targets to four-year schools. It has been the sorority's experience that in two-year schools chapters never stabilize. Almost as soon as a sister becomes active there, it's time to graduate or transfer.

The third step is to work closely with the expansions director. She'll direct you, and be available for guidance and advice.

ONE SUCCESS STORY

"Establishing a colony takes much advance planning," according to Marge Gronski, National Publications Editor, who worked with the former University of Connecticut colony last Spring. "You'll need several sisters to work together with the colony and some materials (OPA brochures, posters, Chevrons, and if possible, a display of scrapbooks, awards, etc. from a local chapter). Most of all, be spirited, and you'll find that the colony will catch OPA fever too!"

"The NEB is aware that colonization efforts cost money," she said. "If you're organized and in earnest, contact Cindy for funding. You shouldn't

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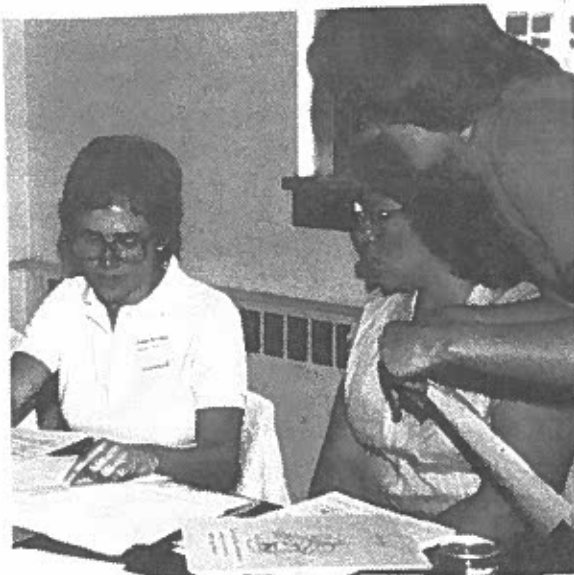
Alumnae BOD to Review Lifetime Dues

Convention, '81 in Bridgeport, CT:

Delegates Tackle Constitutional, Chapter Loan Issues

Here are the highlights of Convention '81. Chapters will be receiving copies of the National minutes from Jean Morgan, National Executive Secretary, soon.

- Revised the National Constitution and By-laws. Major changes included extending the Alumnae Administrator's term from one to two years; NEB members may not hold the same office for more than two, rather than four, consecutive years; each chapter shall hold two, rather than one, project for the

National President's Project each year; candidates for national president shall have served for at least one, rather than two, years on the NEB.

- Discussed plans to aid the weakening Eta and Iota chapters.

- Passed a national budget proposal which specifies a convention subsidy between 25-300 dollars for host chapters, and an NEB contingency fund.

- Passed an alumnae proposal which declares each chapter will plan activities for its alumnae

this year.

- Passed an expansions proposal committing each chapter to make at least five contacts this year.

- Approved procedures for granting and repayment of chapter loans from the national treasury.

- Accepted a bid from Epsilon chapter for Convention '82, to be held during the second week of June, featuring a visit to the World's fair in Knoxville, Tn.

Nat'l Officer Manual to Enhance Professionalism

One of the biggest frustrations of a newcomer to the National Executive Board (NEB) is not knowing where to begin first. Often the predecessor will be from another state, and the new officer returns from Convention armed with lots of enthusiasm, a box full of files, and a head full of questions.

Last year's NEB set as one of its goals the publication of a document that would introduce newcomers to their office and to the Board and hopefully answer many of the questions a new officer faces. Although the transfer of files from one officer to another usually takes place at summer Convention, such is not always the case. The

files do not always contain all the answers. The national president, of course, provides guidance and directions, but questions still arise.

Thus, last year's NEB pooled its resources and knowledge, and directed Leslie Houston, national president, drafted a document entitled "National Executive Board Manual." This manual was reviewed during this past convention by the 1980-81 NEB, and will soon be at the printing presses.

Other than containing detailed procedures for each national office, the manual describes seasonal responsibilities, general responsibilities, activities at midyear and summer conven-

tions, tips on managing time and guides for maintaining individual files.

The manual will be made available to any sister considering petitioning for national office. It will accurately describe what is expected of a national office, and serve as a reference book for those on the NEB.

Our new task is establishing a base of consistent income for our Alumnae organization. Currently, our only source of income is a lifetime fee of \$25, and donations from members. These fluctuate with the interest and motivation of individuals. We need an income that will promote growth and stability.

Several proposals in this area are: 1) changing the lifetime membership fee to dues paid either annually, or every two, five or ten years; 2) raising the lifetime fee to cover more expenses, which at current postage and copying rates would more than double the current \$25 fee and still not provide a steady income; 3) raising the lifetime fee by \$10, and asking members to subscribe to services like the Chevron and Alumnae News. Also, members would pay for postage on ballots, minutes and other mailings.
