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University of New Haven Group Petitions to Join Omega Phi Alpha

Their flower is the red rose; ours is the yellow rose. Their symbol is the diamond; ours is half that, the Chevron. Giving to others and making them happy is one of their goals. They are Chi Kappa Rho, OPA's newest colony.

Twelve women from the University of New Haven (Conn.) on March 31 met with National President Sheila Bush and Public Information Officer Ann DeMatteo to find out how Chi Kappa Rho could affiliate with OPA.

The sisters and their advisor, Betty Van Dyke, received information packets from Sheila. When they talked about what service meant to them, they passed the yellow rose, something that OPA sisters across the country did in cardinal principle workshops this year.

On April 22, Chi Kappa Rho submitted its petition by mail, and in a phone call to Expansions Director Connie Miller, received permission to have their biggest project of the year, a card party and fashion show, to be counted in as part of the five service projects a colony must do to become a chapter.

Chi Kappa Rho was founded at UNH 22 years ago by Virginia Parker, who now resides in Florida. On April 24, CKR held its 20th annual card party and fashion show, proceeds of which go to a scholarship in Virginia's name. Ann and Beta alum Judy Acosta represented OPA at the fashion show.

UNH is a four-year liberal arts university that specializes in business-related subjects. CKR is the only sorority on campus, and if it becomes a

chapter, all of the school's Greeks will be "national." CKR received support to affiliate with OPA from its alums, the dean of students and the Interfraternity-Sorority Council.

Ann first learned about CKR several years ago, but efforts to reach the local service sorority failed. A week before Sheila was to come to Connecticut to give a March 29-31 CPW for Beta and Lambda, Ann called the university, and asked that (SEE PAGE 8)

Cardinal Principles Workshops - Are They Worth It?

The spring semester heightened with visits to chapters in the northeast and southeast regions. Past national president Vicki Cooper made special arrangements to visit Alpha chapter with their four active sisters and six pledges. National President Sheila Bush made a follow up visit to Mu chapters and hosted the Friendship section with a majority of the sisters present.

Sheila also visited Beta and Lambda chapters in Connecticut for a weekend full of exciting ideas for both chapters. Both chapters hope to work more closely in the future and Beta hopes to host Convention '86. Plans were made to see that both goals become a reality.

Epsilon was given the LEADERSHIP/SERVICE workshops in April, which was Sheila's last official visit for the year.

Here's what the chapters said about their workshops:

Alpha Chapter says:

"I liked goal planning for Alpha. Having goals written on paper, we can begin to think about them and work toward them. We can start thinking of ideas and plans. Having the action steps written down, we can only do one thing - that is, GO FOR IT!"

"I was impressed with the reassurance that everyone is willing to help Alpha and all we have to do is call."

"Setting goals really made me feel as if we were stepping towards really accomplishing something. Planning for teamwork helped us write down concrete things to accomplish."

Beta and Lambda Chapters say:

"PMA for OPA was the program that impressed me the most. I had a great feeling of unity and friendship. In feeling more close, accomplishing our chapter goals will be easier and mean a lot more."

"For Beta's purposes, I feel we are finally at a

strongly structured point for our chapter and sometimes we lose sight of our friendship principle."

"I liked the alumnae involvement and sharing ideas, the willingness to listen and support each other. Focus on the future was best part because it was specific to each chapter. I also enjoyed the visit with Lambda."

Mu Chapter Finalizes Convention '85 Plans

"Having every chapter represented" is the goal of Mu Chapter as sisters finalize plans for Convention '85 slated to begin Tuesday, August 6th on the campus of Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro.

National President Sheila Bush has confirmed that the opening business meeting will begin at 4 p.m. on Tuesday in the dorm where delegates will be staying. The purpose of the first gathering is to set the ground rules for the meetings and review the Convention agenda.

Mr. Dwight Henry, an awardwinning extemporaneous speaker who addressed Mid-Year attendees, will conduct a PMA seminar following the business meeting. Mu has planned a get acquainted barbeque and dance for the evening.

Wednesday's activities

include the National President's Council and National Service Council participating in a seminar entitled "Communication: It's a two-way street." Lunch is planned at Crackerbarrel's. Business meetings are scheduled for the afternoon, with dinner planned at Po Folks. The National Executive Board will meet Wednesday night.

Thursday has been set aside to visit Opryland USA Amusement Park.

Business meetings are scheduled for Friday morning. Afternoon sessions will allow delegates to attend one of several seminars including "Growing Pains: The Adolescent Years," (on membership), "Putting Your Best Foot Forward," (on publicity), and another one on expansions. Friday evening delegates and NEB will gather to work on a service project selected for

Convention '85. The details of the project have not been announced. Pizza is planned for dinner, with the Candidate's Forum scheduled to follow. Part 1 of the NEB Training Seminar is planned for Friday night.

Alumnae will gather Saturday morning for a seminar entitled "Get Carried Away With OPA." At the same time delegates and other sisters will gather to discuss ways to raise money for chapter activities. A seminar entitled "Focus on the Future" will conclude the last business meeting. Lunch will be a picnic on the campus with Part 2 of the NEB Training Seminar following. Banquet is planned for Saturday night at Tycoon's, starting at 6.

Delegates will depart on Sunday after a 10:00 brunch at the 101st Airborne on Murfreesboro Road in Nashville.

Award Presentation Highlights Convention Activities

This summer's convention raises so may questions...

Will Zeta cap the competition and win the National Display Award? Can Kappa cop the Travel Award? Is dynamic Delta going to take the Service Award? We will have to wait until August for the answers.

The National Sorority sponsors a series of awards, some to recognize achievements earned throughout the year and others that are reserved for friendly convention competition. Perhaps the most respected is the National Service Award. Since the winning chapter is the one with highest average of service hours per dues-paying member, chapter size does not

affect the chance to win. Last year, Kappa chapter won this prestigious award for their first time.

Another special recognition for service is the Individual Achievement in Service which is awarded to those sisters who earn over 100 service hours during the year. Winners will be announced at the convention and will receive a special certificate.

Two rotating awards are reserved for convention competition. The Travel Award, won last year by Beta, is presented to the chapter whose contingent travels the most cumulative miles. So if Kappa sends five representatives, they will accrue more miles than say, Lambda's two. The more

the merrier! Preparing a chapter display brings out the creativity in us all. Our host, Mu chapter, is responsible for judging the displays for originality and involvement of the sisters in our three cardinal principles.

The Display Award was won last year by Epsilon for their showcase of the OPA Klowns.

Finally, results of the non-competitive Chapter Excellence Program will be announced. Almost every chapter has entered the program this year and have been developing and strengthening chapter life. They will be awarded a gold, silver, or bronze seals of achievement for their efforts.

Checklist for Convention Delegates

In order for your chapter to be fully represented at Convention '85, your job is to be certain that you, as a delegate for your chapter, do the following:

BRING OR SEND your chapter's copy or copies of the National Handbook. BRING OR SEND a copy of your chapter's annual report (if not sent to President Sheila Bush prior to Convention). BRING OR SEND your chapter's Service Hour Report Form for entry in the National Service Award and the Individual Achievement in Service Award (if not sent to Vice President Mary Graves prior to Convention). BRING OR SEND CEP (CHAPTER EXCELLENCE PROGRAM) forms for entry in this special chapter award (if not sent to Mary before Convention). BRING OR SEND rotating National award plaques: Beta's Travel Award, Epsilon's Display Award, and Beta--don't forget to bring "Ophia:" BRING OR SEND written bids to host Convention '86 and '87. BRING OR SEND any slides you may have of your chapter for a national "This is OPA:" slide show. BRING OR SEND written procedures and/or descriptions of your chapter's favorite traditions. BRING a display for entry in the Display Award competition. BRING receipts of travel expenses so delegates can be reimbursed for half of their travel. BRING \$57.50 balance per delegate to Convention (unless already sent). BRING a check for insignia orders in case your chapter wants stationery, posters, bids, etc. You can personally hand-deliver them to your chapter in the fall if the order is pre-paid.

Later in the month of April, OPA sold balloons to help finance Convention. We sold them the last week of April for good luck to everyone taking final exams.


Mu Chapter had its first banquet on April 21. Our pledges donated all money they raised at a bake

someone from the sorority call her back. Secretary Karen Vecchitto did and arrangements were made for the sisters to meet with Sheila and Ann on March 31 at 6 p.m., just before their weekly meeting.

If the colony decides to petition for chapter status, it will become OPA's Nu Chapter.

Connie accepted the colony's petition, and plans to keep the NEB and chapters informed of CKR's progress.

CKR had been considering "going national" for some time. In its petition, the women said one of the reasons for requesting recognition as a colony are: "We were very impressed with your representatives and we want more stability and the recognition of being a national sorority."

Before deciding to colonize, CKR sisters expressed concern about a name change, since they are so well-known on campus. Ann is developing ways for them to use the names of both sororities when publicizing an event.

CKR also questioned how much control national would have over the chapter's finances, but Sheila told Toni and the rest of the membership that local funds are untouched by national. Chapters must pay dues to national, but that's all. National also gives chapters fund raising suggestions.

Since colonization took place, Chi Kappa Rho sisters expressed concerns over two OPA policies, the one which allows men to join, and the one which allows members of other social Greek organizations to join.

Sheila responded:
"Colonization is a good
time for learning. There
have been concerns such as
this in the past, but as a
national service sorority,
one of our strengths is
that our membership is open
to all people under Title

IX."

"I really believe that #952 we've done a lot of work 25W internally, and that we've A grown, and that now is the 22 time to branch out and 55 went expand to new chapters," 900A Sheila said.

That's the Way it Was...in Service...in OPA

The service of 0 Phi A sisters makes a difference! Another very successful year is drawing to a close, and our impact has been felt far and wide...from Africa and Indonesia to Plainview, Texas. All evidence points to a very healthy, vigorous service program for our organization.

This year's National President's Project. Alcohol Awareness, may have been supported more widely and strongly than any other. In the fall, most chapters participated in the National Collegiate Alcohol Awareness Week and during the winter in our own O Phi A Alcohol Awareness Week, Alpha. Epsilon, Zeta, and Mu chapters ran a "Green Bean" campaign, a highly successful information campaign urging communication and counciling for problem drinkers (another group at Texas A&M University at College Station also ran one). Non-alcoholic beverages were served at parties and student unions by sisters of Beta, Delta, and Kappa chapters to show enjoyable drinks need not be inebriating. Mu chapter publicized "friendship contracts" between students, which encourages responsible behavior, and Zeta chapter even persuaded the mayor of Plainview to make an official proclamation.

O Phi A influence was truly felt world-wide this year as chapters strongly supported service to our fourth area: nations of the world. Most projects were devoted to world hunger. Alpha worked in Hunger Awareness Week and African famine funds were supplemented with the proceeds of Delta's pot luck, Kappa's bowlathon, and Mu's skipped meals. Epsilon became a little more personally involved and adopted a little boy, Anwar, from Indonesia

through the "Save the Children" program.

What a year in service: All four areas of service and the two national projects received tremendous support from our chapters. Sisters should be proud knowing that their service does make a difference in the world, but their joy from doing service also enriches their own lives as well.


