














Rome presents itself as a strategic and national connecting point. An estimated total of one half of the population, personal income, business and sales accumulation are within a short drive. Located 45 minutes east of Syracuse, Rome is accessible by three NYS thruway exits, State Routes 365, 26, 46 and 49, and is home to the Oneida County Airport. From Rome you can be in one of the major metropolitan areas in North America, including New York City, Boston, Toronto, Montreal and Philadelphia within a five hour drive. Although not officially one of the natural wonders of the world, visitors to Niagara Falls, located only three hours from Rome, are sure to add it to their list of wonders.

An abundance of mountains, streams, lakes, fresh air, clean water, and beautiful skies surround the convenient location of Rome. As nature abounds, exploration and excitement are only a footstep away. Walking, bicycle, and nature trails lead to pristine waterfalls and gorgeous mountains in the summer before they turn into a winter wonderland. Snow transforms our area into an ideal haven for snowmobiles, ice fishing, tubing, skiing and snow-boarding.

Experience world class entertainment, gaming and dining during any season at the Turning Stone Resort & Casino located only ten minutes away. Historic Treasures

Discover **FORT STANWIX NATIONAL MONUMENT** where the past is preserved to enrich our future. Located along the historic "Great Carry," which enabled expansion to the west, Fort Stanwix was a strategic point during the American Revolutionary War. The American victory that took place at the Fort directly contributed to the defeat of the British at Saratoga in 1777. Fort visitors can experience life as it was through live demonstrations, artifacts and presentations both at the Fort and its visitors center - the Marinus Willett Collections Management and Education Center.

THE MARINUS WILLETT COLLECTIONS MANAGEMENT AND EDUCATION CENTER embodies the mission of the National Park Service - to preserve our natural resources and provide an enjoyable educational experience for this and future generations. Within the Center, Fort Stanwix stores 485,000 artifacts and documents inside a state-of-the-art collection facility. Located adjacent to the Fort on North James Street, the Center's unique exhibits help visitors explore the story of Fort Stanwix and the Mohawk Valley through the eyes of the people who lived in New York during the Revolutionary war.

ERIE CANAL VILLAGE is an outdoor living history museum. The Village is a reconstructed 19th century settlement on the site where the first shovel of earth was turned for the construction of the first Erie Canal in 1817. Visitors can relax and travel back into time on a narrow gauge steam train ride or a mule drawn packet boat cruise along the Canal.

THE ARSENAL HOUSE is a 190-year-old building that once served as the home of commanding officers of the US Arsenal from 1815-1873. Sixteen rooms with ten fireplaces, elaborate plaster cornices and ceiling medallions, hand-hewn beams held in place with wooden pegs and an incredible two and a half story open staircase are still intact. Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the Arsenal House, now under renovation, is one of Rome's few examples of historic Federal style architecture.

More Interesting Places

THE ROME FIRE AND POLICE MEMORIAL PARK, located on the southwest corner of Black River Boulevard and East Court Street, was revitalized in recognition of the fifth anniversary of the horrific tragedies of 9/11.

The Fire and Police Departments worked with Rome Rotary to create a memorial site to honor those who lost their lives trying to protect and serve our country, and to honor and value the firefighters, police officers, and military personnel that do their job each day without question or hesitation. The Park has received national attention for its featured "Twin Towers" that stand in a reflecting pond shaped to represent the State of New York. The 14-foot illuminated towers are made of glass and send bubbling water toward the top to represent the firefighters who ascended the World Trade Center buildings. The water then spills back into the reflecting pond that is located behind the structure that showcases two sections of steel from Ground Zero. Features of the Park include a memorial wall; a restored "Street Box" fire alarm pull station and police call box; an antique hose cart; a bell; and a lighted kiosk featuring a mural by local artist Jane Taylor.

THE WEST ROME DRIVE-IN, located on Route 69 in Rome, is one of only 31 Drive-In movie theaters open for business in New York State. The Drive-In opened in 1951 as a single-screen, just seven years before the number of Drive-Ins in the United States reached a peak of 4,063.

The Drive-In has undergone many changes throughout its years including the addition of a second screen in 1985 providing movie-goers a choice of features, a new Dolby Stereo sound system, and numerous changes to the film projectors. These upgrades have resulted in a dramatic improvement to both picture and sound.

With more than 13 acres of land, the Drive-In is an ideal place for the Flea Market held each Sunday from May through September. For more information please visit www.westromedrivein.com or call (315) 336-9440. For information on the Flea Market call (315) 278-4257.







Downtown Rome

Rome is a proud partner of the Rome Main Streets
Alliance, affilitated with the National Trust for Historic
Preservation's National Main Street Program. The
Main Streets Program is one of Rome's most
influential and important initiatives designed to
revitalize the City's downtown. The program is led
by volunteers from the community including businesses,
local government, nonprofits and residents.

In 2002, the National Trust for Historic Preservation conducted a strategic assessment of Rome's downtown. Three Main Street Corridors were identified through the study — EAST DOMINICK STREET, WEST DOMINICK STREET AND JAMES STREET. Beginning with former Mayor Joseph Griffo, and continuing with our present Mayor James Brown, we are endeavoring to implement a proven four-point approach to revive the downtown area. A new video documentary entitled "Remembering... Rebuilding" tells the story of urban renewal and the redevelopment of the heart of the City.

JAMES STREET CORRIDOR

The James Street Corridor is a growing business and specialty shopping district in the heart of downtown Rome. Unique treasure shops, popular coffee houses, a health food store, flower shop and great restaurants can all be found along this emerging corridor that features part of the City's Historic District and three parks, one of which is registered nationally.

WEST DOMINICK STREET CORRIDOR

The West Dominick Street Corridor is quickly becoming the Arts and Cultural corridor. It is home to the Rome Entertainment, Arts, Cultural, and Historic (REACH) Microenterprise Development Center, the historic Capitol Theatre and a variety of eateries and services.

EAST DOMINICK STREET CORRIDOR

The East Dominick Street Corridor is known as Rome's Original Little Italy. Once home to many of the City's original Italian immigrants, many of the buildings in the corridor are inscribed with the name of the original building owners and dates of construction.

Arts & Culture

THE CALIBER OF ARTS AND CULTURE IN THE CITY OF ROME PROVIDES A GREATER QUALITY OF LIFE FOR BOTH RESIDENTS AND VISITORS. The Capitol Theatre, located in the West Dominick Street Corridor, is a valuable anchor to the Rome Entertainment Arts Cultural and Historic District. Look outside the downtown corridors and you can also find the Rome Community Theater and Beck's Grove Dinner Theater for year-round entertainment.

The Capitol Theatre remains the only building in Rome constructed for the specific purpose of exhibiting motion pictures. Although the Theatre received an Art Deco face-lift in 1939, the auditorium is configured exactly as it was in 1928, and much of the original decor remains.

Also still in place is the Theatre's 3 manual, 7 rank, Moeller theater organ. Restored in 2002, the organ is used on a regular basis to accompany silent movies – drawing audiences from all over the world.

The Rome Historical Society was founded in 1936 and is located in a former US Post Office. The society features a museum, the William E. Scripture Memorial Library, archives, artifacts and continually updated displays showcasing the history

of Rome. Original documents from the Revolutionary War, Civil War, local businesses, people and the region are housed in a collection that boasts more than 10,000 historical textiles and samplers, maps, paintings, prints, photos, and early tools and artifacts specific to the region. Educational and public outreach programs are a few of the many ways that the Society educates the community through audiovisual and interactive programming.

The Rome Sports Hall of Fame and Museum is known as "the only municipal Sports Hall of Fame with its own museum in New York State." A non-profit organization dedicated to honoring and preserving

the great sports achievements of Rome athletes, the Sports Hall of Fame features a racing wing and an all-sports wing. A library, pictures, trophies, uniforms and equipment keep the memories of past sporting heroes alive and well, providing visitors with a comprehensive look at the history of sports in Rome. Inductee plaques reveal the milestones and tribulations of 120 gifted Roman athletes that were talented enough to receive the honor of immortality in the Rome Sports Hall of Fame.

Rome's Jervis Public Library opened on July 15, 1895 in the donated homestead of prominent nineteenth century engineer, John

Bloomfield Jervis. The library's bylaws were drafted by Melville Dewey, the inventor of the famous Dewey Decimal System. Open seven days a week, Jervis Library is recognized as one of the most active in the Mid-York Library System, boasting 123,000 books along with a wide variety of magazines, newspapers, audio and video cassettes, DVDs, spoken word materials, computer software, and CD-ROMs, for total holdings of over 148,000 items. The library provides information, research resources, and education to an average of 800 people each day. In addition, Jervis Library sponsors numerous activities and events including adult lectures, author visits, book discussion series and programs for teens and children.

The Rome Art and Community Center (RACC) is a nonprofit multi-arts organization committed to fostering creativity, cultural awareness, and a

Not only does the Center boast lovely period architecture and sprawling grounds, it is also home to three art galleries, modern art studios, performance spaces, and a unique ArtHouse Café. RACC offers a wide variety of programming including creative art classes, children's events, music and theater performances, a film series, art exhibitions, a national poetry contest, community events, and much more.

The Rome YMCA has serviced the community for the past 135 years recently expanding its wings to offer additional locations throughout the greater tri-valley region. The facility offers a wide variety of programming for people of all ages including, aquatics, arts and humanities, child care, health and fitness, senior programs, sports, summer camp, teen programs and youth and family programs. The Rome YMCA has most recently been given recognition for their YMCA Center for the Creative Arts program (YCCA). The program educates students about the history of jazz and has created an award winning jazz ensemble and wind ensemble that continue to amaze their audiences. The YCCA that was modeled after the New Orleans Center for the Creative Arts has now become a model for YMCA's throughout the nation.





Rome Memorial Hospital

Rome Memorial Hospital began as a small "cottage" hospital in 1884 and served 19 patients during its first year of operation. Today, the newly expanded private community hospital cares for more than 6,000 patients a year in its 129 acute care beds and its skilled nursing facility is home to 80 residents. Quality care and critical services are offered by experienced professionals 24 hours a day. JCAHO – the nation's most respected healthcare accrediting body recently awarded Rome Memorial Hospital a score of 96 that puts them in the top 16% of hospitals in the nation.

Rome Memorial Hospital provides traditional hospital services including emergency, general medical/surgical, pediatric, obstetric, and intensive care. With more than \$25 million invested over the past ten years to improve the facility, Rome Memorial Hospital recently opened a new Energy Center followed by the new 10,500 square foot Emergency Department designed to offer a greater quality of care.

Education

HIGHER EDUCATION OPPORTUNITIES ABOUND IN THE MOHAWK VALLEY WHERE THERE ARE MORE COLLEGE STUDENTS PER CAPITA THAN IN ANY OTHER REGION IN THE NATION.

Several colleges and universities that offer exceptional educational opportunities lie within a two hour radius of Rome. A partnership between Empire Aero Center and Mohawk Valley Community College has created the unique and valuable Airframe & Powerplant program that offers hands on training at Griffiss Business and Technology Park. Students of the A&P program graduate as state-of-the-art technicians who are certified and ready to enter the workforce with companies like Empire Aero, the aircraft maintenance, repair and overhaul facility, located right at Griffiss Park.

K-12 EDUCATION

Numerous elementary schools service the area including eight elementary schools, one upper elementary school, one middle school, one high school and the New York State School for the Deaf. Rome Catholic School offers a private schooling option for K-12. Rome's new \$45 million public high school, Rome Free Academy, teaches the best of the past while tackling the educational challenges of future technology. Sports programs, Cyber Security, JROTC and CAP programs are just a few of the progressive learning opportunities Rome schools offer. HOME PROGRAM

The HOME program assists income eligible families to achieve the "American Dream" and own their own home. Applicants are eligible for up to \$25,000 in assistance to purchase or rehabilitate homes located within the City limits of Rome.

NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

The City of Rome offers loan assistance to income eligible homeowners for improvements that address code violations and weatherization. Depending on income, applicants may be eligible for up to \$20,000 in assistance. If residency is maintained for 7 years, the loan is forgiven.

SIDEWALK IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

The Sidewalk Improvement Program was initiated in 2002 to financially partner with property owners to correct deteriorated residential sidewalk conditions. The program is open to all properties classified as residential, whether owner-occupied or not. Under the program, property owners are reimbursed \$3.00 per square foot, up to a maximum of \$1000 for all mainline sidewalks and \$1500 for all corner properties.

RAMPS AND RAILS

The Ramps and Rails Program helps to meet the needs of people who have physical restrictions and are in need of an exterior ramp and/or adaptive railing at their home. The program is for Rome residents only and works to unite our local community in an effort to help individuals continue to be independent.

NEW CONSTRUCTION TAX EXEMPTION

In December 2004, the City of Rome and the State of New York signed a bill to offer tax exemptions for new construction. The new law, 485-i under the New York State Real Property Tax Law, provides a real property tax exemption on City taxes to property owners who construct and occupy new structures on their property after April 1, 2004. The exemption is equal to 50% of the increase in the assessed value of the property for the first year, decreased 5% per year for an additional 9 years.

Want to do Business in Rome?

COMMERCIAL FAÇADE PROGRAM

The City provides assistance to businesses and property owners in targeted business district areas for improvements to the exterior of their buildings. Depending on the location of the property, applicants could be eligible for up to \$25,000 in assistance.

ROME ENTREPRENEUR ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (REAP)

The focus of the REAP program is to assist new microenterprises (businesses with one to five employees, including the owner), with grant funding for start-up costs including: property acquisition or rent; advertising and/or marketing; preapproved site improvements; purchase of machinery and equipment; utilities; and business consulting, training and technical assistance. Microenterprises located along one of the City's downtown Main Streets Corridors are eligible to receive up to \$7,000 in potential funding. Businesses located outside the Corridors, but within City limits, may be eligible for \$3,000 in assistance. Applicants are required to submit a valid business plan and agree to provide a minimum 25% match in start-up project costs.

EMPIRE ZONES PROGRAM

The Empire Zones Program is a vital component of Governor Eliot Spitzer's effort to continue to revitalize and expand New York's economy. Empire Zones (formerly called Economic Development Zones) are geographically defined areas where businesses have access to vacant land, existing industrial and commercial infrastructure, a skilled workforce and abundant resources such as power and water supplies. The Empire Zones are particularly attractive in that they offer numerous tax incentives for qualifying businesses. Incentives include the following:




