RUGBY PATRONS SOCIETY

Patrons, ex-rugby players and enthusiasts, have been around since the very beginning of the game in East Africa in the 1900s. In a formal sense "The Patrons Society" was formed in 1953 with the formation of the RFUEA, when Patrons of the day contributed funds to enable the building of the Ngong Road Ground, the main stand and offices. Membership, currently totalling over 300, form a wide international network linking rugby clubs around the world, to the game in Kenya.

Support of rugby by Patrons is always unsung, largely unrecognized, and often anonymous. Over the years, there have been many ways in which the Society and Patrons individually have been able to help. Ranging from materials, funds, expertise and counsel; from referees, through mini-rugby, junior coaching, to irrigation and bricks and mortar; each has their place in the facilitation of the game.

Patrons organised the event for several years and continue to be involved in its organisation. The event has grown and now enjoys international acclaim. It is with considerable pride that Patrons congratulate KRU on maintaining the quality and spirit of the event, which has helped to project the national 7s team on its remarkably successful path to the frontline of world sevens which is evidenced in their current position of No.8 in the IRB standings.

Most recently working closely with KRU the new borehole was planned, drilled and largely funded by the patrons which included sponsorship for the provision of a pump for the borehole. 55 years later it is pleasing to see all the development and upgrading of the Ngong Road ground which will now have a greener and improved playing grounds with a reliable and independent water supply.

The Society has also turned its support towards the KRU's Age Grade Rugby Programme which involves children in the Under 10, 12, 14 and 16 age groups, drawn from four Nairobi clubs and the communities. A particular focus has been on the Community Rugby Association (CRA) for

under privileged children. CRA participate in KRU sponsored tournaments, and also run their own tournaments sponsored by Patrons. The Patrons received a major sponsorship from JW Seagon, independent insurance brokers, who provide personal and corporate life and health insurance products with both local knowledge and a wide heritage of business in Africa. Through the sponsorship from JW Seagon the Patrons have increased their support for age grade rugby development programmes.

Patrons have been successful through contacts and local sponsors to obtain a substantial amount of rugby kit from Ireland and a further consignment will soon be arriving here from Wales. It is hoped that the sourcing of kit can be considerably expanded as there is so much scope for extending this support to an enthusiastic youth who will be amongst our future internationals in both 7-a-side rugby and the wider game.

VETERANS THOUGHTS


My name is John Ojara better known as Ojay. I first played CLUB rugby in 1985 for Impala II. A a Veteran player of KCB and I've also played for Quins and Blak Blad when I was in college. Am currently the Secretary of KCB Rugby Club and a Citing Officer for the Union. I was asked to jolt down a few words on the Kenyan rugby scene, so here goes....

When I sit back and watch a local game I can't help but draw parallels with the "good old days' of rugby. I played when the standard rugby ball was, I believe, a size 8 piece of leather that was almost as round as a soccer ball and equally slippery especially on a wet day. But one thing still leaves me nostalgic for the old days when I draw comparisons and thats the reduced number of fans at league matches. Despite the sacrifice of sweat and blood that the Kenya 7's team has undergone to stir interest and recognition in the sport there still isn't the expected rise in fans at local league clashes. In the olden days a match at Mwamba's Railway club would have the main stands full and no inch to stand freely round the pitch. A machine match would have a sea of fans all round the pitch chanting all kinds of lyrics in the name of songs... and the list would go on as you toured the few but well attended rugby venues. The other day I went to watch a Chairman's Cup match at my club and deep into the 2nd half as I sat on the opposite side of the main stand all I could count in terms of fans was the club house manager, a grounds man and his noisy companion who was still cutting grass at the try box area. What's happened to our fan base? What I like most is that more and more oppourtunities are opening up in terms of courses to ensure that the technical benches at various clubs and match officials are up to date with the current standards. The game too has been made safer with the introduction of trained citing officers. More and more people are playing the game and we need the big guns in the corporate sector to show some added interest too. It's time to take rugby to a whole new level and 7's has baked the cake already... ladies and gentlemen, some icing please. I strongly believe

that Kenya will have a 15-a-side team in one of the 2 World Cups after the 2011 Rugby World Cup... it is written.

Since I was asked to talk about the veterans too I thought it right that I should mention this. In the old days a club with a physio was either a visiting team flown in for a marathon of local friendlies or one of the teams we saw on video tape (when we could secure a video deck). The standard "physio" was a bucket of water with a sponge in it placed off pitch at the centre line. When a play went down a sub or the coach would rush to the scene bucket in hand and proceed with dubbing the affected part with sponge and water... interesting enough it seemed to work for a whole range of injuries because the players got up shoke of the limbs and resumed playing. These day we have battalions of physios on the side line and ambulances stocked up well enough to perform brain surgery... but I guess thats progress.






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Kenya's IRB 7s World Series Campaigns

We will have to begin our review in December 2008 because the events of the opening two rounds of Kenya's 2008/2009 IRB Sevens World Series would impact heavily on what lay in store for the team. A strong performance at the season opening Dubai Sevens saw the Kenyans; notoriously slow starters in previous editions of the IRB Sevens World Series qualify for the main cup quarter finals, bowing out 5-21 to New Zealand before losing out to Samoa in the plate semi finals following a narrow 7-12 loss.

South Africa beat England 19-12 to win the Dubai title. The lads would then head out to George, South Africa for the second leg of the series. Their performances in George left a lot to be desired, losing out to Portugal and Samoa in their group matches before falling 14-19 to France in the bowl semis. South Africa won this tournament with a 12-7 win over New Zealand. Kenya failed to collect any points from the South African mission, meaning they would head into 2009 with six points, all collected in Dubai.

When the series resumed in February 2009, Kenya claimed the scalp of their continental rivals South Africa for the very first time, beating them 22-17 during the group stages of the Wellington Sevens in New Zealand. Favourable results saw Kenya make it to the Wellington Sevens main cup quarter finals where they beat Wales 10-7 in a tightly contested semi final before losing 0-26 to eventual tournament winners England. England beat hosts New Zealand 19-17 in a thrilling final.

As if the South African scalp was not enough, Kenya would turn in a heroic display a week later in San Diego, USA when they stunned New Zealand 24-7, topping the pool en route to a quarter final match up against hosts USA. This was Kenya's first win over the Kiwis in fourteen attempts. The US Eagles would beat Kenya 14-7, sending the Kenyans to the plate where they beat Samoa 17-12 in the semis before allowing New Zealand to gain ample revenge for the previous day's loss with a 22-7 win in the plate final. Argentina would win this title with a 19-14 win over England. Meanwhile, Kenya were quietly confident going into

the IRB Rugby World Cup Sevens in Dubai. And they did not disappoint! Qualifying second from pool C behind favourites England, Kenya had already created history by earning automatic qualification to the 2013 event courtesy of making the last eight. They went on to register that historic 26-7 win over Fiji, knocking out the Pacific islanders who were the reigning RWC Sevens champs. The physicality and hunger of the Kenvans left the Fijians, revered masters of the sevens code of rugby utterly baffled. If this was war, this would have been a crime against humanity! This result meant that the Melrose Cup would be headed to a new destination. Kenya perhaps? No! Argentina rained on the Kenyan parade, grinding out a 12-0 win over Kenya, setting up a most unlikely final with Wales. The Welsh would score a narrow 19-12 win that granted them the Melrose Cup and the RWC Sevens title.

When the IRB Sevens World Series resumed in Hong Kong, teams were wary of Kenya. Minnows West Indies restricted them to a 17-10 win. Kenya would win their remaining two pool matches, 31-7 against Scotland and 19-12 against the USA, finishing top of their pool F, setting up a quarter final tie against New Zealand. Kenya would again prevail over New Zealand, winning 10-7, a second successive win after fourteen straight losses to the Kiwis. Kenya's opponents in the semi final were Fiji, the team they had stunned at the RWC Sevens a few weeks back. The Fijians left nothing to chance, winning this one 26-7 before winning the 2009 Hong Kong title with a 26-24 win over South Africa.

Next stop was Adelaide, Australia, the sixth leg of the series. Kenya, South Africa, Cook Islands and Japan made up pool D. Kenya had yet to beat South Africa in the series but all that would change when they claimed a famous 15-14 win, only their second ever over their continental rivals. More importantly, Kenya had finally claimed all the big scalps. Two more pool D wins over Japan and the Cook Islands saw Kenya top the pool, setting up a quarter final date with Wales whom they easily dispatched 33-14. When Kenya played Argentina in the semi final, this was a repeat of the RWC Sevens semis. Kenya prevailed 17-5, making to their first ever IRB Sevens World Series main cup final. Their opponents in the title decider were a certain South African side that they had vanguished a day earlier. Many Kenyans dared to dream but the South Africans, keen to avoid a second successive loss to Kenya were all businesslike; their ruthless efficiency earned them a 26-7 win that saw them win the Adelaide Sevens.

Sometimes you do your best but lady luck deserts you. That was the story of Kenya's London campaign. London was the seventh leg of the series and Kenya failed to make the main cup quarters in London because of an inferior points difference despite a three way tie on points with Fiji and Scotland. Relegated to the bowl, Humphrey Kayange's charges conquered all before them, winning the bowl title with a 12-7 win over Wales. England would win this tournament with a 31-26 win over New Zealand.

The curtains fell on the 2008/2009 IRB Sevens

World Series in Scotland where Kenya topped pool C before losing out 7-19 to Wales in the main cup quarters. New Zealand would knock them out of the bowl courtesy of that 26-21 win while Fiji beat South Africa 20-19 to claim the Scotland leg. South Africa would be crowned 2008/2009 IRB Sevens World Series champions while Kenya finished sixth overall, their highest ever position. They accumulated 68 points. Adding more icing to the cake was ex-Vihiga High School student Collins Injera who emerged top try scorer at the end of the 2008/2009 season with 42 tries. He was also nominated alongside his elder brother and skipper Humphrey Kayange for the IRB Sevens World Series player of the year. A great year for Kenya Sevens!

Kenya would crown this successful season by retaining their home tournament, the Safari Sevens when they beat South Africa's Emerging Springboks 40-19 at the RFUEA Grounds in Nairobi in June.


Re-Cap of the Local 7s Circuit







When the 2009 Western Union National Sevens Circuit kicked off in Kisumu, many wondered how it would turn out to be, especially after players called up to the Kenya Sevens squad were withdrawn. Would the NSC's quality be watered down? Which teams would be dominant? Would the event be worth watching? Well, speaking with the benefit of hindsight, the 2009 Western Union National Sevens Circuit was a memorable one. There was plenty of talent that was unearthed during the five week event, there was drama right up to the last day when the overall title was decided and there was an unprecedented shift in power.





Mitch "Mojojo" Ocholla's Strathmore Leos would have different ideas. The varsity lads had been quietly going about their own business, making the semi finals in Kisumu and Nairobi before staging a come from behind 21-14 win over Quins in the Prinsloo Sevens final in Nakuru, a result that gave Quins leadership of the NSC but more importantly threw the circuit wide open. The Leos recorded a second win in Nairobi during the Kabeberi Sevens where they beat KCB 10-5 to win the event. When the teams converged in Mombasa on Jamhuri Day weekend, there was all to play for. Strathmore and Quins were tied on points, Strath just leading because of a better overall record. They would inevitably meet in the title match in Mombasa, the Leos running off 17-10 winners, claiming the 2009 Western Union National Sevens Circuit overall title. That was Kenya's international and local sevens rugby in 2009.

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Sevens rugby has over the years been an important tool in the development of rugby in Kenya. The profile of the game has increased tremendously owing to the success of the Kenya 7s teams both locally and abroad. It is a fact that rugby is most expansive at the high school level in Kenya. It has slowly become every young man's dream to play sevens rugby for school, club and country in that order.

Having realized the popularity rugby now enjoys among Kenyan youth, the Kenya Rugby Union has now focused effort, time and resources to further grow the sport by targeting children and girls. Age Grade Rugby as it is now commonly referred to ensures children and girls new to the game are safely and gradually introduced to the game of rugby through playing non contact forms of rugby that emphasized enjoyment and participation.

Boys and girls are introduced to the game in the formal setting (primary school) at the age of 9 years thanks to the partnership between the Kenya rugby Union and the Ministry of Education. The talented and interested players from these schools are then asked to join clubs that then offer more specialized coaching to the youngsters whilst at the same time ensure their retention in the game of rugby.

Primary schools rugby culminates at age 14 after the players sit their final exams and move on to join high school where many have over the years been known to pioneer the game if and when they join schools that do not offer rugby as a sport. In recognition of the strides made to develop rugby at the primary school level, the Safaricom 7s will have an under 14s category to showcase the talents at this age.

Having had a Kenya National women's team over the last few years, the challenge has been to keep this fire burning. KRU realized that the most potent method would be to have girls play rugby at high school level and thus introduced the game only last year. Focus was in Nairobi but success of the program is evident from the fact that 3 provinces are now actively involved in the girls' game where boys' tournaments always have girls' teams participating alongside. Nairobi, Western and Rift valley have pioneered the girls' game with distinctions. Now Coast and Nyanza are showing interest. Just like the boys, it is no surprise that western province has dominated the girls high school scene with Mukumu and Butere girls in a class of their own during the national sevens in April this year. Whether the status quo remains will be seen during the 2010 Safaricom 7s where 12 girls high schools have been invited to participate alongside boys. The development of Kenyan Rugby most definitely owes a lot to the Rugby Sevens.

It is with deep sorrow that we learnt the passing on of Joshua Musau Gathumbi who turned 23 on 12th March, played for Kenya Cup side Impala RFC and featured for Nguvu Sharks in the Bamburi Rugby Super Series.

His love affair with rugby started at Mang'u High School where he quickly made a name for himself as a utility back, comfortable in a number of positions. He would continue with rugby at Strathmore University, helping them to the 2007 Eric Shirley Shield title, a victory that saw them gain promotion to the first division Kenya Cup in 2008. In 2009 he moved to Impala RFC winning the treble (Impala Floodlit, Kenya Cup and the Supremacy titles) that year. He had a great season in 2010, a season that saw his side finish third in the Kenya Cup. Joshua has also been part of the Kenya Sevens squad.

His last contribution to Kenyan rugby was that stunning try in his side's 20-30 loss to the SDV Transami Cheetahs on Saturday 8th May 2010. Knowing Rojo and true to his character, we can clearly hear his voice saying;

Don't grieve for me, for now I'm free I'm following the path God laid for me I took His hand when I heard Him call I turned my back and left it all.

I could not stay another day, to laugh, to love, to work or play.

Tasks undone must stay that way

I've found that peace at the close of the day. If parting has left a void, then fill it with remembered joy. A friendship shared, a laugh, a kiss,

Ah, yes, these things I too will miss.

Be not burdened with times of sorrow


TANZANIA
