THE FARM SYSTEM

The strength of the Tiger farm system was spotlighted again in 1968 as the two top links of the chain finished their seasons with flying colors.

Toledo was the pennant winner in the Class AAA International League, following a Governor's Cup triumph in the previous season. Manager Jack Tighe was acclaimed "Manager of the Year" in the International League for the second straight year and General Manager Charles Senger was named the circuit's top executive on the strength of the Mud Hens' success.

Montgomery, with Frank Carswell at the helm, finished second for the second straight year in the Class AA Southern League.

Both Tighe and Carswell will be back at their posts in 1969, with Stubby Overmire also returning to Toledo as pitching coach. It will be the third year for both Tighe and Carswell in their managerial assignments at Toledo and Montgomery.

Al Federoff again will handle the reins at Rocky Mount of the Carolina League, with Len Okrie returning to Lakeland of the Florida State League and Bob Dustal assigned to Batavia, where he was a rookie pilot in the New York-Pennsylvania League in 1968. Bill LaJoie, a new addition to the staff, will handle Bristol, Va., of the Appalachian League, which is replacing Sarasota of the Gulf Coast League as the Tigers' rookie league affiliate.

SPRING TRAINING

The Tigers have trained at Lakeland since 1934, first at Henley Field and since 1966 at Marchant Stadium, a mile north. The all-concrete grandstand at Marchant Stadium was built by the City of Lakeland at a cost of more than \$350,000 and is situated on a 12-acre tract adjacent to Tigertown, which has been the Tigers' minor league training site since 1953.

It is slightly east of Lakeland Hills Boulevard, one of Lakeland's principal north-south arteries and a short driving distance from the trans-Florida highway, Interstate No. 4.

Dimensions approximate the Tiger Stadium field area in Detroit, drainage is excellent and the turf is considered the finest in Florida.

The new grandstand seats 4,025, including 400 box seats. The clubhouse, costing \$48,000, accommodates up to 50 players in each club section with added quarters for umpires. The pressbox, 104 feet long, has spacious quarters for writers and broadcasters, plus a photographers' deck.

TIGER STADIUM

The capacity of Tiger Stadium is 54,220 seats. Official figures list 10,335 box seats; 21,172 reserved; 11,502 unreserved grandstand; and 11,211 bleacher seats.

Baseball has been played at the site since 1900, a year before the American League was born with the Tigers as a charter member. Known as Bennett Park at the time, it became Navin Field in 1912, Briggs Stadium in 1938 and Tiger Stadium Jan. 1, 1961.

The playing field and stands at Tiger Stadium are considered among the finest in baseball. Facilities for players, fans, press, television and radio personnel are excellent and improved whenever possible. Although occupied frequently by more than 50,000 fans, it can be emptied in less than 10 minutes.

More than 10,000 square yards of sod are needed annually to repair the wear and tear of both baseball and football on the playing area. Sprinkling and drainage facilities are among the best and the latest-type field cover can be placed in less than a minute.

STADIUM FACTS

CAPACITY — 54,220 (Attendance records on Page 10).

AREA — Stadium grounds and parking lot cover 8½ acres. Playing field occupies approximately half of total area.

LIGHTING — Eight towers, 1,428 lamps of 1,500 watts each. Installed in 1948.

DUGOUTS — Connected with clubhouses by tunnels, visitors on first base side, home club on third base side. Depressed, dugout-type bullpens new in 1963. John Hand is chief clubhouse attendant and equipment manager.

CONCESSIONS — Operated by Detroit Sportservice, Inc.

FENCES—Left field, 340 feet from plate; left-center, 365; center field, 440; right-center, 370; right field, 325. All fences uniformly nine feet high.

HEIGHTS — From ground to facing of upper deck, 34 feet; ground to first tier of third deck pressbox, 82 feet; ground to roof of third deck pressbox level, 94 feet; ground to top of light towers, 155 feet. Flag pole in center field is 125 feet.

Foul poles are outside of playing field.

Batted ball striking facing or any part of upper stands on fair territory and bounding back on field: home run.

Fly ball striking lights underneath upper stands from right field to center field on fair territory and bounding back on field: home run.

Ball striking flag pole above base and bounding into stands: home run.

Ball striking base of flag pole and bounding into stands: two bases.

Fair bounding ball going onto roof of either bullpen dugout: two bases.

Ball going through or sticking in screen on fair ground: two bases.

Pitched ball sticking or remaining on back stop screen: one base.

Thrown ball: two bases.

Fly ball going over wire fence of space covering canvas in center field: home run.

Fly ball striking protective fence which protrudes into stands in left and right field: home run.

MVP VOTES FOR TIGERS

Seven Tigers received votes in the 1968 American League Most Valuable Player balloting, including 39 of 40 votes on the first two rounds. Denny McLain was the first pitcher to win the award unanimously, while Bill Freehan received 15 second-round votes and Willie Horton and Dick McAuliffe two each. Tigers receiving votes, with positions and points: Denny McLain 1st (280), Bill Freehan 2nd (161), Willie Horton 4th (102), Dick McAuliffe 7th (71), Jim Northrup 13th (15), Norm Cash 23rd (3), Mickey Stanley 25th (2).

McLain also was unanimous choice of 20 writers in the Cy Young award voting for outstanding pitcher of the American League, the third unanimous pick in the history of the award. Only one other Tiger pitcher ever drew any Cy Young votes, Frank Lary in 1961.
