

Hartford hosts the District #7 Spring Conference

On April 9th, 2011 Yankee District 7 held its Spring Conference hosted by the Nathan Hale Chapter #58 at the Wethersfield, CT Lodge Room. Seven AHEPA and five Daughters of Penelope Chapters with 78 attendees met with a continental breakfast/registration period which started at 9 am. At 10 am, a joint AHEPA/DOP session was opened by District Governors Emmanuel Moshovos and Loukia Kazakos by introducing their lodges.

PGP Joanne Hologgitas explained the current status of the District Foundation Scholarship program that the current applications were made available. The same se-

lection process will be used for this year's awards.

PDG *Nick Nikas* presented the results of last year's Hellenic History Trophy Tournament held in New Haven explaining via power-point presentation the costs and the winners. He next presented the fall plans for the 2011 tournament outlining the expansion of the HHT to include nearby districts.

PSG George Anagnostos representing AHEPA National Housing Corporation gave brief remarks about the ANHC program for FY-2010 and its plans for the future. He mentioned that since HUD is only providing 2200 units of housing, ANHC is pursuing new pro-

grams: tax credits, nonprofit bonds and out-right purchases of existing elderly properties and managing non-AHEPA properties also. Brother Anagnostos as chairman/host of the Tri-District Convention gave a narrative of what would be expected at the convention being held in Newport RI on May 20-22.

This year the registration includes hotel and food during the stay. A special dutch-treat dinner theatre is planned for Friday evening's entertainment. Meetings will be held for District 7, 8, 9 on Saturday in separate meeting rooms. On Saturday evening a banquet and dancing will be held with all functions being held at the Mainstay Hotel across from the Grand Casino.

During the next hour, the AHEPA and DOP groups entered into separate meetings. With the AHEPA, *Emmanuel Moshovos*, DG presented his outline on visitations and what he expected to accomplish until the end of year with programs he felt were important to the District.

Brother *Jack Isaac*, Lt. Governor made his presentation as to special workshops that he attended gathering information about officers duties. He mentioned that he hoped that District 7 would follow up by

having similar training programs in the fall. He also stressed the recruitment for new members that every chapter should have a progressive program.

Last to speak was Supreme Vice President John Grossomanides who offered greetings from the Supreme President Nick Karacostas. He encouraged all to attend the New England Regional Tri-District Convention and spoke of the accomplishments of District 7's growth in the past year having one of the largest percentage of increases in the AHEPA domain. Brother John advised us that he is running for the office of Supreme President at the Miami Convention in July and hoped that District 7 would have all the possible delegates in attendance.

Following the close of both sessions, a luncheon was offered by the Hartford AHEPA Family. Harry Fanos—Stamford Chapter #99 News

Two Brothers from the Stamford chapter rose to prominence recently.

Nikiforos Mathews, Archon Ekdikos in the Order of St Andrew, was appointed Regional Commander for District One. He will be responsible for coordinating the participation of Archons in this District, which is comprised of CT, Westchester and New York City. "We are looking forward to working with Nikiforos as we seek to advance our religious freedom mission on behalf of the Ecumenical Patriarchate in New York," stated National Commander Anthony J. Limberakis, MD. Nikiforos was recognized last year as AHEPAN of the year in AHEPA District #7 for his work in getting the legislators of CT to sign a letter of protest regarding the treatment of the Patriarch to the Turkish Ambassador in Washington, DC.



Archon Mathews, who is of Imvrian background, is married with two children. He is a member of the community and parish council of the Annunciation in Stamford, Connecticut, where his father, Fr. Constantine Mathews, serves as the parish priest. Archon Mathews practices as a finance attorney in Orrick Herrington & Sutcliffe LLP's New York office and once

served as a law clerk to the Hon. Archon Nicholas Tsoucalas in the United States Court of International Trade. From 1999 to 2007, Archon Mathews held a commission as a Captain in the United States Army Reserve, where he was qualified to practice as a Judge Advocate. A veteran of both Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom, he served as an Operational and Administrative Law attorney in Kuwait, Iraq and Afghanistan. Among other honors, Archon Mathews was awarded the Meritorious Service Medal in connection with his military service.

Demetrios Frazis, another Stamford AHEPAN, became a member of the Stamford Board of Representatives. As was reported in the Stamford Patch, "Demetrios Frazis was also appointed by the Board to fill the seat vacated by Michael Molgano ... "My belief is

that whatever my constituents dictate, I will be their instrument to carry it out," he told Patch. "That's my goal."" The Board of Representatives is made up of forty (unpaid) elected volunteers.

There are twenty districts, and each district elects two representatives every four years, concurrent with the Mayor's term. The Board of Representatives has the following powers, among others: Enact ordinances for the government of the city, Adopt the submitted capital and operating budgets of the City. Frazis joined two committees: (1) the State and Commerce Committee, which has primary responsibility for monitoring State of Connecticut legislative and other activities and acts as liaison to elected State officials; and (2) the Operations Committee, which deals with the public works functions in the City of Stamford.

In addition,

The Stamford chapter of AHEPA presented Aphrodite Daniel, Panos Chrysovergis and the Synphonia Band in a fun evening of unforgettable Greek tunes on Saturday, May 7, 2011 at the hall of the Annunciation Greek Orthodox Church, Stamford, CT. The entrance fee of \$40 per person included appetizers and wine. The doors opened at 6:30pm and the musical program started at 7:30pm. The Synphonia group impressed all comers with their professionalism and perfect execution. Many people told us this was the best Greek music group they have heard in a long time. The first half was more like a concert, while the second half got everyone excited to join the fun on the dance floor. Young and old danced together in harmony. It was a sight to behold... Sister Olympia Soteriou is enjoying the sunshine in Florida and Sister Mary Petrus will be visiting her soon.



Greek Independence Day

In America, each year on March 25, many Hellenes, and Philhellenes make a yearly pilgrimage to our local Town Halls and State houses to celebrate Greek Independence Day. We bring our children dressed in colorful Hellenic uniforms, all of us proud hearing our children and grandchildren reciting patriotic poems in our mother tongue. There is always an aura that makes us proud of our heritage and happy that we are there to declare its preservation. Our children being there is a testament that our ancient culture, the culture of our forefathers, The Hellenes and the foundation of Western Civilization is alive and well.

As we listen to our Hellenic American community, spiritual and political leaders praising the Hellenes and Hellene Americans, we are proud, and in connected in spirit with those who made it possible for us today to live in this great De-

mocratic Nation. As we listened in the Providence State House, in a room whose architecture symbolizes values that are



deeply Hellenic, we feel that we have not been assimilated to foreign values, but rather America simply adopted our, and thus being American and being a Hellene is harmonious and one. It is frightening to think what kind of life we would have been living today had it not been for the fact that the brave Hellenes loved their Liberty(Eleutheria) so much that they were willing to accept death not only for themselves, but also their family's rather than be enslaved. As the said, better 1 hour of freedom than forty years of slavery.

Those of us who have an interest in our history know Love of Liberty is not something that started with the Greek War of Independence nor uniquely Hellenic. For God's creatures have the instinct to be free, and all of humanity yearns for freedom. However History has documented the struggle of the Hellenes to preserve and regain their freedom for thousands of years and at against incredible odds.

Perhaps it is because The Hellenic culture is one that spans of many millenniums; it is a living history that never becomes stale or irrelevant. The economic pressure and at times psychological and physical abuse did not break them, with much of what their civilization prized in ruins or used by foreigners for their vanity, they yearned for the day to be free. In such an environment they important to them, a sense of who they were. They refused to be assimilated by those they considered Barbari. Hellas was not recognizable by the end of the four centuries of rule by the Ottomans, many Hellenes living abroad and supported the liberation of their patrida, were actually afraid to go back because they knew their heart would be broken.

The destiny of Hellas has always been one of periods of glory followed by sorrow and pain; there were periods of learning and great contributions to humanity to a level that is way beyond the expectation of such a small population living in a land that made it hard to

create wealth. Every so often catastrophe strikes and it has been part of Hellas. Today Hellas is again facing difficult times.


Today it is not necesquered by others using arms and the hiring of mercenaries such as the General Ibrahim of Egypt who was hired by the Otto-

man Sultan to devastate Hellas and sell its children to slavery, as he did during the War of Independence by capturing thousands of girls form Peloponnesus and selling them as slaves. Nations today can be conquered economically, their assets can then be sold and the best and brightest of the youth can be forced economically to leave because their homeland cannot provide them the freedom to achieve their dreams.

Many in our country do not understand exactly what is happening today in Hellas. Others believe they deserve their fate and unless the amartia has been revenged that the people of Hellas have no right to hope for a resolution to this modern day tragedy that has trapped them, and risks that which is most prized, Eleutheria, Independence. We must stop blaming all Hellenes, and they themselves were victims. The fall of the Soviet Union, The EU, Globalization, and politicians willing to give the people things that they yearned for while people in other countries already had for decades put them in a trap that they only now recognize. As Christians we must have compassion, and do everything possible

such that we avoid another Greek tragedy. Let's not forget that when a nation has serious economic issues, it can sustain a foreign pol

icy, and defense infrastructure. Although Hellas is working on having good relations with its neighbors, the neighborhood still has many who wish demise for Hellas.

In Memoriam

Brother George P. Harlamon, 92, former mayor of the city of Waterbury, passed away on Saturday, May 14, 2011, at Waterbury Hospital surrounded by his loving family. He was the husband of Katherine (Konstant) Harlamon.

Mayor Harlamon was born Feb. 5, 1919, in Waterbury, son of the late Peter and Agnes (Hanzakos) Harlamon. He was a veteran of the United States Army, having served proudly during World War II with the 29th Engineers in the Pacific Theater. He graduated from Fordham University in New York with high honors and was inducted into the national honor society for business and finance, Beta Gamma Sigma. He then went on to receive his MBA from the University of Connecticut.

Mayor Harlamon was a registered Republican and served on the Waterbury Finance Board, the Board of Public Works and the Board of Alderman, where he served as president. He served as president of the Board of Park Commissioners and chairman of the Waterbury Town Committee.

As mayor of the city of Waterbury from 1968 to 1969, he introduced the middle school concept and curricula and initiated the construction of the East End Complex, later named the Bergin Complex, which was followed by the North End Complex and West Side Middle School. Perhaps the most pivotal moment of his tenure was the summer of 1968, when the city of Waterbury was in the midst of extreme rioting. Mayor Harlamon was instrumental in negotiating peaceful dialogue that put an end to the unrest in the city without a single fatality.

Mayor Harlamon was the comptroller of the Waterbury National Bank and retired as financial analyst from the Waterbury Hospital in 1985. He also served as adjunct professor of Accounting and Federal Tax at Post College and Mattatuck Community College for 18 years.

Mayor Harlamon was a member of the board of directors for the Mattatuck Museum, the Waterbury Symphony, the American Red Cross, the Exchange Club, the YMCA and the Child Guidance Center. He was an active member of the Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church in Waterbury where he served on the Parish Council for over 27 years as president and treasurer and was a

member of the A.H.E.P.A.

Besides his wife, Katherine, of 62 years, Mayor Harlamon leaves two sons, Peter Harlamon and his wife, Saranya, and Jay Harlamon, all of Waterbury; a grandson, George Harlamon; a granddaughter, Katherine Harlamon; and several nieces and nephews. He was predeceased by five sisters.

Brother Angelus "Ange," E. Papageorge, age 83, the beloved husband of Bess Spilios Papageorge of Fairfield, CT, passed away on June 10, 2011.

Ange was born in Fairfield on May 25, 1928 to the late Elias and Fanny Papageorge, he attended Roger Ludlowe High School and was a World War II U.S. Army veteran. He was a lifelong Fairfield resident and also was a volunteer fireman for the town for over 50 years. Ange was an active parishioner of the Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church in Bridgeport, CT and a member of the AHEPA Chapter #62.




