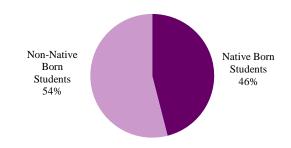


Neighborhoods in Queens

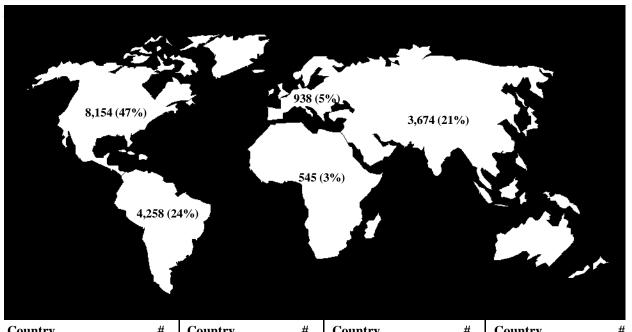

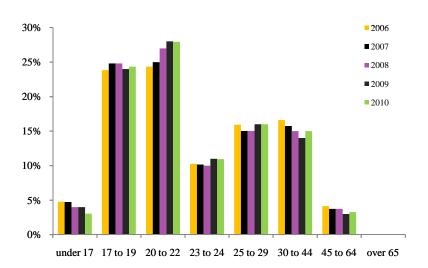

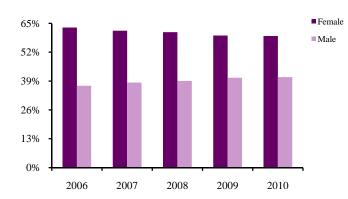
Age Fall 2006 to Fall 2010

There is a wide range of ages in the credit-student population. The trend in recent years has been toward younger students -- about fifty-two percent of students were traditional college age in 2010 (between 17 and 22), and about three percent were younger. Nevertheless, about a quarter were well into their twenties, and another eighteen percent were 30 and over. The median age in Fall 2010 was 22, the same as in the last 10 years.

Women predominate at LaGuardia, as at most other community colleges. In Fall 2010, the proportion of women in the student body fell only slightly, but for the fifth year in a row to fifty-nine percent, five percentage points below the 2005 high. Among the different ethnic groups, however, the proportions of women and men vary substantially. Asian and Native American students are the closest to being equal in gender distribution, while Black, Non-Hispanic students have the highest proportion of women.

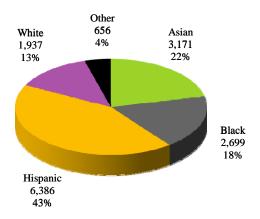

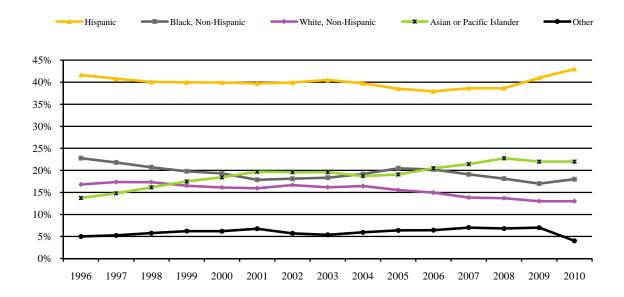
Race and Ethnic Background

Over the past fifteen years, the proportion of Asian students has increased eight percentage points, while the proportions of Black and White students have fallen five and four percentage points, respectively.* The largest ethnic group continues to be Hispanics, who make up more than two-fifth of the student body.



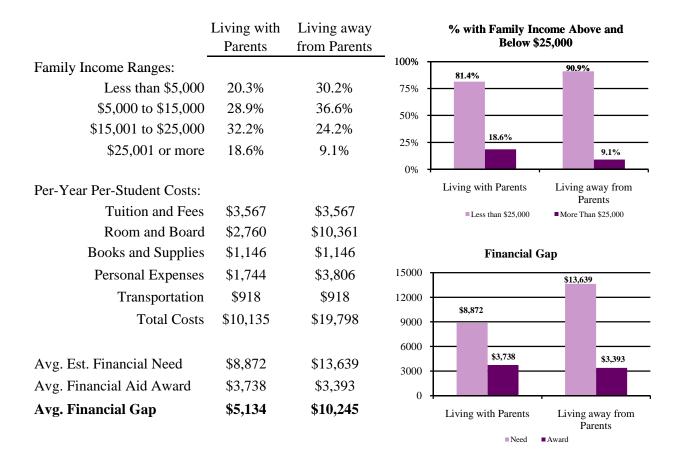

Financial Resources

2010-2011

Fifty-two percent of annual degree students (10,085 out of 19,286) were awarded some form of financial aid in 2010-11, forty-two percent of whom lived independently of their parents. Among full time students, fifty-nine percent (7,797 out of 13,170) were awarded financial aid. Awards are determined by financial need. Need is computed by subtracting a federally determined proportion of the student's or his/her family's financial resources from the total cost of attendance. The gap between award and need averaged \$5,134 for those living with parents and \$10,245 for those living away from parents. Students fund this gap by drawing on their family's resources in excess of the federal formula and by borrowing. Eighty-one percent of LaGuardia aided dependent student families earned less than \$25,000. Because of state and federal aid formulas, the financial gap for independent students was more than twice as large as that of dependent students.

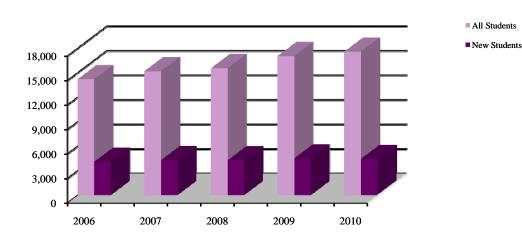
By way of contrast, at private institutions charging \$17,990 to \$24,340 in tuition, dependent students from families earning less than \$32,500 received grants averaging \$13,790*. If faced with this level of tuition and grant aid, dependent LaGuardia students' gap would jump from \$3,863 to \$13,600. LaGuardia students enroll with much less financial sacrifice than similar students at private colleges.

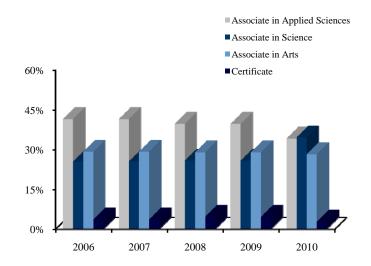


Credit enrollment at LaGuardia increased in 2010 to 17,569, an increase of three percent from 2008, and twenty-four percent since 2006. The proportion of new credit students has dropped four percentage points since Fall 2006, indicating a slight increase in retention and in the number of returning students.

by Degree Type Fall 2006 to Fall 2010

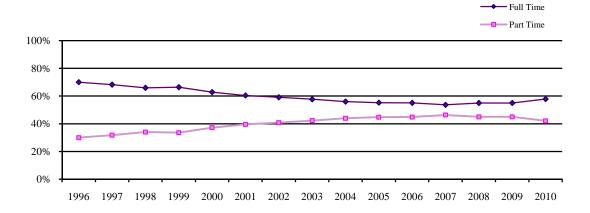
Over the past five years, the proportion of students enrolled in occupational degree programs, the Associate in Applied Sciences, has fallen seven percentage points, while the proportion of Associate in Science has increased nine percentage points. The proportions of students in Associate in Arts, Certificate, and Non-Degree programs fell slightly.

Fall 1996 to Fall 2010

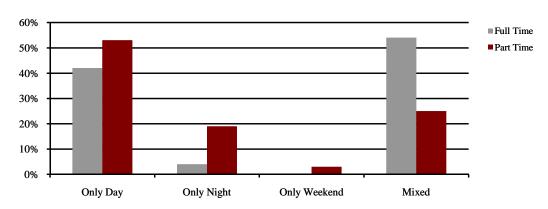

Night courses are those that begin after 5:45 PM on weekdays. If a student had no weekday courses beginning after 5:45 PM and no weekend courses, that student was counted in the "Only Day" course schedule group. Likewise, if a student had no courses that began before 5:45 PM and no weekend courses, that student was counted in the "Only Night" course schedule group. Students with mixed schedules, that is, some day courses, some night courses, and perhaps even a weekend course, were put in the "Mixed" schedule category. Forty-six percent of LaGuardia students take only day courses, while forty-two percent of LaGuardia students have some day and some night courses. Compared to Fall 2009, full-time students taking only day courses dropped by nine percentage points.

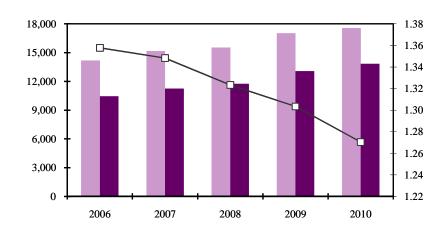

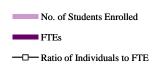

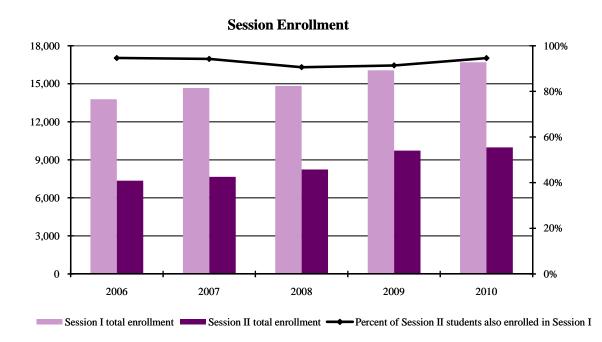

by Session Fall 2006 to Fall 2010

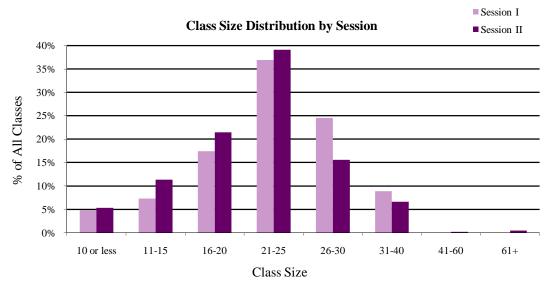

LaGuardia offers classes on a two-semester basis, fall and spring, each year with each semester divided into two sessions, I and II. The four annual sessions run consecutively and do not overlap. Each Session I lasts twelve weeks, while each Session II lasts six. The weekly schedule of Session II can thus be more intensive for a similar credit load. Many students take a full semester load spread over Session I and Session II. The semester/session calendar allows students more flexibility in scheduling with four possible start dates. The possibility of spreading a semester's load over 18 weeks also allows students to schedule class and work time more efficiently. Session II's enrollment tends to be slightly more than half the enrollment of session I. In Fall 2010, 95% of the students in Session II came directly from enrolling in Session I.

The average class in Session I of Fall 2010 enrolled 22.8 students, while the average class in Session II enrolled 21.7. By comparison, the average class size in 2009 was 23.6 students in session I, and 20.7 students in session II. In four years the average session I class size has dropped approximately three students since Fall 2006.

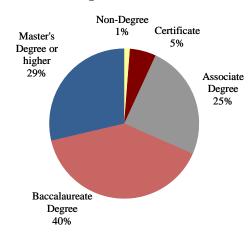

LaGuardia students have high educational goals. Only twenty-five percent of the Fall 2010 entering students who were surveyed planned to stop at an Associate's degree, while sixty-eight percent planned to acquire higher degrees.

In Fall 2010, seventy-six percent of students had clear expectations of graduating from LaGuardia.

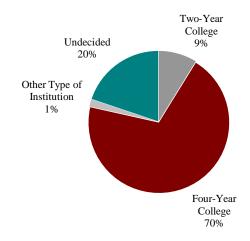
More than two-thirds of the students with transfer plans said they expected to transfer to a 4-year college, while nearly one-fourth were undecided.

Transfer Plans

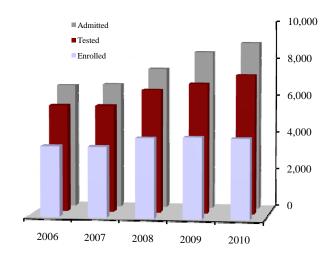

Degree-Seeking Students Fall 2006 to Fall 2010

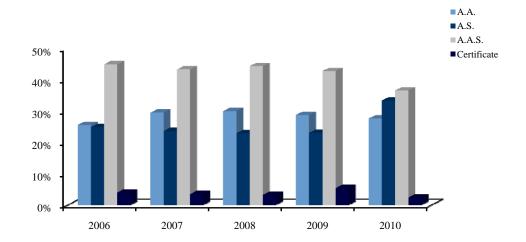
Most of the students who are admitted to LaGuardia are required to take assessment tests in basic reading, writing, and math. Not all students who are admitted or tested go on to enroll. Compared to Fall 2009, total students admitted increased six percent, while the total new students enrolled decreased by nearly one percent.

New Credit Students by Degree Type Fall 2006 to Fall 2010



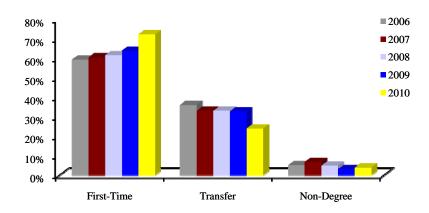
In Fall 2010, the proportion of students enrolled in Associate in Sciences (A.S.) programs rose ten percentage points compared to the previous year. by First-Time, Transfer, and Non-Degree Status Fall 2006 to Fall 2010

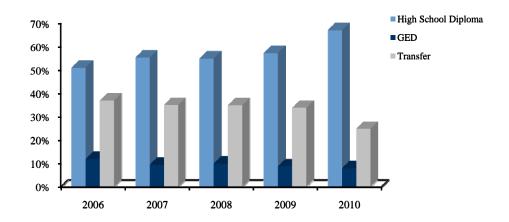

GED*, High School Diploma or Previous College Attendee (Transfer) Degree-Seeking Students, Fall 2006 to Fall 2010



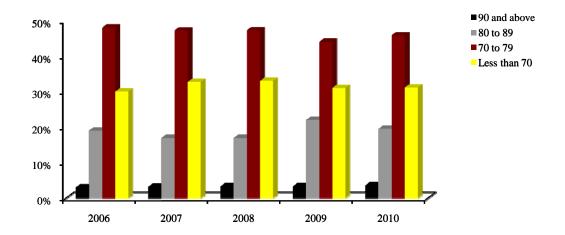

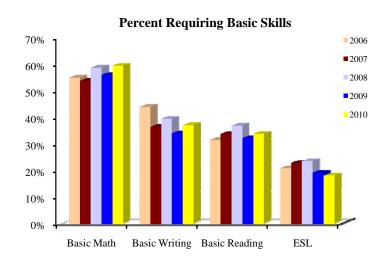

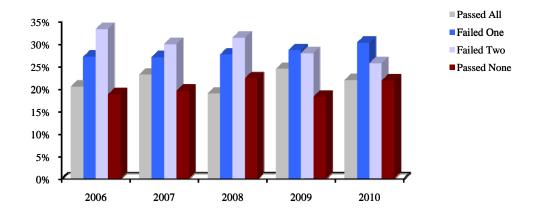

Degrees Awarded Five-Year Trend



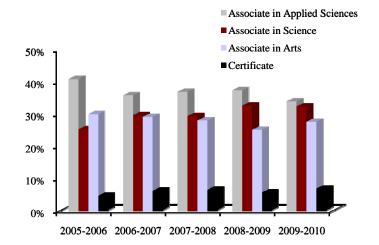

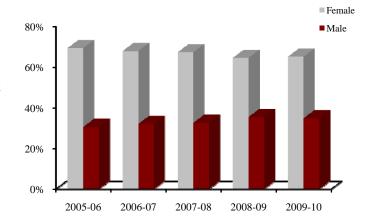

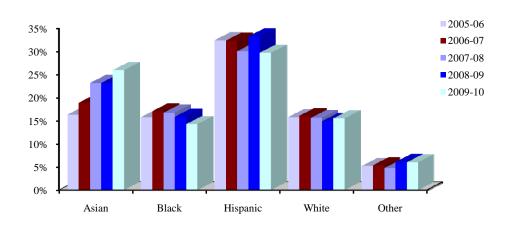
Degrees Awarded by Gender Five-Year Trend

Women make up sixty-five percent of graduates but only fifty-nine percent of enrollments. This gender gap has become smaller during the past five years.

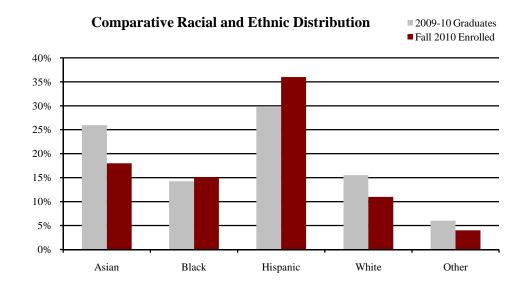

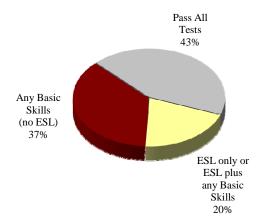
Degrees Awarded by Race and Ethnic Origin

Degrees Awarded by Entering Basic Skills Status Five-Year Trend

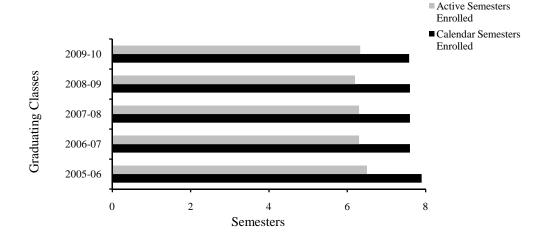

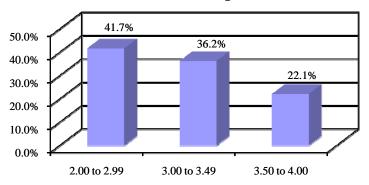

GPAs of Graduates

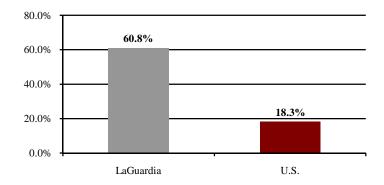
Average GPA Ranges of Graduates 2005-06 through 2009-10

Baccalaureate Transfer Rate of Graduates

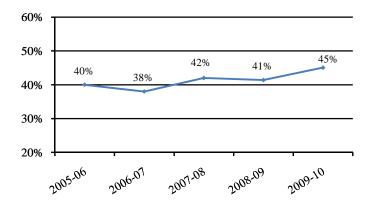
Percentage of Transfers to Baccalaureate Colleges Among Fall 2003 Full-Time Freshmen Who Graduated Within Six Years

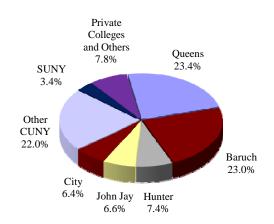
Five Year Trend of One-Year Transfer Rates

Destinations of Graduates

One year after graduation, forty-five percent of the 2009-2010 graduating class had transferred to four-year colleges. Most graduates who continued their education remained within the City University of New York system (eighty-nine percent). 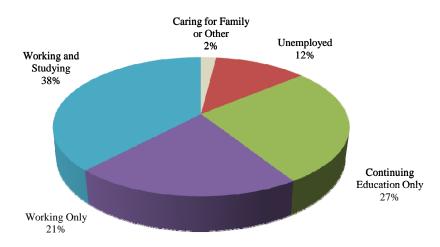

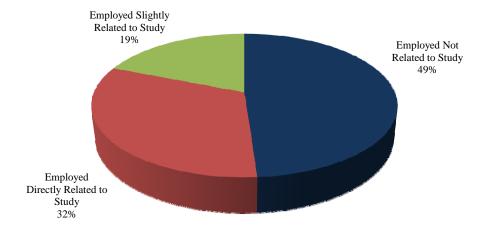
Post-Graduation Primary Activity

Six-months after graduation, eighty-six percent of the 2009-10 graduates surveyed were either working, continuing their education, or both. Fifty-one percent of those employed alumni reported that their jobs related to their studies. Compared with the previous year, the number of immediate graduates who were unemployed increased four percentage points, while the number who continued their education without working increased five percentage points. The economy may have had an impact on our recent graduates.

Activities Six Months After Graduation

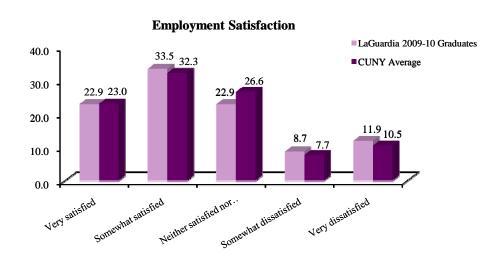


Employment Relationship to Studies

Post-Graduation Employment Satisfaction and Starting Salary

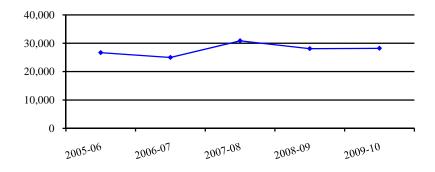

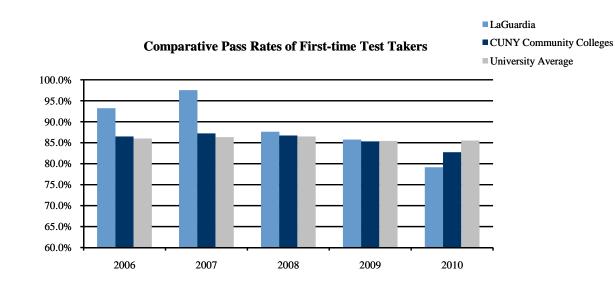

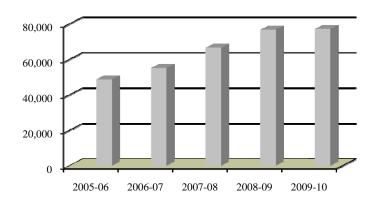

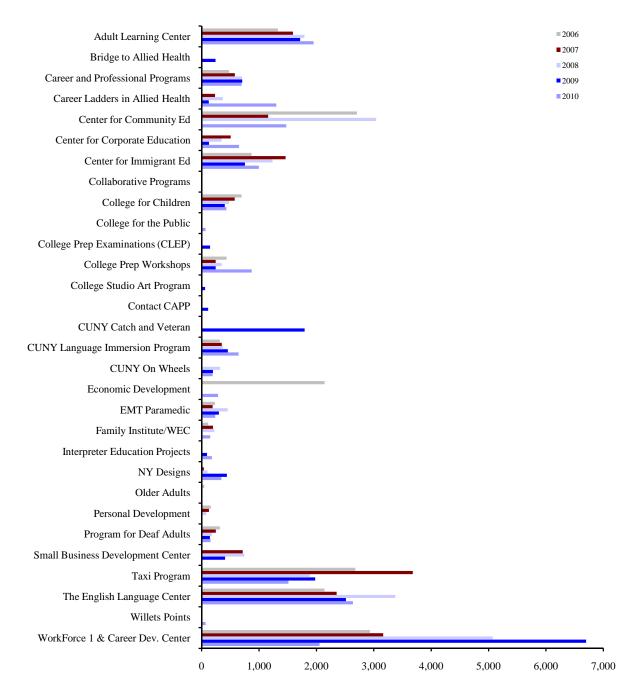

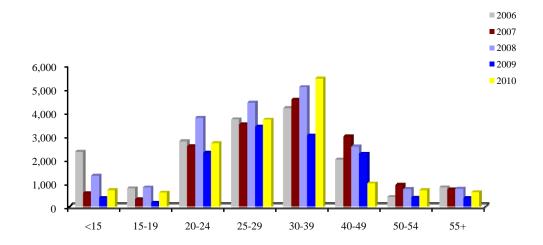
by Program Fall Terms, 2006 to 2010

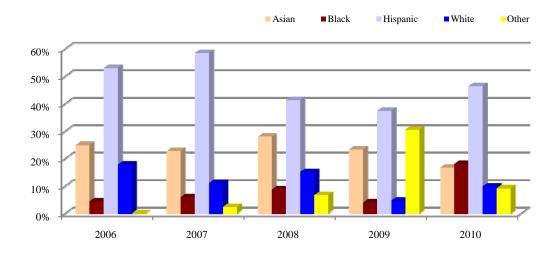

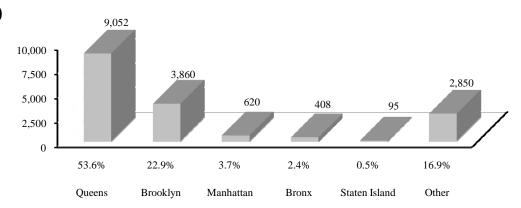

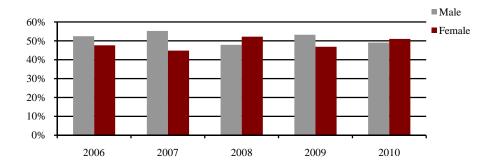

The seven business entities at LaGuardia employ 2,663 people in total. Tax Levy (New York City General Fund) hires the most, 2,104. 854 (forty-one percent) are employed full-time. Faculty, the largest single employee category, make up about thirty-nine percent of all full-time employees. Other professionals, the second largest group, make up nineteen percent. Other job categories include executive/administrative/manager staff, fourteen percent; clerical and classified staff, thirteen percent; service/maintenance, eight percent; and technical and paraprofessionals, seven percent.

At LaGuardia, the balance between women and men in the workforce is tipped somewhat toward women, who make up about fifty-five percent of employees overall, but this varies to some extent according to job category. Among full-time clerical and classified staff, where jobs have historically been held by women, the ratio is about two to one in favor of women. Among the technical and paraprofessional staff, where jobs are frequently held by men, women also predominate. Women also outnumber men among the faculty, with a slightly higher proportion of women among full-time faculty.

The largest age group in the full-time workforce contains those between the ages of 56 and 65. Age levels within job category, however, vary. The other professionals are younger on average than faculty, for example. Among faculty, forty-two percent are 56 or older.

There is significant racial and ethnic diversity in the workforce at LaGuardia, although its distribution does not yet parallel that of the student body. Among the faculty the racial and ethnic distribution is twelve percent Asian, eighteen percent Black, ten percent Hispanic, and sixty percent White.

After its founding, LaGuardia retained its original faculty and staff for many years. Recently, however, the founding group has been retiring and a relatively newer group of faculty and staff is beginning to take its place. The number of full-time faculty and staff who have been at the college for five years or fewer has recently jumped from thirty-seven percent in Fall 2008 to fifty percent in Fall 2010. The service/maintenance group has the largest recently employed group with sixty-nine percent having been here five years or fewer, closely followed by the executive/administrative/manager group (sixty-two percent) and Other Professionals (sixty percent). Forty-five percent of faculty have been here five years or fewer, while thirty-four percent have been here more than 15 years.

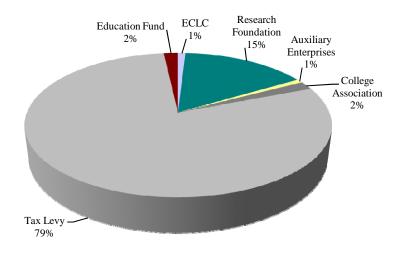
About fifty-nine percent of ranked faculty are tenured.

Professional employees at LaGuardia are highly credentialed. Fifty-four percent of the faculty have doctorates, an exceptionally large proportion for the community college sector. According to the U.S. Department of Education's National Center for Education Statistics, two-year college faculty with PhD's or first professional degrees averaged nineteen percent in Fall 2003 (NSOPF:04, Table 14). LaGuardia has nearly three times the national proportion of faculty with doctorates or first professional degrees. The professional staff at LaGuardia also hold advanced degrees. Within the executive/administrative/manager category, fifty-nine percent have master's degrees and seventeen percent have doctorates.

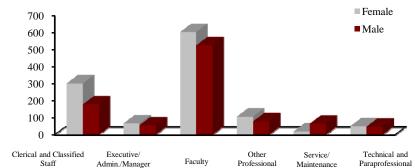

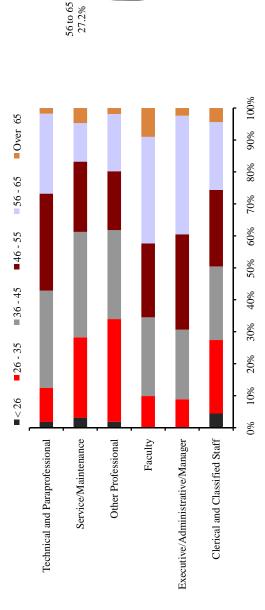

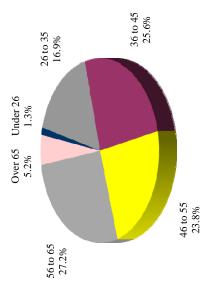

Full Time Tax Levy Employees by Job Category and Age Range, Fall 2010





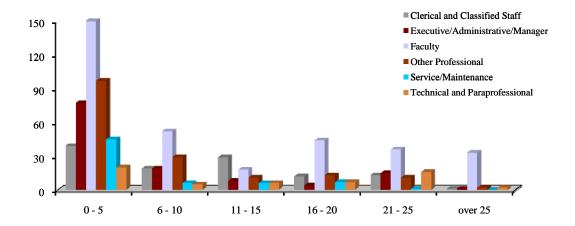

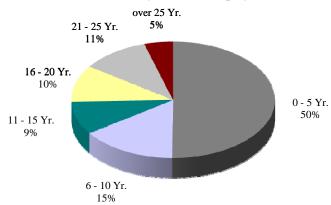

Workforce Percent by Years of Employment, Fall 2010

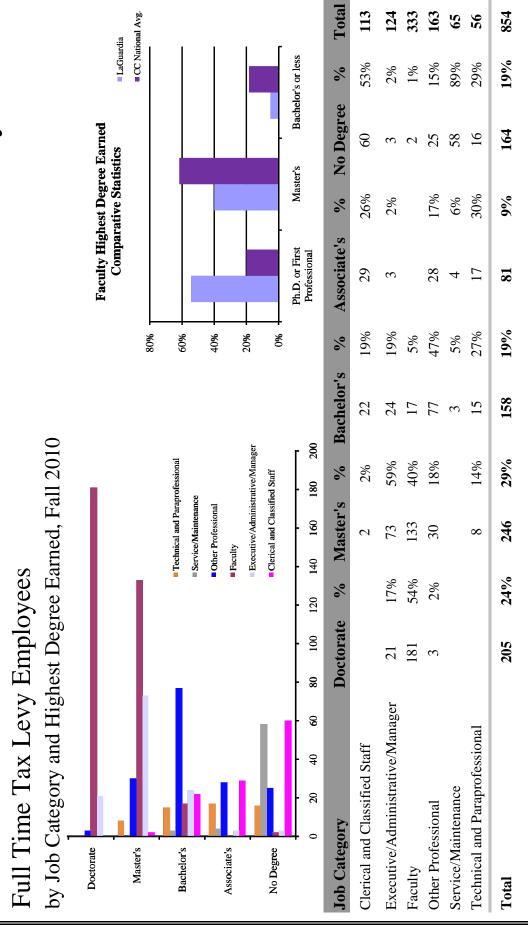

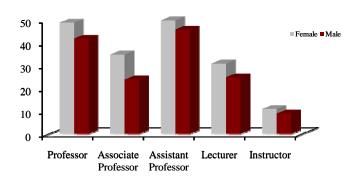

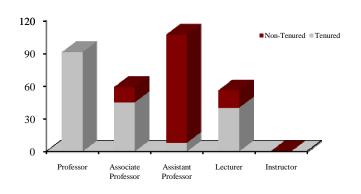

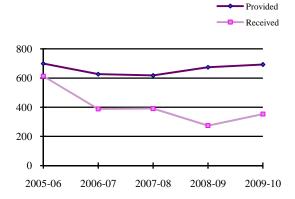


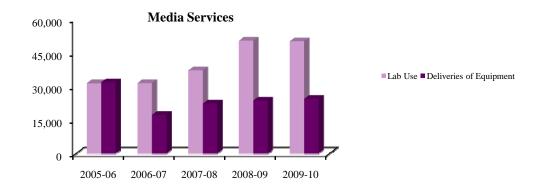


Expenditures (In Thousands of Dollars) Total Operating Expenditures

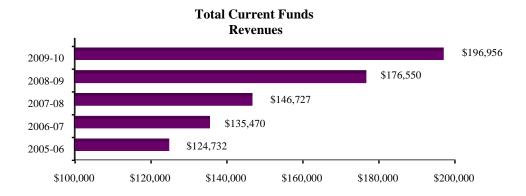

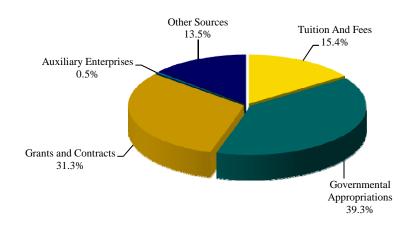

Current Funds Revenues FY 2009-10



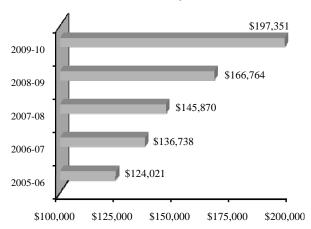

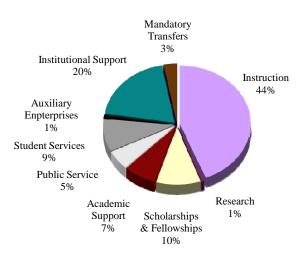

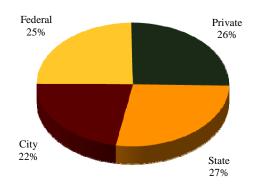

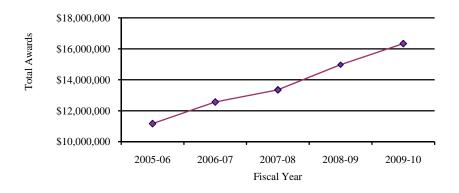

Total Grant Awards FY 2005-06 to FY 2009-10



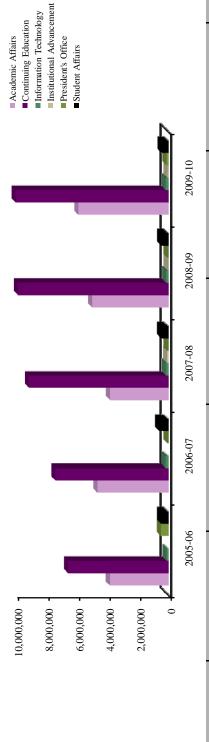

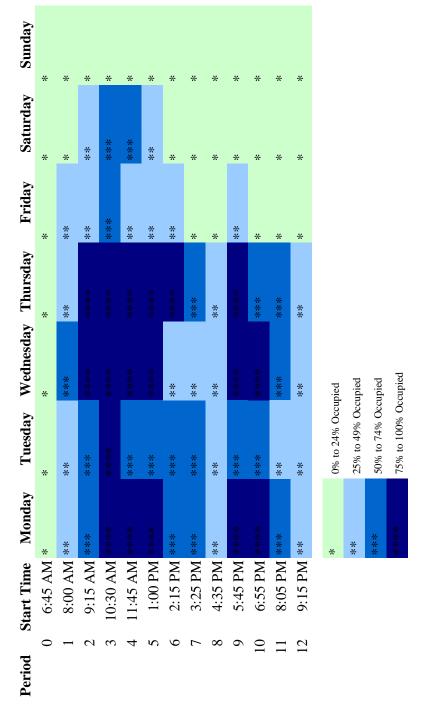

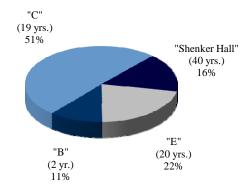

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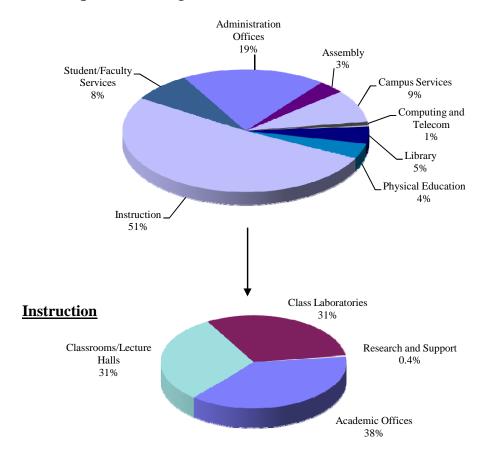

- Note 1. The FY2008-09 decrease in Auxiliary Enterprises revenues from \$1,938 to \$843 is primarily due to the reclassification of Theater and ECLC revenues to the Other Sources revenues this year.
- Note 2. The FY2008-09 increase in Other Sources revenues from \$2,635 to \$27,994 is primarily due to the University Controller reassigning \$20,565 capital appropriation back to the college this year; the reclassification of \$2,105 Education Funds' Other Revenues which were previously allocated in the Private Grants category; and \$1,202 reclassification of Theater & ECLC revenues, which were previously allocated in the Auxiliary Enterprises Revenues. For purposes of comparison, the FY 2008-09 Other Sources figure, if reported in the format prior to this year's changes, would have been \$7,437.
- Note 3. The FY2008-09 decrease in Operating & Maintenance expenses from \$12,073 to \$0 results from Depreciation Expenses, Interest Expense and Operating & Maintenance of Plant now being allocated to the appropriate functional categories based on the respective functional category's space usage. For purposes of comparison, the FY 2008-09 Operating & Maintenance figure, if reported in the format prior to this year's changes, would have been \$10,533.

Adult and Continuing Education	A division of the college offering a wide array of non-credit courses and programs to the community at large.
Age	Age is calculated as of the date in Fall semester when data were captured for the year indicated.
Allied Health	A designation indicating a program relating to medicine or the wider field of health, including nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy and related areas.
Clerical and Classified Staff	Includes employment titles in the following categories: Clerical Group, Custodial, CUNY Office Assistant/Associate, Mail, Motor Vehicle, Print Shop, Purchasing Agent, Special Officer, Stores, Stock.
Credit Student	A designation indicating enrollment in a credit-bearing course or academic program.
Curriculum Code	Code number assigned at LaGuardia to identify programs of study culminating in degrees or certificates.
Degree-Seeking Student	Matriculated. Refers to all students enrolled in curriculums that culminate in A.A., A.S., or A.A.S. degrees or Certificates. Includes transfer students.
Equated Credits	Course credits used in determining the course load and full-time equivalent status of students. Internships and cooperative education experiences are given equated credits, for example, to indicate that the intensity of student participation in these courses is higher than their nominal credit level.

Financial Aid Gap	Financial Gap is the difference between any student's defined financial need and that student's financial aid award package. Financial need is calculated by subtracting a federally determined amount (which increases with income) of a student's (if independent) or of a student's and his or her family's (if dependent) financial resources from the total cost of attendance. Financial aid packages include federal, state, college and donor grants and scholarships, college work awards and subsidized loans. Students must fund any financial gap with outside employment, unsubsidized loans and other draws on family financial resources above the federally determined formula amount.
First-Time Student	Student enrolled in a degree program who has not previously earned credit toward a degree from any college or university (i.e., excludes transfer students).
First-Year Student	Student having 0 to 27.5 cumulative credits earned.
FTE	Full-Time Equivalent. A mathematical equation used primarily for budgeting purposes. The total number of credit hours or equated credit hours for which full-time and part-time students are enrolled is divided by the standard number of full-time hours per academic year (30).
Full-Time Employee	Defined in terms of hours worked, as designated by job title: Faculty, 27 contact hours; Counselor and Librarian, 30 contact hours; Custodial and Security, 40 hours per week; all other staff, 35 hours per week.
Full-Time Student	Student enrolled for 12 or more credits or the equivalent number of hours in the semester indicated, and students certified as full-time by the Registrar.
GED	General Equivalency Diploma, equivalent to the high school diploma.

Matriculating Student	Student enrolled in an academic degree program.

Open Enrollment	Institutional designation indicating non-selective admission to higher education. Open enrollment institutions require only a high school diploma or a GED for admission.
Part-Time Employee	Job titles included within the categories of Teaching Adjunct, Non-teaching Adjunct, and College Assistant.
Part-Time Student	Student enrolled for fewer than 12 credits or hours in the semester indicated.
Second-Year Student	Student having 28 or more cumulative credits earned as of the semester indicated.
