Photojournalist Didier Lefevre, who accompanied MSF, collaborated with graphic novelist Emmanuel Guibert to convey a depth of commitment to human life, while providing powerful images of a country still embroiled in conflict.

An Evening With Margaret Atwood

When Margaret Atwood's most famous novel, The Handmaid's Tale (1985), won the first Arthur C. Clarke Award for best science fiction published in the United Kingdom, she bristled at the suggestion that what she had written was science fiction. Poet, feminist, activist and public intellectual, Atwood returned to what she calls "speculative fiction" with Oryx and Crake (2003), a dystopian novel about genetic engineering that was short-listed for the Man Booker Prize. Her latest novel, The Year of the Flood is another tale of social upheaval and en-

vironmental catastrophe set in the near future. One of the world's most honored living writers, Atwood is the author of 14 novels, 17 poetry collections, nine volumes of short fiction as well as nonfiction and children's books. *The Blind Assassin* won the 2000 Man Booker Prize, while Alias Grace won the 1996 Scotia Giller Prize. In 2008, Atwood gained wide attention for *Payback: Debt and the Shadow Side of Wealth*, a finalist for the 2009 National Business Book Award, a Canadian literary prize.

As a child in Kentucky, **Barbara Kingsolver** used to tell bedtime stories to her mother. Though she lost her accent while living in Indiana, Greece, France and Arizona, she retained that love of storytelling, which has carried her through careers as a science writer, feature journalist and one of America's most admired contemporary novelists. Her first novel, *The Bean Trees*, established Kingsolver as an important literary voice and one who knew how to entertain readers. Since then she's written acclaimed and beloved novels, like *The Poisonwood Bible* (1998), an Oprah's Book Club selection and

Pulitzer Prize finalist. She's also proven her mastery of the short story (*Homeland and Other Stories*), poetry (*Another America*), and essays (*High Tide in Tucson*). Her nonfiction book about moving her family to a farm in Virginia, *Animal, Vegetable, Miracle* (2007), was a best seller. *The Lacuna* (HarperCollins), Kingsolver's first novel in nine years, is a story of one man caught up in the anti-communist witch hunts of the 1950s.



An Evening With **Orhan Pamuk**

Orhan Pamuk, already Turkey's most famous novelist, faced the threat of three years imprisonment in 2005 for the crime of criticizing Turkish denial of the 1915 Armenian genocide. Charges were dropped after a worldwide outcry from human rights groups and writers—John Updike, Umberto Eco and Gabriel García Marquez among them. A year later Pamuk became the first Turkish author to be awarded the Nobel

Prize in Literature. Born in 1952 to an Istanbul family, he studied architecture and journalism before becoming a full-time writer. Pamuk's first novel since winning the Nobel Prize, *The Museum of Innocence*, is a soaring story of unrequited love set in Istanbul's tumultuous 1970s. Pamuk, who lives in Istanbul, has taught at Columbia University, Bard College, the University of Iowa, and this summer lectured at Harvard.
