

# THE BRONZE WOLF CITATIONS

1999 - 2002

### 36th World Scout Conference Thessaloniki, Greece, 15-19 July 2002

The Bronze Wolf is the only award made by the World Scout Committee. It is given solely in recognition of outstanding service by an individual to the World Scout Movement. Approval for the institution of the award was made by the International Committee at its meeting in Stockholm on 2 August 1935. The Committee unanimously awarded the first Bronze Wolf to the Chief Scout of the World, Lord Baden-Powell.

### LE LOUP DE BRONZE CITATIONS 1999 - 2002

### 36e Conférence Mondiale du Scoutisme Thessalonique, Grèce, 15-19 juillet 2002

Le Loup de Bronze est la seule décoration décernée par le Comité Mondial du Scoutisme. Il est remis uniquement en reconnaissance de services exceptionnels rendus par une personne au Mouvement Scout Mondial. C'est à sa réunion de Stockholm, 2 août 1935, que le Comité International a approuvé l'institution de cette distinction. Le Comité décerna unanimement le premier Loup de Bronze au Chef Scout Mondial, Lord Baden-Powell.

### \*JACQUES MOREILLON

#### **World Scout Committee**

### Secretary General World Organization of the Scout Movement

Jacques Moreillon was appointed Secretary General of World Scouting in 1988, after a successful career with the International Committee of the Red Cross, where he served latterly as Director General and is now a member of the Board.

Jacques had been a Scout in Switzerland throughout his youth and was also a Scout leader for some time. Following his Red Cross career, his return to serve the Scout Movement responded to a deeply felt need to devote a new part of his professional life to an idea and to an Organization which is devoted to building the future by developing the young people of today.

During his ten years of service to World Scouting, Jacques Moreillon has visited almost all Member Countries. One of the most important of his many challenges has been the spontaneous rebirth and development of Scouting in former communist countries, which has led to a dramatic increase in the number of countries where Scouting is active.

Jacques has also placed great emphasis on opening Scouting up to the outside world, developing relationships with external organizations, building the status of the Scout Movement as a credible partner with UN agencies, and improving its image among parliamentarians, governments and the public at large.

He has initiated and developed a broad coalition of international educational youth organizations who share with Scouting a common goal of promoting the role of non-fomal education in today's society and encouraging national governments to recognise the importance of that education in their national youth policies.

### \*NEIL M. WESTAWAY Australia

### Former Chief Commissioner, The Scout Association of Australia Former Chairman, World Scout Committee Chairman of the Board, SCORE International

Neil Westaway joined Scouting as an assistant Scout leader but quickly moved on to serve in the Venturer section, rising to be Branch Commissioner for Venturers in Victoria, then Chief Commissioner in that state and ultimately Chief Commissioner of Australia. He continues to serve his national association as Branch Chairman in the state of Victoria.

Neil has attended a number of Asia-Pacific and World Scout Conferences. He chaired the Host Committee of the 12<sup>th</sup> Asia-Pacific Conference held in Melbourne, Australia, in 1980. He also served as Camp Chief of the 16<sup>th</sup> World Scout Jamboree held near Sydney in 1987.

Neil Westaway was elected to the World Scout Committee in 1990, and became Chairman in 1993. During his term in office, he visited some 30 countries and attended all five Regional Conferences in 1995. During the same period, the World Scout Committee had to deal with tough financial decisions and led the development of a new, more equitable registration fee system.

Neil was also instrumental in establishing Scout Resources International – SCORE – as an independent, profit-oriented supply service for the World Scout Movement. He now serves as a very active Chairman of the SCORE Board.

### \*IVO STERN B. Mexico

### Former President & Former International Commissioner, Asociación de Scouts de México Former Chairman, Interamerican Scout Committee Former Member, World Scout Committee

Ivo Stern joined Scouting as a boy in his native Czechoslovakia. He rejoined the Movement in 1964 in his adopted country Mexico.

He has served the Scout Movement in many capacities since, at local, national, regional and world levels. He has recently retired from his six year term as a member of the World Scout Committee, during part of which time he also served as a member of the Board of SCORE International.

As President of his association, Ivo Stern promoted changes in statutes and bylaws, as well as updates in Youth Programme and Adult Leader Training. Many of these changes were later adopted by other associations in the Interamerican Region.

As Chairman of the Interamerican Scout Committee, he established a fundraising campaign which enabled the Region to purchase a new Regional Office. He also initiated a reform within the Region of administration, Youth Programme and activities and Leader Training, and played a supportive role in encouraging Catholic Scout Associations in Argentina and Uruguay to join the recognized National Scout Organizations in these countries.

### \*ABDELAZIZ DRISSI-KACEMI MOROCCO

### Président, Association 'Scoutisme Hassania Marocain' Ancien Président Délégué, Fédération Nationale du Scoutisme Marocain

Abdelaziz Drissi-Kacemi a rejoint le Scoutisme lorsqu'il était encore enfant et a servi son Association, 'Scoutisme Hassania Marocain', durant toute sa vie d'adulte. Il a été membre du Conseil national et en est le Président depuis 1980.

Il a également été Président Délégué de la Fédération Nationale du Scoutisme Marocain de 1993 à 1996 et ensuite son Vice-Président.

Dans ces postes ainsi que d'autres qu'il a occupés au niveau de la direction de l'Association, Abdelaziz Drissi-Kacemi n'a épargné aucun effort pour répandre le concept de la fraternité mondiale durant le protectorat et après l'indépendance du Maroc.

Il a aussi œuvré en faveur de la coopération entre les Scouts du Maroc et ceux d'autres pays du Maghreb et de la Région Arabe dans son ensemble, leur permettant ainsi de s'imprégner de l'esprit du Scoutisme Mondial.

En tant que Président du Symposium Scout International, « Jeunesse sans frontières », qui s'est tenu en 1994 à Marrakech, Abdelaziz Drissi-Kacemi a joué un rôle clé dans le succès de cet événement. Il a par ailleurs contribué activement à l'instauration de la coopération euro-arabe, établissant des liens entre le Scoutisme Marocain et les Organisations Scoutes Nationales en Europe.

### \*HERMAN HUI Hong Kong

# Chairman, Asia-Pacific Regional Scout Committee Deputy Chief Commissioner (Operations) & Former International Commissioner, The Scout Association of Hong Kong

Herman Hui is a successful Businessman and Solicitor. He joined the Scout Movement as an adult, serving as Vice-Chairman of East Kowloon Region. He was appointed International Commissioner of his association in 1994 and became Deputy Chief Commissioner (Operations) in 1997.

He has also served actively within the Asia-Pacific Region, working with the community development sub-committee, constitutions review task force, and public relations sub-committee. He was elected a Member of the Regional Scout Committee in 1995, and as Chairman in 1998.

Herman Hui also made a significant contribution in the part he played in the building of BP International House in Hong Kong, which serves as a symbol of the Scouting Spirit. He also contributed much time and effort in organising two international Scout events: one, as Chairman, Organising Committee of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Asia-Pacific Workshop on Scout Supply Management in 1995, and two, as Chairman of the Organising Committee of the 19<sup>th</sup> Asia-Pacific Regional Scout Conference in 1998.

# \*PAULA PELÁEZ G. Chile

### Vice-President and Member of the Board; Past President Asociación de Guías y Scouts de Chile

Paula Peláez is a Medical Doctor, Master of Public Health and Specialist in Endocrinology & Adolescent Health. She is described as a permanent role model of dedication, good humour and teaching qualities.

During her 15 years as President, Past President and Vice-President of the Chilean Scout and Guide Association, Paula Peláez has played a leading role in placing the association in high regard by the academic and scientific sectors of the community. Being an extraordinarily well-known figure in the national community and enjoying noticeable coverage by the mass media, she takes advantage of every opportunity to strengthen the position of Scouting in terms of its involvement in the community and its task of meeting the needs and aspirations of young people.

Her personal skills and qualities have been a determining factor in the success of many important endeavours of the Chilean Scout and Guide Association, particularly those connected to the international dimension of Scouting, such as the 6<sup>th</sup> Pan-American Jamboree in 1989, the 1<sup>st</sup> General Assembly of the World Scout Parliamentary Union in 1994, and the 19<sup>th</sup> World Scout Jamboree in 1998-99. During the past 15 years, she has attended most World and Interamerican Scout Conferences often as delegation leader.

### MOSTAFA SALEM Libya

### Former International Commissioner, Public Scout & Girl Guide Movement, Libya Former Chairman, World Programme Committee Former Member, World Scout Committee

Mostafa Salem joined the Movement as a Scout, and has filled many leadership positions within Scouting – at national, regional and world levels – since.

He served as Programme Commissioner of the Libyan Scouts before becoming International Commissioner. His contributions to Scouting in his own country have been numerous and valuable.

Internationally, Mostafa Salem has been, or is currently, active as liaison person between the Public Scout & Girl Guide Movement and the Arab Guide "Region", coordinator for fundraising and supply between the Scout Shop of Libya and SCORE International, and as Member and then Chairman of the World Programme Committee.

He was elected to a six-year term as Member of the World Scout Committee in 1990. In that capacity he provided very helpful insights into Arabic and Moslem attitudes and opinions when the Committee was dealing with potentially sensitive subjects.

Mostafa Salem has had an outstanding and very evident influence on the development and improvement of Scouting in Libya, the Arab Region and worldwide, particularly in the field of Youth Programme including Community Development and Community Service. His dedication to and enthusiasm for Scouting, along with his unquestionable personal capacities, have greatly enriched the work of the various committees and groups with which he has been involved.

### \*ROBERT WILMES France

Représentant de l'Organisation Mondiale du Mouvement Scout au Comité permanent des Organisations Non Gouvernementales en relations avec l'UNESCO, Paris

Robert Wilmes a été animateur d'un groupe local des Eclaireuses Eclaireurs de France depuis 1945. Depuis 1948 sa troupe développe les échanges scouts internationaux avec les partenaires de l'OMMS en Europe centrale, la Scandinavie et les Balkans. Il a aussi été élu Responsable départemental puis Responsable régional.

La double culture française et québécoise de Robert Wilmes apporte un bénéfice enrichissant aux échanges scouts entre les deux pays cousins sur les plans matériels et éducatifs. Le soutien aux groupes québécois se rendant en France et aux groupes français partant au Canada concerne les démarches pratiques, l'orientation vers un partenaire scout équivalent et la formation aux échanges internationaux.

Son engagement en faveur des échanges franco-québécois concerne aussi la réflexion pédagogique et éducative apportée aux groupes locaux partenaires des Eclaireuses Eclaireurs de France et de la Fédération Québécoise du Guidisme et du Scoutisme. Grâce à Robert, les groupes des Eclaireuses Eclaireurs de France s'efforcent de faire progresser la réflexion pédagogique de la coéducation en direction de leurs partenaires québécois. Au profit des groupes français, Robert reste l'indispensable

initiateur de nouvelles techniques de vie en pleine nature pratiquées par le Scoutisme Québécois.

Robert Wilmes reste un "passeur" entre le Scoutisme Français et le Scoutisme Québécois. Proche par la langue, la jeunesse de chacun de ces deux pays occidentaux développés ignore tout de l'autre. L'action de Robert dans ces échanges scouts les rapprochent en dépassant le terrain exclusif de la revendication francophone.

L'engagement de Robert dans ces échanges depuis quinze ans permet aux Eclaireuses Eclaireurs de France d'investir la pédagogie des relations internationales dans un secteur où ils restaient auparavant tributaires des politiques d'Etat. Les Eclaireuses Eclaireurs de France construisent des échanges franco-québécois de jeunes fondés sur la participation des Scouts et Eclaireurs des deux pays grâce à l'engagement de Robert. Il reste l'artisan scrupuleux de ce rapprochement fécond.

Robert Wilmes a aussi servi pendant plusieurs années comme Représentant bénévole et engagé de l'Organisation Mondiale du Mouvement Scout au Comité permanent des ONG en relations avec l'UNESCO à Paris.

## STEWART J. HAWKINS United Kingdom

### Former International Commissioner, The Scout Association Former Chairman, European Scout Committee Former Chairman, European Scout Foundation

Throughout his Scout life, Stewart Hawkins has shown leadership and a firm grasp and commitment to the service of young people through the development of a strong and vibrant youth programme. Latterly, the need for firm financial support for this programme, at all levels, led him to accept the challenge of chairing the European Scout Foundation. This necessitated a review of working methods and of relationships between the Foundation and the European Scout Committee – the results of which have now been implemented for the benefit of the European Region and of World Scouting.

Stewart Hawkins has been committed over many years to the ideals and practice of World Scouting. He has done this against the background of challenging professional demands and the special calls on his energy and resources of serious illness in his family. There have been particular services most recently in support of the European Scout Region's "Children for the Future" project in south eastern Europe.

### \*A. GEOFFREY LEE Australia

# Former International Commissioner, The Scout Association of Australia Founder & Chairman, Lord Baden-Powell Society, Australia Former Vice-Chairman, Asia-Pacific Regional Scout Committee Member, Fundraising Committee, World Scout Foundation

Geoff Lee's services to the World Scout Movement can best be described in two ways.

First, his support for World Scouting activities through his own participation and his encouragement of others to participate. His enthusiastic support of international events led to his appointment as International Commissioner between 1976 and 1982. He played a key role in Australia's successful bid to host the World Scout Jamboree and World Scout Conference in 1988.

Secondly, his fundraising activities, both in Australia and overseas, have been of great value to the World Scout Movement. He was one of Australia's first Baden-Powell Fellows and played a highly significant role in developing the concept of the World Scout Foundation's Honours Programme. His fundraising efforts in connection with the World Events in 1988 resulted in a substantial surplus for the Jamboree, which benefited the World Scout Foundation.

### ALY ALY EL-MOURSY Egypt

### Former International Commissioner; Vice-President Egyptian Scout Federation

Aly Aly El-Moursy served as an Executive Member of the Egyptian Scout Federation from 1966-1993 and as International Commissioner from 1985-1993.

During this period he visited most Arab countries and many in Europe and North America to develop co-operation agreements, mutual exchanges and twinning arrangements with Egyptian Scouting. He also served as a member of the World Community Development Subcommittee and took part in various activities organised by the Community Development Service of the World Scout Bureau.

Throughout the service to Scouting in Egypt over 50 years, Aly Aly El-Moursy has contributed to the promotion of the World Scouting brotherhood. He has consistently supported the work of the Arab Scout Region, including sharing in the elaboration of the Regional Strategy 1989-2000. He is highly respected by all who have worked with him and maintains good relations with many Egyptian authorities, which he has used to promote Scout project plans and in raising funds for the Movement.

Aly Aly El-Moursy has recently been elected as President of the Egyptian Scout and Guide Fellowship and a member of the Executive Committee of the Arab Scouts and Guide Fellowship. He also serves as President of the Egyptian Boy Scout Association and Vice-President of the Egyptian Scout Federation.

### **KIM KYU-YOUNG**

#### **World Scout Bureau**

#### Regional Director, Asia-Pacific Regional Office

Kim Kyu-Young has been serving the Scout Movement for over 30 years. During his term as Regional Director since 1990, regional membership has soared from 8 million to 19.5 million. Scout associations in the region - he has travelled to 30 countries and territories across Asia and the Pacific - have benefited from his initiatives in organizational leadership, developing resources, establishing Scout Foundations and registration systems, adult resources management, information technology, and relationships.

As Secretary General of Boy Scouts of Korea, he played a key role in the planning stages of the 17th World Scout Jamboree in 1991. In addition he has helped to organize several Asia-Pacific Jamborees and other youth events. The publication by the Asia-Pacific Region of a guide to planning large Scout events was largely due to his inspiration and persistence.

Kim Kyu-Young's services are anchored on strong leadership, management and relationships, leading to strengthening of regional solidarity and cooperation. As interlocutor and team leader, he has provided opportunities for capacity building for individuals (volunteers and professionals) and for National Scout Associations.

## JIRI NAVRATIL Czech Republic

#### President, Junak - svaz skautu a skautek CR

As a young man in his early 20s during the Second World War in his native Czechoslovakia, Jiri Navratil was briefly arrested by the German Gestapo for carrying out illegal Scouting. Following his release, he worked with Scouts who were involved in secret resistance groups until the end of the war.

In 1949, following the Communist coup, he was again arrested because of his involvement in Scouting. He was sentenced to 25 years in prison. He was eventually released in 1960. Following the restoration of the Scout Movement during the "Prague Spring" of 1968, he became a key national commissioner, responsible for cultural affairs, and thanks to his moral credibility he played a very important role in building the positive image of Scouting for the public. A journalist since 1977, he has also used his profession to support and encourage the Scout Movement through magazines and other publications.

From the beginning of the last rebuilding of the Scout Movement (following the "Velvet Revolution" of 1989), Jiri Navratil has been a member of the National Board of his Association. He has served as International Commissioner, Vice-President and President. His many strengths include building bridges between new Scout organizations and with parliamentary and governmental bodies.

### PHILIPPE PIJOLLET

#### **World Scout Bureau**

#### Former Director, Adult Resources, World Scout Bureau

During his many years of service to World Scouting (he joined the World Scout Bureau in 1974), Philippe Pijollet has been instrumental in strengthening adult leader training within WOSM. He played a key role in the introduction of the World Adult Resources Policy and has been highly influential in developing and promoting an understanding of the essential relationship between Youth Programme and Adult Leadership and the importance of their interdependence for the success of Scouting.

Philippe Pijollet has played an exceptional role in strengthening the educational aspect of Scouting, particularly adult leadership and the training of adults.

## WILLIAM G. WELLS Australia

### Former Chief Commissioner, Scouts Australia Former Vice-Chairman, Asia-Pacific Regional Scout Committee

In addition to a long service to his own National Scout Association, including Chief Commissioner from 1992-1999, William Wells has played a very active role within the World Organization of the Scout Movement, at both world and Asia-Pacific levels. He served as Vice-Chairman of the Asia-Pacific Programme Sub-Committee from 1984 to 1989, and as a Member of the World Programme Committee from 1984-1993. He was Organizing Chairman of the 31st World Scout Conference held in Melbourne in 1988 and was an Advisor to the World Moot Council from 1990-1991.

William also served the Asia-Pacific Regional Scout Committee as a Member and, from 1992-1995, as Vice-Chairman. Thereafter he played a key role in developing the Regional Strategic Plan through the Strategic Planning Task Force; and he was instrumental in the formation, launching and promotion of the Asia-Pacific Regional Scout Foundation. Both of these initiatives have benefited Scouting in the region greatly.

William Wells has been a dedicated Scout leader for well over 40 years and he has made significant contributions to international Scouting.
