



AN ACCESSIBLE REGION

A central base located within some of Australia's best regional air, sea, rail, road, water, communications, and energy infrastructure. Growth in demand is fueling further improvements. For example, operations (throughput) at the Region's international Port Alma facility grew by 208% between 2005 and 2010 to service demands for commodities such as petroleum, bio-fuels, and ammonium nitrate.

The Rockhampton Region's \$5.2 Billion economy ticks all the boxes and is recognised nationally as a growth centre offering a diversity of business and lifestyle opportunities.

Consider the competitive advantages of the Rockhampton Region - perfectly located and linked as a critical exporter and service hub for Central Queensland, servicing a 3½ hour catchment of over 450,000 people and offering one of the most reliable and generous water supplies in Queensland.

Ideally positioned between mining and agricultural pursuits in the west, home to defence facilities and government directorates, and linked to key export ports and industrial centres, the region is reinforced by a stable base of health, education, retail, and industry.

A PRODUCTIVE REGION

- Rockhampton Region Gross Product is \$5.2B (2010).
- Part of the Fitzroy Area, which offers the highest business productivity in Queensland (2009), growing 18% since 2004 compared with 10% for Queensland overall and currently 15% higher than the state's overall business productivity.*
- Fast emerging as an optimal destination for lucrative knowledge, logistics, medical and professional services activities.

- Mining Industry Mining is the prominent industry in the greater Central Queensland region.
- The Rockhampton Region boasts a majority share in production of the state's gold, limestone, magnesium and salt with its ports helping facilitate 25% of the state's exports with Central Queensland's contribution to this increasing by 104% in recent years.
- Diverse Agricultural Sector The Region is home to the Central Queensland Livestock Exchange, two of the largest abattoirs in the country which provides added value with the processing for market also undertaken within the Region and lush pastures and water availability resulting in livestock making up 65.6% of the Region's total agricultural production.

BENEFITS

A CONNECTED REGION

- Road The Capricorn, Leichhardt and Burnett Highways radiate out from Rockhampton linking the city with Central Queensland's coal resources.
- Rail Rockhampton is a major
 Queensland Rail centre with the ability
 to handle close to 200 million tonnes
 of rail freight each year. High-speed
 passenger trains and tourist trains
 travel to the west, south and north.
 The Rockhampton Region provides
 services and infrastructure for 100%
 of Australia's rail freight between
 economies north of Gladstone and
 the rest of the nation's producers and
 consumers.
- Air Rockhampton has one of the most highly serviced regional airports

in Australia, with more than 750,000 passengers in the last 12 months. It provides valuable international heavylift air freight capabilities, defence services for three nations, charters, training and extensive direct domestic passenger and freight flights. Facilities include unrestricted widebodied operations and a mix of wide-bodied aircraft including the B747 to B777 and A340 types.

 Port - Port Alma is a bulk shipping port located south east of Rockhampton operated by the Gladstone Port Corporation, which also operates the internationally recognised Port of Gladstone, one of the largest ports on Australia's east coast responsible for handling billions of dollars worth of cargo each year, including 45.2 million tonnes of coal and a container handling facility. Throughput at Port Alma is in excess of 250,000 tpa for 2010. The Port of Gladstone is in the process of further expansions to increase its handling facilities, which when complete will have an annual through port capacity of 70 million tonnes.

 Energy – The region is linked to entire eastern seaboard through high capacity transmission infrastructure.
 The region is home to the 1434 megawatt Stanwell Power Station supplying electricity to the national grid, with a capacity sufficient to power 1.5 million homes and offers ample land, water, geothermal and wind resources for further energy generation investments.



A SKILLED AND GROWING REGION

- Almost 450,000 people live within a 3½ hour drive of Rockhampton.
- Estimated resident population of the Rockhampton Regional Council area in 2009 was 114,105 (2.6% of the total Queensland population), with an average age of 37 years.
- Population projections published by the Department of Infrastructure and Planning in 2008 indicate that the population of the Rockhampton Regional Council area will increase to 153,256 persons by the year 2031.
- The Rockhampton Region's population growth rate of 1.9% is currently keeping pace with the Australian average population growth rate of 2%*.

A REGION OF ABUNDANT LAND

- 18,300km² of land and lucrative markets in industrial, commercial, agricultural, residential and retail property.
- The Rockhampton Region's market for residential homes has averaged well above inflation and CPI movements during the last 5 and 10

year periods to 2010. The value of homes in the Region's Lakes Creek suburb, for example, has seen an average capital growth performance of 16% per annum over the 10 years between 2000-2010. The Region's strong performance is supported by providing investors with sustained yields equivalent to or above capital city suburbs.

- The Rockhampton Region has approached its vast land holdings strategically and with new business in mind with designated industrial estates for business and light industry.
- Purpose-planned space away from residential areas has been created for heavier high impact industries in the Stanwell Energy Park, located west of Rockhampton and separate from residential areas while still being a close commute.
- An abundance of good quality agricultural land and consistent water availability has attracted a variety of land-based industries. Directly west of Rockhampton, 50,000ha of land has been strategically identified for its irrigation and intensive animal production properties. Further planning has also identified options

for the development of low cost water infrastructure to support irrigation, industrial development and urban expansion.

A REGION WITH DEFENCE TRAINING WORTH MILLIONS

- The Shoalwater Bay Military Training
 Area (SBMTA) north east of
 Rockhampton is one of the Australian
 Defence Force's largest training areas,
 delivering regular and significant
 stimulus to the Rockhampton regional
 economy.
- Training exercises at SBMTA frequently see in excess of 30,000 troops deployed, with ongoing Australian military training activities, annual military training activities of the Singaporean Armed Forces and bi-annual training exercises with the US military.
- The Department of Defence advises that in 2005, the local economic impact of Operation Talisman Sabre (USA/Australian training exercise) was estimated at \$4M - \$5M in expenditure; and that in 2008, the local economic impact of Operation Wallaby (Singaporean/Australian training exercise) was estimated at \$24M in additional expenditure.

A WELL REPRESENTED REGION

- A full range of Queensland and Australian Government departments and agencies have offices in Rockhampton, which in collaboration with regional council operations has led to the government sector becoming the second most significant employer in the Region and the most significant sector in terms of contribution to the Gross Regional Product. This gives the economy the advantage of significant stability.
- QPS employment contributes approximately \$320M of income to the Rockhampton Region, with Rockhampton hosting regional offices for all Queensland Government Departments with the exception of only Queensland Treasury and Department of Premier and Cabinet, and a range of Australian Government agencies including Department of Education, Employment & Workplace Relations (DEEWR) and Centrelink.

A REGION RICH IN NATURAL RESOURCES

- The Rockhampton Region has one of the best water supplies in Queensland, with the Fitzroy River offering supply from the largest water catchment of eastern Australia.
- Extensive water storage, treatment and reticulation services link residents, business and heavy industry to reliable and generous supplies.
- Queensland Magnesium operates a major magnesium processing facility at Parkhurst, generating significant regional exports to international markets, \$85 million in spending, and hundreds of jobs.
- The Region is a major manufacturing base including Hastings Deering, which provides significant services for the Central Queensland industry and over 600 jobs within an employee workforce that has grown over 178% since 2006.

A REGION WITH ADVANCED HEALTH CARE

- Health and Social Assistance is the Region's largest sector in terms of employment and has the most significant flow on effects of any sector within the Region.
- The Rockhampton Hospital is the Region's major hospital, providing advanced levels of health care and leveraging a major private health care sector. The Rockhampton Hospital is also a major teaching hospital with linkages to CQUniversity and the University of Queensland.
- Queensland Health employs more than 3,000 people in the Central Queensland region, with more than 1,000 of those working in Rockhampton alone. The Central Queensland Health Service District has an operating budget of more than \$300M a year.

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OUT OF THE BOX?

From its innovative university to its internationally linked aeronautical and military precinct, the Region nurtures a habitat for innovation and demonstrates its capacity to profit from new knowledge and 'out of the box' ideas.

AN INNOVATION INVESTMENT REGION

- The Rockhampton Region is one of only two regions in Queensland and one of 10 in Australia, to be gazetted as an "Innovation Region" for investment priority by the Australian Government.
- Rockhampton Regional Council is a signatory to the CQ Innovation-Accord, committing to ensuring Central Queensland is known and recognised as Australia's premier "Region of Innovation".

- The Region has a culture of collaboration and connectivity for innovation, and new technologies are trialled in the region by organisations such as Ergon Energy.


INTERNATIONAL AERONAUTICAL AND MILITARY PRECINCT

 Provides aeronautical and freight services for domestic passenger services to Brisbane, Sydney, Melbourne, Townsville, Mackay and Gladstone with Qantas, Virgin Blue and Tiger Airways.

- Runway and support infrastructure that can accommodate all commercial passenger and heavy lift aircraft.
- The airport and associated specialist facilities are routinely used by Australian and international defence forces in support of their activities in the Shoalwater Bay Training Area.
- Domestic and international air freight capabilities are of importance to Australia's national freight activities as well as logistics operators seeking rapid links to Asia Pacific markets.
- An attractive site for aeronautical businesses; including engineering, manufacturing, defence and related industries.

RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENTS


- Stockland the leading residential developer in Australia delivering a range of masterplanned and mixeduse communities in growth areas across the country – chose the Rockhampton Region as a prime site, purchasing 278 hectares in Parkhurst for a 1,900 lot residential development that will become home to approximately 5,000 people.
- Developments such as this are a huge economic boost to the Region, also creating greater employment opportunities for locals and improved infrastructure for this community.
- · Tangible progress with businesses

working together with Council, industry and the community to create an environment conducive to interconnecting residential, business, sporting and cultural precincts throughout the Region.

KNOWLEDGE INDUSTRIES

 The Region is home to Queensland's most integrated education industry – and flagged for the state's first dual sector university integrating vocational and tertiary education through a merger of CQUniversity and TAFE. Ongoing transformations are enormously increasing the Region's capacity to produce appropriately educated and vocationally trained staff for state's resources and health sectors.

- Joint training initiatives between CQUniversity and Queensland Health through the Rockhampton Hospital, CQUniversity and mining/resource industry, and home to a University of Queensland facility at the hospital.
- Professional, scientific and technical services make up the Region's fastest growing sector with demonstrated successes providing domestic and foreign markets with mining, industrial, freight and transport services.
- Ergon Energy has chosen the Rockhampton Region for its trial of 'Smart Meter' technology - integrated broadband electricity meters. Ergon is using a site in Yeppoon as a pilot project for this innovative technology.



COMPLETE CONNECTIVITY

- The Region's telecommunications services are comparable to national capital cities.
- The Region has created an enabling environment for continued growth and is at the apex of broadband communication improvement plans, bolstered by its energy sector and health service hub roles.
- Embraces the National Broadband Network as it will significantly expand the Rockhampton Region's capacity to deliver services to Central Queensland particularly in the areas of health and education.

GROWING ENERGY SECTOR


- The Region already provides approximately 7% of Queensland's jobs in the 'Energy, Gas, and Water sector' and is home to very highly skilled technicians employed by major energy concerns like Ergon Energy and Stanwell Power Station.
- Employment in the sector has grown by approximately 77% between 2006 and 2010 within the region and also offers flow-on opportunities for business concerns providing associated services and facilities.
- Central Queensland was identified as a prime position for a large-scale solar power precinct, in the Queensland Concentrating Solar Power pre-

feasibility report, prepared by the Australian Government in partnership with the William J. Clinton Foundation's Clinton Climate Initiative.

- This landmark study found large solar projects both technically and environmentally feasible, and found Central Queensland an optimal site.
- The Region is already linked to the entire eastern seaboard through high capacity transmission infrastructure due to the 1434 megawatt Stanwell Power Station.
- The Region offers outstanding viable sun, wind, water, and geothermal resources at sites close to the grid for further energy generation facilities.

Development, other councils and local businesses – supporting the continuing growth of a diversified, vibrant and innovative economy and high standards of liveability.





- Rockhampton Airport is one of the most highly serviced regional airports in Australia, with more than 750,000 passengers every year enjoying regular daily direct flights to Brisbane, Melbourne, Townsville, Mackay and Gladstone, with connections to Sydney, New Zealand and the Pacific Rim.
- Major national highway, rail and international port links.

FOCUS ON EDUCATION AND TRAINING

- The headquarters for CQUniversity Australia and the location of its main campus. CQUniversity boasts 18,000 students from more than 100 countries.
- Major campus of Central Queensland Institute of TAFE supports the Region's strong emphasis on apprenticeships and traineeships.

- The Region is a centre of excellence for education with a good teacher to student ratio across the large number of public and private schools.
- Home to more than 15 training organisations that support business in hosting apprenticeships and trainees or provide specific skills training and assessment.



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
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ROAD AND RAIL NETWORK DEVELOPMENT

MOTIVATION

Flooding of the Bruce Highway and North Coast Railway at Rockhampton can cut critical supply routes to and from central and north Queensland for two to three weeks at a time, effectively isolating over 700,000 Queenslanders. Projected climate change impacts could increase the frequency and severity of this flooding.

Rockhampton's existing Fitzroy River bridges, constructed in 1952 and 1980, are fast approaching capacity and currently funnel all traffic into a small area of the city. Construction of an appropriately located flood-free third bridge to reduce growing traffic congestion and redistribute throughtraffic away from the busy city centre is now a near term priority.

Relocation of the existing North Coast Railway from Denison Street in the city centre is also a high priority as train length and frequency increase, and as the conflict between the rail and state and local road networks increases. Load limits on the existing Alexandra Street rail bridge and slow transit times through Rockhampton also impact on the efficiency of rail operations.

A western realignment of the Bruce Highway and third bridge will link Rockhampton's growth areas at Parkhurst and Gracemere as well as providing connectivity with the CBD, Base Hospital and Airport. This link will also provide improved access from the Australian Defence Forces Western Street facilities to the Shoalwater Bay Military Training Area and further north.

Improving the flood immunity of the Rockhampton Airport is also critical and levee and combined levee-road options are being investigated in conjunction with the proposed western alignment of the Bruce Highway.

BENEFITS


The dominant activity associated with these proposals would be construction. Based on the construction industry's multiplier effects within the Rockhampton Region alone - above and beyond the direct benefits of the infrastructure to improve the productivity of the state and national economy, the stimulus from the construction activity itself would deliver the following flow-on increases:

- · Jobs: 8646 Full Time Equivalent Jobs
- · Value Added: \$606.3 Million
- · Gross Output: \$1.7 Billion

While additional economic benefits would occur within the state and national economy above and beyond these benefits to the Rockhampton Region's economy, Rockhampton Regional Council has not added them within these figures. Thus, this represents a conservative example of the stimulus this proposal could inject for economic growth.

ROAD & RAIL

DUE TO THE CONTINUING GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT OF THE ROCKHAMPTON REGION, GREATER DEMAND IS BEING PLACED ON THE REGION'S TRANSPORT NETWORKS. TO SUSTAIN THE ENORMOUS GROWTH PREDICTED, IMPROVED ROAD CAPACITY AND FLOOD IMMUNITY ARE CRUCIAL, NOT ONLY FOR THE ROCKHAMPTON REGION, BUT FOR LONG HAUL AND REGIONAL TRANSPORT ACROSS QUEENSLAND.



WE HAVE

- \$5M Australian Government funded Fitzroy River Floodplain and Road Planning Study to identify and evaluate options to address the issues of flood immunity, capacity, freight movement and amenity of the Bruce Highway and North Coast Railway through Rockhampton.
- Planning is underway for duplication of the Capricorn Highway between the Yeppen Roundabout and Gracemere by the State Government. There are no funding commitments for this project.

WE NEED

A commitment to funding for long term solutions to road, rail, freight, and flooding impacts for the Bruce Highway and North Coast Railway in and around the city of Rockhampton.

WE WANT

- Commitment to construct the Yeppen Bridge duplication as the first stage of a high level crossing of the Fitzroy River floodplain to improve the flood immunity of the Bruce Highway.
- \$500M Commitment to funding of a high level flood-free crossing of the Fitzroy River floodplain.
- Construction of high level flood-free road crossing of flood plain by 2016.
- \$500M Commitment to funding of essential road and rail corridors and infrastructure realignments.
- Construction of new road and rail deviations by 2021.
- Support for improving the flood immunity of the Rockhampton Airport in conjunction with proposed road infrastructure.

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
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INDUSTRIAL LAND

SERVICED INDUSTRIAL LAND

The Gracemere Industrial Area, adjacent to the Capricorn Highway, is strategically located just south-west of Rockhampton and is well positioned to attract industries servicing the Bowen, Galilee and Surat Basins and Queensland gas fields.

Development of the industrial precinct has historically been limited by poor access and the absence of appropriate infrastructure to support development.

The Blackwater Railway, a major coal transport link, and the existing level crossings are widely regarded as among Queensland's most dangerous. Safe and efficient access from the Capricorn Highway across the railway and into the industrial area is a priority for both rail and road authorities.

MOTIVATION

Development of the precinct will:

 Provide an attractive location for businesses servicing the growing mining and resources sectors in Central Queensland;

- Build on the areas existing transport related industries and provide opportunities for larger scale logistics operations;
- Generate significant employment and private sector investment;
- Provide local employment opportunities for Gracemere's rapidly growing population; and
- Reduce the need for heavy vehicles to travel through Rockhampton;

Once the planned overpass has been constructed into the industrial area, the area will be one of a select few industrial precincts in Queensland with Type 1 Road Train access.

BENEFITS


The dominant activity associated with this proposal in the initial phase would be construction. Based on the construction industry's multiplier effects within the Rockhampton Region alone - above and beyond the direct benefits of the precinct to industry's ability to grow the state and national economy - the

\$80million of public sector investment would lead to \$330million dollars of public and private sector combined activity. This in itself would deliver the following flow-on increases:

- · Jobs: 2743 Full Time Equivalent Jobs
- · Value Added: \$192,3 Million
- · Gross Output: \$551.4 Million

While additional economic benefits would occur within the state and national economy above and beyond these benefits to the Rockhampton Region's economy, Rockhampton Regional Council has not added them within these figures. Thus, this represents a conservative example of the stimulus this proposal could inject for growth.

Just \$80 Million of public funding could produce a boost of over \$551.4 million in the Gross Output above and beyond the significant Output contribution that businesses within the Rockhampton Region already make to the state and federal economy.



WE HAVE

- State and local government stakeholders have jointly funded the Gracemere-Stanwell Corridor Study to investigate short, medium and long term solutions in this area. This study is nearing completion.
- \$6M State Government commitment in the current financial year for planning, design and corridor acquisition for the overpass.
- \$4M State Government commitment in next financial year budget for further works.
- Community consultation undertaken by Department of Transport and Main Roads in September 2009.
- The Malchi-Nine Mile Road intersection chosen as preferred location of overpass, and alignment approved.

- Department of Transport and Main Roads has commenced detailed designs which are expected to be completed by mid 2011.
- ✓ Rockhampton Regional Council has undertaken preliminary assessments of local road, water and sewerage infrastructure required to support development of an initial 50ha of industrial land. More detailed planning is underway.

WE NEED

Confirmation of full funding for this project of \$50M.

WE WANT

- \$50M Confirmation of full funding for Gracemere Industrial Access Project with construction of the overpass anticipated to be completed by the end of 2012 to coincide with duplication of the rail in that area.
- \$20M Funding support for local road, water supply and sewerage networks to facilitate an initial 50ha of industrial land to be developed. This will lead to approximately \$250M in private investment and 2,500 jobs for the Region, however only a proportion of the infrastructure costs will be able to be recovered from developers.


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












WATER INFRASTRUCTURE

The Rockhampton Region has one of the most reliable water supplies in Queensland, with the Fitzroy River offering supply from the largest water catchment of eastern Australia.

With strategic investment, these water supplies could be further developed to stimulate and stabilise economic . expansion and productivity growth within Queensland.

Enhancements to this secure water supply would also enable the Rockhampton Region to further expand its \$5.2 billion economy, accelerate its growing contribution to state and national prosperity, and support international trade expansion.

The proposal would also contribute to efforts to ensure regional communities benefit from economic growth through elements of significant social benefit including:

 A pipeline link between the Fitzroy River and Mount Morgan that will support population growth and supplement its current small dam, ensuring a secure long term water supply for the future.

 Mount Morgan provides some of Queensland's most affordable housing and is within driving distance of all resources basins – a potential asset to the Queensland resources sector.

At the present stage this project is focussed upon upgrading Eden Bann Weir and/or constructing Rookwood Weir and developing a pipeline for Mount Morgan.

In 2010 the Queensland Government included the Rockhampton-Gladstone water pipeline in its list of projects to Infrastructure Australia for which it is seeking investment. Although the need for water to supplement the capacity stored in Awoonga Dam is expected to determine the construction timetable of this pipeline, this initiative is currently a 'shovel ready' contingency project that could be brought forward to be delivered within two years at a total

cost of approximately \$320 million. Bringing it forward, instead of waiting for the drought trigger, could provide the following benefits:

- Produce greater wider economic benefits and a better overall benefit to cost ratio due to current low labour costs.
- Reduce market uncertainty associated with water security for Gladstone, while also providing a 'two-way' flow function between the water supplies of the Rockhampton and Gladstone Regions to reduce drought impact risks.
- Provide the water services needed to make key industrial land productive.
- Productivity improvements resulting from putting the Fitzroy water to its highest and best use in Central Queensland.
- Lower carbon emissions than a desalination plant.
- Improve the fiscal sustainability of both the Rockhampton and Gladstone Regional Councils.





BENEFITS

This water infrastructure will directly benefit industry's ability to grow the state and national economies. Based on the industry's multiplier effects within the Rockhampton Region alone, the investment in this water infrastructure itself would deliver the following flow-on increases:

- Jobs: Between 2529 2640 Full Time Equivalent Jobs
- Value Added: Between \$342.1 -\$357.2Million
- · Gross Output: \$654 \$683Million

While additional economic benefits would occur within the state and national

economy above and beyond these benefits to the Rockhampton Region's economy, Rockhampton Regional Council has not added them within these figures. Thus, this represents a conservative example of the stimulus this proposal could inject for growth.

THE DAY

While the Rockhampton Region is thriving and investor confidence is growing, due to a sustained economic growth in the resources and supporting sectors, the presence of a Central Queensland team in the National Rugby League will add significantly to the Region's profile.

The development of such a team would also provide a point of focus and unification for Central Queensland.

As the first outside investor in the Bid, Council shares the Bid Team's vision in that the CQ NRL Bid, combined with the proposed junior academy, the Stadium and the spirit of regional Queensland exceeds all of the criteria for enabling positive and meaningful regional development, not only in the Rockhampton Region, but in the greater Central Queensland. Rockhampton Regional Council supplied \$40,000 as the first outside investor in the bid.

To further drive the Region's growth and economy, which will provide greater security and certainty for the community, it is paramount that the CQ NRL Bid be secured.

BY SECURING THE BID

- A purpose built, state of the art stadium, seating 20,000 people, will be constructed. It is proposed that the stadium will include a 1,000 person conference centre and be capable of housing major outdoor events.
- Rockhampton will be broadcast to a national and international audience, further heightening the Region's potential.
- A national sporting team will be established.
- An Academy will be formed and based in Rockhampton providing young people with developmental pathways that will lead to continued education and meaningful employment opportunities.

The proposal would provide flow-on economic benefits associated with direct stimulus in the Construction and Recreation sectors. Based on the industries' multiplier effects within the Rockhampton Region alone - above

and beyond the injection of capital expenditure for the facilities and the benefits of the \$33 million expansion in recreation sector directly resulting from the establishment of the team and academy - the stimulus from the construction and operation of the NRL Stadium and Academy alone would deliver the following flow-on increases:

- Jobs: 2359 Full Time Equivalent Jobs (above and beyond those within the stadium and academy)
- · Value Added: \$162.3 Million
- · Gross Output: \$454.8 Million

While additional economic benefits would occur within the state and national economy above and beyond these benefits to the Rockhampton Region's economy, Rockhampton Regional Council has not added them within these figures. Likewise, these figures exclude the likely additional recreation sector stimulus associated with non-NRL business activities that are likely to occur as part of the stadium's operations, such as concerts and other sports events. Thus, this represents a conservative example of the stimulus this proposal could inject for economic growth.














YEPPOON FORESHORE REDEVELOPMENT

The Yeppoon Foreshore Redevelopment will transform the area between Appleton Park and Merv Anderson Park, including the former Yeppoon Hospital grounds, into a vibrant and active recreation area for the Region's community to enjoy.

It is Rockhampton Regional Council's desire to develop this site into a future community recreation area incorporating appropriate mixed use development, which when developed would be a major tourist drawcard for the Region and a substantial asset for the community.

The future of the Yeppoon Foreshore Project has been identified as a key issue for the Region's community, with Tourism Queensland and the Capricorn Tourist Organisation recognising the substantial benefit this development would bring to the Region.

WE HAVE

- \$2M committed from the Queensland Government to execute demolition of the former hospital buildings.
- Council committed \$185,000 to engage consultants to commence preliminary/conceptual planning, design and cost estimation works on the Yeppoon Foreshore Redevelopment Project.
- Enquiry by Design Workshop was held (22 and 23 November 2010) to progress works undertaken on the Yeppoon Foreshore Redevelopment Project.

- Community and stakeholder input was sought in early November 2010 and again over the December 2010/January 2011 period.
- Preliminary drawings and cost estimates for a staged development are completed.




DUAL SECTOR UNIVERSITY

The establishment of a Dual Sector University:

- Is widely supported by the Rockhampton Region community as it will deliver better short and long term higher education outcomes to our community;
- Meets the Bradley Review's vision for better connections across tertiary education and training, which are more dynamic and not readily defined by sectoral boundaries;
- Improves access and participation to higher education for rural, remote and regional students;
- Instigates enhancements to academic quality processes and policies in CQUniversity to develop an efficient regulatory and accountability framework consistent with the expectations of the Tertiary Education Quality and Standards Agency;
- Enhances facilities to provide a better quality learning and teaching experience for local students; and
