The Principal

The summer holidays are rushing towards us and the children joining us for next year have had their first day in school. It is a very exciting time for the new intake and for the second year running, we are the most popular school in the County. We are delighted that parents continue to place so much confidence in us. We hope the new children settle well in September and have a very successful time in the Academy.

The older students are breathing a sigh of relief as the examinations are now over. All of the older year groups have been involved in exams in some way. Some of Year 10 have been taking their GCSEs a year early, whilst Year 11 completed the full GCSE examinations and the Sixth Form completed their post 16 exams. The Humanities block and new ICT block have emerged from the ground and are well on their way. We are due to take possession of the Humanities block in October and the ICT block in December. A large part of the main school will be demolished over the summer holidays, so the children will be returning to a very different landscape in September. We will be tight for space for the first part of the Autumn term and then the school will gradually be returned to us. By a year in August it will all be over and we will have our world-class facilities finished!

What happens in those facilities is even more important and Ofsted have made their programmed monitoring visit for a new Academy. They have said that we are making good progress and that we have raised attainment for the children. They have given us ideas for the future around balancing teacher led and student led activities and improving the Sixth Form further. We are already working on these areas. The school is due a full Ofsted at the end of the 2011-12 Academic year. We will be aiming to get our third "Outstanding"!

My thanks to all of the staff, parents and students for their support and hard work over the year. We have had a very busy and very enjoyable year. Do have a lovely break when the summer holidays arrive.

On Thursday 3rd February, around 30 pupils from Y9 and 60 from Y11 were entered into the Intermediate Maths Challenge. This is a national event organised by Leeds University for the most able mathematicians in the country. Math Extravaganza

As we go to press the Maths Department is preparing for another evening of Mathematical Wonder. By the time you read this report, parents and pupils of this year's and next year's Y7 will have been treated to a variety of activities promoting mathematics as 'fun' and banishing the stigma that sometimes surrounds the subject.

Mr Crawshaw demonstrates some 'Mathematical Magic' by guessing the birthdays of members of the audience from answers they give him to a list of simple calculations. Pupils and parents are also given the opportunity to take part in some game shows, based on familiar shows which have appeared on TV over the years. These include "Play your Cards Right", "Countdown" and a mathematical version of 'Family Fortunes' using information gathered from 100 pupils during maths lessons, on topics such as 'name a famous mathematician' and 'name an imperial measurement'. Some pupils in the audience help out with the authentic sound effects for the right and wrong answers.

This year, for the first time, pupils and parents will be given the chance to take on the banker in a game of "Deal or No Deal" during which the maths behind the banker's offers will be explained.

Throughout the evening raffle tickets are given out to anybody that volunteers or succeeds in any of the activities for a prize draw at the end.

One of the first steps parents can do to help your child with Mathematics is to make sure they are fully equipped for lessons and exams. This, however, does not need to break the bank; your son or daughter can buy all the mathematics equipment they will need from either the Maths Shop or from any member of the Mathematics Department at the start of the lesson, for just over £1 (15cm Ruler + Pencil + Pen + Compass + Protractor = £1.05). We also sell Scientific Calculators (£6.50) that are easy to use and are suitable for any Key Stage 3, 4 or 5 student to use at any part of their time at St George's Academy.

St George's Academy Council

At the end of another hectic year on the Academy Council its important that the positive work of the students is shared with the staff and the parents. The Academy Council constitutes three representatives from each year group, who from their form discussions and Year Council meetings bring important topics to our meetings to be discussed. Feedback from either Mr Milnes or me is then relayed through the Year reps and via the minutes back to the students where the request originated. This method of communication gives all students the opportunity to be part of the democratic decision making process.

The focus for this year has been supporting charities; ideas for involvement have come from all year groups, but it was the Year Eight suggestion of Operation Christmas Child that I believe the Council can be most proud of. This appeal encouraged students to bring in shoeboxes full of small useful items for the destitute children of Eastern Europe and other impoverished regions. The response was the highest ever from St George's with 160 shoeboxes brought in. I would hope that if the project is run again next year then the students once again exceed expectations. It was a humbling experience to go to the warehouse where the shoeboxes are actually sorted, to see the work and dedication of Mike and Rowena that enables thousands of shoeboxes to be sent out from this area alone.

The students' charitable actions continued with both Children in Need and Red Nose Day. On both occasions, students from all years brought excellent ideas to Council meetings and then independently arranged their individual fundraising activities. A special mention must go to Year Ten, who for Comic Relief organised a fun run for the Year Seven students that raised over £1500. It was also a privilege to be invited onto Radio Lincolnshire to talk about the wide range of fundraising activities that students were involved in throughout the day.

Aside from our charity involvements, the Academy Council has been at the forefront of discussions on the new building designs. Students from the Council were invited to spend time with the architects behind the designs and offer suggestions and ask questions about the new buildings. Mr Watson also attended one our meetings to offer a presentation of how the new buildings will look.

This year has also seen a number of other improvements to the Academy Council; representatives from the Ruskington site now attend our meetings, so there is a greater connection between the two sites. Minutes from our meetings are also now published on the school website and we now have a budget to support our projects.

At this point, thanks must be given to Mr Milnes as the Council's staff co-ordinator, Mr Watson and the SMT for their continued appreciation for the role of the student voice. As we look to the future, with our new Academy status and construction underway for both the Sleaford and Ruskington sites, if St George's can maintain its strong community feel and continue to value the contribution of the student voice, then it can only go from strength to strength.

Firstly, the current Year 11 students have been working towards and have just completed their English Language and English Literature papers. Having settled into new groups in January in the light of the November examination results it has been a case of 'all guns blazing' to help these students achieve the best grades possible. Some students who are still hoping to achieve a grade C, and some who are hoping to achieve an A*, were assisted by Mr S Willshaw from CfBT to help give final advice and guidance.

Year 10 have also been working towards and have just completed their English Language GCSE. Again, last minute revision sessions and revision guides helped them to prepare for their first set of results.

Not to be outdone, the A level students in the department have been preparing for their exams. These are obviously important in terms of helping them to get to the University of their choice. 

As part of their 'Food and Shopping' topic, Year 9 German students spent a lesson experiencing typically German foods. Here are Toby Hetherington's opinions on the interesting delicacies he tried!

German Food Tasting Day

I thought that the German taster day was really good, there were some foods there that I didn't even know were German, like the gummy bears. I thought that some of these foods were from a different country. When we got inside we saw a whole array of foods from meats to sweets, bread and more and most of them looked tasty but sauerkraut (pickled cabbage) looked disgusting, it was purple and slimy. If we wanted some of the black forest gateau, Mrs Samworth said that we had to try the sauerkraut first!

Mrs Samworth gave us each a plate and sent one side of the room to collect a bit of everything. I got some Schwarzbrot which was really high in nutrition but this bread, which was supposed to be very good for you, sucked all of the water from your mouth and you instantly needed a drink whenever you ate a piece. I also tried some salami, which was really nice and had what looked like a pepper coating on the outside, it was really delicious and I think everyone liked it. We tried some frankfurters, which I knew I already liked, because I have them in hotdog rolls. We also tried a bigger version of the frankfurters called Bockwurst, it was like the frankfurter, but had a lot more meat in it which made it tastier. We also had slices of ham, there were two types, one was plain ham and the other was smoked. I found that the smoked ham was the nicest and I had two slices. Then we tried some sort of meatballs, one was turkey and chicken, the other was some sort of beef, they were very meaty and one of them tasted strongly of onions.

I eventually pushed myself to try some of the sauerkraut, it was a tiny amount but I still tried it, yuck, it was really disgusting and I had to wash it down with half a bottle of water. The master classes programme is being developed for next year. We are hoping to use the skills and expertise in our parent body to enrich this programme. We are hoping to offer the students as wide and as varied a range of role models as possible from accountants to zoo keepers!

Fairtrade at St George's Academy

Following our successful retention of Fairtrade School status in 2010 we now have 2 years to gain sufficient evidence to keep Fairtrade School status for a further 5 years. It has been a quieter year, but still one of much success. We have sold over £2000 of Fairtrade goodies to staff and pupils at the weekly Friday stall. *This is an average of £63 per week.* With respect to the younger supporters, we have been so pleased with the work of Megan Devine, Kelsey Tjepkema, Casey Reynolds, Odette Bristow and latterly Kain Waring.

We helped to organise a number of competitions, both in the Academy and across Sleaford during Fairtrade Fortnight. We gained publicity from the Sleaford Standard due to the impact that the pupils made; they were particularly noteworthy



when they bravely sold Fairtrade goods at the March Farmers' Market! (see http://www.sleaford-fairtrade.btck.co.uk/News for the pictures) They deserved medals rather than the hot chocolate they actually got! (but if Fairtrade did medals.....)

We also conducted a survey of Sleaford shoppers. We were so grateful to the Sixth Form Public Service students and Mr G Walker for their invaluable help. The conclusions of that survey were:

- (1) 60% of the people surveyed realised that Sleaford was already a Fairtrade Town;
- (2) More shoppers than in 2009 now believe that Fairtrade is not expensive;
- (3) They were prepared to pay up to 27p per 100p of original price for a Fairtrade product.

(Fortunately the price of Fairtrade is now very competitive with other leading brands.)

It also proved that the pupils are intrinsically involved in the business of the Town.

The Academy also organised the Fairtrade Town Fairtrade Business awards where 7 local businesses were recognised for their fantastic support of Fairtrade. Local primary school children write lots of letters to specific businesses whilst Y13 Business Department students Marcus Harris and Sam Fearfield wrote a superb report on the progress made with Fairtrade businesses within Sleaford. The Fairtrade Foundation, with their focus upon Fairtrade Cotton this year, wanted schools to create a world record breaking length of Fairtrade cotton bunting. The Academy, with the great work from the Art students supported by Miss C Ferrier, produced a multi-colour work which now forms part of the World Record of 3300 metres!!

As we submit this short article we are preparing to conduct a further survey in support of the renewal of the Sleaford Fairtrade Town bid. Pupils from Years 7 and 10 will go out and ask shop keepers what variety of Fairtrade stock that they sell. We hope to show the Fairtrade Foundation that the initiative which started at St George's College, but which now is vibrant at many of the primary and other secondary schools in Sleaford, is still flourishing and partly due to the enthusiasm and sheer limitless energy of the pupils of the Academy!

Lincolnshire Show Schools Challenge 2011

On Wednesday 22nd June and Thursday 23rd June the Billingborough Site BTEC Countryside and Environment group represented the Academy at the Lincolnshire Show. They had produced a booklet covering a range of topics under the general heading of Farming: Past, Present, and Future. The booklet is an impressive piece of work that received many very favourable comments. Although the team did not win, Jay Bradley and Lucy King received special prizes for their own personal achievement in the Challenge.

Members of the public who were interested were invited to take a copy of the booklet and to make a small donation to the 'Make a Wish' charity.

BBC News School Report

She has written on film for Total Film, The Guardian, Little White Lies and NME among other publications, hosted Q&As and interviewed a wide range of film directors and movie stars.

Ms Jones worked with the students during the day to help them improve the quality of their reviews. At lunchtime she ran a master class for the participating students, explaining how she became a journalist and answering questions from the students

Points were again awarded for the level of performance; the faster you ran, the further you threw or jumped, the more points you earned – up to 38 points for each competitor. In addition, 20 bonus points were awarded to the winner of each event, 16 for second, 13 for third, then 10, 8, 6, 4, 3, 2, 1 for the rest. The scoring system means that it is always a high scoring, exciting competition, as big swings are possible at any time.

Unfortunately, being an English summer (and particularly Wimbledon fortnight), rain (in fact a thunderstorm) stopped play mid –afternoon! The remaining events (some events for Years 7 & 8) were re-scheduled for later dates, which had to be after the printers' deadline for this magazine due to continuing unreliable weather. Consequently, the results above are incomplete and may change significantly.

The most notable performances so far as we go to press include:

Helen Chapman smashing the Y10 100m record which had stood since 1988. She knocked nearly half a second off the record.

Jim Ownsworth breaking 2 Y9 records (Javelin and shot – the former had been a record since 1992) Kirsty Williams breaking the Y8 800m record which had stood since 1993.

Humanities

The History Department will also be losing a long standing and highly respected colleague as Mr Senior retires. His commitment to the students over the years cannot be faulted and his knowledge of the subject will be sorely missed by his colleagues in the faculty.

We wish them both long and happy retirements.

Humanities across the Academy

This has been another year of change and development in the Humanities Faculty as both the Sleaford and Ruskington sites have begun to work more closely. We share schemes of work at Key Stage Three and GCSE levels, meet regularly and discuss teaching and learning across the sites. Our first joint educational visit is planned for the summer term to Bosworth battlefield and Twycross Zoo. The greater alignment between the sites can only bring about more benefits for our students now and in the future.

KS3 Geography

We have improved our schemes of work at Key Stage Three to make them more current and in response to the views of students. The schemes of work have been developed to include a wider range of thinking skills and activities which get the students involved in their learning. We have also left some curriculum time to discuss current events such as the Japanese tsunami. These developments go some way to explaining the increase in numbers of students opting to take subject at GCSE as does its inclusion in the English Baccalaureate.

The ever popular Natural History Museum visit took place in March. The clamour to book a place on this visit is always very high and there were a large number of worthy students who missed out this year. Those lucky enough to be invited had an excellent day at the museum and conducted themselves very well. The breakdown of our coach and the puncture experienced by the relief coach didn't dampen our spirits too much!

The museum is always spellbinding for the students. The sight of the dinosaur in the entrance hall and the sheer size of the blue whale live long in the memory. Our studies of plate tectonics in the class room are enhanced by the visits to the earth galleries at the Museum and the students are able to make better connections to the world around them having taken part in this visit.

No visit to the museum would be complete without trips to see the T Rex in the dinosaurs gallery or the creepy crawlies and again we didn't disappoint! The students managed to spend themselves out on a trip to the shop before departure and returned with many bars of chocolate and souvenirs. Their behaviour on the visit was the best we have ever experienced and have set a high bar for others to live up too.

GCSE Geography

The English Baccalaureate has provided a much needed boost to the profile of Geography nationally. We at St George's have always known the value of the subject and many students have continued their studies to GCSE, A level and beyond. This year however has seen the numbers opting for the subject increase again. The developments in the Academy and specifically the development of a new Humanities block, due to be ready in November 2011, with improved ICT access will assist us in making our Geography students even more ready for the world beyond the Academy.

The department are looking forward to making use of a range of new developments in our teaching and the students learning such as geographical information systems, a weather station, electronic books, digital mapping and much more. There has never been a more exciting time to study geography. Our visits programme has expanded this year, with visits in the local area to Navenby and the more regionally to Edale and the Holderness coasts. The Edale visit which is running again next year is always a favourite with the Year 10 students. They get an excellent opportunity to develop some outdoor activity skills as well as their geographical skills, knowledge and understanding. Our visit to Hornsea on the Holderness coast was a resounding success too with the students managing to collect some excellent data for the controlled assessment task we have to complete as part of the course. They developed their ability to use fieldwork equipment and act as members of a team. The weather was kind to us which always helps when you are doing fieldwork!

A Level

The study of this academic subject which develops so many skills needed for life beyond the Academy has remained a popular choice over the last few years and almost a quarter of those taking the subject are continuing with it or a related course at University or College. This is a tremendous testament to the quality of the education they are receiving in the Academy. Our visits programme at A level has developed over the years to include visits to study sand dune ecosystems at Gibraltar Point and the socio-economic differences in urban environments in Hull. We would like to wish all our current students every success in the future.


