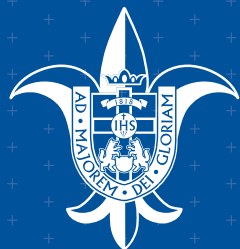


MISSION STATEMENT

An Overview

Saint Louis University is a Jesuit, Catholic university ranked among the top research institutions in the nation. The University fosters the intellectual and character development of 12,733 students on campuses in St. Louis and Madrid, Spain. Founded in 1818, it is the oldest university west of the Mississippi and the second oldest Jesuit university in the United States. Through teaching, research, health care and community service, Saint Louis University has provided one-of-a-kind education, leadership and service for 191 years.



SLU RANKINGS AND HONORS

- + The 2009 edition of *U.S. News & World Report's* "America's Best Colleges" ranks SLU 80th out of more than 260 national universities, making SLU one of the top five Jesuit universities in the United States.
- + The Princeton Review lists SLU among the nation's top institutions in its *Best 368 Colleges 2009* guide, which recognizes only 15 percent of all four-year colleges in the nation. The Princeton Review also named SLU a "Best Midwestern College."
- + The Carnegie Foundation lists SLU as one of a handful of Catholic universities that is "research extensive." In fiscal year 2008, SLU's research funds totaled \$63.4 million.

Changing Lives

RESEARCH

+ During fiscal year 2008, SLU's Medical Center researchers in health sciences were awarded funds through grants, contracts and subcontracts totaling \$57.6 million. This includes funding from the National Institutes of Health and other government sources such as the National Science Foundation and Centers for Disease Control. This figure also includes money awarded from private industry, associations and foundations.

+ In FY08, there were 455 funded Medical Center research projects.

+ SLU researchers in areas outside of health sciences also received funds awarded through grants, contracts and subcontracts from government, associations, foundations and private agencies, generating \$5.8 million for 82 projects during FY08.

+ Construction of SLU's new biomedical Edward A. Doisy Research Center was completed in 2007. Research in the new state-of-the-art, environmentally friendly facility focuses on several core areas: cancer; molecular and structural biology; cardiovascular and pulmonary diseases; infectious diseases and biodefense; neurosciences and aging; and liver disease.

MISSION AND OUTREACH

+ Saint Louis University has been recognized as a character-building college by *The Templeton Guide: Colleges That Encourage Character Development*.

+ University students, faculty and staff contributed 836,550 community service hours to organizations, groups and individuals during 2007.

+ SLU's chapter of Alpha Phi Omega, a co-ed service fraternity, is the largest in the nation as

well as one of the biggest student organizations on campus.

+ SLU students and volunteers cook and deliver meals to St. Louis neighbors in need as part of a unique cooperative between the University, the Campus Kitchens Project and local nonprofit service organizations.

+ During University breaks, Campus Ministry sponsors students who spend time serving the poor and marginalized within

TEACHING

+ 99 percent of tenured and tenure-track faculty hold the highest degree in their field.

+ The average class size is 23.1, and the student-to-teacher ratio is 12-1.

+ SLU boasts 39 endowed chairs and 18 named professorships.

+ SLU offers inquiry courses for undergraduates that feature small

class sizes and unique learning experiences. Undergraduates also assist faculty with research.

+ More than 35 Jesuits live, teach and minister at Saint Louis University.

+ 54 percent of undergraduate courses have fewer than 20 students.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENT

+ The Board of Trustees authorized the establishment of a revolving loan fund of \$10 million from the University endowment for real estate development projects surrounding the SLU campus.

+ SLU students work with organizations to provide services such as needs assessment for the elderly and disabled, basic legal advice, child immunization tracking,

consumer education and hearing screenings for children.

+ University improvements, enhancements and expansions have totaled more than \$840 million since 1987.

+ SLU has established a forgivable loan program, Hometown SLU, for full-time employees who purchase homes in designated areas near the University.

Colleges and Schools

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

Year Founded: 1818

Dean: Donald G. Brennan, Ph.D.

- + Boasting nationally ranked programs, the college offers more than 30 majors in the sciences, social sciences, humanities, and fine and performing arts.
- + The college is home to 16 academic departments and 10 interdisciplinary programs.
- + The college houses several centers of excellence, including the Center for Environmental Sciences, which is coordinating groundbreaking research into climate change, natural hazards, sustainable development, biodiversity and other critical areas.
- + In 2008, researchers developed a significantly more precise weather monitoring and forecasting system that can pinpoint severe weather activity on a neighborhood-by-neighborhood basis. The system will assist a local power company in returning power to homes after outages.
- + In 2008, SLU researchers became the first team of foreign experts to enter China's earthquake zone following the 7.9-magnitude quake in May 2008. The SLU team has been asked to study what caused the massive quake and analyze ongoing geologic hazards.

COLLEGE OF EDUCATION AND PUBLIC SERVICE

Year Founded: 1998

Interim Dean: John Watzke, Ph.D.

- + The college offers leading programs in education, public policy, and counseling and family therapy. The college also is home to the School of Social Work.
- + The master of social work program rose to No. 42 in *U.S. News & World Report's* graduate school rankings for 2009.
- + The college offers several dual degree programs, including the new social work and public administration graduate degree.
- + The college is home to several centers of distinction, which provide students with collaborative academic experiences while improving the community through outreach programs and research projects.
- + RegionWise, a clearinghouse of regional information housed at the college, is leading a three-year, \$666,000 project to address urban water pollution problems in North St. Louis County.

COLLEGE OF PHILOSOPHY AND LETTERS

Year Founded: 1889

Dean: Garth L. Hallett, S.J.

- + The college provides academic training for men, both religious and diocesan, preparing for priesthood.
- + SLU's philosophy professors have gained national and international recognition through prestigious awards and lectureships.



EDWARD AND MARGARET DOISY COLLEGE OF HEALTH SCIENCES

Year Founded: 1929

Dean: Charlotte Brasic Royeen, Ph.D.

- + The Doisy College of Health Sciences is home to seven academic departments. Many of the college's programs are excellent pre-med options.
- + Through a unique interprofessional curriculum, students from Doisy College and other health care programs discover the best strategies to collaborate so they can provide outstanding care for patients.
- + *U.S. News & World Report* ranks the physician assistant education program among the top 20 in the country.
- + Doisy College recently has added programs for students who wish to pursue careers as athletic trainers; diagnosticians and therapists who work with cancer patients; and managers of health information technology.
- + The department of nutrition and dietetics operates Fresh Gatherings, a campus cafeteria offering gourmet, agriculturally sustainable foods.
- + The department of occupational science and occupational therapy is recognized internationally for leadership in the development of applied occupational science.
- + The college receives research support from the National Institutes of Health, the Department of Health and Human Services and multiple private foundations.

GRADUATE SCHOOL

Year Founded: 1832

Dean: Donald G. Brennan, Ph.D.

- + The Graduate School offers nationally recognized advanced degrees, ranking among the top five Catholic schools in doctoral degrees granted during the past 20 years.
- + The school also is home to the Center for Advanced Dental Education, which offers selective, nationally recognized programs in orthodontics, periodontics and endodontics.
- + The school offers more than 40 programs of study, as well as certificates and advanced dual-degree programs.
- + *U.S. News & World Report* ranks the Ph.D. program in clinical psychology among the top 100 in the country for 2009. Ph.D. programs in biology and history also rank among the nation's best.
- + The graduate program in medieval philosophy is rated the best in the country by top philosophers through the *Philosophical Gourmet Report*. Other philosophy graduate programs received high marks in the internationally renowned report.
- + *Diverse - Issues in Higher Education* ranked SLU No. 23 in the number of doctoral degrees in psychology awarded to African Americans.
- + In 2008, the school launched a new master's degree program in public sociology and criminology/criminal justice.

PARKS COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING, AVIATION AND TECHNOLOGY

Year Founded: 1927

Dean: Manoj S. Patankar, Ph.D.

- + Parks College is the first federally certificated flight school in the nation.
- + Rooted in a tradition of hands-on learning, Parks has a worldwide reputation for aviation and aerospace engineering programs and is a leader in biomedical, electrical, mechanical and other engineering disciplines.
- + According to the American Society for Engineering Education, SLU ranks among the top 10 universities in the nation for women engineers.
- + In 2008, Parks became home to the Airline Quality Rating, which rates all major U.S. airlines. The ratings are viewed by more than 50 million people a year and regularly featured by top news outlets, including CNN and *USA Today*.
- + The 2009 edition of *U.S. News & World Report's* "America's Best Colleges" ranks the college's undergraduate engineering programs No. 38 in the nation.
- + In 2008, Parks received \$2.25 million from the Federal Aviation Administration to create the new National Center for Aviation Safety Research.
- + In 2008, Parks launched an innovative interdisciplinary engineering undergraduate program that is tailored to students' individual interests.

JOHN COOK SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

Year Founded: 1910

Dean: Ellen Harshman, Ph.D., J.D.

- + The business school is the 15th oldest business school in the nation and one of only 21 schools in the country to provide comprehensive international business education.
- + Home to seven centers of distinction, the school offers a nationally ranked undergraduate business degree with concentrations in nine areas.
- + The school also offers five graduate programs that give students a competitive edge, including an innovative one-year, full-time MBA program.
- + The school's part-time MBA program climbed 10 spots to No. 16 on the *U.S. News & World Report* "American's Best Graduate Schools" rankings for 2009.
- + In 2008, the school launched the innovative SLU Billiken Angels Network, a program that identifies and invests funds and expertise in businesses that can make a difference in the region's economy.
- + *U.S. News* ranked the school's undergraduate programs among the best in the country for 2009.
- + In 2008, *Business Week* ranked the school's undergraduate programs No. 71 in the country.
- + In 2008, *Entrepreneur* magazine gave SLU an honorable mention for entrepreneurship education alongside Harvard, Stanford and MIT. And, *Women 3.0* magazine rated SLU among the best for female entrepreneurs.



SCHOOL FOR PROFESSIONAL STUDIES

Year Founded: 1996

Dean: Marla Berg-Weger, Ph.D.

- + The school offers degrees and certificates designed for busy adults, with accelerated online, evening and weekend classes.
- + Students can study on the St. Louis campus or at the school's satellite location in Belleville, Ill.
- + In 2008, the school greatly expanded its number of courses from 70 to 100.
- + In 2008, the school moved into a newly renovated building that supports the needs of its adult students, today and into the future.
- + Also in 2008, the school launched three new academic programs, including SLU's first undergraduate degree available totally online as well as programs in nursing and technology.

SCHOOL OF LAW

Year Founded: 1843

Dean: Jeffrey E. Lewis, J.D.

- + The school is home to several centers of excellence, including the Center for Health Law Studies, ranked No. 1 for 2009 by *U.S. News & World Report*. The program has secured the top spot for five consecutive years.
- + Students can participate in clerkships, corporate externships, fellowships and courtroom competitions.
- + During the 2007-08 academic year, the School of Law's legal clinics provided more than 31,000 hours of free legal service from students gaining practical, hands-on legal experience.
- + For unparalleled cultural experiences and in-depth knowledge of international law, students can participate in numerous study-abroad opportunities, including programs in Germany, Spain, Ireland, France and Asia.
- + In 2008, the school helped coordinate the largest naturalization ceremony in St. Louis history.
- + In 2008, the law school marked the 100th anniversary of admitting women in its programs. SLU was the first Jesuit institution to admit women.
- + Qualifying pre-law scholars are guaranteed admission to the School of Law as undergraduates and have an acceptance letter in hand their junior year.

SCHOOL OF MEDICINE

Year Founded: 1836

Dean: Philip O. Alderson, M.D.

- + The School of Medicine educates physicians and biomedical scientists, conducts medical research and provides health care on a local, national and international level.
- + The school awarded the first medical degree west of the Mississippi River.
- + Many of the school's approximately 440 faculty members are nationally and internationally recognized scholars, clinicians and teachers.
- + The school teaches about 680 medical students and 550 residents in 48 graduate medical education programs, including residencies, subspecialty residencies and fellowships.
- + The school is a leading center of research in five key areas: cancer, liver disease, heart/lung disease, aging and brain disease, and infectious disease.



SCHOOL OF NURSING

Year Founded: 1928

Dean: Teri A. Murray, Ph.D.

- + The school is nationally recognized for its expert faculty and innovative and pioneering programs, and it offers bachelor's, master's and doctoral nursing education programs.
- + Through a one-of-a-kind inter-professional curriculum, nursing students collaborate with those studying other health careers to learn teamwork strategies and offer the best possible care to patients.
- + The school was the first in the country to offer an accelerated nursing program for qualified students seeking a fast-track bachelor's degree in nursing.
- + The school became the first in the state to offer a doctoral program and in 2008 introduced the area's first doctoral degree for advance nurse practitioners.
- + The school also is the first in the nation to offer an online certificate program that prepares nurses to lead in case of a natural disaster or terror attack.

SCHOOL OF PUBLIC HEALTH

Year Founded: 1991

Interim Dean: Homer Schmitz, Ph.D.

- + The School of Public Health is the only accredited school of public health in Missouri and the nation's only public health school at a Jesuit, Catholic university.
- + The school offers a new undergraduate health management degree, as well as master's and doctoral programs in six public health disciplines. It also has joint degrees with the Doisy College of Health Sciences and schools of business, law, medicine and social work.
- + Its M.H.A. program, ranked 12th nationally by *U.S. News and World Report*, celebrated its 60th anniversary in 2007.
- + The school is home to 10 nationally recognized centers, and its research focuses on areas including cardiovascular disease, cancer, child health, obesity, diabetes, bioterrorism, HIV/AIDS, lead poisoning and clean water.
- + The school received federal contracts to lead area research institutions in a landmark study on the environmental and genetic factors that influence the development of disease in children.

SAINT LOUIS UNIVERSITY - MADRID

Year Founded: 1967

Vice President/Rector: Frank Reale, S.J.

- + SLU's Madrid campus is the first U.S. institution to be recognized by Spain's higher education accreditation authority as an official foreign university.
- + It is the oldest and most renowned U.S. university in Spain.
- + The campus offers its 637 students four-year undergraduate baccalaureate degrees as well as master's degrees in Spanish and English for its permanent students.
- + Students also can begin degree programs in aviation, engineering, business, health sciences and liberal arts at the Madrid campus and complete them at the St. Louis campus.
- + Each semester, more than 200 students arrive at the Madrid campus for a study-abroad experience. Attracted by the quality educational reputation of the St. Louis and Madrid campuses, more than 250 universities in the United States send study-abroad students to SLU's Madrid campus.



Student Life

LEARNING OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM

- + Innovative programs for freshmen ensure that their first year at SLU goes smoothly. In addition, sophomores, juniors and seniors can participate in programs tailored just for them.
- + Eight residence halls, three apartment complexes and three language houses offer diverse living options. Many learning communities and topic-focused housing options are available.
- + Students are supported in their choice of major and career development through a focus on exploration and educational planning in academic advising and career counseling. SLU recently developed the Student Success Center, a one-stop shop for student support services, including tutoring, academic advising, career services and more.

LEADERSHIP AND ACTIVITIES

- + SLU offers involvement opportunities in more than 170 student organizations, including service/honorary/social fraternities and sororities, media/audiovisual programming groups and special interest clubs. Leadership development programs assist students in fulfilling their leadership potential.
- + Busch Student Center, SLU's student union, features a 1,600-seat ballroom, bank, bookstore, floral

- shop, hair salon, meeting spaces and other amenities as well as a variety of dining options.
- + The BSC also houses the Student Government Association and other student organization offices, as well as SLU-TV, *The University News* and KSLU radio. Additionally, it houses the Cross-Cultural Center, which strives to cultivate intercultural awareness and student engagement.
- + The Student Activities Board plans and presents major

WELLNESS

- + Simon Recreation Center, a 120,000-square-foot facility, includes more than 200 pieces of fitness equipment, a multipurpose gym with elevated jogging track, racquetball courts, group exercise rooms, a juice bar, an indoor pool and a climbing wall.
- + Membership to Simon Recreation Center is included in the SLU experience for all students. Faculty, staff, alumni and their families can join as well. There also are special memberships for friends of the University as well as one-day guest passes.
- + A focus on student wellness brings together Student Health and Counseling services, programs and peer education, Campus Ministry's spiritual growth opportunities, Simon Recreation Center classes and holistic dining options to help students maintain balance and promote a healthy lifestyle.

- entertainment acts for the University. Past musical acts have included Jack's Mannequin, Guster, O.A.R., Dashboard Confessional and Rihanna. Past comedians have included Jimmy Fallon, Frank Caliendo and Seth Meyers.
- + The student-led Great Issues Committee brings prominent speakers to campus, recently welcoming presidential candidate Ralph Nader and journalist Bob Woodward.

BILLIKEN ATHLETICS

+ The Saint Louis University Billikens compete at the NCAA Division I level in baseball, basketball, cross country, field hockey, track and field, soccer, swimming and diving, softball, tennis and volleyball.

+ SLU is the only Division I school in St. Louis.

+ SLU is a member of the Atlantic 10 Conference, which includes Charlotte, Dayton, Duquesne, Fordham, George Washington, La Salle, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Richmond, St. Bonaventure, Saint Joseph's, Temple and Xavier.

+ During the 2007-08 academic year, SLU student-athletes posted a 3.12 GPA. A league-high 114 students made the Commissioner's Honor Roll in fall 2007, and 100 achieved that honor in spring 2008.

+ Chaifetz Arena, SLU's new 10,600-seat on-campus arena, opened in April 2008. The complex, home to Billiken men's and women's basketball games and many other events, also includes an athletic practice facility that hosts volleyball matches. A connecting three-story building houses the athletic department offices and support facilities.

WHAT'S A BILLIKEN?

The Billiken is a symbol of good luck that was a national craze in the early 1900s. In 1908, Florence Pretz, an art teacher, received a patent for her version of an ancient Asian figure. Later, the Billiken Co. of Chicago adopted the likeness, giving it its name. Manufactured as a bank and statuette, the Billiken reached its peak of popularity in 1911. Its association with SLU can be traced back to sportswriters who thought the SLU football coach, John Bender, bore a striking resemblance to the im-



ish creature. One sportswriter drew a cartoon of Bender as a Billiken, posted it in a drugstore window and tabbed the football team "Bender's Billikens." The public took up the moniker, and it soon became the official nickname of all SLU teams.

+ The office of alumni relations reaches out to alumni abroad, particularly where large numbers of alumni reside, such as Bangkok, Madrid, Seoul and Taipei.

+ SLU alumni have served as U.S. Surgeon General, U.S. Attorney General and members of Congress. They also include an award-winning Broadway producer and the former director of mission operations at NASA.

+ Since 1818, nine colleges and universities have been established by SLU alumni or professors.

On Campus

SLUCARE

SLUCare, the physician medical practice of Saint Louis University School of Medicine, has 350 full-time and part-time faculty physicians who practice in 14 clinical departments. These physicians – along with nurse practitioners, medical assistants, nurses and related professionals – provide primary through quaternary care services at locations in Missouri and Illinois. - + 124 SLUCare physicians are named as St. Louis' best doctors according to an annual survey conducted by Best Doctors Inc. and printed in the August 2008 issue of *St. Louis Magazine*.
- + SLUCare is the first academic group practice in the St. Louis area to implement an Electronic Health Record (EHR).
- + SLUCare physicians serve as the team physicians for Billiken athletics.
- + SLUCare is the only academic medical practice in St. Louis fully accredited by the Accreditation Association for Ambulatory Health Care Inc.
- + For fiscal year 2008, there were almost 470,000 outpatient visits to SLUCare providers.

SAFETY

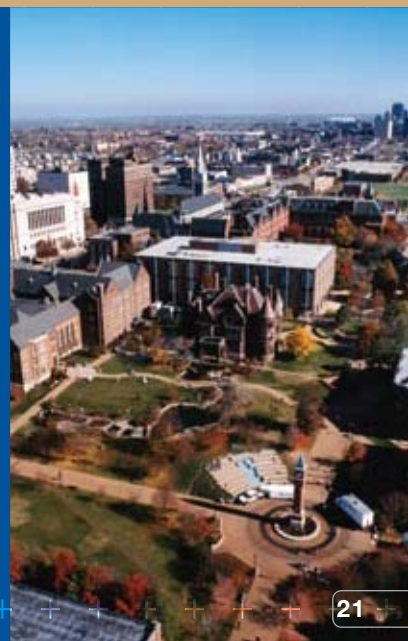
- + More than 100 well-trained public safety officers patrol campus on foot, on bikes and in vehicles.
- + SLU educates students about personal and dating safety as well as alcohol awareness.
- + In January 2008 all safety and preparedness units were reorganized to enhance efficiency and protection.
- + Also in 2008 SLU launched a broad emergency preparedness initiative, which includes the development of a business continuity and recovery plan.
- + SLU has a special communication system that can reach students, faculty and staff quickly in the event of a campus emergency.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

- + SLU is a completely wireless campus, supplementing the access available in classrooms, residence halls and apartments.
- + Students use computers and networks from their residence halls and apartments and from numerous computer labs throughout SLU, including at the Madrid campus.
- + Classrooms are equipped with access to Internet resources, including Internet 2, for massive data transmission and video conferencing.
- + Information technology services maintains computer equipment in 226 classrooms and 29 labs. More than 20,000 computers are used by students, faculty and staff on campus.

AMENITIES AND FACILITIES

- + There are 127 buildings on SLU's 235-acre campus.
- + Busch Student Center is available for community rentals. The Wool Ballroom can seat 1,000 people at tables or 1,600 for a lecture.
- + The Water Tower Inn, SLU's on-campus hotel for short-term and extended-stay guests, features 62 guest rooms, five meeting rooms, food service and a fitness center.
- + The University's Lay Center in Louisiana, Mo., offers both art and educational opportunities for community groups. The 380-acre property features a sculpture park, children's garden, classroom, laboratory and residential facilities, and an interpretive center displaying the area's natural and cultural history.
- + Manresa Center – a former Franciscan monastery – and Il Monastero – a former Presbyterian church – have been renovated as retreat, conference and meeting centers in Midtown St. Louis.
- + Bannister House, SLU's faculty, staff and alumni club, is open weekdays for breakfast and lunch and is available for private gatherings.
- + Students, faculty and staff can conduct environmental and biological research at Reis Biological Station near Steelville, Mo., as well as at Lay Center.





+ SLU is home to three libraries: Pius XII Memorial Library, Medical Center Library and Omer Poos Law Library.

+ Collectively, the libraries hold more than 2 million volumes and provide access to more than 40,000 electronic resources including databases, journals and e-books. Podcasts, RSS feeds and blogs are accessible through the libraries' main Web site.

+ Pius XII Memorial Library is the main library for undergraduate, graduate, faculty and visiting scholars' research, as well as learning and study needs. It also is home to the University Archives, a full-service café, the University's Testing Center, the Reinert Center for Teaching Excellence, writing centers and the iCommons.

+ The Vatican Film Library, located within Pius Library, holds the most extensive collection of manuscripts microfilmed from the Vatican Library in the world, including archival records on

the history of Jesuit missions in the Western Hemisphere filmed from library collections located in Spain and Latin America.

+ Ranked 14th among 199 American Bar Association-accredited law school libraries in total number of titles available to faculty and students, Omer Poos Law Library's collection includes more than 650,000 volumes in print and microform along with access to law-related databases.

+ The Medical Center Library is housed in the Doisy Learning Resources Center and is a 32,000-square-foot facility that provides quiet and comfortable accommodations for students to study and meet.

+ Through the new document delivery program, the Medical Center Library offers students, faculty, researchers and clinicians access to key databases and e-resources necessary for teaching and research both on-site and remotely from anywhere in the world.

Museums

SAINT LOUIS UNIVERSITY MUSEUM OF ART (SLUMA)



+ The one-time Beaux Arts home of the St. Louis Club, SLUMA contains more than 50,000 square feet of gallery space.

+ SLUMA hosts visiting exhibitions as well as permanent collections. The works of Serge Poliakoff, Michael Eastman, Annie Leibovitz, Dale Chihuly and other artists have been showcased at SLUMA. The museum also features the Collection of Western Jesuit Missions, with religious art and artifacts from the 13th-20th centuries.

+ SLUMA's MacLennan Gallery of Asian Decorative Art is one of the largest U.S. collections of its kind.

SAMUEL CUPPLES HOUSE



+ In 1888, wealthy St. Louis entrepreneur Samuel Cupples commissioned architect Thomas Annan to design a magnificent mansion that would speak to Cupples' business success.

+ The three-story home is made of purple Colorado sandstone with gargoyles and elaborate architectural details. It exists today as one of the rare examples of Richardsonian-style Romanesque architecture in St. Louis.

+ The elaborate interior of carved wood and stained glass once was heated by 22 unique fireplaces.

+ Cupples House serves as a gallery for SLU's collection of fine and decorative art dating before 1919. The Eleanor Turshin Glass Collection, featuring the largest collection of art nouveau and art deco glass west of the Mississippi River, is shown throughout the mansion.

MUSEUM OF CONTEMPORARY RELIGIOUS ART (MOCRA)

+ The Museum of Contemporary Religious Art is the world's first museum dedicated to the dialogue between contemporary artists and the world's faith traditions.

+ The museum opened in 1993 and is located in a former chapel in Fusz Hall.

+ In its first 15 years MOCRA has presented the work of artists of local, regional and national stature, and its many exhibitions have received critical acclaim.

+ MOCRA's exhibitions are supplemented with educational programming including tours, lectures and symposia, movies and performances.

SAINT LOUIS UNIVERSITY HISTORY

SLU's beginnings date to 1818, three years before Missouri became a state and when St. Louis was a pioneer settlement of 3,000 people. At this time, Louis William DuBourg, bishop of Louisiana, opened St. Louis Academy, which began in a one-story stone house and later became St. Louis College.

In 1823, DuBourg offered the Society of Jesus a farm near Florissant, Mo., for a Native American school and additional property in the city for the building of a college. The Jesuits' Maryland provincial authorized a band of 12 Belgian Jesuits – two priests, seven scholastics and three lay brothers – to set out for Missouri in 1823.

Ground was broken in 1828 for a three-story building downtown at the corner of Ninth Street and Washington Avenue. During construction, classes were conducted in Florissant. On Nov. 2, 1829, the college formally reopened in St. Louis, and enrollment reached 150 students. On Dec. 28, 1832, the institution became Saint Louis University when Gov. Daniel Dunklin signed the charter granted by the general assembly of Missouri. In 1888, the University moved to its present Midtown St. Louis site.

THE JESUIT TRADITION

The Society of Jesus, commonly known as the Jesuits, is renowned for its worldwide educational institutions. Today, more than 650 Jesuit institutions educate women and men around the world.

Founded in 1540 by Ignatius of Loyola, the Society's original plans included a trek to the Holy Land to follow the life of Jesus. War prevented the group from making the trip, so the Jesuits placed themselves at the pope's disposal to "seek the greater glory of God and the greater aid of others."

Although Jesuits filled a variety of needs in their early history, Ignatius realized the need for education in the world was great, and he included this work in the Jesuit Constitutions. In 1543, the Jesuits began to teach both Christian doctrine and scholarly subjects in Goa, India. Schools originally intended for young Jesuits began to admit other students. The Society of Jesus also received a request to establish a college for lay people in Messina, Sicily. By 1556, the Society of Jesus had opened 40 colleges throughout the world.

The Jesuit tradition demands excellence in research and teaching, but it also calls for educating "women and men for others." This approach is accomplished through educating the whole person. Dedicated to its Jesuit heritage, SLU strives to put knowledge to the service of humanity and to contribute to the transformation of society.



SLU'S PRESIDENT

Since his inauguration as president in 1987, President Lawrence Biondi, S.J., has reshaped and revitalized Saint Louis University. During the past two decades, Father Biondi upgraded and modernized the University campus and encouraged redevelopment of the community around it. Most importantly, he committed vast University resources to academics, student scholarships and financial aid, faculty research and state-of-the-art technology. These improvements have helped SLU move closer to realizing Father Biondi's vision that SLU become the finest Catholic university in the United States.

A Chicago native, Biondi joined the Jesuits in 1957 shortly after graduating from St. Ignatius High School. Since that time, higher education has played an important role in his life. His master's degree in linguistics and his doctorate in sociolinguistics were conferred by Georgetown University. He has three degrees from Loyola University Chicago and a licentiate in sacred theology from the Jesuit School of Theology at Chicago.

My vision is to establish and maintain Saint Louis University as the finest Catholic university in the United States, wherein the entire University community is actively engaged in student formation. 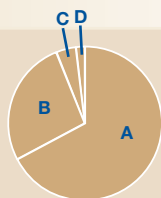
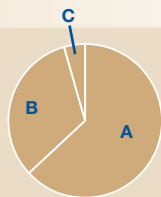

ST. LOUIS

Located on the Mississippi River, St. Louis is a metropolitan region boasting nearly 3 million people, with more than 350,000 residents in the city itself. It is home to a number of Fortune 500 and Fortune 1,000 companies, and the city has received national recognition for its successful efforts to revitalize its downtown area and renovate its historic buildings.

St. Louis claims a number of significant cultural gems, including the famous Gateway Arch, the tallest monument in the United States; Forest Park, which is larger than New York City’s Central Park and contains the city’s zoo, art museum, science center and history museum; and a booming performance arts district, featuring the historic Fox Theatre and the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra, the second-oldest in the nation.

St. Louis is noted for being one of the nation’s best sports cities and having great fans. Residents and visitors root for the 10-time World Champion St. Louis Cardinals baseball team, St. Louis Blues hockey team, St. Louis Rams football team and a number of independent sports teams. In addition, the Saint Louis University Billikens excite the city with 16 NCAA Division I sports – SLU is St. Louis’ only Division I school.

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
