Links with Moonekera School in Malawi



Letters arrived this week from our link school. The new headteacher, Mrs. Violet Lumbe is very keen to work in partnership with the school and has provided us with a lot of information about her school. We sent out two cameras and we look forward to getting the photographs developed and put on display in the school. A number of pupils across the year groups in our school have written to pupils in Malawi and the children in Malawi have written back. We hope to do some joint project work with them in the future. The children have talked about local food in their letters and we would like to tell them about our traditional foods





Our pupils and your children did us proud, not just on the festival evening but also in their school performance two days before


