# General Information

## 1) Palais des Congrès

The Conference centre is open to participants from 26 September to 3 October from 7:45 to 22:00.

The Palais des Congrès has three levels (-1, 0, +1), providing access to the 2 amphitheatres and 9 meeting rooms which will be used for the plenary and regular sessions of the 26th International Population Conference. Elevators and stairs provide access to the different levels. A map of the three levels can be found on pages 23-25 of this bulletin.

A number of services can be found in the Conference centre, including a travel agency (Objectif Maroc), a bank and currency exchange, a cyber café, information booths, and a message board where participants can leave and receive messages. There is also direct access to the Mansour Eddahbi Hotel complex and restaurants and bars through the Salle Royale.

## 2) Registration

Only participants with an official Conference badge may enter the Palais des Congrès. This badge should be carefully guarded for the duration of the Conference.

### Registered Participants:

Participants who have already registered and whose registration fees have been paid **before 15 September** are invited to pick up their Conference badge at the Registration Area starting Saturday 26 September through Friday 2 October from 8:00 to 17:00. To pick up your badge please bring a copy of your Conference registration receipt and present it to the personnel at the "Badge Pick-up" desk.

### On-site Registration and Payment:

Participants who did not register online **before 15 September** should go to the "Payment and On-site Registration" desk. Those who pre-registered but

did not pay online or did not receive a receipt by email indicating that their cheque had been received are also requested to go to this booth.

Please note that registration at IUSSP member rate (400 € instead of 600 €) is only available to members in **good standing as of 15 September 2009**.

All participants in attendance will receive by email a "Certificate of Attendance" after the Conference.

## 3) Conference Badges and Kits

Badges include each participant's name and institution and must be worn at all times within the Conference centre. Lost badges can be replaced at the Registration Area upon presentation of your Conference receipt, identification, and payment of 200 dirhams.

Conference badges provide full access to the Palais des Congrès for the duration of the Conference for all sessions and meetings except closed side meetings for which participants must have an invitation (see listing on pages 18-21).

Conference kits containing Conference publications and documents will be distributed to all participants at the Kit Distribution Point in the main entrance hall of the Palais des Congrès (level 0). Participants' badges will be punched after receiving the kit; accompanying persons do not receive a Conference kit.

## 4) Uploading PowerPoint Presentations

All meeting rooms are equipped with a computer and a projector so that speakers can use PowerPoint slides. **PowerPoint and other files cannot be uploaded in the meeting room.** All PowerPoint files must be uploaded on a central server no later than the evening before the session. Presenters should submit their file on a CD, DVD, or USB key the evening before the session to the technical assistants in the **Presentation Deposit Room** (Reda 4, level -1), open from 7:45-20:00 from 26 September to 2 October.

Presenters should carefully verify that the file is uploaded to the correct session and that it opens and runs correctly. Please name the file by indicating the session number and name of first author (for example: 225-Smith).

Overhead projectors are available upon demand at the Presentation Deposit Room; you must make your request at least 24 hours before your presentation.

## 5) Submitting Texts for Translation

In order to ensure the quality of simultaneous interpretation, please deliver the full text of your oral presentation or, at the very least, a copy of the presentation to the assistants in the **Presentation Deposit Room** (Reda 4, Level -1) at least 24 hours before the session takes place. The cover page of this text must clearly indicate the name of the first author, the title of the paper, as well as the session number, room, time and date of the session. Those presenting in Fez 1B and Fez 2B are exempt, as there will be no simultaneous interpretation available in these rooms.

## 6) Languages

The official working languages of the IUSSP XXVI International Population Conference are English and French. Thanks to the Moroccan government, English/French interpretation will be provided for 9 of the 11 simultaneous sessions. In addition, trilingual simultaneous interpretation in English, French and Arabic will be offered for all plenary sessions in the Ministres amphitheatre and for all sessions held in the Ambassadeurs amphitheatre, which include sessions focusing on the Arab region. Sessions in Fez 1B and Fez 2B, which were added later to the initial programme, will be held in English without simultaneous interpretation.

Headphones will be distributed outside each room in exchange for an identity card (ID card, passport, driver's license). Due to the use of different frequencies and equipment, headphones can only be used in the room where they are distributed and participants are kindly asked to return their headset at the end of the session so that it can be recharged. Due to the high cost of headphones, participants who lose their headphones will have to pay for their replacement.

## 7) Scientific Programme

### *Regular sessions*

Eleven simultaneous sessions will be held Monday through Friday from 8:30 to 17:00, during four 90-minute time slots (see calendar on page 7). A list of

sessions by time slot is available on pages 8-17; details of each session can be found in the Programme and Book of Abstracts included in the Conference kit.

Each session will be facilitated by a chair and will include 4 presentations, followed by a discussion of all papers from the floor, possibly introduced by a discussant. Each presenter will have 15 minutes to speak leaving approximately 25 minutes for discussion (*N.B. In sessions with 5 presentations, speakers will only have 12 minutes to present*). Presenters should respect these time limits.

A timer will be provided to the session chair who will instruct the technician to cut the microphone when the speaker's time is up.

### *Poster Sessions*

Five poster sessions with up to 180 posters will take place from Monday to Friday. Posters will be on display from 9:30 to 17:00 and the authors will be present from 12:00 to 13:30 to discuss their work and respond to any questions. Posters were as much as possible grouped by broad themes.

Authors can set up their poster each morning between 8:00 and 9:30 (technicians will supervise and provide assistance with poster hanging). Poster presenters must use the panel assigned to their poster. Panels are numbered and posters are given a number in advance that corresponds to the session and panel number in the exhibition hall. For example P1-147 indicates Poster Session 1, panel 147. Orientation maps will be provided in the Poster Area (level 0).

Double stick tape will be made available at the information desk near the Poster Area to mount posters on the panels. Posters must be taken down no later than 19:30. Posters not removed by this time will be removed and stored by the organizers with no guarantee that they can be retrieved intact later.

Each day, the Poster committee will select the best poster from each session. Poster awards will be distributed to the authors of the 5 best posters. These awards will be presented during the Closing Ceremony on Friday 2 October.

### *Plenary sessions:*

An Opening Ceremony, Closing Ceremony, and 4 Plenary Sessions will be organized during the Conference. Plenary sessions will take place from 17:30 to 19:00 in the Ministres amphitheatre (with live transmission in the Ambassadeurs amphitheatre for the Opening Ceremony).

- **Opening Ceremony:** Sunday 27 September. This session will include a message from His majesty King Mohammed VI and addresses by John Cleland (IUSSP President), Thoraya Obaid (UNFPA Executive Director) and Rima Khalaf Hunaidi (Former Director of UNDP's Regional Bureau for Arab States). It will be chaired by Ahmed Lahlimi Alami (Haut Commissaire au Plan and President of the IOC).
- **UNFPA Plenary:** Monday 28 September. "*After Cairo: issues and challenges for a New Agenda on Population and Development*", chaired by Thoraya Obaid (UNFPA Executive Director).
- **Moroccan Plenary:** Tuesday 29 September. "*Key population challenges in the Arab world*", chaired by Ahmed Lahlimi Alami (Haut Commissaire au Plan and President of the Moroccan NOC).
- **IUSSP Plenary:** Wednesday 30 September. "*International migration and the economic crisis*", chaired by Hania Zlotnik (Director, United Nations Population Division).
- **IUSSP Plenary:** Thursday 1 October. "*Population and climate change*", chaired by Adrian Hayes (Researcher, Australian National University).
- **Closing Ceremony:** Friday 2 October. Chaired by Peter McDonald (IUSSP Vice President). The session will include an address by Peter McDonald, the incoming IUSSP President, the presentation of the 5 Best Poster awards, and the presentation of host country candidates for the next International Population Conference in 2013.

#### ***NOC Sessions on the Arab world***

In collaboration with colleagues from throughout the Arab world, the Moroccan National Organizing Committee (NOC) has organized ten special sessions and a plenary session on population issues in the Arab world. The plenary session on "Key population challenges in the Arab world" will take place on Tuesday 29 September at 17:30 in the Ministres amphitheatre. The other sessions will take place in the Ambassadeurs amphitheatre on Monday 28 and Tuesday 29 September from 8:30 to 17:00 and in the morning on Wednesday 30 September. From Wednesday afternoon to Friday evening, the Ambassadeurs amphitheatre will feature sessions from the regular scientific programme focusing on the Arab world or on themes of interest to the region. All sessions will include trilingual simultaneous interpretation in French, English and Arabic.

- *Getting published: negotiating the peer-review process* (session 127), Wednesday 30 September, 15:30-17:00, Fez 1A (capacity: 150 participants);
- *Research to action: communicating evidence to effect change* (session 140), Thursday 1 October, 8:30-10:00, Fez 2A (capacity: 150 participants).

## **8) IUSSP Activities**

### **• IUSSP General Assembly:**

The IUSSP will hold its General Assembly on Wednesday 30 September from 19:00 to 21:00 in the Ministres amphitheatre. All IUSSP members are invited to participate. IUSSP student members may attend but are not allowed to vote. Topics for discussion include IUSSP activities for the 2006-2009 period and election of the new Nomination Committee members. The agenda of the General Assembly is available at the IUSSP booth.

### **• Mattei Dogan Foundation Award**

The 2009 Mattei Dogan Foundation Award for Comparative Research in Demography will be presented to Wolfgang Lutz during the IUSSP General Assembly. As part of this award, Wolfgang Lutz will speak at the IUSSP Plenary on "Population and Climate Change", which will take place at 17:30 on Thursday 1 October.

### **• IUSSP Laureate**

The 2009 Laureate ceremony will take place just after the General Assembly at 20:00 on Wednesday 30 September, and is open to all Conference participants. The 19th IUSSP Laureate is bestowed to Jane Menken, Director of the Institute of Behavioral Science and Distinguished Professor of Sociology at the University of Colorado.

## **9) Exhibits**

*Participants are invited to visit two exhibits held all week long in the Palais des Congrès:*

- **"People of Marrakech: a geodemography of the Red City."** This poster exhibit, organized by the Université Cadi Ayyad, Marrakech and the Institut national d'études démographiques (INED-France), is based on the volume *Gens de Marrakech, géodémographie de la Ville Rouge*, written by Mohamed Sebti, Youssef Courbage, Patrick Festy et Anne-Claire Kursac-Souali.
- **"From Vienna to Marrakech."** This poster exhibit presents the history of IUSSP International Population Conferences from 1959 to 2009 and is organized by the Vienna Institute of Demography.

## 10) Receptions

- **Welcome reception:** Sunday 27 September, 19:30. Following the Opening Ceremony, the NOC invites all participants to a reception around the pool of the Mansour Eddahbi Hotel. Tea, coffee, fruit juice, and a variety of pastries will be served.
- **Dinner offered by H.M. the King in honour of Participants:** Tuesday 29 September, 19:00, after the Moroccan Plenary session. Round trip bus transportation will be provided.
- **Gala dinner offered by the Haut-Commissariat au Plan :** Friday 2 October, 19:00, after the Closing Ceremony. Round trip bus transportation will be provided.

## 11) Accommodation and local transportation

Participants can get to the Palais des Congrès by several means of transport:

- **Bus shuttle:** A bus shuttle will be available in the morning and evening to transport participants between the Palais des Congrès and the Conference hotels. The hours and stops will be posted in the lobby of all Conference hotels and at the Objectif Maroc stand in the Palais des Congrès.
- **Taxi:** Small taxis can take up to 3 passengers and the fare is about 15 dh for a short ride. Taxis are equipped with a meter.

## 12) Lunches and Coffee Breaks

The Palais des Congrès asks that participants do not bring food and drinks (except water) into the amphitheatres and meeting rooms.

Several types of food services are available in or near the Palais des Congrès:

- **Lunches subsidized by the IUSSP:** A limited number of subsidized lunches (1000 per day) will be served in the tent set up outside the Palais des Congrès as well as in the Salle Royale (Level 1), and the Koutoubia area (level +1). Vegetarian lunches will be served in the Ouzoud area (level -1). Participants can purchase reduced priced lunch tickets for 30 dhs (3 euro) per lunch. The lunch tickets will be sold at the reception desk in the entrance hall where the Conference kits are distributed, Monday to Friday between 8:00 and 13:00. Participants can purchase tickets for one day or for several days of the week.

- **Restaurants and bars:** Several restaurants can be found near the Palais des Congrès, in particular in the hotel Mansour Eddahbi and across the street. Restaurants and bars in the Mansour Eddahbi Hotel can be reached through the Salle Royale.

## 13) Internet Access and Cyber Café

WiFi is available free of charge in the Salle Royale (level 0). A **cyber cafe** equipped with 50 computers can be found in the back of the Salle Royale (level 0). Participants can use these computers for free but use is limited to 20 minutes if other participants are waiting. Printers are also available; participants can print a maximum of 30 pages free of charge during the Conference.

## 14) Press Coverage

Representatives of the press will be present at the Conference and may attend regular and plenary sessions. The opening and closing ceremonies, plenary sessions and the sessions organized by Morocco may be also filmed and broadcast later. Members of the audience who participate in floor discussion during these sessions may be filmed.

## 15) Visits to Local Organizations

A series of visits to organizations working on population, health and development issues in the Marrakech region has been organized by the NOC. Conference participants can visit these institutions, meet with their representatives, and learn about their activities. ## 17) About Marrakech

### Currency and Exchange

The Moroccan currency is the dirham (MAD or dh): 100 dh ≈ 8,9 euro ≈ US\$12,5. Traveler's cheques in euros or US dollars can be changed in hotels and banks. Cash can also be withdrawn from ATM machines with major credit cards using a 4-digit PIN. (The amount of cash you can withdraw per day may be limited. Please check with your bank.) Major credit cards are accepted by most merchants.

### Time zone

Morocco's time zone is GMT.

### Telephone

- To call Morocco from home, dial the international dialing prefix, then 212 (Morocco's Country Code) and the telephone number (without the first zero).
- To call from Morocco to another country, dial 00 (International), then the Country Code followed by the telephone number.

### Climate

Weather at the end of September should offer dry warm sunny days with average day time high temperatures of 30°C (87°F) and cooler nights with an average low of 17°C (63°F).

### Electricity

In Morocco, electricity is 220 volts-50 Hz.

## GETTING AROUND MARRAKECH

**From the airport** (6 km south of the city centre):

A special shuttle will transfer Conference participants who reserved their accommodation through *Objectif Maroc* from Marrakech airport to the Conference Hotels on 25, 26 and 27 September. For participants arriving in Casablanca, the train is the best way to get to Marrakech. The train arrives downtown near the Palais des Congrès. For more information on transfers set up especially for the Conference please visit the Conference website ([www.iussp.org/marrakech2009/](http://www.iussp.org/marrakech2009/)).

**Taxis:**

"Small taxis" from the airport to downtown: 60 dh.  
"Big taxis" from the airport to downtown: 120 dh.

**In the city:**

- **"Small taxis"** (limited to 3 passengers). The average price of a short ride in town is approximately 15-20 dh depending on the distance (check the meter). After 20:00, there is a 50% price increase and bags are also charged an additional amount. A taxi station can be found on every main square.
- **"Big taxis"** (for rides within or outside of the city, limited to 5 passengers). The big taxis which can be found in front of the larger hotels are more expensive and the cost has to be negotiated. (Ask your hotel for advice).
- **Carriage** (4 passenger limit). Horse drawn carriages are available. Price of trips is listed on the carriage.

## PRACTICAL INFORMATION

### Tipping

Tipping (several dirhams or 10-15%) is expected in restaurants but also for numerous other services.

### Working Hours

**Government offices:** Monday to Friday from 8:30 to 16:00.

**Stores and businesses:** Monday to Saturday (or Sunday) from 8:30 to 13:00 and from 14:30 to 20:00 or later.

**Banks:** Monday through Friday, 8:15 to 15:30.

**Post Office:** The main post office is open from 8:30 to 16:00. Stamps can also be purchased at a "Tabac" or at the reception desk in many hotels. Numerous yellow mailboxes are available to post letters.

**Museums:** 9:00 to 12:00 and 15:00 to 18:00 – closed on Tuesday.

## **FOOD**

### **A few typical dishes**

- **Pastilla**: the jewel of Morocco's cuisine, pastilla is a slightly sweet, subtle puff pastry filled with a mixture of onion, pigeon (or chicken), parsley, boiled egg and ground almonds, and perfumed with cinnamon. More recent versions include fish and shell fish.
- **Méchoui**, free range lamb roasted over a fire and sprinkled with cumin and salt.
- **Tagine**, meat, vegetables and spices slowly simmered for several hours in special earthenware pottery over warm coals. Versions include poultry, lamb, or fish accompanied by diverse vegetables.
- **Tanjia**, Marrakech specialty. It is the name of an earthenware jar and a dish made of mutton and spices mixed together in the jar which is then sealed with paper and twine and brought to the hammam where the "farnachi" places it in hot cinders to cook for a minimum of 4 hours.

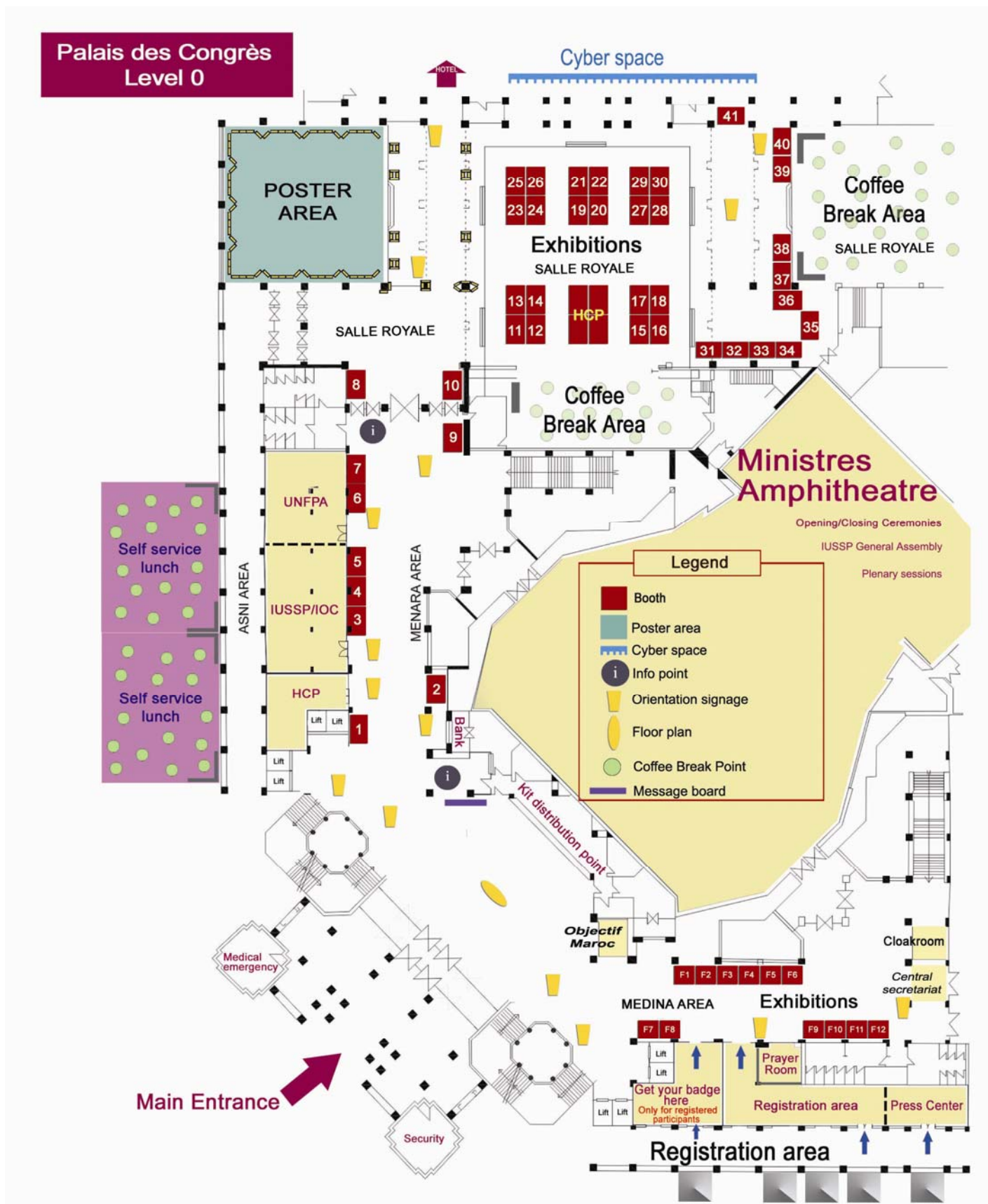

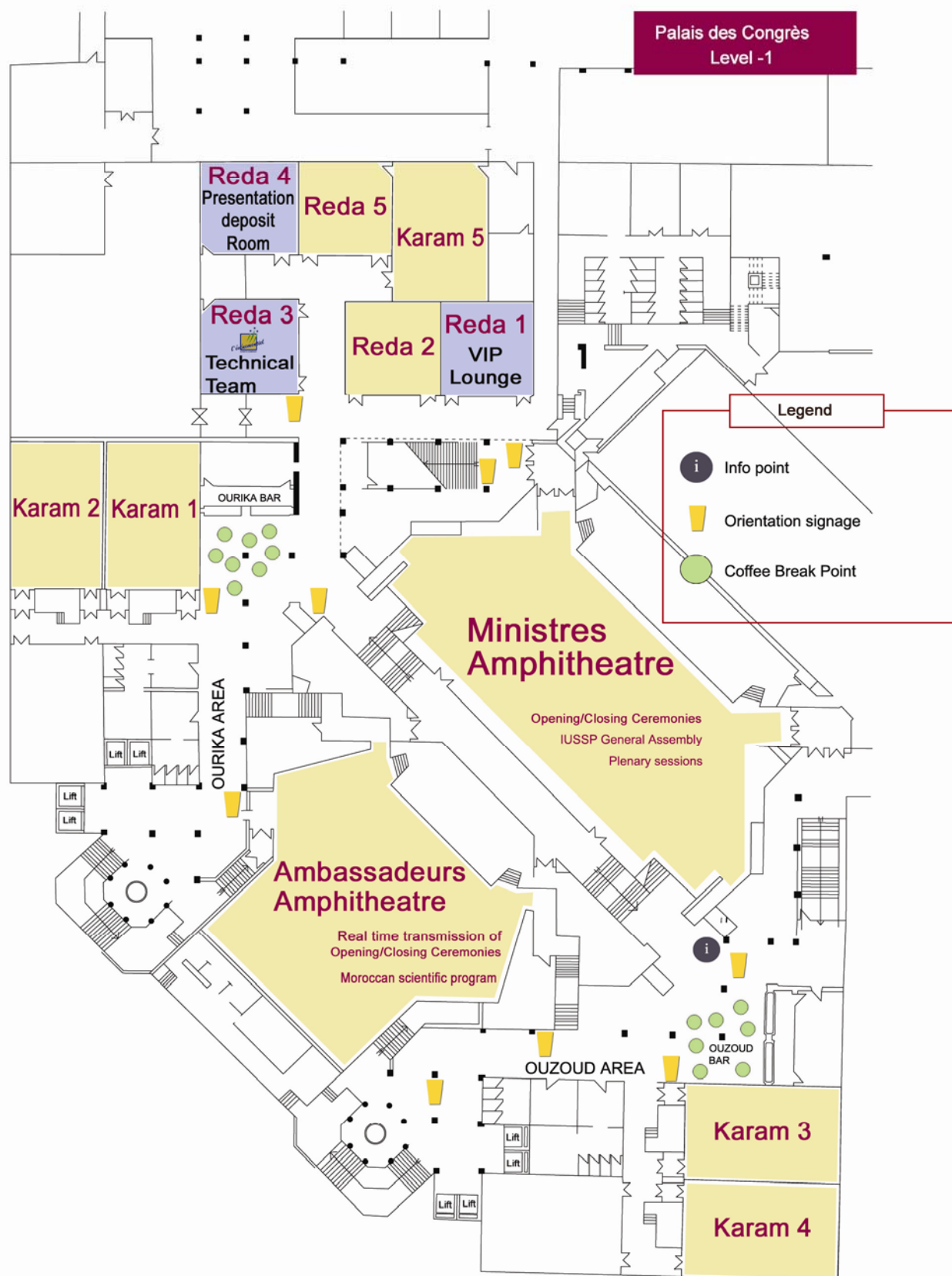
