The OVMA has made numerous changes to this year's conference to demonstrate veterinarians' commitment to the environment and a sustainable future. We've reduced our paper consumption, switched to ecologically-friendly paper and are giving attendees convenient OVMA conference bags made entirely from recycled materials.

Did you know...

Each year, North Americans throw away enough office paper to build a wall four metres high, stretching from Vancouver to Halifax!*

OVMA has committed to reducing unnecessary paper waste. We've drastically reduced paper consumption at this year's conference. We've replaced printed conference proceedings with speaker notes for delegates during the individual sessions and a CD of the complete proceedings. This results in a savings of approximately 250,000 pieces of paper!

Did you know...

Ontarians use 7 million plastic bags each day- that's about 4 bags per person every week! **

This year, OVMA will provide attendees with ecologically friendly conference tote bags. Made entirely from recycled materials, the bags are reusable and machine washable. They'll come in handy throughout the year, and are perfect for running errands like grocery shopping!

Did you know...

That half the world's forests have already been cleared out or burned, and 80% of what's left has been seriously degraded? ***

OVMA now uses paper certified to be manufactured from recycled pulp for all conference materials. Look for the Forest Stewardship Council (FSC) logo on our printed materials, which means that the paper has been manufactured in a way that respects the environment, benefits society, and protects the livelihood of local communities.

How can you contribute? Go green during your hotel stay!

- Turn off any lights, TV, air conditioner or heater when you leave your hotel room.
- Don't have your towels and sheets replaced on a daily basis. Leave unopened hotel-supplied amenities (e.g., shampoo and cream bottles) in the room. Take home the ones you've begun to use and take the empty ones home for recycling. Take only the brochures and tourist information you need and return the rest to display racks.
- Recycle bottles, cans, paper, etc.
- Bring a reusable water bottle with a built-in filter that you can fill anytime rather than drinking from and disposing plastic water bottles.
- Thank the managers and employees for embracing green-hotel practices.

Back at the practice...

Encourage the use of biodegradable dog waste bags instead of plastic, which will fully decompose in 30-45 days!

The natural harbour setting of the Westin ensures a feeling of quiet privacy—yet you are only minutes from the commercial and cultural centre of the city, where theatres, shopping, restaurants, and commerce thrive. Complete convention facilities include a glass-enclosed walkway linking the hotel to the Westin Harbour Castle Conference Centre. Deluxe rooms, all with partial or full lake view, combine traditional comforts with a relaxing environment.

ACCOMMODATION

OVMA has negotiated special room rates at The Westin Harbour Castle and a block of rooms has been reserved. Hotel rooms are available to OVMA delegates for \$173.00 (plus applicable taxes). The cut-off date is January 11, 2009. Prior to the cut-off date, individual group members are entitled to the group rate if they make their reservations and pay a deposit equal to the room rate for one night. Reservation requests received after the cut-off date will be accepted on a space available basis.

Individual delegates may lengthen their stay for up to two days prior and one day after the official meeting dates (January 27 – February 1, 2009). The hotel will provide these rooms, subject to availability, at the group rate if reserved by the individual prior to the cut-off date.

Individual room reservations will be held until 6:00 p.m., unless the first night's deposit is received or a guarantee for late arrival is made with a major credit card by the guest.

AIR TRANSPORTAION

Airport: Lester B. Pearson International

Pacific Western offers shuttle from the airport to the Westin Harbour Castle. Buses leave the airport every 20 minutes. The Westin Harbour Castle is the first stop to Toronto and the last stop out of Toronto. Fares: one way \$16.45, return \$28.35 (prices are subject to change). For more information on Pacific Western, please contact (905) 564-3232. Limousine service at a flat rate of approximately \$50.00 is offered by several different companies. Taxis are also available.

GROUND TRANSPORTATION

Toronto is served by all modes of transportation. By car, the Westin Harbour Castle is located at 1 Harbour Square, just off of the Yonge/York/Bay Exit of the Gardiner Expressway. Delegates concerned about downtown traffic should avail themselves of excellent alternative modes of rapid transit:

GO-Transit Stop at Union Station TTC Exit at Union Station

Ample parking is available at GO STATIONS (Milton, Oakville and Burlington and points along the lake in the west; Pickering, Ajax and Oshawa in the east). For more information on GO TRANSIT, please contact (416) 869-3200.

Underground transportation is available within the SUBWAY system at the Union Station stop. Upon arrival at Union Station, take the stairs (not escalators) up one level and follow the signs for "Harbourfront LRT." To get to the Westin Harbour Castle, exit at Queen's Quay Station, which is the first stop of the Harbourfront LRT. For more information on the TTC, please phone (416) 393-4000. Upon arrival at Union Station by TRAIN, please follow the underground signs for the subway and proceed as above.

PARKING

Valet parking with in and out privileges for hotel guests is available at \$35.00/day at the Westin Harbour Castle. Self-parking outside is available for hotel guests at \$17.00/day at 90 Harbour Square. Rates are subject to change. 

THE FUTURE VETERINARY **MEDICINE: A DEMOGRAPHIC** PERSPECTIVE

As Dr. David Foot frequently tells audiences, demographics aren't just important; they can explain two-thirds of everything - whether

the subject is marketing or human resources, or health, social or global trends.

Dr. Foot is an award-winning professor at the University of Toronto and a Ph.D. in economics from Harvard University. Since the publication of his phenomenal best-seller, (Boom, Bust & Echo), Dr. Foot has almost single-handedly informed, inspired and influenced the public discussion of demographics.

Change can't be avoided, but it can be anticipated and managed. OVMA has recently retained Dr. Foot to examine future demographic trends in Canada, specifically as they pertain to the future of pet ownership and the demand for companion animal veterinary services. Dr. Foot will present the findings from that study, as well as other insights into what Canada's changing demographics will mean for the future of the country and the veterinary profession.

NUTRITION Dr. Jane Armstrong

9:15 - 10:15 a.m. Fat: The Largest Endocrine Organ

Adipose tissue secretes a wide variety of metabolically active adipokines that regulate energy metabolism, and reproductive, cardiovascular and immune functions. Information will be given on adipokine evaluation in pets and new genomics research that furthers our understanding of the links between obesity and disease.

10:45 - 11:45 a.m. Obesity: Health Risks and Management in Dogs & Cats

This talk will summarize recent studies on which canine and feline diseases are associated with obesity and the consequences of over-conditioning on lifespan. Understanding these risks provide tools to gain owner compliance with obesity prevention and treatment. Treatment guidelines for obesity management will be discussed, concentrating on nutritional recommendations.

Diabetes Mellitus in Cats: 1:30 - 2:30 p.m. **Risk Factors and Treatment**

Risk factors for feline diabetes will be presented and compared to known risks for human type 2 DM. Diagnostic criteria for feline DM will be reviewed and guidelines given for initial treatment of the nonketotic diabetic with insulin glargine and a low carbohydrate diet. Monitoring suggestions and diabetic remission will be discussed.

Why are cats the only nonhuman species with a high incidence of hyperthyroidism? Research has focused on environmental and/or host factors as explanations. This talk will recap the data that has generated consumer concern about feeding canned cat food, and exposure to flame retardant chemicals. An overview of current guidelines for treating hyperthyroid cats will also be given.

4:00 - 5:00 p.m. Placement, Use and Care of Nasoesophageal Tubes

Placing a nasoesophageal (NE) tube is an inexpensive, technically straightforward, and well-tolerated technique that permits nutritional support while diagnostic evaluation is performed. This talk will cover indications for placing NE tubes, placement techniques including species differences between dogs and cats, use and care of NE tubes, and possible complications of which to be aware.


