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
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Dear members of the football family,


FIFA Ambassadors for Women's Football

In 2005, FIFA President Joseph S. Blatter hit upon the idea of appointing FIFA Ambassadors for Women's Football, an international, multicultural team of international women's football stars who support women's football worldwide.

The Ambassadors actively promote the development of the women's game. By raising public awareness and taking part in information campaigns, the Ambassadors not only help to spread women's football around the world but also work towards improving the standing of women in society by helping to break down social and cultural obstacles. They attend interviews, events and meetings to advocate women's football on behalf of football







in general and the women's game itself. The role of an Ambassador is not merely restricted to representing FIFA at events. They are encouraged to present fresh ideas and to relay any proposals and concerns raised at events back to the world governing body. They are all ready and willing to play an active role.

The FIFA Ambassadors for Women's Football can also serve as role models for all of the women and girls playing football today as well as for anyone else with an interest in women's football. They all have achieved extraordinary feats in their international careers and are widely respected on account of their performances on the pitch and their standing as athletes.



The objectives of FIFA and the ambassadors

A FIFA Ambassador for Women's Football:

- Actively promotes the development of women's football in her country, and around the world on behalf of herself and on behalf of FIFA
- Takes an interest in FIFA's role and its corporate social responsibility programmes and to identify with the work and objectives of the governing body, and as such, with the game of football in general
- Is ready and willing to play an active role in the development of women's football
- Makes proposals or takes initiative to promote the development of women's football
- Is ready, whenever possible and at FIFA's request, to attend official interviews with the media, press conferences and special events (such as seminars, courses, coaching seminars etc.)







I scored four goals against England at Wembley Stadium in 1990. It was a record, for both men and women in the legendary stadium (Italy won 4-1). Also, in 1999 I became the first woman in the world to coach a professional men's team (Viterbese, Division "C", ITA).

I hope that in all countries the standing of women's football will improve. And I hope to see many ex-players being used in women's football because they have a lot of competence and passion.

What is your biggest achievement?

In 1999 I was ranked the second-best European woman player of the century (and fourth in the world) in the standings defined by the International Federation of Football Historians and Statisticians.

What has football given you?

Football has given me a lot of opportunities to work and it has given me the possibility to express my talent and my skills.

I have so many fond memories of my football career it is difficult to name just one. My clearest and fondest memories, however, would be the exhilarating feeling I had when walking out onto the pitch wearing the Australian jersey ... It's amazing!

What do you wish for the future of women's football?

My greatest wish for women's football is to have a multitude of professional leagues around the world where players (coaches, management etc) have the opportunity to play and coach football at the highest level and earn a living.

What is your biggest achievement?

After two years' absence from the national team (having been dropped in early 1996), my biggest achievement was being named captain of the Australian team for the 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup in the USA and scoring two goals in that tournament.

What has football given you?

Football has been the most important thing in my life, outside family, for the best part of 28 years and as such has been quite influential on the way in which I communicate with people and view life in general. This, by the way, has always been in a positive way. Amazingly, football has made me cry, as a result of poor results, but also from great results... Football has also empowered me in so many ways!



What have you learned through football?

A lot of things! Most of all that hard work and determination can take you a long way. I have learned to work with a variety of people and personalities and I feel strongly that to become the best team you need to embrace diversity. Also, I know by experience that most of the time the details will win you the game.

What is your fondest memory of your football career?

It has to be the time I played for Sprint Jeløy, early in my career. We were on our way back from an indoor tournament in Sweden, cruising along in the club's old bus. It was winter and very cold. Half way home the bus broke down! We were towed to a nearby garage, the bus and its 20 passengers. While the bus was being fixed, the 20 passengers shared one small 6-sqm room for eight hours. I would say those hours were the funniest time spent with any team; I would even say this was a great team-building event.

What do you wish for the future of women's football?

My wish is that football will be the natural sport choice for girls as it is for boys, wherever you live in the world. Girls need access to clubs and fields, sufficient equipment and coaches that truly care for the game. Unfortunately, many girls do not have access to the game in their home area even though they want to play.

What is your biggest achievement?

That must be the FIFA Women's World Championship in Sweden in 1995. Not only because of the gold medal, but the spirit and the great enthusiasm in the team during the whole tournament. We had fun, we enjoyed each other's company, we desperately wanted to win the next game and we stood up for each other. We found the winning recipe that summer.

What has football given you?

Lifelong friendships and many, many memories I will never forget.


