We are looking for students that are interested in the topics that will be discussed during the conference and would have the eagerness to join the two new sections of the Environmental Working Group. The Working Groups will, among many other follow-up activities, have the possibility to present their results at the conference in Ljubljana, Slovenia, which will give them a say on the international parquet.

Of course these are only guidelines and can in coordination with the organizers still be changed slightly into different directions:

Ø Section 1: Energy Politics

Which states are going to be the new main energy consumers? What impacts will it have on the international relations structure? Which politics are the International Energy Agency (IEA) and the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) conducting? How are states preparing for a possible shortage of Energy Resource Supply? What role do energy resources play in conflicts? What policies are some states trying to implement to support Alternative and Renewable Energies?

Ø Section 2: Climate Change


