Every child deserves the right to equitable educational opportunities throughout their schooling experience but there is no doubt that the needs of all children are not always the same. The needs of gifted and talented children are certainly unique but no less important than those of any other group of children in our schools and centres.

Since 2005 schools have been required to identify and provide for gifted and talented students, and this has been a huge step forward in raising the awareness and interest for appropriate gifted education provisions for all schools. However, gifted and talented education needs to be seen in terms of a long term strategy with the appropriate vision to support this strategy. This has not always been evident in the past when gifted education has tended to be dealt with on more of an ad hoc basis. This lack of continuity of support has not been beneficial for gifted learners themselves and has led to varying rates of progress for many as provisions see saw from year to year.
