# Doc Rejoins Texas Tech After Gynecologic Oncology Fellowship

J. Salvador Saldivar, M.D., M.P.H., has joined the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center at El Paso Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology as an assistant professor of gynecologic oncology.

Dr. Saldivar, a native El Pasoan, is board certified in obstetrics and gynecology. He received his medical degree from the University of Illinois at Chicago College of Medicine and completed his residency training in OB/GYN at Texas Tech University HSC in El Paso. He received a master's of public health from the University of Texas School of Public Health and research training in gynecology oncology at the MD Anderson Cancer Center in Houston, Texas. He completed his clinical fellowship in gynecologic oncology at the University of British Columbia and the British Columbia Cancer Agency in Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada.

Dr. Saldivar is also just one of two gynecologic oncology specialists in El Paso. He has authored numerous research articles involving genetic susceptibility and biomarkers in gynecological malignancies. His areas of interests include minimally invasive surgery, management of complicated gynecologic cancers and fertility-sparing surgery in women with gynecologic malignancies.

#### Highlights of TTUHSC President John Bal dwin's State of the University Address

- The University, which treats about 2.5 million patients per year, has made strides in its missions of education, health care and research

- Talented students and faculty, new programs and a renaissance in research have strengthened the University

- Paul L. Foster School of Medicine, set to open in 2009, has received 2000 applicants for 40 slots, a testament to its quality

- University's research expenditures this year have increased about 18 percent to \$25 million and its NIH funding has risen 51 percent since last year

- The University has added 69 new faculty members in Lubbock and 16 new members in El Paso

- The School of Nursing graduated 450 students, the second largest for a nursing school in the state, and expanded in Dallas, Amarillo and El Paso

- Highlighted two new distinguished research groups--a cancer research team formerly of the University of Southern California, and a team of infectious disease scientists, moved from Harvard to El Paso. The event is dedicated to educating women and helping them make informed decisions about health, well-being and personal safety for themselves and their families.

During the conference, women were treated to health screenings, manicures, massages and great healthcare sessions hosted by local and regional experts. Two internationally renowned Hispanic speakers, *Maria Marin* and *Alberto Sardinas*, introduced the attendees to the idea of women as Super Heroes—which resonated with the audience. And two local super heroes were also honored for their impact on women in the El Paso community—*Mary Carmen Gonzalez* of the UBCC, and *Maria Sanchez*, . The Center Against Family Violence and AVANCE were also honored as Community Investment Grant recipients. The event was such a success say organizers, that several hundred women have already preregistered for next year's conference!

# Laura W. Bush Institute for Women's Health hosts inaugural national advisory board meeting
