Mountaineer Bowl

The Western State Mountaineers displayed Mountaineer Bowl for the first time in 1948. Western immediately fell in love with the new playing field as they won that first game 20-0 over Colorado School of Mines.

Today, Mountaineer Bowl ranks as the highest collegiate football field in the world at 7,750 feet. One of the best settings for a collegiate football game or track meet in America, the Bowl can hold 4,000 fans.

Mountaineer Bowl features a pair of press boxes - one for game-day staff and one for radio and working media.

The Bowl also features an official collegiate track, which was redone in 2006.

Mountaineer Bowl is also home to both Gunnison High School football and track and field.

In 2005, the Bowl received a brand new eight lane track and a new scoreboard (including a messageboard system and a new audio system).

Paul Wright Gym

Paul Wright Gym has been a work in progress since the initial building was built in 1951. Today the gym is known as one of the loudest in the region. At 7,723 feet, Wright Gym is the Highest Collegiate Gym in the World.

In 2007-08 school year, a brand new roof, floor and baskets were added.

In 2005, brand new bleaches were added to the lower section of the gym.

The current swimming pool joined the gym in 1960 and in 1965 the wrestling room was added to the east side of the gym. The biggest change of all came in 1998 as a 40,000 square-foot renovation and addition was completed. The renovation included a new 2,500 square-foot weight room with 5,000 pounds of free weights and also a locker facility for visiting teams. New locker facilities were added for both the general student population and men's and women's athletic teams.

The Tracy Borah Mountaineer Sports Hall of Fame room was also added during the renovation. The room features a meeting room, trophy cases and the Hall of Fame. Also added was a new training room that features whirlpool baths, five taping tables and a separate examination room. Volleyball and women's basketball also received new lockerrooms and team rooms. Upstairs, six classrooms were added that enabled the Exercise and Sport Science department to conduct all of its classes in one area.

Paul Wright Gym is named after the one of Western State's early coaches and leaders. Instrumental in getting skiing organized as an NCAA sports, Wright taught and coached at Western for 38 years. He also served the Gunnison Community as mayor, judge, board member and Rotarian.



Western State College - Gunnison, Colo.

Western State College of Colorado in Gunnison, Colorado, was founded in 1901 and was the first college on Colorado's Western Slope. Western has an enrollment of about 2500 students, and offers Bachelor's degrees in over 20 different majors.

At Western State College of Colorado, we take genuine pride in our ability to work one on one with our students. We get to know each student and help each reach his or her highest level. At Western, students have a true, one-on-one relationship with us- our students, our faculty and our town.

Western offers one of the safest campuses in the state. Our beautiful small town location and the sense of community on our campus bring about a very low incidence of criminal occurrences. Students feel a high level of personal responsibility here because they are part of the total community in the Gunnison Valley.

From involvement in a musical production, or a radio or television show, to writing for the school newspaper or being elected to the Student Government Association, Western students are always able to get involved in fun and fulfilling activities on campus.

Western State College of Colorado has one the most successful NCAA Division II sports programs in the country. The Mountaineers finished 15th in the 2006-07 Director's cup.

Jay Helman came to Western in 1989 as Assistant Professor in Kinesiology and Head Men's Basketball Coach. Three years later, in addition to his coaching and faculty responsibilities, he was named Chair of the Department of Kinesiology and Recreation. He was named Vice President for Academic Affairs in 1996 and, in February of 2002, became Western's 13th President.

His B.A. degree in English Literature is from Santa Clara University in California. He also earned an M.A. in Psychology from California State University at Sonoma, and a Ph.D. in Exercise and Sport Science from The Pennsylvania State University in 1988.

Dr. Helman was named President at a pivotal moment in Western State College's more than a century of service to Colorado and the nation. He has guided Western through trying times, dealing with fiscal issues, potential governance changes and the need to attract more students. In addition, he has worked hard to communicate effectively with Colorado legislators, area and national opinion leaders and with area residents about the College's challenges and goals.

Evidence of his leadership is seen in increasing enrollment, the passage of a bill that made Western independent of the three-college system of which it has been a part for many years, and optimism across the campus about the College's future. Despite a state-wide economic slump, Western continues to set fund-raising goals. The College was highly praised during a recent accreditation visit by a team of educators making up a North Central Association team who stated unequivocally their belief in the overall strength of Western and its future.

Dr. Helman has written a number of articles for academic publications and made presentations to a variety of organizations.

During his five-year tenure as Head Basketball Coach he was honored twice as Coach of the Year, had two teams qualify for post-season national tournaments and had an excellent graduation rate of student-athletes.

Athletic Director

15th Year

Dr. Waggoner is beginning his 15th year as Athletic Director at Western State College of Colorado.

He received his B.A. and M.A. from WSC in 1980 and 1981 respectively. He received his Ed. D. from the University of Northern Colorado in 1994.

Under his guidance, the college has generated numerous special events to promote interest in Mountaineer athletics and to attract financial support from alumni, friends and corporate partners.

Over \$14 million has been raised privately for Mountaineer Athletics in the past 14 years and each of the past four years have produced annual revenues and pledges that exceed \$1 Million. Private/external/enterprise generated revenues make up 48% of the total WSC athletic budget. The average in the NCAA D-II is 24%. Additionally, over \$6 Million in athletic facility improvements have been made for Mountaineer Athletics in the past 14 years from public and private sources.

In the past 14 years, Western State College athletic teams have accomplished the following:

10 NCAA II National Championship teams

72 NCAA II National "Top 10" team finishes

25 Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference Championship teams

13 consecutive "Top 25" finishes in the Directors' Cup standings and one of two current NCAA Division II schools to accomplish this feat.

Three "Top 5" finishes in the Directors' Cup standings

Numerous individual National Champion, All-American, Academic All-American and Coach of the Year awards.

Two USA Today NCAA Academic Achievement Awards

in 2003.

Graduation rates of Western State's student-athletes rank among the best in the NCAA Division II.

Waggoner is the owner of Rocky Mountain Athletic Consulting Services (RMACS) and is a regular speaker on such topics as team building, liability/sport law, Title IX, fundraising, NCAA clearinghouse standards, contemporary issues in coaching, marketing student/athletes to colleges, parent relations, motivation, strategic planning and other selected topics. He is also professionally active as the current First Vice President of the NCAA Division II Athletic Directors Association (D-II ADA), current member of the National Association for Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) Executive Committee, the past Chair of the NCAA Division II Wrestling Committee, and past Chair of the RMAC AD's council.

Waggoner is also active in community service locally. He is a 1971 GHS Football Memorial Foundation board member, a member of the Gunnison Elks Lodge, a past member of the Citizens for a Gunnison Community Center Committee, a past member of the Gunnison Valley Hospital/Community Evaluation Committee, Relay for Life team captain and a regular volunteer at other community events and activities.

Prior to focusing full-time on his athletic administration career, Dr. Waggoner enjoyed a successful coaching and teaching career for 18 years, including 12 of those years serving as the Head Wrestling Coach and Associate Professor of Exercise and Sport Science at Western State College.

Waggoner and his wife Gloria (also an educator) have two grown children, Dillon and Destiny.





Dr. Cynthia "Cindy" Drexel, professor of business, became Western's Faculty Athletic Rep. in the spring of 1998.

A native of Western Colorado, she was born in Olathe and holds two degrees from Western State. Drexel earned her bachelor's degree in 1974 and her master's in 1975, both in business administration. She then went on to receive her doctorate from BYU in 1989.

Drexel began teaching as a graduate assistant in 1974-75 and joined the faculty full-time in 1980.

As Faculty Athletic Representative, she serves as liaison between the Mountaineer athletic department and the college's faculty, as well as between Western State and the NCAA and the RMAC.

Drexel and her husband, Bob, have one child.

Scott Groom is entering his 21st year in the WSC athletic department. After 16 years with the Western track program, Groom enters his fourth year as Assistant Athletic Director for Internal Operations and Compliance.

Groom is a native of Sioux City, IA. but attended Woodland High School in Illinois where he participated in football, basketball, and track. His promise in football led him to Eastern Illinois University.

Groom's coaching career began in 1983 at Air Academy High School in Colorado Springs and included a stint at Rampart High (1984-87).

Groom arrived at Western in 1988 as an assistant track coach and then guided the track program from 1991-2002.

Groom received a Bachelor's degree from Eastern Illinois (1982) and Masters from Western (1989).

Married to wife Deanne, Groom has two step sons.



Don Mundell is entering his 18th year as head athletic trainer at Western State College.

Mundell was born in Lamesa, Texas but soon moved to Walsh, Colo. While attending Walsh High School he participated in football, basketball, and track. He then went on to receive his bachelor's degree from the University of Northern Colorado in 1980, and his master's degree from Colorado State University the next year.

Mundell received the National Athletic Trainers Association certification in 1981. After many years at the high school level, Mundell moved to Western State in 1991.

During the summer of 1998, Mundell was chosen to be the trainer for a team of wrestlers sponsored by the US Olympic Committee and the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference to represent the United States in Bulgaria.

Mundell is married to his wife Sue and they have two children, Justina and Kelly.

Janine Pleau enters her third year as Assistant Trainer for Western State Athletics.

The Chester, Calif., native comes to Western after spending a year as Head Trainer at both Ignacio and Bayfield High Schools in the Durango area. Pleau also served as Assistant Trainer at Fort Lewis during the 2005-06 school year.

Pleau received her Bachelor of Arts from Fort Lewis in 2003 and is scheduled to receive her Master of Arts in December.

Pleau also served as Assistant Trainer at Adams State from January 2004 to May 2005.

Peter Dea is CEO, president and a member of the board of directors of Western Gas Resources, Inc. Recently, he served as president of Colorado Oil and Gas Association and on the board of directors of the Denver Museum of Nature and Science and the American Geologic Institute. He graduated from Western in 1976 with a degree in geology.

Mountaineer Sports Hall of Fame

2008 Inductees

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: According to its charter, the Hall of Fame has been organized to “promote the enduring values of a thriving athletic program by identifying and recognizing those persons who deserve special acclaim for their contributions to Western State College athletics.” To nominate someone, call (970) 943-2079.

O. Kay Dalton, took Western State football to an elite level during his tenure as head coach. Dalton led the Mountaineers from 1961 to 1965 and during those years his teams were affectionately known as "The Dalton Gang". During his first two years, Dalton worked on fine tuning his football machine and the Mountaineers came away with 4-5 and 5-4 season. In 1963, the Mountaineers took over as one of the top programs in the country. The Mountaineers went 8-1 overall and 4-0 in RMAC play to claim the program's second conference title ever. Western's lone setback in 1963 was to Arizona State. The 1964 team could go down as the best ever in Western State history. Western won its second straight RMAC title with a perfect 3-0 conference title. It also finished the regular season with a 9-0 record. The result was a trip to the Mineral Bowl. The Mineral Bowl was known as the Small College National Championship and the Mountaineers just missed out on a National Title with a 14-13 setback to North Dakota State. In 1965, the Mountaineers continued to roll, winning its third straight RMAC Championship and finishing the season with a 7-1 overall record. The lone setback in 1965 was a 14-7 setback to Weber State. During the 1963, 1964 and 1965 campaigns, the three losses came by a total of 15 points. Dalton left Western following the 1965 season to coach in the Canadian Football League. During Dalton's five years, the Mountaineers won three RMAC Championships, went 33-12 overall and 15-5 in RMAC play. Dalton ranks fourth all-time at Western State in wins with 33.

James Hahn, is the most successful Women's Basketball Coach in Western State history. After taking over the program in 1982-83, the Mountaineers went through three rebuilding years before bursting on the scene in 1985-86 and 1986-87. The 1985-86 team went 18-11 overall and 12-4 in RMAC play. The Mountaineers closed out the regular season by winning 10 of 11 games. In the NAIA District VII Playoffs, Western knocked off Adams State and Southern Utah before falling to Fort Lewis. The 1986-87 team secured the second RMAC Championship in program history with a 22-7 overall record and a 12-2 mark in RMAC play. During one stretch during the season, the Mountaineers won 12 straight games and then defeated Southern Colorado and Western New Mexico to win the NAIA District VII Playoffs before falling to Fresno Pacific in the NAIA Bi-District Playoffs. For his career, Hahn won a program best 113 games and seven straight seasons of double-digit wins.

Franklin Jefferson, made history at Western State, becoming the first African-American student-athlete on the football and track and field teams. Jefferson played three years (1964-66) under head coach O. Kay Dalton. During the 1964 season, Jefferson played defense, was the kicker and also returned punts and kickoffs. Also in 1964, Jefferson impressed on the track, winning several medals in the 100, 200 and 4 x 400 relay. In 1965, Jefferson was moved to the offensive side of the ball and the move was a huge success. Jefferson led the team in rushing, scoring and was second in total offense and punt return yards. Following the season, Jefferson was named the conference's Running Back of the Year. During his junior year, Jefferson never lost a yard while carrying the ball. Going in his senior season of 1966, Jefferson drew national attention - being named the Player to Watch out of the conference by Sports Illustrated. Jefferson didn't disappoint as he was again named the Running Back of the Year. Following his senior season, Jefferson was invited to tryout by several NFL teams, but when it was discovered that he had a chipped bone in his neck - Jefferson decided to stop playing and avoid the risk of being paralyzed. During his three years at Western State, Jefferson and the Mountaineers went 31-3.

Ermelinda Shehu, came to Western State from Tirana, Albania in the Spring of 1995. A knee injury kept her out of the competition that year, but from 1996 to 1999, Shehu left her mark as one of the greatest track and field athletes ever to compete for Western State. Excelling in the Triple Jump and Long Jump, Shehu earned four NCAA Division II National Championships. Shehu won the Indoor National Championship in the Triple Jump in 1996 and 1997 and the Outdoor National Championship in the Triple Jump in 1996 and 1997. Combining both the Triple Jump and Long Jump, Shehu earned nine NCAA Division II All-American honors. Shehu was a dominant force when

it came to the RMAC Championships. During her career, Shehu won 21 RMAC Championships and still holds the RMAC Indoor Championship record in the Triple Jump with a leap of 40-03.75 in 1997. As of her induction, Shehu holds the Western State record for the Indoor Triple Jump (42-07.50), Indoor Long Jump (19-06.50), Indoor 60 (7.66), Outdoor 100 (11.78) and Outdoor 200 (24.42).

Bucky Broomhall, Broomhall turned his time as a Western State skier into an impressive ski coaching career. Broomhall skied at Western from 1955-59 and took seventh in Cross Country as a senior and also finished in the Top 20 in Ski Jumping. Following his senior season, Broomhall was a member of the 1957 Olympic Training squad and also skied in the Pre-Olympics in Squaw Valley in 1959. After graduating, Broomhall served as a teacher and coach in Fryeburg and Mexico Maine and also Bennington, Vermont. He started the Torger Togle Nordic Youth Ski Program that expanded nationwide and is known throughout the county as the Bill Koch League. Broomhall is also a FIS technical delegate and has officiated Junior High, High School, Junior Olympic, NCAA, U.S. Nationals and World Championship events. He also competes in World Master events.

Bob Decker, served as both coach and faculty member at Western State, as well as many years serving the Gunnison and Western State communities. Decker arrived at Western State as Head Men's Basketball Coach and Assistant Professor in 1967. Decker stepped away from coaching in 1977 continued as an Assistant Professor until 1990. In the community, Decker has always been busy. He served as the Mayor of Gunnison for four years and on the City Council for eight years. He also served on the Upper Gunnison Conservation Board for eight years and was a Trustee of State Colleges for eight years. Decker was also on the Board of Directors for Club 20, a Chamber of Commerce member, the Dos Rios Golf Club board and the Colorado University Advisory Board. Decker has also been a member of the Mountaineer Athletic Association for 40 years and established the Decker Basketball Scholarship.

Peter Rodriguez, went from a Western State football player to one of the top assistant coaches in the National Football League. Rodriguez arrived after Western in 1961 and played for the Mountaineers for three years under head coach O. Kay Dalton. Following his playing career, Rodriguez got his coaching start at Stratton High School where he served as both assistant High School coach and Head Middle School coach for all sports that the Middle School provided. After a two year stop as Head Football Coach at Harrison High School in Colorado Springs, Rodriguez moved up the college game. Rodriguez served as a Graduate Assistant at Arizona, where he received his Master's of Education in Administration. After that, Rodriguez held assistant jobs at Western Illinois, Florida State, Iowa State and then again at Western Illinois. Rodriguez then tried his hand at the professional level, serving as an assistant in the USFL for three years before the league folded in 1986. Rodriguez then went back to college for a year at Northern Iowa before turning pro for good with a one-year stint in the CFL with the Ottawa Roughriders. After that it was on to the NFL in 1988, where he would spend the next 19 years as one of the top Special Teams coaches in the league. Twice during his career he was voted Special Teams Coach of the Year by his peers and he was also named Special Teams Coach of the Decade (1990's) by the Dallas Morning News. While in the NFL, Rodriguez coaches for the Los Angeles Raiders (1988-89), Arizona Cardinals (1990-93), Washington Redskins (1994-97), Seattle Seahawks (1998-2003) and Jacksonville Jaguars (2003-2006). Rodriguez retired from coaching in 2006 after coaching for 43 years.

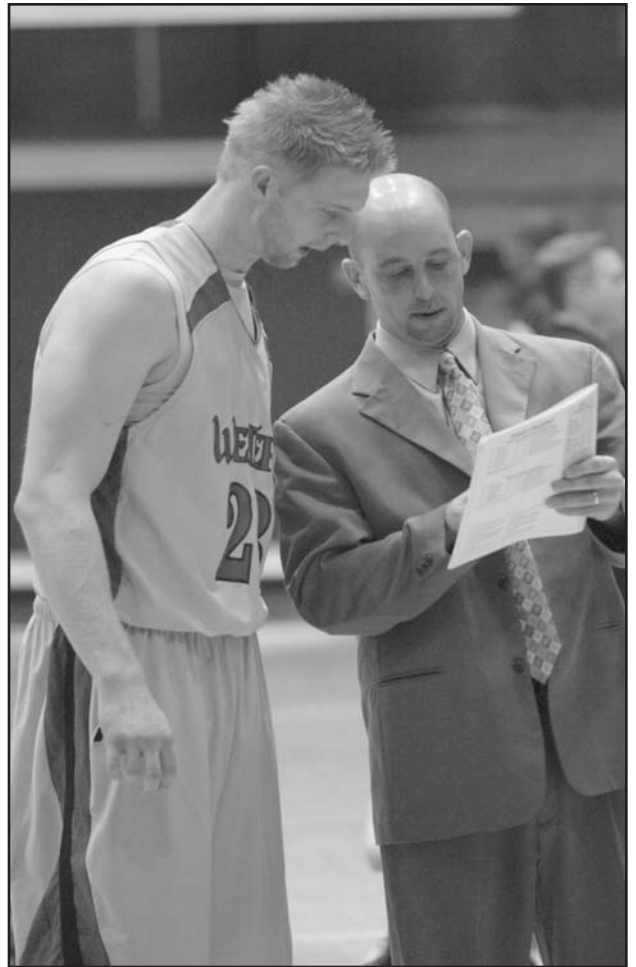
Moskowitz brings a wealth of knowledge and experience from both the international and collegiate level and was officially named head coach of the Mountaineers on April 14, 2008.

During his first season on the Gunnison Campus, Moskowitz and his staff say many positives and negatives in their 10-17 campaign. Western stayed competitive in despite of their lack of experience, losing seven games by an average of five points or less. Western's defense was the gule within their success; it held opponents to 70 points per game which ranked them fourth in the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference. Western's total of eight RMAC wins on the 2007-08 season was the most in nearly a decade.

Entering into the 2008-09 season, Western is excited about the opportunity to showcase their progress. On this year's roster there are five seniors, five juniors, four sophomores and two freshman. With more experience, a laid foundation and optimistic outlook, Western is anxious about the journey.

Prior to arriving in Gunnison, Moskowitz served as an assistant at two fellow RMAC institutions. In 2004, he was named the head coach at Si Tanka University where he led a struggling Eagles program into the conference tournament. In 2005, he was named an assistant on Team USA that competed in Israel.

With nearly ten years of experience in the Rocky Mountain region, his familiarity with high school



and junior college coaches has made him one of the top recruiters in the region. Moskowitz believes in instilling strong characters and passionate individuals into his program whose personal goals are out weighted by those of the team's accomplishments.

Moskowitz was born Dec. 9, 1973 and graduated from Osbourn High School in Manassas, Va. He is married to the former Katie Meek, who was previously the head volleyball coach at Adams State College and is currently the assistant with the volleyball program here at Western. Meek's 544 wins place him third all-time among high school boys coaches in Colorado and second all-time among coaches at one school.

Expectations set high for Men's Basketball

In his second year as head men's basketball coach, Mike Moskowitz believes that consistency is what will drive his team to success.

"We just want to be a consistent team that plays hard with enthusiasm," Moskowitz said. "We want to enjoy the struggle of getting better."

In April of last season, Moskowitz had the interim title removed and became the full-time head coach of the Mountaineers. Coming off a season in which the team went 10-17 (8-11 RMAC), Moskowitz believes this year's squad has what it takes to improve.

"We are deeper and have a lot more talent," Moskowitz said. "We have a lot more game playing experience as well."

Some of that experience comes from returning starters, senior guards Justin Avalos and Jeremy Brooks. Avalos averaged 7.5 points per game and 1.1 steals last year. Brooks was also an important factor to the team's overall success scoring 10 points per game and leading the team in free throw attempts with 167.

However, the production on the floor is not the only thing these and other seniors will provide this season.

"We have five seniors and they all have taken active leadership roles," Moskowitz said. "Some do it vocally, some do it by example."

Because Moskowitz was only an interim head coach last year, this will technically be his first season as the official head coach of the Mountaineers. But that doesn't mean the expectations haven't changed.

"Expectations are basically what I place on myself," Moskowitz said. "This is just the second year in the process."

Guards

Leading the Mountaineers at point will be senior Jeremy Brooks. Brooks was the second leading scorer last season (10.0 per-game) and had 51 assists and 27 steals.

Senior Justin Avalos also gives Western experience at the guard position. Avalos appeared in all 27 games and averaged 7.5 points-

per-game. Avalos also had 30 steals and 22 assists last season.

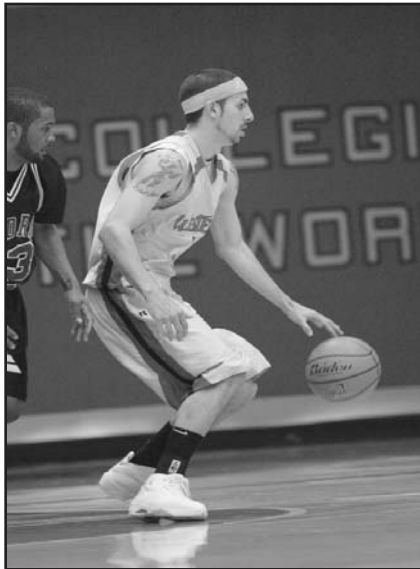

Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference

The Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference is a 14-team conference that has members in Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico and Nebraska.

The conference is broken up into an East Division (Chadron State, Colorado Christian, Colorado School of Mines, UC-Colorado Springs, Metropolitan State, Regis and Nebraska-Kearney) and a West Division (Adams State, CSU-Pueblo, Fort Lewis, Mesa State, New Mexico Highlands, Western New Mexico and Western State) for most major core sports.

For football the conference competes with nine teams (Adams State, Chadron State, Colorado School of Mines, Fort Lewis, Mesa State, Nebraska-Kearney, New Mexico Highlands, Western New Mexico and Western State).



The conference was first called the Colorado Faculty Athletic Conference in 1909 and had four charter members: University of Colorado, Colorado A&M (now Colorado State), Colorado College and Colorado School of Mines. The conference was re-named the Rocky Mountain Faculty Athletic Conference in 1910 and in 1924 Western State and Northern Colorado joined the conference.

In 1967 the name of the conference was officially changed to the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference and in 1992 the conference became an official member of the NCAA Division II.

In July of 1997, UC-Colorado Springs was added and in 2006, Fort Hays moved out of the conference and Western New Mexico joined the league.

The RMAC offices are housed in Colorado Springs, Colo.

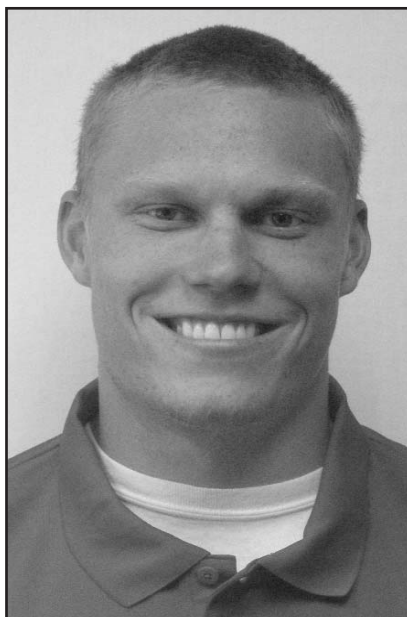
Robertson earns Champion, Leadership and Responsibility Scholarship recipient
