a word from the executive director



Dear Friends,

Have you ever noticed that time seems to fly by, and that the older you get the faster it passes? This year ActionAIDS turns

twenty-five years old! It's hard to believe. Many of our founders could have never imagined that the need for an organization like ActionAIDS would still exist after so many years. I personally feel privileged to have been a volunteer with ActionAIDS in the beginning, and to have worked here at the organization for the past 22 years. While the work we do has changed significantly, the need continues to grow.

Philadelphia has an HIV infection rate that is five times the national infection rate, and it is estimated that 25% of individuals infected with HIV are unaware of their status. Our founding mission was that "No One Should Face AIDS Alone." Today, many citizens of Philadelphia are "facing HIV disease alone", and they don't even know it. Yes, there is much work that remains to be done.

In the early days of the epidemic, with limited treatments for HIV, our work too often was about helping our loved ones die with dignity. We have made such tremendous progress in the last 25 years. HIV disease can now be effectively treated and managed. Many of our clients today can expect to have a normal life expectancy. That reality was a dream for our early clients!

So, as we move into our twenty-fifth year of partnership with the community, we remember those who gave so much to the beginnings

of ActionAIDS and are no longer with us. We remember that the work we do today would not be possible without their sacrifices and struggles. Our work has always been a testimony to them.

ActionAIDS still provides Volunteer Buddy services. We have one of the few surviving Buddy Programs in the country. We work with clients providing Case Management and Assistant Case Management services to remove barriers to care. We provide education, outreach, testing and counseling services so that HIV positive individuals have access to the care they need to have a normal life expectancy. We provide housing counseling and housing for homeless individuals with HIV disease.

Our 25th Anniversary is a time to assess the work that remains ahead of us. We are completing a strategic plan to help us identify what ActionAIDS needs to look like moving forward. The message is clear that the current portfolio of services remains in high demand, and we are open and listening to the community to identify what other services we should consider providing.

ActionAIDS is effective because of the community we've built. We are grateful to each of you for choosing to be a part of that community. In our 25th year, we celebrate the community that has grown out of a desire to respond to the needs of our friends and family members living with HIV. Together, we've done amazing things. Together, we will do amazing things moving forward. Thank you!

awarded to julie drizin and ted allen



Every year since 1991, ActionAIDS has shown their appreciation for people who through their work, their vision, and their philanthropy have made a very real difference in the lives of men, women and children living with HIV and AIDS. ActionAIDS recognizes those individuals with their highest honor: The Friend for Life Award.

On Thursday, April 29th, 2010, as part of Dining Out For Life, the 2010 Friend for Life Award was presented at Stephen Starr's Butcher and Singer in Philadelphia to two individuals who create, advocate and nourish charitable and community causes.

Julie Drizin. 2009 marks the 25th year of Julie Drizin's career in public radio. She got "hooked on radiophonics" at WXPB-FM in Philadelphia, where she garnered many awards as News and Public Affairs Director. After a stint as an independent producer, she moved to Washington, DC, at the dawn of the Clinton Era, to become

News Director and later National Bureau Chief for Pacifica Radio. There, she launched and produced the successful *Democracy Now!* Julie was the founding Senior Producer of NPR's *Justice Talking* and *The Intersection*, a multicultural regional news-talk experiment at *continued on page 2 >> see Drizin*



Ted Allen. An AIDS, gay rights and social justice activist, Ted Allen has been a Dining Out For Life spokesperson since 2008. Ted's day job is host of Food Network's prime time series *Chopped* and he appears on their other

hit *The Best Thing I Ever Ate*.

An Emmy Award winner, he came to fame as the food and wine specialist on the groundbreaking Bravo series "Queer Eye for the Straight Guy," which had a 99-episode run. Allen was a judge on the first four seasons of Bravo's *Top Chef* and Food Network's *Iron Chef America*.

Ted is also author of *The Food You Want to Eat: 100 Smart, Simple Recipes*, a cookbook featuring easy, all-natural recipes; and serves as the spokesman for Robert Mondavi Private Selection wines.

In the April issue of *The Advocate*, Ted wrote about Dining Out For Life saying: "It's a win-win-win—on a single day, with almost no overhead, Dining Out For Life raises \$4 million for the fight, breathes fresh life into small businesses and gives us all an easy way to make a meaningful contribution. Returning Home Annually to Bring Health and Hope

Raphiatou "Raphia" Noubissi lives the ActionAIDS motto, "Friends for Life," from West Philadelphia to Cameroon, West Africa.

As a case manager in Philadelphia, Raphia works with many of the French speaking West African immigrants infected with HIV and AIDS, and she is bringing that knowledge and resource to her home village of Fouban, Cameroon, which has been devastated by HIV disease.

The entire African continent has been devastated by AIDS, with 1 in 4 people infected in some



regions. Death from AIDS is tragically an everyday occurrence. 22.5 million people in Africa have HIV, which is 2/3 of the global total. Since the epidemic began, over 14 million children have lost at least one of their parents to the disease. In Cameroon, HIV is one of the top causes of death for both children and adults, according to the World Health Organization.

Raphia explains that medical care in Fouban is out of reach for many people. "At most, people make \$2 day; it costs \$1 to buy access to a clinic and \$2 to see a doctor. Why hand over one's money to a doctor when it's needed at home?"

Raphia co-founded *Sharing Health and Hope in Cameroon Africa* (SHAHICA) in 2005 to bring medical care to her community of Fouban, where she spends six weeks every year bringing health care volunteers, medications, and prevention supplies. She will travel to Fouban in May with ActionAIDS staff Kris Kershner and Jessica Sussman and medical providers from PHMC and Temple University Hospital.

A typical day for Raphia and the SHAHICA Team involves providing constant care. Raphia and the Team begin in the morning at the clinic, where they are greeted by a line of 500 people. Some have camped overnight at the clinic's doors to get a place in the line. During ten-minute clinic visits, the doctor triages the patients and then sends them for blood testing and x-rays. Each person receives a one year supply of medications to manage diabetes, hypertension, arthritis, and other conditions. Those identified at risk for HIV are provided rapid HIV testing, condoms, and prevention counseling.

The team works as quickly as possible until



electricity is turned off in the town for the night. They repeat the process over two weeks and see about 1,500 people. Along with medical outreach, the team then conducts two weeks of case management with HIV-positive children and adults. They link newly diagnosed people to medical care and support resources and follow up with people diagnosed in previous years to check their progress, and provide money for people to travel to receive HIV medications and CD4 white cell counts in the capital city of Yaounde.

To ensure that health providers can better identify and intervene with HIV, the SHAHICA team provides inservice training to the doctors, nurses, and social workers in Fouban. The health care workers have gained critical medical knowledge but also have learned how to give hope to people.

There have been many successes in the past year. Raphia relates a story about nine year old orphan Kaissa, who had been plagued by a mysterious illness. Her grandmother feared a curse and the pediatric nurse practitioner was baffled. When Raphia visited the child she gasped at how sick and skinny Kaissa was, and insisted that she receive an HIV test. Kaissa tested positive for HIV and Raphia helped get the child medication. Kaissa's condition improved

in just four weeks, and she was able to return to school. However, school was two miles away and the private school was a shorter distance. Raphia developed a fund that pays \$10 per month for orphans infected or affected by AIDS to attend school. "Kaissa has a future now with HIV treatment and I wanted to help her go to school." Kaissa is now thirteen, still lives with her grandmother, and is eagerly anticipating Raphia's annual visit.

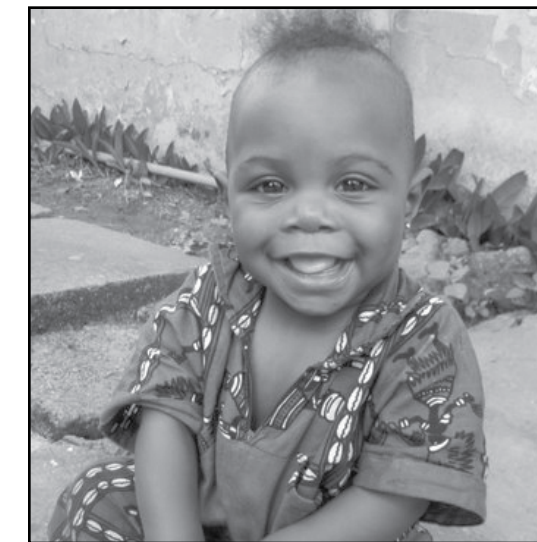
When asked what Raphia has on her wish list, she was specific with needs. Every penny is used to provide health care, medications, translation services, condoms, HIV testing kits, and tuition for school. The team volunteers their labor and solicits their friends and family for airfare. The greatest need is for money to cover the cost of the most urgent medical tests and treatments. One day of medical outreach costs \$500, which means that 150 people receive medical assessment, care and basic medications. A donation of \$25 can save two people's lives from either malaria or typhoid. Or \$25 can help a person with HIV stay alive by providing transport to get medication and blood testing.

When not in Cameroon, Raphia's heart is still there. She fields emails from doctors who identify new patients or children who have been orphaned by AIDS. Raphia observes that the demand of HIV care is a never-ending process. She wishes she had more financial resources to do more.

Sometimes the work is overwhelming, and Raphia admits that she cries a lot. She is saddened that a Cameroon family infected with HIV must decide who will live and who will die: "How can they decide who to save? It's a heart breaking decision."

When Raphia was told that the friends, volunteers, and staff of ActionAIDS wanted to help with this effort, she exclaimed, "On behalf of the children and families of Fouban, I am grateful for the help."

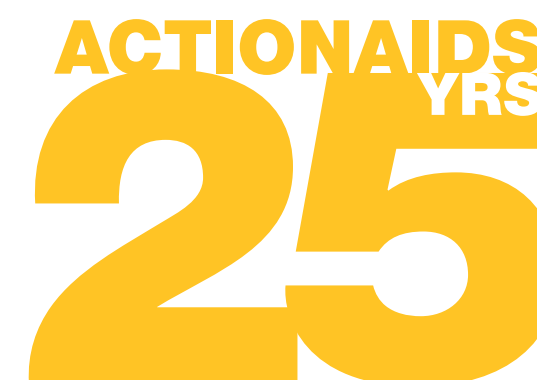

Getting tested is free, so... why isn't everyone doing it?

Getting tested for HIV can be an intimidating experience; however, our trained staff is here for support. Anyone who is having or has ever had sex (anal, vaginal or oral), has ever used injection drugs, and/or anyone who has ever had a piercing or tattoo should be tested for HIV. Anyone and everyone is welcome to get tested! We generally recommend getting tested every 6 months, but the counselor and client can determine a regular testing schedule during the session. Making regular HIV testing a healthy habit and encouraging risk reduction behavior is something that the Prevention staff at ActionAIDS strives for.

Our Prevention staff provides 20-minute rapid HIV testing for everyone, at no cost. We offer testing in English and in Spanish. The rapid test does not actually test for HIV or AIDS, but the antibodies that build in the body after HIV infection. Antibodies are made by the body to try to fight off the infection. If the test comes back as non-reactive (negative), then the test has not picked up these antibodies. If it comes back as reactive (positive), then it has picked up something that is or looks like HIV, and a second or confirmatory test will be given to be sure the test is actually a positive result. This second test takes approximately seven days for the results to come back.

During the 20 minutes, our HIV test counselor will

talk the client through the testing process and answer any questions that they may have. The test counselor is there for support, information, and referrals, and works with the client to make a plan to reduce a client's risk for HIV transmission.

So, why get tested for HIV, anyway? Since there are not really any symptoms for HIV, getting tested for HIV is the only way that an individual can know their HIV status. Treatment for HIV will help to slow HIV and will keep an individual's immune system working and fighting off illnesses.

ActionAIDS provides testing throughout Philadelphia and offers walk-in hours and appointments at their 1026 Arch Street location. HIV testing appointments can be made by calling our Testing Hotline at 267-940-5515. Our staff will gladly answer any questions regarding HIV and we work to help clients have healthier lives. Walk-in hours are as follows:

- Monday 11:00 AM to 1:00 PM
- Tuesday 10:00 AM to 12:00 Noon
- Wednesday 1:00 PM to 4:00 PM
- Thursday 12:00 Noon to 2:00 PM
- Friday by appointment

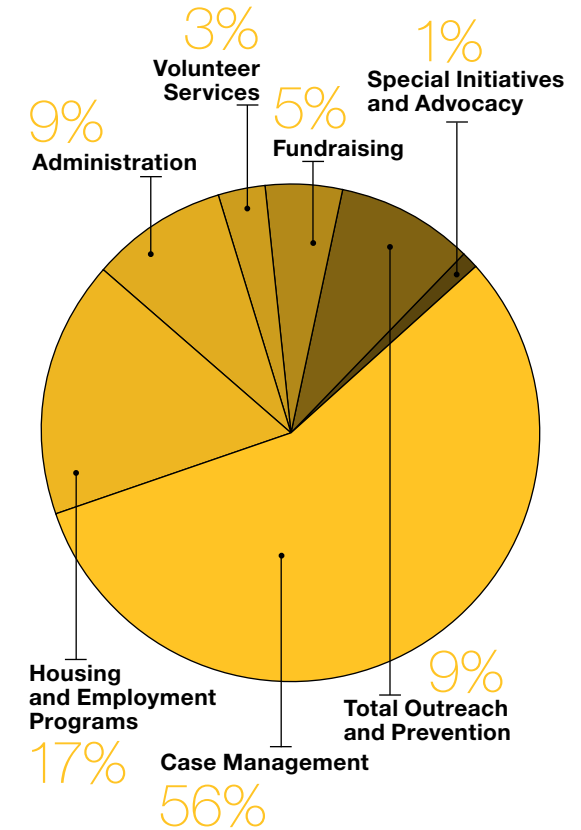
