The sixth annual TOAN National Orchestral Awards were a buzz of excitement with over a 100 people from the music sector around Australia attending the presentation ceremony hosted by the New South Wales Government Premier's Office at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music in Sydney on Saturday 20th August, 2005.

Presided by TOAN Board member, Esther Benjamin and introduced by the Chair of the judging panel, Associate Professor Martin Jarvis, the Awards were presented by Mr Roger Wilkins, Director-General, The Cabinet Office and Director-General, Ministry of the Arts.

The Awards recognise individuals and group achievements throughout the entire orchestral sector in Australia during 2004.

INDIVIDUAL REGIONAL AWARD

Bob Favell

Bob is highly respected for his musical achievements in Cairns both as an instrumental music teacher at Cairns State High School, Conductor of Cairns State High School Orchestra and founder / Musical Director of the North Queensland Philharmonic Orchestra, which started 15 years ago. He has led the Cairns State High School Orchestra to win Educations QLD's 'Fanfare' competition 5 times between 1992 - 2004.

These efforts have seen increased player membership and increased audiences.

As one of the founders of Queensland Community Orchestras, Colin has been instrumental in creating a group that encourages and facilitates discussion amongst Queenslands community based orchestras, to support each other with information and resources.

Sydney Symphony Orchestra

In 2004 the Sydney Symphony presented concerts and activities that not only catered for their loyal subscribers but also attracted

new and younger audiences through 'festival-style' events and highly visual marketing such as commercial radio, JC Decaux posters sites and e-marketing. The range of concerts programmed was inspirational including new works portrayed in music and images, Tchaikovsky's 1812 with real canons and fireworks, joint concerts with pop & jazz artists, 'the Shock of the New' showcasing how all music was once new, encouraging the audience to listen to the music

though for the first time and film music: Lord of the Rings symphony. Sydney Symphony also received support from Fairfax to distribute 400,000 CDs to Sydney-siders.

This included advertising in Cantonese through local Chinese radio and newspapers, bilingual Concert programs and a bilingual front of house team to cater appropriately for the audience. This was a well thought out program that captured a new and progressively growing local market.

Cairns High School

For the last 15 years, Cairns High School Orchestra has developed young musicians into orchestral players and an orchestra that regularly win awards at both at the Queensland Festival of Music and Education Queensland's biannual competition 'Fanfare' competing against approximately 600 ensembles from around the state. An auditioned based orchestra, Cairns State High School engages professional tutors to work with players in master classes, workshops and sectionals.

LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Alex Grieve OAM

At 83, Alex Grieve is till performing and sharing his lifetime of experience as a professional musician, teacher, examiner and recording artist. He has played with many professional orchestras and chamber ensembles including, ABC orchestras, Australian Pops Orchestra, Melbourne Philharmonic Orchestra, Melbourne Chamber Orchestra and Australia Felix. Alex's recordings are still available in the Australian Music archives, the most popular being C:112 Horn Masterworks.

Alex was bestowed this Award due to a lifetime of ongoing contribution to both musical community and the community at large and "in retirement" he spends much of his time developing Horn players and assisting orchestras by being involved with management committees.
