## Outstanding Quality of Life

With a metro population of 1.25 million, Louisville boasts a unique — and ideal — small town/big city environment. We're part bustling metropolis, part close-knit neighborhoods. From a low cost of living to an extensive park system, "the Ville" raises the bar on quality of life to give everyone something to love — and a reason to stay.

- Louisville's cost of living is substantially lower than the national average, particularly with respect to housing
- According to data from the National Association of Realtors, the median selling price of a home in Louisville in 2008 was \$131,600
  - 33% below the U.S. median of \$196,300
  - 40–81% lower than housing costs in markets like Philadelphia, Miami and San Francisco, which logged median selling prices of \$220,900, \$318,900 and \$701,700, respectively, in the first three months of 2008
- Highly regarded public school system recently named one of the top five urban school districts in the country by the Broad Foundation
- School system offers a wealth of educational opportunities
  - Several magnet schools with programs specializing in such diverse subjects as engineering, communications and the performing arts

## Hospitality & Events

Louisville is a fan-friendly city that is well-known for its hospitality worldwide. Over 17,000 rooms in more than 100 hotels and motels are available for visitors within the Louisville metropolitan area. The Fourth Street Live! entertainment district in downtown Louisville is a prime spot for visitors along with multiple attractions, featuring Louisville Slugger Museum, Kentucky Derby Museum, Muhammad Ali Center, Louisville Science Center, Speed Art Museum and Frazier History Museum.

Sports, including UofL athletics, are an important facet of life in the Louisville area and Louisville embraces big events. Churchill Downs has hosted four Breeders' Cups and continues its traditional Run For The Roses – the Kentucky Derby – the first Saturday each May, drawing over 160,000. The 1996 and 2000 PGA Championships were staged at Valhalla Golf Course in eastern Jefferson County, which was also the site of the 2008 Ryder Cup international competition. The Louisville Bats, the triple-A baseball team of the Cincinnati Reds, have drawn over 1 million fans to games in a single season, with new Slugger Field stationed on the downtown riverfront.

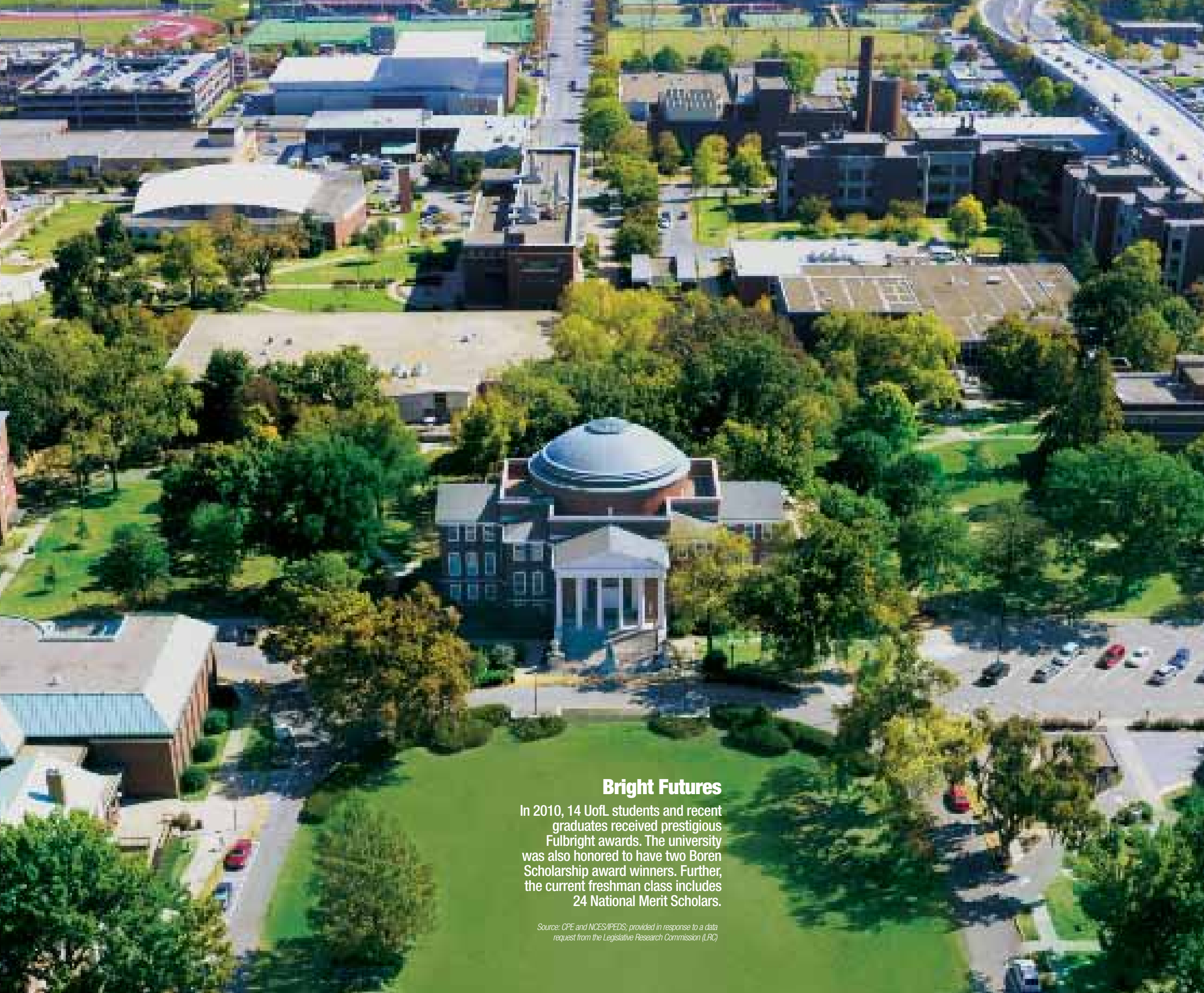

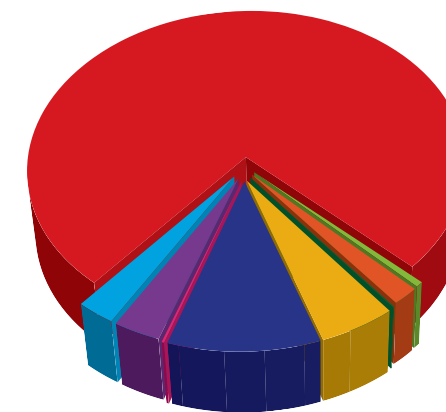

# UofL's Campus is a place to live, play, dine, and thrive

Cardinal Towne is a privately developed student housing complex built in recent years, as a solution to UofL's housing needs. It includes one- to four-bedroom suites with private bathrooms in each bedroom, an underground parking garage, a swimming pool, hot tub, and a rooftop patio. The first level of the complex is dedicated to retail establishments, such as Qdoba, Jimmy John's and Comfy Cow Handmade Ice Cream and Desserts.

## A University Transformed

Change is here at the University of Louisville. In the last half-decade, UofL's change can rightly be called a transformation. Scholarship, standards, buildings, research, campus environment, athletics, advising and student health services — they have literally grown up around the people who matriculated and then matured in the backyard of their alma mater.

Ambition backed by vision has helped the university evolve from a private, liberal arts college, to a public, urban research institution, to an aspiring global higher education community with significant international reach.

### Intellectual transformation

A vital university draws nourishment from both strategic and organic change. Nowhere is that more true than in the College of Arts and Sciences, where record numbers of post-graduate scholarships and soaring graduation rates have shown the promise of policies enacted on students' behalf. Some examples:

- Ensuring that every academic major offered continues through at least the master's level
- Tripling the number of student advisers available for tutoring and academic and career development
- Expanding the college's honors program so talented students can attend smaller and more-intensive classes to slake their thirst for learning
- Adding 50 full-time faculty positions to keep pace with benchmark universities and rely less on part-time teachers to lead crucial foundation courses
- Developing long-range plans for every department in the college, aligned with both A&S's vision for the future and the university's greater goals

### Physical transformation

Among the eye-popping changes that have reshaped UofL's campus profile in the past few years, including a variety of new athletic complexes and student housing sites, perhaps the most surprising addition has been the planting and preservation of trees. UofL recently was named a Tree Campus USA, a national designation awarded to colleges that practice good management of urban forests. The university developed a care plan for the more than 1,100 trees on its 309-acre Belknap Campus and is spending upwards of \$200,000 a year to maintain them.

Discoveries made at UofL are improving the health of citizens, attracting the brightest researchers and students, developing new businesses and industries, and creating new jobs. Our research is translational — from bench to bedside — with important breakthroughs in adult stem cell, stroke, cancer and spinal cord injury, among many other subjects. We are blazing a trail of discovery toward a healthier tomorrow.

### **Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation, Frazier Rehabilitation Institute**

The UofL and Frazier Rehab partnership is producing nationally recognized work already being done here in understanding and treating devastating spinal cord injuries, traumatic brain injuries and movement disorders. Frazier Rehab, a 135-bed facility and regional care network, offers all facets of rehabilitation from physical therapy to speech and pulmonary therapy.



## Finding Answers to Cancer

The James Graham Brown Cancer Center (JGBCC) encourages collaboration in clinical care and strives to create an atmosphere that fuels translational research. With the JGBCC's emphasis on bringing the benefits of the latest research from the bench to the bedside as efficiently as possible, patients at the center are often among the first in the world to have access to promising new therapies through leading-edge clinical trials. The James Graham Brown Cancer Center is poised to become one of America's preeminent research and clinical care institutions.





# UofL graduation rate rises faster than any other university in Kentucky

With inspiration and great expectations in the air, UofL graduates at all levels and specialties have reached a milestone in their academic careers. Each year, the University of Louisville graduates thousands of students from all over the state and nation. This year is no different. More than 2,600 students graduated – some to go into the workforce while others will continue their education in specialized fields. ## UofL Among Nation's Leaders with 28 Fulbright Scholars in Last Two Years

During the summer of 2011, the university announced 14 students had earned Fulbright awards, repeating its 2010 benchmark number and placing UofL among the nation's top Fulbright-producing institutions. To put things in perspective, UofL had more Fulbright winners in 2010 than all Kentucky institutions combined — as well as more than such esteemed institutions as the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Duke University and Georgetown University.

## UofL's top 10 Entrepreneurship program MBAs win international 'Super Bowl' of competitions

Capping an unprecedented string of competition victories by the College of Business, TNG Pharmaceuticals, a new business developed by Entrepreneurship MBA students Jenny Corbin, Larry Horn, Max Brudner, Cory Long and Terry Tate, won the 2011 Global Championship at the Venture Labs Investment Competition (VLIC), the "Super Bowl" of business plan competitions.

"It's an extraordinary achievement — a once-in-a-lifetime accomplishment," said Van G. H. Clouse, PhD, associate professor of management, Cobb Family Professor of Entrepreneurship and director of the Forcht Center. "What these students have done is truly remarkable, for their futures, our program, this university and our community."

The company's product is Fly-Vax, a patented vaccine designed to neutralize parasitic horn flies, an agricultural pest that causes cattle farmers more than \$1 billion a year in losses due to lower beef and milk production. The company is licensing the formula from Au-

burn University research scientists who first developed the vaccine.

TNG's grand-prize win at VLIC — generally regarded as the most prestigious competition of its kind in the world — was the first for a UofL team. VLIC featured 40 breakthrough concepts developed by the finest entrepreneurship programs in the world, including Georgia Tech, Johns Hopkins, Sasin Graduate Institute (Thailand), Norwegian University of Science, University of Manitoba and Centro Global de Innovación.

In addition to winning the grand prize, the team also earned honors for Outstanding Written Plan and Outstanding Presentation within its division. Valued at \$135,000, their prize was a combination of cash, consulting and mentoring services, national advertising and a celebratory visit to ring the opening bell at the NASDAQ OMX Stock Market on June 3. Team advisors are Clouse and Entrepreneur-in-Residence Suzanne Bergmeister.
