

WEA Sydney's last course with AMES

WEA Sydney is best known for its wide variety of courses in humanities, general courses and foreign languages (what might be called good old-fashioned "lifelong learning"), but we also present a range of top quality VET programs, either co-ordinated with our own trainers, or for corporate or goverment clients. One such highly valued program took place from April to June 2011, as WEA Sydney delivered an Office Skills course to 18 students from the NSW Adult Migrant English Service (AMES) as part of the Employment Pathways Program funded by the Department of Immigration and Citizenship (DIAC). The program consisted of four Microsoft Office courses, one course on communication skills and one for resume writing and interview skills. WEA had a whole mix of students from different nationalities including China, Japan, Turkey, Slovakia, Thailand and Vietnam.

Feedback collected from the students during the courses revealed a high rate of satisfaction with the course delivery, contents and the trainers. Ron Lawrence, who has spent a considerable amount of time of his life with WEA Sydney as a tutor, took the responsibility of delivering the computer courses. Ron has a history of making courses enjoyable and is an expert in delivering courses to students from different ethnic backgrounds. Jefferson Lillis, another of WEA's highly sought after tutors, delivered the Communication Skills course and Gavin Redelman, the Managing Director of Red Star Resume, delivered the Resume Writing and Interview Skills course. The students then attended two weeks of work placement with different companies to complement their classroom study. WEA Sydney thanks Sydney School of Business & Technology, Kent Institute, Education Services Australia, Australian Nationwide College, Parramatta College, City East Community College, TAFE NSW and Department of Education and Training for offering work experience opportunities to these students.

Some of the students already had high level degrees, achieved back in their countries of origin. However, the Office Skills course provided them with the necessary knowledge and skills to help them prepare for the Australian work environment. Fourteen students successfully completed the program and were awarded with a Statement of Attainment from Certificate II in Business.

Success was reaped soon after the completion of the work experience program with one student being offered a part time position by NSW TAFE Ultimo campus in their Student Administration areas. Syed Moniruzzaman, WEA Sydney's Education Manager Business and Vocational Training, has been providing the students with necessary career advice since the completion of the course. Overall, the course was a fitting end to WEA Sydney's long and fruitful association with AMES, as that organisation closed its doors to migrant training in July.
