Our pretty damn scientific ranking of 26 Atlanta neighborhoods, based on affordability, transit, safety, greenspace, culture, diversity, dining, nightlife, schools, shopping and more!

f you think it's audacious of us to publish a neighborhood guide where we christen one neighborhood as the city's overall best, well ... you're right. What makes a neighborhood great for one person might make it straight-up unlivable for another. We get that.

But what can we say? We *really* like to rank things. And in this case, we think our rankings are highly useful. We didn't quantify a neighborhood's relative worth based on what we as a staff thought about a particular place. Rather, we adopted a scientific method for determining how a neighborhood stacks up on a scale of 1 to 10 when it comes to, say, the quality and diversity of its restaurants; its per-capita crime rate; the proximity of public transit; etc.

We then tallied those rankings to give each neighborhood an ultimate score — and were a bit surprised to find some of our favorite 'hoods landing low on the list, while others we might have overlooked snuck into the top 10. We also were surprised by some of the rankings themselves. Midtown finished second on our list, but ranked low for safety, which likely knocked it out of the top slot. Grant Park and Cabbagetown didn't make the top-10 cut, largely because they have so few retail options. And one OTP 'hood crept into the top 10, partly because of its surprisingly diverse population.

So be it. Whether you agree or not, you can't argue with science.

HOW WE CAME UP WITH OUR NEIGHBORHOOD RANKINGS:

Each neighborhood received a reported and researched score of 1 to 10 in 11 different categories. For more on our methodology, including the breakdown of points awarded per category and per neighborhood, go to **clatl.com/neighborhoodguide**.

Location » Intown/North, occupies much of the "V" formed by Interstates 75 and 85

Buckhead is no longer the epicenter of Atlanta's once buck-wild club scene — and that's how most residents like it. The ritzy Streets of Buckhead development is still on hold, but the area remains among the Southeast's top shopping destinations, with two high-end malls and tons of swanky boutiques. And Buckhead has more fancy hotels and restaurants than anywhere in Georgia — if that's your thing.







Where else can Atlanta residents walk to restaurants, boutiques, bars, grocery stores and even a neighborhood movie theater with the monthly Silver Scream Spook Show? There are few places in Virginia-Highland you can't reach by way of a pleasant stroll along tree-shaded sidewalks or a quick bike ride. To the north, Morningside remains a dreamy — albeit pricey — destination for families.

GREENSPACE

Residents are just a short walk from Piedmont Park and this year, Morningsiders are expected to also be able to access the park — and the Beltline, which runs along its eastern edge — via its expanded borders near Ansley Mall.
