

Declared candidates

The race is beginning to heat up for the Oct. 6 provincial election. Twenty-five candidates have been nominated in eight local ridings although the only riding in which all four parties have announced their candidates is Niagara West-Glanbrook, held by PC Leader Tim Hudak. The Tories and the NDP have candidates declared in all eight ridings, followed by seven for the Liberals and two for the Green Party.

Lining up local candidates has been a challenge Tim Hudak in four-party race

With a set date for Ontario elections, there's no more waiting for the premier to drop the writ (but that will still take place Sept. 7). The PCs and NDP have already released their platforms.

Hudak or a caucus member has been making almost weekly visits to Hamilton since spring to outline a policy or to fire shots at Premier Dalton McGuinty over such issues as the eco-fees debacle. The Liberals have visited Hamilton to announce projects such as \$45.5 million for a new humanities building at McMaster University.

Four seats - Burlington, Haldimand-Norfolk, Halton and Niagara West-Glanbrook - are held by the PCs. Ancaster-Dundas-Flamborough-Westdale and Hamilton Mountain are held by the Liberals and Hamilton Centre and Hamilton East-Stoney Creek are held by the New Democrats.

Lining up local candidates has been marked by twists and turns. A polling firm was calling ADFW residents to see if they would vote Ward 1 Councillor Brian for

McHattie were he the NDP candidate. McHattie and ADFW NDP riding president Herb Shields denied having anything to do with the calls. The party eventually selected Trevor Westerhoff.

Chris Corrigan, a retired Canadian army colonel and the Tories' 2007 candidate in ADFW, registered last year to run again. He, however, was pushed aside in March by party brass for TV talk show host Donna Skelly. That has given the Tories headaches from Corrigan supporters.

Burlington Liberal MPP Joyce Savoline announced in February she would not seek re-election and a few people announced they were seeking the nomination. But the date for the nomination meeting was not set until July 14.

Rene Papin, former president of the Burlington PC Riding Association, declared in March, but dropped out in May after he claimed key advisers were told by party brass he "does not fit the strategic direction of the party" at this time. Party spokesperson Alan Sakach, however, denied the party wanted Papin out and is at a loss as

to where he got that impression. Papin declined further comment. Lawyer Brian Heagle, a former Liberal, also announced his bid in March, but withdrew July 14 because "I never expected the nomination process would still be going on" and he had to make other commitments. The meeting will be held July 26 at 7 p.m. at Billings Court Manor. The remaining candidate, businesswoman and former municipal candidate Jane Mc-Kenna, will be acclaimed.

Sakach said the party took some

time to set the date because it had a number of people who were interested, and it wanted to provide the opportunity for all to talk with family and friends before they made the commitment.

The Liberals have picked a newspaperman to help them win Hamilton East-Stoney Creek, a riding it lost to the NDP by 1,210 votes in 2007. Mark Cripps is leaving his job as managing editor of Hamilton Community News, which has weekly papers in Stoney Creek, Hamilton Mountain, Dundas and

July 28 at the Stoney Creek Legion. Former Hamilton Mountain Tory MPP Trevor Pettit has been approached to run for the fledging Reform Party of Ontario, a provincial version of Preston Manning's old party. Pettit has also been offered the job of deputy leader by Leader Brian Harness. He'll make his decision in August.
