ACC Has Two Teams in BCS, Eight Bowl Teams Overall Virginia Tech, Clemson, Florida State Ranked in both AP and USA Today Final Polls Clemson Claims First ACC Crown Since 1991; Virginia Tech Tops 10 wins for 8th Straight Year

For the first time in its history, the ACC had two teams in the Bowl Championship Series. ACC Champion Clemson played in the Discover Orange Bowl and Virginia Tech was an at-large selection by the Allstate Sugar Bowl.

Three ACC teams are ranked in the final Associated Press Top 25 with Virginia Tech (21st), Clemson (22nd) and Florida State (23rd).

Three ACC teams are also ranked in the final USA Today Coaches poll led by 17th-ranked Virginia Tech and including No. 22 Clemson and No. 23 Florida State.

The total of eight ACC bowl teams this year gives the Conference 58 bowl teams in the seven years the ACC has been a 12-team league. Only the SEC has had more in that time.

Boston College LB Luke Kuechly captures four major 2011 National Awards: the Lombardi Award, given annually to the nation's top lineman or linebacker; the Nagurski Award, given annually to the nation's top defensive player; the Dick Butkus Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top linebacker; and the Lott

IMPACT Defensive Player of the Year.

Clemson TE Dwayne Allen has been named the winner of the 2011 John Mackey Award, which is given annually to the nation's top tight end.

NC State sophomore CB David Amerson led the nation in interceptions and interceptions per game. Amerson was named the winner of the prestigious Jack Tatum Award which is given annually to the top defensive back in college football by the Columbus (Ohio) Touchdown Club. Amerson set an ACC single-season mark with 13 pickoffs, an NCAA FBS-leading 1.00 per-game average and the most by an FBS player in 29 years.

Clemson freshman WR Sammy Watkins was named the National Freshman of the Year by Rivals.com. Watkins led all freshmen nationally in receptions (82), receiving yards (1,219) and tied for first in TD catches (12).

Clemson head coach Dabo Swinney was named the winner of the 2011 Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award.

Boston College LB Luke Kuechly, Clemson TE Dwayne Allen and Florida State P Shawn Powell earned consensus All-America Honors.

Boston College LB Luke Kuechly ended his junior season leading the nation in tackles for the second straight year. Kuechly set ACC marks for tackles in a season (191) and career (532) this year.

Virginia Tech RB David Wilson recorded the third-best single-season rushing yardage total in ACC history with 1,709 yards and a 5.9 average.

Wake Forest redshirt freshman CB Merrill Noel tied for the national lead in passes defended with 21.

North Carolina redshirt freshman RB Giovanni Bernard is the leading freshman rusher in the nation. His total of 1,253 rushing yards is the 3rd-best total by a freshman in ACC history.

Florida State P Shawn Powell led the nation with a 47.00 average, dropping 40 percent of his punts inside the Seminoles' opponents' 20-yard line.

ATLANTIC DIVISION TEAM NOTES



Boston College

The Eagles defense improved markedly in the second half of the season, allowing 17 or fewer points in four of the final five games of 2011, going 3-2 after a 1-6 start to the campaign...

Junior **LB Luke Kuechly**, who has declared as an early entry into the 2012 NFL Draft, completed his career as perhaps the most decorated ACC defensive player in history...The 2011 ACC Defensive Player of the Year, Kuechly was also named winner of the Lombardi Award, given to the nation's top lineman or inside linebacker; the FWAAs Bronko Nagurski Award, given to the nation's top defensive player; the Butkus Award, given to the nation's top linebacker; and the Lott IMPACT Trophy, given to the nation's best defensive player...Kuechly led the nation in tackles and solo tackles for the second straight year, averaging an NCAA-record 15.92 hits per game...He also finished with an ACC-record 532 career tackles, just 14 shy of the NCAA's career record...His 14.0 career tackle average is an ACC and NCAA record... Senior **CB Donnie Fletcher** finished with 11 career interceptions, which tied for 14th among all active players in the FBS this year.



Maryland

After the end of the 2011 season, head coach **Randy Edsall** replaced both of his coordinators, hiring former Terrapin assistant **Mike Locksley** to coordinate the Maryland offense, and former Houston DC **Brian Stewart**, to head the Terps' defense...**QB C.J. Brown** became the 10th QB in ACC history and the first Terrapin to run for more than 500 in a season; he finished at 574... Senior **RB Davin Meggett** ran for 91 yards at NC State and finished his career in fifth place on the Maryland career list with 2,429 yards... The Terps tied for eighth place nationally with 16 fumbles recovered on the season... **LB Demetrius Hartsfield** finished the year ranked 5th nationally in tackles, averaging 12.0 per game... **DT Joe Vellano** was a first-team All-ACC performer and second-team All-America (Walter Camp) for the Terrapins after averaging 4.5 solo tackles per game; that's the highest figure in that category by any FBS DL since Anthony Spencer of Purdue averaged 4.93 in 2006.... Vellano's father, Paul, was a first-team All-ACC DT in 1973...They are the first father-son tandem to each earn first-team All-ACC honors in football...**DL Andre Monroe** earned first-team Freshman All-America (FoxSportsNext.com) honors and **DE Keith Bowers** and **LB Lorne Goree** were Honorable Mention Freshman All-Americans.



Clemson

Clemson was ranked 22nd in the final Associated Press and USA Today national polls...The Tigers hired Oklahoma defensive coordinator **Brent Venables** to become defensive coordinator, replacing Kevin Steele...Clemson's ACC Championship in

2011 was its 14th shared or outright, the most of any ACC school... **RB Andre Ellington** rushed for 116 yards on just 10 carries against West Virginia in the Discover Orange Bowl...It was Ellington's 2nd straight 100-yard effort and his 5th of 2011...Ellington finished 4th in the ACC in rushing (90.6 avg.) with 1,178 yards and 11 TDs... He teamed with **WR Sammy Watkins** to make Clemson the 12th team in ACC history with 1,000-yard producers in rushing and receiving... Watkins set ACC freshman receiving records for most pass receptions (82), most yards (1,219) and most TDs (12)...The catches and yardage led all freshmen nationally, while the TD receptions tied for the national lead... led all freshmen nationally... **QB Tajh Boyd** set an ACC record with 38 TDR, a mark previously held by NC State QBs Philip Rivers (2003) and Russell Wilson (2010)... **WR DeAndre Hopkins** has 124 catches in his first two seasons, a Clemson record for a sophomore...Hopkins is the first ACC receiver to have 50 or more catches in each of his first two seasons.



NC State

Head Coach **Tom O'Brien** is 7-5 against nationally-ranked opponents in his five years with the the Wolfpack...State's win over Louisville in the Belk Bowl boosted its record in bowl games to 14-11-1, the 14th-best winning percentage (.558) among schools with

15 or more bowl appearances...O'Brien is 8-2 (.800) as a head coach in 10 bowl appearances at State and Boston College... State overcame a 27-point third-quarter deficit to earn a 56-41 win over Maryland in the regular-season finale on Nov. 26. The deficit was the largest any team has eradicated in the second half to win an ACC game. ... **QB Mike Glennon** tied school records for TD passes (five) and TD responsibility (six) in the win over the Terrapins... Glennon threw 31 TD passes in 2011, tying for the 5th-best single-season total in ACC history.... **WR T.J. Graham** finished as the ACC's career leader in kickoffs (137) and kickoff return yardage (3,153)...Graham was 16th nationally in punt returns (11.47) and 17th in all-purpose yards (148.69)...He had four career TD returns (2 kickoff, 2 punt)...**CB David Amerson's** 13 interceptions led the nation and set an ACC single-season record and were the most in the FBS in 29 years... Amerson was a first-team Walter Camp All-America... With **S Brandon Bishop** adding 5 interceptions, NC State led the nation as a team with 24 pickoffs and finished 6th nationally in turnover margin (+1.08).



Florida State

Florida State finished 2011 as one of the nation's best defensive teams...Coach **Jimbo Fisher's** club was 4th nationally in total defense (275.00), 4th in scoring defense (15.1), 2nd in rushing defense (82.69), 8th in tackles for loss (8.62)

and tied for 8th in sacks (3.08)...FSU finished the year ranked 23rd in both the Associated Press and USA Today national polls...In netting 95 yards of total offense in the 21-7 win at Florida on Nov. 26, FSU became the first FBS team to win a game while gaining less than 100 yards since at least 1999... The Seminoles held the Gators to 184, their lowest total in at least 12 seasons ... **P Shawn Powell** led the nation in punting, averaging 47.0 yards per punt, a figure topped only twice in a season in ACC history... FSU has held eight straight opponents to 19 or fewer points; that's the longest streak of its kind by an ACC team since Miami's nine-game run in 2005...**QB EJ Manuel** finished 2011 having thrown 121 passes without an interception...Manuel's career pass completion percentage of .661 would rank 4th-best in the ACC for a career...**PK Dustin Hopkins** completed his junior year with 326 career points tying him with former FSU standout Scott Bentley for 5th place on the ACC career scoring list.



Wake Forest

Wake Forest WRs **Chris Givens** and **Michael Campanaro** set an ACC single-season record for most pass receptions by two teammates, combining for 156...Givens, who declared for the NFL Draft as an early-entry, finished with 1,330 pass

receiving yards, the fourth-best mark in ACC history... His 83 pass receptions tied for the 6th-best single-season total by an ACC receiver and he ranked 11th nationally in receiving yards per game (102.3)... Campanaro averaged 7.3 catches per game over his final six contests to finish with 73 receptions, and 4th in the ACC in receptions per game (6.1)... **CB Merrill Noel**, the ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year and a consensus first-team Freshman All-America, tied for the nation's lead in passes defended with 21; that's the most by any FBS freshman since the NCAA began tracking the statistic in 2000... **S Josh Bush** tied for 9th nationally in interceptions with six (0.46)... In Wake's final five games, **QB Tanner Price** threw 173 passes without an interception, the 7th longest such streak in ACC history ... **WR Michael Campanaro** is the only FBS player this season with 700 or more yards in receiving (833) and 100 or more in passing (106)... He's the first ACC player with that combination since Florida State's Anquan Boldin in 2002...**NG Nikita Whitlock** finished 5th in the ACC in tackles for loss (1.08) with 14 TFLs.



COASTAL DIVISION TEAM NOTES



Duke

In their three seasons as teammates, **WRs Conner Vernon** (198) and **Donovan Varner** (186) combined to catch 384 passes for 5,171 yards. The receptions total is first in ACC history for teammates in common seasons and the yardage figure is second. The Virginia Tech duo of Jarrett Boykin and Danny Coale achieved the yardage record in four seasons together; Vernon and Varner had three years as teammates ...Varner completed his career tied with former FSU WR Peter Warrick for 4th place on the ACC's career reception list with 207 catches... Vernon will enter the 2012 campaign in 7th place with 198 receptions, needing just 35 catches next season to break the ACC career mark of 232 held by Clemson's Aaron Kelly (2005-08)... **S Matt Daniels**, a first-team defender, and second-team representatives Vernon and **P Alex King** gave Duke multiple All-ACC players for the fourth year in a row... That stretch, achieved entirely under **coach David Cutcliffe's** direction, is the longest for the program since 1980-83.... Daniels tied for 8th nationally with 1.33 passes defended per game and was 3rd nationally among all defensive backs in tackles (10.5)... Redshirt freshman T Laken Tomlinson was named a first-team Freshman All-America by the *Sporting News*... Duke has won 3 or more games in 4 straight seasons for the first time since 1985-91 ... Of Duke's nine losses in 2011, five were by 10 or fewer points.



North Carolina

North Carolina named former Southern Miss head coach **Larry Fedora** as its 35th head coach on Dec. 8, 2011, replacing Everett Withers... Fedora had a 34-19 four-year record including a 12-2 record this past year... **RB Giovani Bernard**, the ACC Freshman of the Year, finished with 1,253 rushing yards, the 3rd-best total by an ACC freshman and the most by any freshman in the FBS this season... Bernard was joined on the All-ACC first team by **LB Zach Brown** and **DE Quinton Coples**, who combined for 24.5 tackles for loss... Brown was also named a 2nd-team All-America by Rivals.com... Bernard earned unanimous first-team Freshman All-America honors from nine different agencies including the FWAA... **QB Bryn Renner** led the ACC and ranked 10th nationally in pass efficiency (159.4)... **WR Dwight Jones** led the ACC with 85 pass receptions, the 5th-highest total in ACC history... Jones' 1,196 reception yards was the 9th-best effort by an ACC player and his 12 TD catches tied for the conference lead with Clemson's Sammy Watkins... Jones and Bernard made North Carolina the 11th team in ACC history with 1,000-yard producers in both categories... **TE Eric Ebron** and **CB Tim Scott** were Honorable Mention Freshmen All-Americans by CFN.com... **FB Devon Ramsey** received another year of eligibility from the NCAA... Ramsey missed almost all of the 2007 and 2011 seasons with injuries.



Georgia Tech

Georgia Tech finished 2nd nationally in rushing, averaging 316.46 yards a game despite facing 6 opponents who were ranked 48th or better in defense against the run including No. 11 Georgia, No. 14 Virginia Tech and No. 20 Utah... When Tech posted a 5-3 record in 2011, it marked the 17th consecutive year the Jackets have been .500 or better in the ACC... During that time Tech has won 85 ACC games, only Florida State has won more (104)... **WR Stephen Hill**, who has declared as an early entry into this year's NFL Draft, averaged 29.3 yards per catch on 28 receptions on the year, the highest among the top 100 receivers in the FBS, and an ACC record for a minimum of 25 catches... **Tevin Washington** rushed for 986 yards on the year, the third-best figure by a QB in ACC history... Washington's pass efficiency rating of 155.38 would place him 13th nationally if he had enough pass attempts to qualify... **G Omoregie Uzzi** earned first-team All-ACC distinction and 2nd-team All-America honors (SI.com) for his role in the Jackets' often explosive offense... Tech A-Backs **Orwin Smith** (615), **Embry Peeples** (481) and **Roddy Jones** (458) combined for 1,554 rushing yards, a 9.4 per-carry average, and 16 TDs... Both Smith (10.1) and Peeples (10.2) averaged better than a first down a carry.



Virginia

RB Perry Jones finished 4th in the ACC in combo yards (yards rushing and receiving) with 1,421 yards... Jones had 509 receiving yards, the most of any running back in the ACC, and 915 rushing... Virginia, which finished 8-5, doubled its 2010 win total (4-8)... Head coach **Mike London** is the first person to earn ACC Coach of the Year acclaim in his first or second year as an FBS head coach since Maryland's Ralph Friedgen was cited in 2001 ... London guided Virginia to six wins by 10 or fewer points including four victories by a total of eight points... All of Virginia's 2011 losses were to bowl-bound teams; that list includes one conference champion (Southern Mississippi) and another that played for its league title (Virginia Tech)... **CB Chase Minnfield** earned 2nd-team All-America honors (CBSSports.com) and **G Austin Pasztor** was a 2nd-team All-America choice by AP... **CB Demetrius Nicholson** was named a 2nd-team Freshman All-America (CFN.com, Roivals.com, Yahoo Sports) and **RB Kevin Parks** was an Honorable Mention Freshman All-America (CFN.com)... **WR Kris Burd** was 8th in the ACC in pass receptions (66, 5.1 avg) and 5th in receiving yardage (913, 70.2 avg)... Over his final 6 games **QB Michael Rocco** completed 61.4 percent of his passes for 1,485 yards, with just 4 interceptions, 9 TDs and a 141.00 pass efficiency rating.



Miami

Although finishing at 6-6, Miami became only the 22nd team in ACC history to suffer no losses by more than eight points in a season. In all, 502 teams have represented ACC institutions in the league's 59 years... **RB Lamar Miller's** total of 1,272 rushing yards this season is the highest by a Hurricane since Willis McGahee's school-record 1,753 in 2002 ... Miller's 79-yard TD run against Boston College in the season finale on Nov. 25 is the second-longest by an ACC player this year and the longest by a Hurricane since Clinton Portis had an 82-yard effort against McNeese State on Aug. 31, 2000 ... **QB Jacory Harris** finished his career fourth in ACC history in TD passes (70), 12th in passing yardage (8,826) and 18th in total offense (8,823) ... **LB Sean Spence** earned first-team All-ACC honors after averaging 9.6 tackles per game... Spence also was named 2nd-team All-America by *Scout.com* and *FoxSportsNext.com*.. Freshman **DE Anthony Chickillo** was credited with five sacks on the year and was named a 2nd-team Freshman All-America... **WR Tommy Streater**, who made six catches in his first two seasons, had 46 as a junior in 2011... **LB Denzel Perryman** earned first-team Freshman All-America honors... Five underclassmen--**T Brandon Washington**, **DE Vernon Olivier**, **DT Marcus Forster**, Miller and Streater--all declared to become early entires into this year's NFL Draft.



Virginia Tech

Virginia Tech, which was ranked 17th by USA Today and 21st by AP in their final polls, became the first ACC team to earn an at-large spot in a BCS game when the Allstate Sugar Bowl invited the Hokies to face Michigan ... Tech dopped a 23-20 decision to the Wolverines in overtime despite outgaining them in yards, 377-184... The Hokies have been ranked in 104 of the 129 AP polls released in their ACC tenure... **Frank Beamer** is the third coach and Virginia Tech is the fourth program in FBS history to win 10 or more games in eight straight seasons... Tech is the only current team in the FBS with 8 straight years of 10 or more wins... **TB David Wilson**, the ACC Player of the Year, finished ranked 8th nationally in rushing and his total of 1,709 rushing yards was a Tech single-season record and the 3rd-highest total in ACC history... **Danny Coale** is one of only four FBS players in the past 12 years to punt eight (43.5 avg.) or more times and return eight or more punts (6.5 avg.) in the same season... Coale (2,685) and **WR Jarrett Boykin** (2,884) set an ACC record for most career reception yardage by two receivers (5,542)... **QB Logan Thomas** had 30 TDR, which tied for the 11th highest single-season total in ACC history... Tech finished 10th nationally in total defense and 7th in scoring defense... **CB Jayron Hosley**, one of two Tech early entries into the NFL Draft (Wilson is the other), finished 11th nationally in punt returns (12.67 avg.).



2011 ACC Football By The Numbers

.634 - Florida State has recorded a 25-14-2 record in 41 bowl appearances. That is a winning percentage of .634, the 6th best nationally for any school with 15 or more bowl appearances.

.857 - The winning percentage of Clemson at Memorial Stadium under head coach **Dabo Swinney**. Named the 2011 winner of the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award, Swinney's Tiger teams have posted a 12-2 (.857) record in Clemson in his four seasons as head coach.

First - When Maryland defensive tackle **Joe Vellano** was named first-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference this year he became part of the first father-son combination to be named prestigious first-team All-ACC football squad selected by ACSMA. Joe's father, Paul, was first-team All-ACC pick at defensive tackle for the Terrapins in 1973 by the Atlantic Coast Sportswriters Association, which was AC-SMA's original name.

1.62 - Wake Forest freshman **CB Merrill Noel** tied for the national lead in passes defended with 21 for a per-game average of 1.62. A total of 19 of those were pass deflections with two pass interceptions. Noel's total of 21 passes defended is the most by a freshman since the NCAA began keeping this statistic nine years ago.

3 - The ACC has three of the top five current consecutive bowl streaks in the nation. Florida State made its 30th straight bowl trip, which leads the nation. Virginia Tech is 3rd (19) and Georgia Tech is tied for 4th (15). Boston College, which had its streak of 12 straight bowl games snapped this year, was tied for the 7th longest streak.

4 - Boston College junior **LB Luke Kuechly** won virtually every national defensive player of the year award this year. Kuechly won the prestigious Lombardi Award, given annually to the nation's top lineman or inside linebacker; the Nagurski Award, given annually to the nation's top defensive player; the Butkus Award, given each year to the nation's top linebacker; and the Lott IMPACT Defensive Player of the Year Award.

4 - Also the number of ACC assistant coaches nominated for the **Frank Broyles Award** which is presented annually to the nation's top assistant coach. Clemson offensive coordinator **Chad Morris**, North Carolina defensive coordinator **Art Kaufman**, Virginia defensive coordinator **Jim Reid** and Virginia Tech offensive coordinator **Bryan Stinespring** were nominated from the ACC.

5 - When **Bill O'Brien** was named head coach at Penn State earlier this year, he became the 5th member of **Georgia Tech's** 1998 coaching staff of George O'Leary to become a head coach in the FBS following in the footsteps of Ralph Friedgen (Maryland), Randy Edsall

(Connecticut), Maryland), Ted Roof (Duke) and Doug Marrone (Syracuse).

6 - Six of the ACC's 12 starting quarterbacks hail from Virginia and all six led their teams to bowl games this year including Clemson's **Tajh Boyd** (Hampton, Discover Orange), Virginia Tech's **Logan Thomas** (Lynchburg, Allstate Sugar), Virginia's **Michael Rocco** (Lynchburg, Chick-fil-A), Florida State's **EJ Manuel** (Virginia Beach, Champs Sports), NC State's **Mike Glennon** (Centreville, Belk) and North Carolina's **Bryn Renner** (West Springfield, Advocate V100 Independence).

7 - NC State's 37-13 win over 7th-ranked Clemson marked the 7th time in his five years in Raleigh that **Tom O'Brien** has coached the Wolfpack to a win over a nationally ranked team. At State, O'Brien has posted a 7-5 record against ranked teams and since 2003 is 14-9 (.609) against teams ranked in the Top 25.

8 - Virginia Tech is the only school in the nation to have recorded 10 or more victories in each of its last eight seasons. Tech has an 11-3 overall record this year, continuing a streak which began in 2004 and has seen the Hokies compile an 84-24 (.778) overall mark since joining the ACC.

9 - When Virginia head coach **Mike London** was named the 2011 ACC Coach of the Year he earned the 9th ACC Coach of the Year citation for an UVA head football coach, the most of any school in the league.

10 - Virginia Tech junior **RB David Wilson** topped the 100-yard rushing mark a total of 10 times in 14 games this season. That tied the ACC single-season record for most 100-yard games set in 1970 by North Carolina's Don McCauley and matched in 2009 by Virginia Tech's Ryan Williams.

11 - In 2012, the ACC will welcome back no fewer than 11 of its 12 starting quarterbacks from the 2011 season. Only Miami, which loses starter Jacory Harris, does not return its starting signal-caller. But the Hurricanes will have two players **Stephen Morris** (Miami) and **Ryan Williams** (Memphis) who have started at least five games in their careers.

12 - Prior to the 2011 season, the ACC had 10 teams which had featured both a 1,000-yard rusher and a 1,000-yard passer in the same season. This year alone, the ACC had two teams manage the feat. North Carolina became the 11th team to accomplish it with **WR Dwight Jones** (1,196) and **RB Giovanni Bernard** (1,253). Clemson became the 12th team in the ACC title contest when **RB Andre Ellington** (1,178) topped the 1,000-yard mark joining **WR Sammy Watkins** (1,219).

12.0 - Maryland **LB Demetrius Hartsfield** ranked 5th nationally in tackles in 2011, averaging 12.0 hits per game, though his season was limited to just nine games by injuries.

13 - NC State sophomore **CB David Amerson** led the nation in interceptions and set a single-season ACC record with 13 pickoffs in 13 games, an average of 1.00 per contest. He broke the old mark set by North Carolina's Dre Bly during the 1996 campaign. Amerson is the third ACC player since 2007 to tie or hold the nation's lead in pass interceptions joining Virginia Tech's Jayron Hosley (2010) and Wake Forest's Alphonso Smith (2007).

14 - Clemson overcame a 14-point deficit no fewer than three times this season to record wins over Auburn, Maryland and Wake Forest. That's the most in school history.

14 - Clemson captured its 14th Atlantic Coast Conference Football Championship in 2011. The Tigers have won more ACC Football titles than any other school, but it is the first ACC gridiron crown for Clemson since 1991.

17.64 - Virginia Tech finished the year ranked 7th nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 17.64 points per game.

24 - Paced by All-America **CB David Amerson's** nation-leading 13 picks, NC State led the nation in intercepted passes this year. With Amerson and S Brandan Bishop leading the way, the Wolfpack intercepted 24 passes. Bishop is tied for 11th nationally with 5 interceptions this year.

29.3 - The average receiving yards per catch for Georgia Tech junior **WR Stephen Hill** on his 28 catches this season which is an ACC record for a minimum of 25 catches. Hill's per-catch average was the highest of anyone ranked among the Top 100 in the NCAA's FBS receiving yards per game in 2011.

38 - Clemson **QB Tajh Boyd** set an ACC single-season record for touchdown responsibility in 2011 with 38 TDs. Boyd threw 33 TD passes and ran for 5 scores. NC State's Philip Rivers originally the old record with 37 TDs in 2003 that was tied by the Wolfpack's Russell Wilson in 2009.

40.35 - The percentage of punts which Florida State **P Shawn Powell** placed inside of Florida State's opponent's 20-yard line in 2011. Powell has dropped 23 of his 57 punts inside the 20, pinning FSU's foes in poor field position 40.4 percent of the time. Powell led the nation in punting average at 47.0 yards per punt.

57 - ACC runners topped the 100-yard rushing mark in a game a total of 57 times this fall, breaking the ACC's all-time high which was set last year. Georgia Tech's Preston Lyons had the record-setting performance with a 138-yard effort against Utah in the Hyundai Sun Bowl.

58 - Since the 2006 season and including this year's games, the ACC has had 58 teams participate in bowl games, the most of any league in the nation save the SEC, which has had 60 teams go to bowl games.

2011 ACC Football By The Numbers

All-America Ted Brown (4,602, 1975-78).

66.1 - Florida State quarterback **EJ Manuel** heads into his senior season as one of the most accurate passers in ACC history. Manuel, who only became a full-time starter this past year, has completed 337 of 510 passes in his career, a completion percentage of .661. Only Virginia's Matt Schaub (.670), Wake Forest's Riley Skinner (.690) and Maryland's Scott Milanovich (.661) have completed passes at an equal or better rate.

82 - Clemson **WR Sammy Watkins** shattered three ACC freshman receiving records on a single play when he hauled in a 48-yard TD pass against Georgia Tech on Oct. 29. Watkins finished his record-setting campaign with 82 catches for 1,219 yards and 12 TDs. All are ACC standards for freshmen and the catches and yardage led all freshmen nationally, while the TD reception total tied for the national lead among first-year players.

82.69 - Florida State ranked 2nd nationally in defense against the run in 2011, allowing just 82.69 yards per game on the ground. The Seminoles also rank 4th in scoring defense, 4th in total defense, 8th in tackles for loss, 20th in pass defense and tied for 8th in sacks.

85 - North Carolina senior **WR Dwight Jones** led the ACC in pass receiving in 2011 with 85 catches, the 5th-best single-season total in ACC history.

121 - Florida State junior **QB EJ Manuel** ended the 2011 season having thrown 121 consecutive passes without an interception. Manuel's current streak began early in the third quarter against NC State and has included games with Boston College, Miami, Virginia, Florida and Notre Dame.

95 - When Florida State defeated its arch-rival Florida, 21-7, despite totalling just 95 yards of offense, it became the first FBS team in this century to win a game with less than 100 yards of total offense.

118 - Clemson sophomore **PK Chandler Catanzaro** led the ACC with 118 points (8.4 avg.) this season, making 22-of-27 field goal attempts and 52-of-53 PATs. It was the 7th highest single-season point total in ACC history. Catanzaro averaged 8.4 points per game and ranked 2nd in the ACC in scoring per game, trailing only Florida State's Dustin Hopkins (8.5).

124 - After his first two seasons, Clemson sophomore **WR DeAndre Hopkins** has 124 career pass receptions to his credit. Hopkins, who ranked 6th in the ACC with 72 catches in 14 games this year (5.1/g), is the first ACC receiver to have 50 or more catches in each of his freshman and sophomore seasons.

156 - Wake Forest's pass receiving combination of **Chris Givens** and **Michael Campanaro** caught more passes this past season than any other pair in a single-season in ACC history. Givens (83) and Campanaro (73) combined to catch 156 passes, breaking the old mark of 155 set by NC State's Jerricho Cotchery (86) and Tramain Hall (69) in 2003.

173 - Wake Forest sophomore **QB Tanner Price** finished the 2011 season having thrown 173 passes without an interception. The streak covers Wake's final five games against Notre Dame, Clemson, Maryland, Vanderbilt and Mississippi State. The streak is the 7th longest in ACC history.

145.62 - The pass efficiency rating for Virginia Tech sophomore **QB Logan Thomas** over his last nine games. After a loss to Clemson on Oct. 1, Thomas completed 159 of 259 passes (61.4%) for 2,127 yards and 15 TDs and only 5 interceptions. He also ran for 340 more yards and 10 TD's.

159.40 - North Carolina sophomore **QB Bryn Renner** led the ACC and ranked 10th nationally in pass efficiency rating with a 159.40 mark.

251 - Virginia Tech head coach **Frank Beamer** has a total of 251 coaching victories in his career and now leads all active NCAA FBS head coaches. Beamer has moved past Lou Holtz for 8th on the NCAA's career FBS list with 7th-place Tom Osborne (Nebraska) now four wins away at 255. In 2011 alone, Beamer reached the 250 career win milestone as well as the 200-win mark at Tech.

316.46 - Georgia Tech ranked 2nd nationally in rushing offense in 2011, averaging 316.46 yards a game on the ground. In Coach Paul Johnson's four seasons in Atlanta, the Yellow Jackets, who led the nation in rushing in 2010, have not finished below 4th in the national rankings for rushing offense.

326 - Florida State **PK Dustin Hopkins** has 326 career points, tying him with former FSU placekicker Scott Bentley (1993-96) for 5th place on the ACC career scoring list. The ACC career record of 393 points was set by Maryland's Nick Novak during the 2001-04 seasons.

405 - The combined total of pass receptions for Duke's "V" boys, junior **WR Donovan Varner** (207) and sophomore **WR Conner Vernon** (198), the most of any current duo in the ACC and the most any pair in ACC history. The duo caught 384 passes between them while playing together.

532 - Boston College junior **LB Luke Kuechly** set an ACC career mark for tackles with a 14-tackle performance in BC's 16-14 loss to Notre Dame. Kuechly, an early-entry into this year's NFL draft, finished his career with 532 career tackles, just 14 shy of the NCAA record. He is in 3rd place on the all-time NCAA list behind Tim McGarigle (545) of Northwestern and Rod Davis (526) of Southern Miss.

868 - Boston College **TB Montel Harris** needs 868 yards to break the ACC career record for rushing yardage. Harris, who missed almost all of the 2011 season with a knee injury, has received an additional year of eligibility from the NCAA and will begin the 2012 season with 3,735 career rushing yards. Harris is looking to break the 34-year-old record of former NC State

986 - Georgia Tech **QB Tevin Washington** finished the 2011 season ranked 4th in the ACC in rushing, running for 986 yards and 14 TDs, far and away the most of any signal caller in the ACC. His rushing total is the 4th-best single season effort by an ACC signal caller and the 14 rushing TDs are the 3rd-best single-season total by an ACC QB.

1,253 - North Carolina redshirt freshman **TB Giovanni Bernard** compiled the 3rd-best single-season rushing total by an ACC freshman. Bernard ran for 1,253 yards, averaging 96.4 yards a game and 5.3 yards per carry. He was the leading freshman rusher in the nation in 2011.

1,330 - Wake Forest junior **WR Chris Givens** led the ACC and ranked 10th nationally in total receiving yards. Givens led the ACC and finished 11th nationally in receiving yards per game. His total of 1,330 yards this year is the 4th-best figure in ACC history.

1,709 - The number of rushing yards for Virginia Tech junior **TB David Wilson** in 2011. Wilson finished 8th nationally in rushing, averaging 122.1 yards per game and recorded the 3rd-highest single-season total in ACC history.

2,884 - Virginia Tech senior **WR Jarrett Boykin** finished his career with 184 career receptions for 2,884 yards. The yardage total is the 11th-best in ACC history and his reception total ties for the 4th-best effort in league history.

3,153 - NC State senior **WR T.J. Graham** finished his career as the ACC's career kickoff return yardage leader. Graham totaled 3,153 yards on 137 returns--both ACC records--and a 23.01 average and 2 TDs. In 2011 he passed former Maryland standout Torrey Smith (2,983) who set the record in 2010.

5,542 - The number of career pass receiving yards for which Virginia Tech wide receivers **Jarrett Boykin** (2,884) and **Danny Coale** (2,658) totalled. That is the most by a pair of receivers playing together in ACC history. Duke's prolific pair of Conner Vernon (2,675) and Donovan Varner (2,496) are second with 5,171 yards.

73,675 - The attendance at this year's **Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game** in Charlotte. The game was a sellout and a record attendance for an ACC Football Championship Game. It also marked the third time in the events 7-year history that attendance had topped the 72,000-mark.

73,027 - The average attendance for the **Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game** in Charlotte's Bank of America Stadium in 2010 and 2011. The Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship will return to Charlotte after both of the 2012 and 2013 football seasons.

2011 Dr Pepper ACC Championship 7th Annual ACC Title Game

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) -- Before an ACC Football Championship Game record crowd of 73,675 fans, Tajh Boyd threw three touchdown passes and ran for another as No. 21 Clemson defeated No. 5 Virginia Tech to win its first ACC title in 20 years.

The Tigers (10-3) clinched their first Orange Bowl berth since 1981, the year they won their only national championship. Clemson won't be playing for a national title this season, but the victory was still sweet considering they'd lost three of four games to close the regular season.

"We knocked down a lot of walls tonight," Clemson coach Dabo Swinney said.

Clemson became the only team to beat Virginia Tech (11-2) twice in the same season. The Tigers beat the Hokies 23-3 in Blacksburg, Va., on Oct. 1.

The second half was all Clemson. Clemson scored three touchdowns on five plays in a span of 4:24 in the third quarter to break open a 10-10 tie at halftime.

After Virginia Tech went three-and-out on its first second half possession, Boyd capped a 10-play, 87-yard touchdown drive with his second touchdown pass of the game to tight end Dwayne Allen for a 17-10 lead.

On Clemson's next play from scrimmage, wide receiver Sammy Watkins got behind the defense and hauled in a 53-yard touchdown pass from Boyd — his 31st of the season, extending his own school record. Boyd completed 20 of 29 passes for 240 yards and was named the game's most valuable player.

Andre Ellington, who ran for 125 yards, raced 29 yards for a touchdown to give the Tigers a 31-10 lead. Boyd put the game away early in the fourth quarter on a quarterback sneak.

"Our team, I could sense the confidence growing," Swinney said. "I told them if you just put it together on offense, defense and special teams, it won't be close, I don't care who we play."

Similar to the first matchup, the Hokies could get nothing going against a stingy Tigers defense, which knocked away nine passes.

Virginia Tech tailback David Wilson, the ACC's player of the year, was a non-factor, held to 32 yards on 11 carries.

Virginia Tech quarterback Logan Thomas had a rough night, fumbling on the team's first play from play from scrimmage leading to Boyd's first touchdown pass to Allen and an early 7-0 lead for Clemson.

Sammy Watkins, Clemson

Clemson wide receiver **Sammy Watkins** was named the 2011 National Freshman of the Year by Rivals.com. Additionally, Watkins was named a first-team All-American on the site's overall team, and a first-team freshman All-American. Watkins was the only freshman nationally to be named first-team All-American by Rivals.

Watkins is the first Clemson freshman to make a first-team All-American team. Anthony Simmons was a third-team All-American by Associated Press in 1995 and that is the only previous year a Clemson freshman has made a first, second or third team.

Watkins, who was named the ACC Freshman of the Year by the Atlantic Coast Conference Sports Media, finished the year with 82 receptions for 1,219 yards and 12 touchdowns this year. He ranks fourth in the nation in all-purpose yardage with 176.0 yards per game.



Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year Award

Dabo Swinney, Clemson

Clemson Head Football Coach Dabo Swinney was named the winner of the 2011 Bobby Dodd Award as the FBS National Coach of the Year. The announcement was made at

halftime on ESPN at the Chick-Fil-A Bowl game between Auburn and Virginia.

Swinney is the first Clemson football coach to win a National Coach of the Year honor since 1981 when Danny Ford was named National Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association and the Football Writers Association.

Ford coached Clemson to the National Championship during that 1981 season with a 12-0 record, including a 22-15 win over Nebraska in the Orange Bowl. Swinney guided the Tigers to their first visit to the Orange Bowl since that game at the conclusion of the 1981 season.



"This is a great honor," said Swinney. "I accept this award on behalf of our players, coaches and everyone affiliated with our program at Clemson. I am proud of what we have accomplished this year and we hope to add to that this week.

"It is an honor to win an award named after the legendary Bobby Dodd, who did so much for college football. I am humbled to be the recipient of this award."

This season Swinney has coached Clemson to its first ACC Championship in 20 years, its first 10-win season in 21 years, and its first bid to the Orange Bowl since 1981. The Tigers finished the year with a 10-4 record, their most wins since 1990.

The Tigers had four wins over top 25 teams in 2011, a school record for one season and tied for second most in the nation. Included in the list of wins over ranked teams are a pair of wins over Virginia Tech, a 23-3 victory in the regular season over a 10th ranked Virginia Tech team in Blacksburg, and a 38-10 win over the third ranked Hokies in the ACC Championship game on December 3. That victory tied for the highest ranked team Clemson has defeated in its history.

Nation's Top Lineman, Linebacker
Luke Kuechly, Boston College



Boston College junior linebacker **Luke Kuechly** was named the 2011 winner of the prestigious Lombardi Award as the nation's top collegiate lineman, beating out Alabama linebackers Courtney Upshaw and Dont'a Hightower and Stanford offensive tackle Jonathan Martin for the award. Kuechly led the nation with 191 tackles this season and was a bright spot for a team that went 3-5 in the Atlantic Coast Conference. The junior has a school-and Atlantic Coast Conference-record 532 career tackles. Kuechly is the first recipient from Boston College and won the Butkus Award as the nation's top linebacker.



He had 10 or more tackles in 33 of his 37 career games. He had 191 tackles in 2011 and 183 in 2010, the top two single-season totals in ACC history.

Kuechly becomes the seventh player from a current ACC school to be honored with the Lombardi Award. He is the fifth ACC player to have captured the Lombardi, and the first since North Carolina's Julius Peppers captured the honor in 2001.

The Rotary Club of Houston has presented the award annually since 1970.

Boston College junior **Luke Kuechly** was the recipient of the 27th annual Butkus Award honoring the nation's top linebacker.

Dick Butkus, a Hall of Famer for the Chicago Bears, was on hand to present the award to Kuechly at the Eagles' team awards banquet on Dec. 4 at the Sheraton Hotel in Needham, Mass.

Kuechly was selected by a panel of 51 coaches, recruiters, scouts and journalists coordinated by Pro Football Weekly. Kuechly amassed 191 total tackles, including 102 solo, and three interceptions including one for touchdown. He finished runner-up in the 2010 voting.

"Luke Kuechly is a highly instinctive tackling machine with rare three-year production," said

Hub Arkush, publisher of Pro Football Weekly and coordinator of the Butkus Award selection committee, in a statement. "He embodies the spirit of the Butkus Award, bringing tremendous intensity, competitiveness and leadership to the field, while continuing a legacy of outstanding linebacker play at Boston College."

Kuechly received 58 points and 18 first-place votes. Finishing second and third were Alabama teammates Dont'a Hightower (33 and 5) and Courtney Upshaw (23 and 3). Manti Te'o of Notre Dame finished fourth (20 and 1), Lavonte David of Nebraska was fifth (16 and 1), and Jarvis Jones of Georgia (14 and 1).

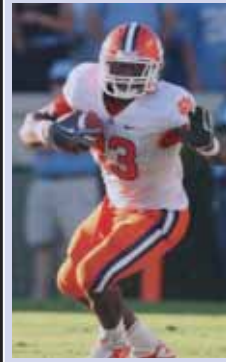

John Mackey Award Nation's Top Tight End **Dwayne Allen, Clemson**



Clemson junior tight end **Dwayne Allen** was the recipient of the John Mackey Award at the Home Depot College Football Awards show in Orlando, FL. Allen is the

first Clemson offensive player to win a national position award. Allen won the award over finalists Tyler Eifert of Notre Dame and Orson Charles of Georgia. The Clemson tight end had 50 receptions for 598 yards and eight touchdowns this year in helping the Tigers to their first ACC Championship in 20 years. His reception total, reception yards and touchdowns were Clemson single season records for a tight end. He had two touchdown receptions in the ACC Championship game against Virginia Tech, helping the Tigers to a 38-10 victory. Allen is the third Clemson player to win a national position award. In 1982, Terry Kinard was named CBS National Defensive Player of the Year. Last year Da'Quan Bowers won the Bronko Nagurski Award as the top defensive player in the nation, and won the Ted Hendricks Award as the top defensive end. Allen becomes the third player from a current ACC school to win the Mackey, joining Kellen Winslow II of Miami (2003) and Heath Miller of Virginia (2004).

Jack Tatum Award Nation's Top Defensive Back **David Amerson, NC State**



NC State cornerback **David Amerson** has been named the recipient of the 2011 Jack Tatum Award, which is given annually to the top defensive back in college football by The Touchdown Club of Columbus. Amerson, a first-team All-ACC performer, was also a finalist for the Jim Thorpe Award. Amerson led the FBS in interceptions with

13 this season, setting a school and ACC single-season record.

Named for the late Ohio State and NFL legend Jack Tatum, past winners of the Tatum Award include Charles Woodson (Michigan), the late Sean Taylor (Miami), and last year's winner Patrick Peterson (LSU).

The Jack Tatum Award was presented during the 57th Touchdown Club of Columbus Awards Banquet on February 11, 2012, at the Lifestyle Communities Pavilion in the Arena District of Downtown Columbus.

Bronko Nagurski Award Nation's Top Defensive Player Luke Kuechly, Boston College



Boston College linebacker **Luke Kuechly**, the Atlantic Coast Conference's all-time leading tackler, claimed the 2011 Bronko Nagurski Trophy, which is awarded annually to the best defensive player in college football.

Kuechly, a junior from Cincinnati, Ohio, became the 19th winner of the national defensive player of the year award, as voted on by the membership of the Football Writers Association of America. He received the Bronko Nagurski Trophy on Dec. 12 at a gala banquet sponsored by the Charlotte Touchdown Club at the Westin Hotel.

The four other 2011 Nagurski Trophy finalists were Alabama safety Mark Barron, LSU cornerback Morris Claiborne, Illinois end Whitney Mercilus and Penn State tackle Devin Still.

Kuechly led the Football Bowl Subdivision in total tackles for a second straight season with 191 (102 unassisted), a whopping 15.9 per game. Although Boston College posted only a 4-8 record, Kuechly was all over the field making plays. He had three interceptions for 71 yards in returns, including a 45-yarder for a touchdown in the final game of the season, a 24-17 victory at Miami.

"He is a great player with an indomitable spirit," said Miami coach Al Golden. "He has a physical, mental and competitive toughness that is off the charts. His durability, lateral quickness and mobility are off the charts. He is just a really good player. ... He is the type of player that you want to coach or develop. He is a fierce competitor."

The 6-3, 235-pounder made 12 tackles for 28 yards in losses this season and also broke up three passes and had three quarterback hurries. His career-high 23 tackles against Duke tied for the second-highest single-game total in the FBS, and his 20 tackles vs. Florida State tied for the eighth-highest.

Kuechly became the second consecutive ACC player to win the Nagurski Trophy. Clemson end Da'Quan Bowers won it last season.

"He doesn't look like your typical middle linebacker, but you turn the film on and he's unbelievable," Clemson coach Dabo Swinney said. "He's in the picture on every play. I met him at the Nagurski awards dinner last year. He looks like a biochemist with those glasses (off the field). You would never know he tears people's heads off on the football field. He is relentless."

Boston College All-America LB **Luke Kuechly** became the ACC's all-time career-leading tackler



this season and now has 532 career tackles. He is 14 hits shy of the NCAA career mark. Kuechly, who led the nation in tackles last year and finished 2nd nationally as a true freshman, leads the nation and set an ACC single-season mark with 191 hits. This season he averaged 15.9 tackles per game. His 33-game streak

of 10 or more tackles was snapped against Miami, as had had 9 hits versus the Hurricanes. A unanimous All-America selection in 2010, Kuechly led the nation in tackles per game (14.1) and solo tackles (8.5) per game. He was the NCAA FBS active career leader in total tackles (14.0) and solo tackles per game (7.9).

ACC Player of the Year Offensive Player of the Year David Wilson, RB, Virginia Tech

In only his first season as Virginia Tech featured back, junior David Wilson recorded one of the best seasons by a running back in ACC history to capture ACC Offensive Player and Overall Player of the Year honors. Wilson, from Danville, Va., rushed for 1,709 yards, the third-best single-season mark in ACC history. He averaged 5.9 yards per carry and finished the season leading the ACC and ranked 8th nationally in rushing with a 122.1 per-game average...Wilson tied an ACC mark for most 100-yard rushing games in a season with his 10th such effort, running for 153 yards against Virginia. Wilson also ranks 8th nationally in all-purpose yards per game, averaging 160.9 yards per game. He has led Virginia Tech to an 11-3 overall mark, 7-1 in the ACC and to the Hokies' fifth visit to the ACC title game.

ACC Defensive Player of the Year

Luke Kuechly, LB, Boston College

A fierce defender who covers the field defensively from sideline-to-sideline, Boston College junior linebacker Luke Kuechly is the 2011 ACC Defensive Player of the Year. For the second straight year, Kuechly led the nation in tackles per game and shattered the ACC career record for most tackles in a career with 532 stops in only three full seasons. His 191 total tackles this year is an ACC single-season mark. The native of Cincinnati, Ohio led the nation in solo tackles per game and he is the nation's active career leader in tackles per game and total tackles. He completed his career just 14 stops shy of breaking the NCAA FBS career record for tackles and will enter this year's NFL Draft as an early entry. A unanimous All-America last year, Kuechly was awarded the Butkus Award, which is given annually to the nation's top linebacker. He also was named winner of the Lombardi Award, which goes to nation's top lineman or linebacker; and the Nagurski, which is presented to the nation's best defensive player.

ACC Coach of the Year Mike London, Virginia

In only his second season as head coach at Virginia, Mike London was named ACC Coach of the Year after leading the Cavaliers to a resurgence that saw them win eight games this season and post an 8-5 record, a four-game turnaround from 2010. London led a Virginia team that was picked to finish 5th in the ACC's Coastal Division and to six wins in its final eight games including triumphs over then 12th-ranked Georgia Tech and 23rd-ranked Florida State as the Cavaliers earned bowl eligibility for the first time since 2007. Also included in that streak were wins at Miami and Florida State, as Virginia became the first ACC team to record wins at both schools in the same season...London guided the Cavaliers to five wins this season by seven or fewer points including four by three or fewer points...Under his guidance, UVA came within one game of earning a berth in the ACC Championship Game, and earned a berth in the Chick-fil-A Bowl, the Cavs first appearance in the Atlanta Bowl game since 1998.

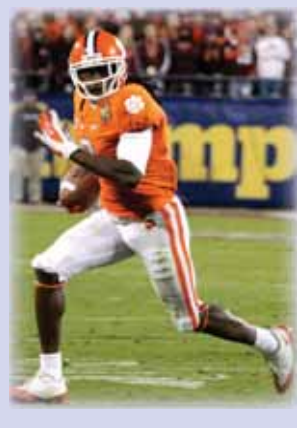

Rookie of the Year Offensive Rookie of the Year Sammy Watkins, WR, Clemson

One of the most explosive players in the nation, Clemson true freshman Sammy Watkins set ACC freshman single-season records in pass receptions, pass receiving yards and touchdown receptions in just Clemson's ninth game of the season on the way to being named the ACC's



Offensive and Overall Rookie of the Year. A native of Ft. Myers, Fla., Watkins was named ACC receiver of the week three times and ACC Rookie of the Week honors four times. Watkins ended the season as the nation's leading freshman receiver with 82 catches for 1,219 yards and 12 touchdowns. He also scored on an 89-yard kickoff return against Maryland, and has the fourth-highest average in all-purpose yardage by a freshman in the NCAA's FBS since 2000, averaging 176.0 yards per game. Watkins topped 100-yards in pass receiving on five occasions this year and finished 3rd overall in the ACC in receptions, 2nd in receiving yards and tied for the lead in TD receptions (12).

conference's head coaches and defensive coordinators. A four-year starter for the Hokies, DeChristopher earned first-team All-ACC accolades in 2011 and was a 2nd-team All-ACC honoree in 2010. He also earned Honorable Mention All-ACC in 2009. He started 51 games in his career and was twice named ACC Offensive Lineman of the Week this year and graded out to 90 percent in 12 of his 14 starts while recording 124 knockdown blocks.... He led a Hokie offensive line which paved the way for running back David Wilson to rush for 1,709 yards this year and for Tech to claim its third Coastal Division title in the last four years. Tech posted a 38-13 in his 51 career starts, and is the only team in the nation to record 10 or more wins in each of the last eight seasons. DeChristopher becomes the first Virginia Tech player to be named a winner of the ACC's Jacobs Blocking Trophy...DeChristopher edged out Florida State senior tackle Zebrie Sanders and North Carolina junior guard Jonathan Cooper for the 2011 ACC Jacobs Trophy.

Jim Tatum Award Danny Coale Virginia Tech



Virginia Tech senior wide receiver Danny Coale, who graduated in the fall of 2010 with a degree in Finance and is currently pursuing a second undergraduate degree in Marketing Management, is the recipient of the 2011 James Tatum Award, which is given annually to the ACC's top football scholar-athlete.

The Tatum Award is given annually in memory of the late Jim Tatum to the top senior student-athlete, in athletic eligibility, among the league's football players. Tatum, a two-time ACC Coach of the Year, coached in the fifties at both Maryland and North Carolina and believed strongly in the concept of the student-athlete. A native of Lexington, Virginia, Coale ranks 2nd at Virginia Tech in career pass receptions (165) and pass receiving yardage (2,658). His receiving yards total is the 18th-best career total in ACC history. He has combined with fellow senior wide receiver Jarrett Boykin to record 5,542 yards, the most reception yardage by two receivers in ACC history. This year, he led Virginia Tech and ranked 7th in the ACC in reception yardage with 904 yards and a 15.1 yards-per catch average. He becomes the first Virginia Tech player to be honored with the Tatum Award after graduating with a GPA of 3.34. Named to the 2010 All-ACC Academic Football team, Coale was also selected at Tech to be a member of the Student Endowment for Educational Development, the largest student-run investment portfolio in the nation.

Brian Piccolo Award Giovani Bernard North Carolina



North Carolina red-shirt freshman tailback Giovani Bernard, who rebounded from a severe knee injury to become the nation's leading freshman rusher, is the recipient of the 2011 Brian Piccolo Award. The Piccolo Award has been given annually since 1970 in memory of the late Brian Piccolo to the "most courageous" football player in the ACC. Piccolo was the ACC Athlete of the Year in 1965 and played for

the Chicago Bears before his career was cut short when he was stricken with cancer. Bernard suffered a severe knee injury, tearing his anterior cruciate ligament on the third day of pre-season practice prior to the start of the 2010 football season, which forced him to miss all of last year. After a year of rehabilitation, Bernard returned to lead North Carolina in rushing this year with 1,253 yards and 13 rushing touchdowns. He ranks 3rd in the ACC in rushing and has more rushing yards than any other freshman nationally. This year he became the first Tar Heel football player since 1984 to record five consecutive games with 100 or more yards in rushing and currently had 7 100-yard performances to his credit. Coincidentally, Bernard played his prep football at the same high school as Piccolo. A running back who led the nation in rushing in 1965 with 1,044 yards, Brian Piccolo played at Central Catholic High School in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, which was the previous name for St. Thomas Aquinas High School, Bernard's prep alma mater. Bernard becomes the 5th UNC student-athlete to receive the Piccolo.

Lott IMPACT Trophy Nation's Top Defensive Player Luke Kuechly, Boston College



Boston College Linebacker Luke Kuechly was named the 2011 winner of the Lott IMPACT Trophy at the annual awards banquet.

The 6-3, 237-pound junior from Cincinnati led the nation in tackles each of the past two seasons and this year was named the winner of the Butkus Award as the top linebacker in the country and the

Lombardi Award as the top lineman/linebacker. He recorded a school and ACC record 532 tackles in just three seasons.

The other finalists for the award were Emmanuel Acho of Texas, Dont'a Hightower of Alabama and Manti Te'o of Notre Dame.

Named after Hall of Famer Ronnie Lott, the Lott is awarded to college football's Defensive IMPACT Player of the Year. The Lott Trophy is the only college football award where character counts. The student-athlete must be making an IMPACT on the field as well as off the field in such areas as academics, community and leadership. IMPACT is an acronym for Integrity, Maturity, Performance, Academics, Community and Tenacity.

Boston College will receive \$25,000 for its general scholarship fund in recognition of Kuechly's achievement. Each of the runner-up schools received \$5,000.

In addition to his prodigious skills on the field, Kuechly is an honor student at Boston College, an officer on the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee for the second straight year and a participant in the HEAR (Help Educate through Athletic Responsibility) Program, which involves him visiting local schools and sharing experiences as student-athletes.

Marine Sgt. Dakota Meyer, the most recent winner of the Congressional Medal of Honor, was presented with an Honorary Lott IMPACT Trophy.

Johnson, Beamer Among Top 18 Active Coaches in Wins Per Season

The ACC has two coaches who rank among the Top 25 active football coaches in the NCAA in wins per season with five or more seasons as a head coach. Georgia Tech's **Paul Johnson** leads the way among ACC coaches, currently averaging 9.33 wins per full season. Johnson's record puts him in 9th place nationally among active head coaches with five or more years of experience. Virginia Tech's **Frank Beamer** (21st, 8.10) also joins Johnson among the Top 25 coaches in the nation in the NCAA's FBS. Virginia's **Mike London** has had an impressive start to his career, averaging 9 wins a season in his first four years as a head coach at FCS member Richmond and at UVA., while **Jimbo Fisher** is averaging 9.5 wins a year in his first two seasons at the helm at Florida State.

Five Current ACC Head Football Coaches Have UVA Ties

The selection by Miami of former Temple head coach **Al Golden** to succeed Randy Shannon as its head football coach, makes him the fifth former UVA assistant or graduate assistant coach to be a current head football coach in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Golden joins Boston College's **Frank Spaziani**, NC State's **Tom O'Brien**, Virginia's **Mike London** and Wake Forest's **Jim Grobe** as current ACC head coaches who have spent time as assistants or graduate assistants for the Cavaliers. Golden spent four seasons (2001-04) at Virginia as defensive coordinator under Al Groh. The Eagles' Spaziani served as an assistant coach at Virginia under then head coach George Welsh for nine seasons (1982-90), the last five as defensive coordinator. O'Brien also served under Welsh at UVA, spending 15 seasons (1982-96) there including the last six as offensive coordinator. London served two terms at UVA under Groh, serving as defensive line coach in 2001-04 and again in 2006-07 as defensive coordinator and defensive line coach. Wake Forest head coach Jim Grobe, a 1975 Virginia graduate, who just starting his 11th season with the Deacons, lettered two seasons at UVA as a middle guard and linebacker and also spent one year as a graduate assistant coach (1975) under then Virginia head coach Sonny Randle.

Wake Forest's Jim Grobe Becomes Latest ACC Coach To Join 100-Win Club

With a dramatic 24-23 win over Duke on Oct. 22, Wake Forest head coach Jim Grobe became the fourth active ACC coach with 100 career wins. Grobe has a 101-100-1 career mark for 17 seasons, the last 11 with the Deacons. NC State's Tom O'Brien gained 100 career triumphs when NC State defeated 22nd-ranked West Virginia in the 2010 Champs Sports Bowl. O'Brien accumulated 75 wins in a 10-year stay at Boston College. Virginia Tech's Frank Beamer (251), and Georgia Tech's Paul Johnson (140) are the other ACC coaches over the century mark in career triumphs.

Florida State's Fisher Joins Exclusive ACC Club

In his first season as Florida State's head coach in 2010, **Jimbo Fisher** joined select company by posting a 10-4-0 record as a first-year head coach in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Only three coaches have won 10 or more games in their first year in the ACC. Fisher is joined by Ralph Friedgen at Maryland and former head coach Jeff Jagodzinski at Boston College, who won 10 or more games in their rookie years as a head coach.

NC State's Tom O'Brien Latest To Coach at Multiple ACC Schools

NC State's Tom O'Brien is the fifth coach in Atlantic Coast Conference history to have served as a head coach of two ACC schools. O'Brien coached at Boston College from 1997 through 2006, which included the school's first two seasons (2005-06) of ACC membership. Jim Tatum was the first ACC coach at two schools; he first coached at North Carolina in 1942, then at Maryland from 1947-55 before returning to UNC beginning in 1956 until his death in 1958. Others who have coached at two ACC schools include Bobby Ross (Md, GT), Al Groh (WF, UVa) and Bill Dooley (UNC, WF).



Dooley actually coached at three current ACC schools as he spent nine seasons at Virginia Tech before the Hokies joined the ACC, in between stints at UNC and Wake Forest, winning 162 games in his career. Dooley and Ross are the only coaches in ACC history to be named ACC Coach of the Year at more than one school. Others who have coached at more than one current ACC school, though not necessarily when they were in the ACC, include John Heisman, who coached at both Georgia Tech and Clemson.

Virginia Tech's Beamer Becomes 10th FBS Head Coach To Win 200 Games At One School

With a 17-10 win over East Carolina on Sept. 10 Virginia Tech head football coach Frank Beamer



accomplished yet another milestone in a career which now spans 31 years as a head coach. The win was Beamer's 200th as a head coach at his alma mater making him only the 10th head coach in NCAA FBS history to have won 200 games at one school. He became only the second ACC

head coach to do so, joining former Florida State head coach Bobby Bowden, who actually won 316 games as a Seminole during the 1976-2009 seasons. Beamer's overall record in 24-plus seasons at Virginia Tech is 209-98-2 (.680). He is now only the second active FBS head coach with 200 wins at one school with Nevada's Chris Ault (227) the other.

Florida State's Jimbo Fisher Joining Select Company in Second Season

Florida State's second-year head coach **Jimbo Fisher** is joining some select company in only his second season on the job as the Seminoles head coach. Fisher compiled a 19-8 record (.704) in his first two seasons. His winning percentage ranks him 12th among all ACC head coaches in their second season, ahead of such figures as Clemson's Danny Ford and Georgia Tech's Bobby Ross. The best mark recorded by an ACC head coach in his first two years in the league was by Fisher's predecessor at FSU, Bobby Bowden, who lost just twice in 25 games during the 1992-93 seasons, capturing ACC crowns in both years and the national title in 1993.

Duke's V-Boys, Conner Vernon and Donovan Varner, One of the ACC's Most Productive Receiving Duos

Duke's wide receiver tandem of junior **Conner Vernon** and senior **Donovan Varner** have become the most prolific pass-catching duo in ACC history. In their two-plus seasons as teammates, the pair combined to make 405 career catches, and have caught more passes than any other duo. The pair caught 384 passes while actually playing together, and passed the ACC's all-time record held by Clemson's Aaron Kelly (232) and Tyler Grisham (132), who played together during the 2005-2008 seasons. Virginia Tech's senior tandem of **WRs Jarrett Boykin (184)** and **Danny Coale (165)** ended their careers in 4th place with 349 pass receptions between them.

NC State's David Amerson Sets ACC Record, Leads Nation in Interceptions

NC State sophomore cornerback **David Amerson** led the nation and set an ACC single-season record, making 13 pass interceptions this past season. Amerson's total broke the previous league mark of 11 set by North Carolina's Dre Bly in 1996. Amerson was the second straight ACC player to lead the nation in pass interceptions and the third player in the last four years to either lead the nation or tie for the nation's lead in pass interceptions. Amerson was preceded by Virginia Tech's Jayron Hosley (2010) and Wake Forest's Alphonso Smith (2008).

Georgia Tech's Hill Sets ACC Season Record For Yards-Per Catch

Georgia Tech junior **WR Stephen Hill**, who has declared as an early-entry in this year's NFL Draft, set an ACC single season record for most yards per catch for a minimum of 25 pass receptions. Hill averaged 29.3 yards per catch on each of his 28 receptions, good for 820 yards and 5 touchdowns.



Hill's effort bettered the previous mark of 25.5 set in 2009 by NC State's Owen Spencer. Spencer, who had 31 catches that year, still holds the standard for a minimum of 30 catches. Tech's Demaryius Thomas holds the mark for 35 or more receptions, averaging 25.1 on 46 catches in 2009.

Wake Forest's Givens, Campanaro Set ACC Record for Most Combined Catches

Wake Forest's wide receiver tandem of junior **Chris Givens** and sophomore **Michael Campanaro** set an ACC record for most pass receptions in a season by two teammates. Givens, who has declared as an early entry into this year's NFL Draft, finished second in the ACC with 83 receptions, while Campanaro, in only his second season, finished 4th in the conference with 73 catches. Combined, they caught 156 passes which bettered the old mark of 155 set during the 2003 season by NC State's Jerricho Cotchery (86) and Trammie Hall (69). Clemson's talented duo of freshman **Sammy Watkins** (82) and sophomore **DeAndre Hopkins** (72) recorded the third-best total by two receivers with 154 catches between them.

Wake Forest's Merrill Noel Ties for National Lead in Passes Defended

Wake Forest's redshirt freshman cornerback, **Merrill "Bud" Noel**, the 2011 ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year, tied for the nation's lead in passes defended and led the nation in pass deflections. Noel, a consensus first-team Freshman All-America, had two interceptions and 19 pass deflections in his first year of collegiate football, becoming the first freshman since the NCAA began keeping the category to lead it. Noel's 1.62 average tied Nevada senior defensive back **Isaiah Frey** for the national lead. In all, three ACC defensive backs finished ranked in the top 10 in the nation in passes defended. NC State sophomore **CB David Amerson** ranked 5th nationally, averaging 1.38 passes defended per game with 13 interceptions and 5 pass deflections. Duke senior **S Matt Daniels** tied for 8th place, with a 1.33 average.

ACC Has Record Five QB's Top 3,000 Passing Yards in 2011

All Five Return in 2012--Also a First

Led by Clemson sophomore **Tajh Boyd**, for the first time the ACC had five quarterbacks top 3,000 passing yards in 2011. All five signal callers return for the 2012 ACC season, also a new high. The previous best was four QBs with over 3,000 yards in 2009 and 2010 and the previous high in returning passers who had topped 3,000 yards the previous year was just two, in 2003 and 2010. In the ACC's history, the league has had only 24 different quarterbacks record 30 3,000-yard performances. Only three signal callers have recorded back-to-back 3,000-yard efforts in Florida State's Chris Weinke (1999, 2000), NC State's Philip Rivers (2002, 2003) and the Wolfpack's Russell Wilson (2009, 2010). The five passers with 3,000 or more yards in 2011 were Boyd (3,838), **Bryn Renner** of North Carolina (3,086), **Mike Glennon** of NC State (3,054), **Tanner Price** of Wake Forest (3,017) and **Logan Thomas** of Virginia Tech (3,013). This doesn't include Duke's **Sean Renfree**, who threw for 3,131 yards as a sophomore in 2010 and also returns in 2012.

He has dropped 23 of his 57 punts (40.3 %) inside of the Seminoles' opponents' 20-yard line. He also boomed 24 of his 57 punts for 50 or more yards with only 7 touchbacks. In all, FSU gains an average of 41.28 yards of field position every time Powell punted the football in 2011.

This season Maryland sophomore QB **C. J. Brown** and Georgia Tech junior QB **Tevin Washington** recorded two of the best rushing performances by an ACC quarterback, both against Clemson. Brown, in the first start of his career, helped the Terrapins ring up 45 points against the then 8th-ranked Tigers by rushing for 162 yards on 22 carries and a TD, the 9th-best effort in ACC history by a signal-caller. Two weeks later, Washington led the Yellow Jackets to an upset of the then 5th-ranked Tigers (BCS), rushing for 176 yards on 27 carries--the 4th-best effort by an ACC quarterback in league history. Clemson's Sammy Watkins Sets ACC Freshmen Records in Receptions, Yards, TDs

Clemson freshman WR **Sammy Watkins** rewrote the ACC record book for pass receiving by a freshman, setting new standards in pass receptions, receiving yards and touchdowns.



Watkins actually broke those ACC records in the 9th game of the season and finished with one of the top receiving years in ACC history. Watkins finished 3rd in the ACC in pass receptions with 82, 2nd in pass receiving yards with 1,219 and tied for first with 12 TDs. The old freshmen marks were 58 catches by Frank Wycheck of Maryland (1990) and Wali Lundy of Virginia (2002); 853 receiving yards by NC State's Koren Robinson; and 9 receiving TDs by Virginia's Heath Miller (2002) and FSU's Greg Carr (2005).

Wake Forest's Chris Givens led all ACC receivers with 1,330 yards, the 4th-best mark in ACC history, on 83 catches and 9 TDs. North Carolina's Dwight Jones finished the year with 85 pass receptions--the ACC's 5th-best single-season effort--good for 1,196 yards and 12 TDs.

ACC Runners Head for the Century Mark ACC Runners Break League Mark With 57 100-Yard Efforts in 2011

Led by Virginia Tech's **David Wilson**, North Carolina's **Giovani Bernard** and Miami's **Lamar Miller**, ACC running backs topped the 100-yard mark a total of 57 times this year. When Georgia Tech's Preston Lyons rushed for 138 yards against Utah in the Sun Bowl on Dec. 31, it marked the 56th 100-yard effort in the ACC this year, breaking the old mark of 55 set in 2010. Wilson had 10 100-yard games this year while Bernard and Miller topped the century mark in rushing 7 times each. The highest total prior to expansion in 2004, was 1983 when the league's eight teams had 44 100-yard efforts, led by 13 by North Carolina. In 1971, the seven-team ACC had 42 100-yard efforts, led by Wake Forest which recorded 16 100-yard rushing performances, the most by a single team in a season in ACC history.

Duke's Sean Renfree Piling Up 300-Yard Games

When Duke junior QB Sean Renfree threw for 303 yards in the Blue Devils' 31-21 loss to Virginia on Nov. 19, he topped the 300-yard mark in passing yards for the 8th game of his 23-game career as a starter. Renfree leads all active ACC players in most 300-yard performances and, with one more 300-yard effort, would tie for the 9th-highest total in ACC history. NC State's Philip Rivers holds the ACC record with 18. In 29 total games, six of which he was in a reserve role, Renfree has averaged 219.2 yards per game passing, 260 yards per game as the starter.



The Soph Signal-Callers: ACC Has 7 Sophomore Starting QBs

The ACC had no fewer than seven sophomore quarterbacks who started for their teams in 2011. The talented collection of second-year men include a pair of sophomores at Maryland in C.J. Brown of Maryland, who ran for 162 yards and threw for 177 yards, accounting for 4 TDs against Clemson in his first collegiate start on Oct. 15, and Danny O'Brien, the 2010 ACC Rookie of the Year, who has thrown for 4,086 yards in less than two full seasons. O'Brien missed the final two games of the season due to an injury suffered on Nov. 12. Joining Brown as second-year starters were Chase Rettig of Boston College; Tajh Boyd of Clemson; Bryn Renner of North Carolina; Michael Rocco of Virginia; Logan Thomas of Virginia Tech and Tanner Price of Wake Forest. Rettig and Price got their feet wet starting for their teams as freshmen last fall, while Boyd, Renner, Rocco, Thomas and now Brown made their starting debuts this year. Miami's Stephen Morris, who is also a sophomore and started a few games last year due to injury, is not now Miami's starter, but has 1,523 career yards.

Miami's Miller, Tech's Wilson and UNC's Bernard Piled Up 100-yard Games

On Oct. 15, the ACC had seven runners top the 100-yard rushing mark in their games. In all, ACC runners topped the century mark a league-record 57 times this season with Virginia Tech junior David Wilson leading the way with 10 games over 100-yards rushing. North Carolina redshirt freshman Giovanni Bernard and Miami's Lamar Miller have both topped the century mark 7 times. Miller's consecutive streak (5) was broken on Oct. 15th against UNC, and Bernard, who became the first Tar Heel to post five straight 100-yard days since Ethan Horton in 1984, had his 5-game streak broken Oct. 22 at Clemson when his playing time was limited with a hip injury.

ACC Makes Mark In NFL Playoffs

Former ACC Pass Receivers Recording Big Days In the 2011 NFL Playoffs

Accounted for 51.3% of all Passing Touchdowns, 35.5% of all Passing Yardage

The Atlantic Coast Conference has had a significant impact on this year's National Football League Playoffs. Through the NFL's first 10 playoff games, receivers who have played collegiately at current ACC schools have accounted for 51.3% of all of the passing touchdowns thrown, 35.5% of the passing yardage and 26% percent of the pass completions.



In all 15 former ACC players—including 14 who played Atlantic Coast Conference Football—have totaled 118 catches for 2,032 yards and 20 touchdowns in the 10 NFL Playoff Games to date. ACC pass receivers have averaged an eye-opening 17.2 yards a catch average. By comparison, the non-ACC receivers in those games averaged just 10.9 yards per catch. All told, the teams in those ten NFL games have a combined total of 443 pass completions for 5,586 yards (12.6 average) and 39 scores.

Of the top eight pass receivers in terms of yardage in the NFL Playoffs, six are from current ACC schools including the top two in Hakeem Nicks (North Carolina) of the New York Giants with 335 yards and a 18.6 per-catch average and Demaryius Thomas (Georgia Tech) of Denver with 297 yards and a 29.7 per-catch average. They are followed by Vernon Davis (Maryland) of San Francisco (292), Marques Colston, who played collegiately at Hofstra, of New Orleans (256) and Victor Cruz of the New York Giants (242), who played collegiately at Massachusetts. But the next four are ACC products in Calvin Johnson (Georgia Tech) of Detroit (211); Andre Johnson (Miami) of Houston (201); Anquan Boldin (Florida State) of Baltimore (174) and Jimmy Graham (Miami) of New Orleans (158). Nicks will be playing in next Sunday's Super Bowl.

Nine of the 15 100-yard performances by NFL receivers in the playoffs have been from receivers from ACC schools. ACC receivers turned in the only 200-yard receiving efforts in the playoffs, when Georgia Tech's Calvin Johnson had 12 catches for 211 yards for Detroit against New Orleans and Georgia Tech's Demaryius Thomas had 204 yards on only four catches versus Pittsburgh. Hakeem Nicks and Vernon Davis are the only receivers in the playoffs to have topped the 100-yard mark twice.

National Football Hall of Fame Inducts FSU's Deion Sanders, Miami's Russell Maryland Honors UNC's Woody Durham



Atlantic Coast Conference schools had two inductees and a major award-winner this year at the annual National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame annual banquet in New York City. Former Florida State cornerback **Deion Sanders** and Miami defensive tackle **Russell Maryland** were the honorees from ACC schools and their selection brings the total to 15 former players or coaches who have been tabbed for induction into the College Hall of Fame from current Atlantic Coast Conference schools over the last seven years. Longtime North Carolina broadcasting legend **Woody Durham** was presented with the Football Foundation's Chris Schenkel Award, which is given annually to a sports broadcaster who has had a long and distinguished career broadcasting college football. Durham retired this April after spending 40 years as the Voice of the Tar Heels for football and basketball. The award bears the name of its first recipient, Chris Schenkel who had life-long commitment to excellence in broadcasting and a longstanding association with The National Football Foundation & College Hall of Fame.



Sanders redefined the qualities of the position of cornerback during his four-year career for the Seminoles (1985-88) and was named the winner of the Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's top defensive back in 1988. That year, he led the nation in punt returns and finished 8th in the balloting for the Heisman Trophy. A two-time unanimous All-America, he led FSU to four bowl victories and to the first two of 14 consecutive AP top five finishes.

Maryland, a dominating defensive tackle on Miami's 1987 and 1989 National Championship football teams becomes the seventh Hurricane coach or player to be selected to the College Hall of Fame. A unanimous All-America as a senior in 1990, he also was presented with the Outland Trophy that year as the nation's top interior lineman. A Lombardi Award finalist and the College Football Lineman of the Year by UPI, he helped Miami compile an impressive 44-4 record, including four bowl triumphs during his four seasons (1986-90) in Coral Gables.

Noting ACC Football Academics, Schools Are No. 1

ACC Schools Rank No. 1 In Average Starting and Mid-Career Salaries

In a study published by the website Payscale.com, graduates of Atlantic Coast Conference schools earned more money in their initial jobs after graduation from college than their counterparts at schools from the other Conferences that play in the NCAA's Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS). ACC schools also rank first among NCAA FBS Conferences in the salaries of its graduates at the mid-point of their careers. The study did not include the starting salaries of graduates of the military academies

In all, six ACC schools--Georgia Tech (2), Duke (3), Virginia Tech (5), Virginia (16), Maryland (17) and Boston College (18) were ranked among the nation's Top 20 in starting salary. Seven league schools--Duke (1), Georgia Tech (4), Wake Forest (7), Boston College (10), Virginia Tech (14), Virginia (18) and Maryland (19)--were ranked among the Top 20 in mid-career salaries.

Noting ACC Football

Florida State Selected To Take ACC Football Title For the First Time Since 2006

PINEHURST, N.C. -- Florida State, seeking its first league title since 2005, is the consensus choice to win the Atlantic Division and to defeat Virginia Tech in the Dr Pepper ACC Championship Game according to a poll of media members attending this year's ACC Football Kickoff at the Pinehurst Resort.

The 2005 ACC Football Kickoff was also the last time the Seminoles were projected by the media to win the ACC title.

Boston College running back Montel Harris, who enters his final season within striking distance of the conference's 33-year-old record for career rushing yardage, is the preseason Player of the Year.

The Seminoles of coach Jimbo Fisher, who won the Atlantic last year, received 65 of 71 first-place votes in that portion of the balloting. Fifty of the 65 also said Florida State will prevail in the title game, set for Dec. 3 at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, N.C.

The Hokies, who have won three of the first six championship contests, got 66 votes in the Coastal election. Eighteen electors picked Tech to repeat as ACC champion.

Harris, who enters this fall with 3,600 career rushing yards, the most of any ACC player after his junior season, was chosen by 26 media representatives, with FSU quarterback EJ Manuel second with 14 votes. Harris' teammate Luke Kuechly, a 2010 unanimous All-America linebacker selection, was third with 12 votes. This fall, Harris will be chasing the Atlantic Coast Conference career rushing record of 4,602 yards, set in 1978 by NC State All-America Ted Brown.

GREENSBORO, N.C.-- Florida State and Miami led all Atlantic Coast Conference schools each with four players selected to the 2011 Preseason All-ACC Football team in voting conducted by the media at the annual ACC Football Kickoff, which was held July 24-25 at the Pinehurst Resort in Pinehurst, N.C.

In all, 15 of the 25 honorees on the team earned first or second-team All-ACC honors last fall, with nine having been selected to the All-ACC first team. Three of the selections are returning first-team 2011 All-Americans.

The Seminoles, tabbed by the media at the ACC Football Kickoff to win their first ACC Football title since 2005, had quarterback EJ Manuel (Virginia Beach, Va.) and offensive tackle Andrew Datko (Weston, Fla.) chosen on offense; defensive end Brandon Jenkins (Tallahassee, Fla.) selected on offense; and cornerback Greg Reid (Valdosta, Ga.) named as the specialist for his abilities as a punt and kickoff returner.

Miami, beginning its first season under new head coach Al Golden, also had four players selected in guard Brandon Washington (Miami, Fla.), center Tyler Horn (Memphis, Tenn.), outside linebacker Sean Spence (Miami, Fla.) and safety Ray-Ray Armstrong (Sanford, Fla.).

Virginia Tech, Clemson and North Carolina all had three selections, while Boston College and Duke each had two players chosen and Georgia Tech, Maryland, NC State and Virginia had one each.

BC was led by preseason player of the year tailback Montel Harris (Jacksonville, Fla.) who enters the season needing 1,002 rushing yards to break the 33-year-old ACC career record set

in 1978 by former NC State All-America Ted Brown, and 2010 unanimous All-America linebacker Luke Kuechly, who led the nation in tackles per game in 2010 and is the NCAA's leading career returning tackler in tackles per game. Harris and Kuechly tied for the highest amount of votes received as each were named on 49 ballots. Duke was represented by All-America placeki

Those who were chosen first-team All-ACC last fall included Montel Harris and Luke Kuechly of Boston College, Brandon Jenkins of Florida State, Kenny Tate of Maryland (though selected at safety last year), Brandon Washington of Miami, Quinton Coples of North Carolina, George Bryan of NC State, Chase Minnifield of Virginia, and Jayron Hosley of Virginia Tech.

The six selections who were named to the second team 2010 All-ACC squad were Conner Vernon and Will Snyderwine of Duke, Sean Spence and Ray-Ray Armstrong of Miami, Omoregie Uzzi of Georgia Tech and Blake DeChristopher of Virginia Tech.

Three members of the 2011 preseason team were repeaters from 2010 preseason squad in Montel Harris and Luke Kuechly of Boston College and George Bryan of NC State.

In all, eleven of the 12 ACC schools were represented on the preseason All-ACC team. A total of 51 ballots were turned in from the more than 290 media members in attendance at the 2011 ACC Football Kickoff.

ACC 2011 Football Championship Game Legends Class

*Pro Football Hall of Famers Jim Otto of Miami and Chris Hanburger of North Carolina,
1983 ACC Player of the Year Ben Bennett of Duke headline 2011 Class*

Two members of the Professional Football Hall of Fame in former North Carolina linebacker **Chris Hanburger (Fayetteville, N.C.)** and former Miami center **Jim Otto (Wausau, Wis.)** and two-time ACC Player of the Year **Ben Bennett (Sunnyvale, Calif.)** of Duke, headline the ACC's Class of 2011 Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game Legends.

The Legends will be honored at this year's Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game weekend. They will be honored at the ACC Night of Legends event on Friday, Dec. 2, and during ceremonies at Bank of America Stadium for the 7th Annual Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship, which has an 8 p.m. kickoff on Dec. 3 and will be nationally televised by ESPN in both HD and 3-D.

The group of 12 former gridiron standouts from current ACC schools includes two former ACC players of the Year, three consensus first-team All-Americans, five first-team All-Americans, and eight players who combined for 74 years in the National or American Football League and a total of 94 years of professional football experience in either the NFL, AFL, Canadian Football League, World League of American Football or the Arena Football League. Nine of the Legends were drafted into the NFL or AFL, including four first-round draft choices.

In all, the collection of players combined for a national championship, a Canadian Football League Grey Cup, nine ACC team titles and three NFL Super Bowl appearances.

Otto (1957-59) started three seasons at center and linebacker for the Miami Hurricanes under legendary coach Andy Gustafson. Drafted in the first round by the fledgling American Football League, he signed with the Oakland Raiders in 1960 and began an unprecedented 15-year professional career as the prototypic pivotman. Voted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility in 1980, Otto was a 10-time AFL All-Star, a 10-time All-AFL team member and a three-time NFL All-Pro performer. He helped lead Oakland to the 1967 AFL Championship and a berth in Super Bowl

II. He started 210 consecutive games at center for the Raiders, 308 games in all, and was named to the AFL's all-time team. He is one of only 20 men to play in the American Football League for all 10 years of its existence. Otto wore the famous 00 number throughout his career. A native of Wausau, Wis., he now lives in Auburn, Calif.

Hanburger (1962-64), was a standout linebacker and center for the North Carolina teams of coach Jim Hickey in the early-to-mid 1960s. Named a first-team All-ACC selection as a center in both 1963 and 1964, he helped lead the 1963 Tar Heel team to a 9-2 record, a share of the ACC championship and a 35-0 win over Air Force in the Gator Bowl. Drafted on the 18th round of the 1965 NFL Draft by the Washington Redskins, Hanburger went on to play 14 seasons in Washington, where he earned nine Pro Bowl selections and was regarded as one of the best outside linebackers of his era. Inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame last Saturday at Canton, Ohio, he played in 187 NFL games and was voted to the All-NFL team four times. A mainstay of the dominant Washington Redskin teams of the 1970s, he made 19 career interceptions, returning them for 347 yards and two touchdowns. He led Washington to the 1972 NFC Championship and Super Bowl VII. That year, he was named the NFC Defensive Player of the Year. Originally a native of Fort Bragg in Fayetteville, N.C., he now lives in Darlington, S.C.

Bennett (1980-83), a pinpoint passer who was named ACC Player of the Year by the Associated Press in 1982 and 1983 and was named ACC Player of the Year by ACSMA in 1983, played three seasons for coach Red Wilson and one for coach Steve Sloan at Duke. He completed his collegiate career as the NCAA Division I record-holder for passing yards (9,614), pass attempts (1,375) and pass completions (820). The 1980 ACC Rookie of the Year, he benefitted from having Steve Spurrier as his offensive coordinator and set three NCAA freshman records in 1980 against Wake For-

est completing 38 of 62 passes for 469 yards. In his career he set seven NCAA, 15 ACC and 42 school records. Even 28 years later, he still ranks 6th on the ACC career passing yardage list, 3rd in passes attempted and 4th in passes completed. Drafted in the 6th round of the NFL Draft by the Atlanta Falcons, Bennett played only briefly for two seasons in the NFL, as well as briefly in United States Football League and the World League of American Football. He played all or parts of 10 seasons in the Arena Football League and threw for over 14,000 yards, while making five appearances in the ArenaBowl. He was inducted into the Arena Bowl Hall of Fame in 2000 and will be inducted into the Duke Athletics Hall of Fame on Sept. 9. A native of Sunnyvale, Calif., Bennett now resides in Orlando, Fla.

Joining them as 2011 ACC Legends this year are Boston College's **Stephen Boyd (Valley Stream, N.Y.)**, a two-time All-Big East selection at linebacker who helped lead the Eagles to three straight bowl appearances during the 1992, 1993 and 1994 seasons; Clemson's **Perry Tuttle (Lexington, N.C.)**, a first-team All-America wide receiver who was one of the most dangerous deep threats in ACC history; Georgia Tech's **Lucius Sanford (Milledgeville, Ga.)**, a first-team All-America who was one of the hardest-hitting linebackers in Yellow Jacket history; Maryland's **Rich Novak (Laurel, Md.)**, a stand-out quarterback for the Tom Nugent-coached Terrapin teams of the late 1950's and early 60's; Virginia Tech's **Mike Johnson (Landover, Md.)**, a standout defensive performer for the Bill-Dooley-coached Hokies of the early 1980's; and Wake Forest's **Larry Russell (Newburyport, Mass.)**, a two-time All-ACC performer who led the Deacons to the 1970 ACC championship.

Completing this year's Legends Class are a trio of consensus first-team All-Americans in NC State placekicker **Marc Primanti (Coatesville, Pa.)**, who set an ACC record for consecutive

field goals without a miss in 1996 that still stands today; Florida State's Andre Wadsworth (St. Croix, Virgin Islands), the 1997 ACC Player of the Year, who played on four consecutive ACC championship teams for the Seminoles' legendary Bobby Bowden; and Virginia's Chris Slade (Newport News, Va.), the ACC's all-time leader in quarterback sacks for the George Welsh-coached Cavalier squads of the early 1990's.

Boyd (1991-94) was twice named All-Big East and All-ECAC at linebacker for the Eagles in 1993 and 1994. He played his first three seasons under Tom Coughlan, and his final campaign with Coach Dan Henning. Boyd helped the Eagles compile a four-year record of 28-17-2 (.617) and play in three straight bowl games: the 1993 Hall of Fame Bowl; the 1994 Carquest Bowl and the 1994 Jeep-Eagle Aloha Bowl. Drafted in the 5th round by the Detroit Lions in the 1995 NFL Draft, he played seven seasons in the National Football League, all of them with the Lions. He started a total of 66 games during the 1995-2001 seasons. A two-time Pro Bowl selection for the Lions, he made 536 tackles from 1997-99. He was named an Associated Press 2nd-team All-Pro in 2000 and an All-NFC player for both 1999 and 2000 by the Football News. He currently is the head football coach at Chaminade High School in Minneola, N.Y. A native of Valley Stream, N.Y., he currently resides in Long Beach, N.Y.

Tuttle (1978-81) was one of the main offensive threats on Clemson teams which posted a sparkling 37-10 (.787) four-year record. He played one season under Charley Pell and three years for the Tigers' legendary head coach, Danny Ford. Tuttle was an integral part of the 1981 Clemson team which posted a perfect, 12-0 record and captured the ACC's second national football championship. He caught the game-winning touchdown pass in a 22-15 win over 4th-ranked Nebraska in the 1982 Orange Bowl Game, clinching the Tigers' first national gridiron title. A two-time first-team All-ACC wide receiver (1980-81), Tuttle had 150 career receptions for 2,534 yards and 17 touchdowns. He still ranks 5th on Clemson's career receiving lists in pass receptions and 3rd in reception yards and TD catches. A first round pick by the

Buffalo Bills in the 1982 NFL Draft, he played four seasons in the NFL and six years (1986-91) in the Canadian Football League with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers. During his time in the CFL, he had 321 career receptions for 5,817 yards and 41 TDs and helped lead Winnipeg to the 1990 CFL Grey Cup Championship. A native of Lexington, N.C., he currently lives in Charlotte, N.C.

Sanford (1974-77) was the defensive leader and four-year starter on the Pepper Rodgers-coached Georgia Tech teams of the mid to late 1970's. A fierce competitor and hard hitter on the field, he was the consummate linebacker, leading Tech in tackles in three of his four seasons and making 433 total stops—at the time a school record—during his collegiate career. He still ranks 4th on the Georgia Tech career tackle list. A three-time All-Southeastern Independent team selection at linebacker (1975-77), Sanford was named a first team All-America in 1977 by both the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) and The Sporting News. Selected in the 4th round of the 1978 NFL Draft by the Buffalo Bills, he played nine seasons with the Bills and his final campaign for the 1987 Cleveland Browns. In all, he played in 129 games in the NFL and recorded over 100 tackles in each of his first four pro seasons. A former Dean's List student at Georgia Tech, he currently serves as Executive Director of the Georgia Tech Letterwinner's Club and an Associate Director of Development for Athletics. Originally from Milledgeville, Ga., he now lives in Atlanta, Ga.

Novak (1959-61), one of the highest-regarded prep quarterbacks in the nation prior to entering Maryland, played under the innovative eye of Maryland head coach Tom Nugent, who is generally considered as the creator of the I-formation offense. A threat to run or pass, Novak completed 109 of 217 passes during his Terrapin career for 1,262 yards and 10 TDs. He also had 550 career rushing yards and led the Terrapins in 1959 in total offense. Novak, who shared playing time in Nugent's system with Dale Betty and Dick Shiner at quarterback, still earned honorable mention All-ACC honors by United Press International in

1960. He helped lead the Terrapins to an 18-12 (.600), three-year record. Known as Rich Novak now, he had good success against West Virginia, three times leading the Terrapins to wins over the Mountaineers. After his collegiate days, he eschewed professional football to begin a very successful business career. Formerly of Uniontown, Pa., Novak now resides in Greenwich, Conn.

Johnson (1980-83) was Virginia Tech's second most prominent defensive player of the 1980s behind only Outland Trophy winner Bruce Smith. He helped lead Tech to a four-year, 31-14 (.689) record which included a 9-2 mark in 1983, his senior season. He totaled 429 tackles for his career, leading the Hokies in tackling in 1982 and 1983 with 148 and 135 hits, respectively. An excellent student as well, Johnson, who majored in the demanding field of architecture, earned 2nd-team Academic All-America honors in 1982. Out of college he signed with the Philadelphia and later Baltimore Stars of the USFL, playing two seasons (1984-85) in the USFL. He helped the Stars win the USFL Championship in 1984. Drafted by the Cleveland Browns in the first round of the 1984 NFL Supplemental Draft (18th pick), he went on to a 10-year career in the National Football League, the first eight with the Browns, the final two with the Detroit Lions. He started 125 games and was twice named to the NFL Pro Bowl (1989, 1990). In 1989 he was named first-team All-AFC by both UPI and Pro Football Weekly. He had 13 career interceptions, returning two for touchdowns and added one fumble recovery for a score. He recorded a total of 1,146 career tackles, 26 forced fumbles and 13 fumble recoveries. Born in Southport, N.C., he was a native of Landover, Md., and currently resides in Forestville, Md.

Russell (1969-71), who was named All-ACC twice in 1970 and 1971, was the master of the triple-option Veer offense featured by Coach Cal Stoll's Wake Forest teams. Russell led the Deacons to the 1970 ACC Football title, the school's first, and then guided a Wake offense that set

the ACC's single-season rushing record for rushing yards per game (304.5) in 1971. The Deacons became the first ACC team to average over 300 yards rushing a game for a season; that record lasted 39 years until Georgia Tech broke it in 2010. Russell's total of 803 career rushing yards was an ACC record for quarterbacks at the time, at the time. He also set ACC single-season and career marks for rushing yards and touchdowns by a quarterback. In his senior season, he led the ACC in scoring and finished 9th nationally with 94 points (8.5 per game). A native of Newburyport, Mass., Russell lives now in Portsmouth, N.H.

Primanti (1995-96), who missed only four kicks of any kind in his two-year Wolfpack career, is one of the most accurate placekickers in ACC history. For his career, he made 51 of 52 PATs and 31 of 33 field goal attempts. In his senior season, he did not miss a kick at all, making all 24 PATs and 20 field goal attempts, and was named winner of the prestigious Lou Groza Golden Toe Award, presented annually to the nation's best placekicker. He set an ACC record over the 1995 and 1996 seasons, making 27 consecutive field goal attempts. A consensus first-team All-America in 1996, he was named a first-team All-America by the Associated Press, the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA), The Sporting News and Football News. He was also named first-team All-ACC in 1996. He still holds ACC records for

best field goal percentage for a season (1.000) and career (.912). Originally from Coatesville, Pa., he now resides in Raleigh, N.C.

Wadsworth (1994-97), who earned a scholarship at Florida State as a non-recruited 215-pound walk-on, developed into one of the most feared pass rushers in the ACC. A member of four ACC championship teams in 1994, 1995, 1996 and 1997, he helped FSU, coached by the legendary Bobby Bowden, to a four-year, 42-5-1 (.885) record including an 11-1 mark and a No. 3 final national ranking in his senior season. That year, he was named ACC Player of the Year after leading the league with 16 quarterback sacks and earning consensus first-team All-America honors. At no time in his collegiate career did Florida State fail to earn a national ranking of lower than 4th in the final AP poll. Wadsworth was named 2nd-team All-ACC in 1995 and 1996, earning first-team honors in 1997. He finished his career with 23 sacks. In the 1998 NFL Draft he was the third player chosen in the first round by the Arizona Cardinals, the highest-ever for a Seminole player. Hampered by nagging injuries and multiple knee surgeries, his pro career lasted but three seasons. Originally a native of St. Croix, the Virgin Islands who grew up in Miami, Fla., he currently resides in Scottsdale, Ariz.

Slade (1989-92) is the ACC's re-

cord-holder for quarterback sacks in a career, having recorded 40.0 during his four-year career with the Cavaliers. One of the defensive leaders for the Cavalier squads of the late 1980s and early 1990s coached by George Welsh, he became the first player in UVa history to earn back-to-back first-team All-America honors. He was named a first-team All-America in 1991 by College and Pro Football Weekly and earned consensus All-America honors in 1992, honored as a first-team All-America by AP, UPI, Football Writers of America (FWAA), the Walter Camp Foundation, The Sporting News and Football News. He was named Defensive Player of the Year by the Football News in 1992 and he led the ACC in sacks that year with 14. During his four years as a starter he helped lead Virginia to a 33-14-1 (.698) record and three consecutive bowl trips. Selected in the 2nd round of the 1993 NFL Draft by the New England Patriots, he played nine seasons in the NFL, the first eight with the Patriots. He was named to the NFL's Pro Bowl in 1997 and made 98 starts in his career with 53.5 career sacks. He finished his pro career with over 600 tackles and was a member of the New England team which played in Super Bowl XXXI. A native of Newport News, Va., he now resides in Atlanta, Ga., and serves as the football sideline reporter for the UVa radio network.

ACC Overtime Games

The ACC & Overtime

When Virginia Tech and Michigan went into overtime in the Sugar Bowl on Jan. 2, it marked the 58th time an ACC team has had to go to extra sessions. Of the 58 overtime contests, a large portion of them--24--have been played in the month of September. Games have gone into overtime for ACC teams a total of 13 times in November, while 12 have been played in October, three in August, four in December and two in January (2006 FedEx Orange Bowl, 2012 Allstate Sugar Bowl). Of the 58 overtime contests, 28 have been ACC games while 30 non-conference games have gone into overtime. The home team has a 31-20 advantage in the 50 games played on campus. The team which wins the toss has a 29-29 record. 43 of the games were decided in the first overtime with 11 games in double overtime and four in triple overtime.
