The 2011 West Australian Football League grand final is the culmination of another highly successful AAMI WAFL premiership season and a chance for players to create their own piece of history as they strive for grand final glory.

Congratulations to all of the teams competing in today's WAFL grand finals, reaching the big stage at the end of the season is a tremendous feat whether it be at colts, reserves or league level.

Each player will take the field and compete with pride and passion for their club as they aim to hold the premiership cup aloft and celebrate a hard-earned victory.

It has been a very close season for the competition, with the gap decreasing between top and bottom sides and all clubs claiming some memorable wins over higher-placed opponents.

The top four was not finalised until the last round of the season when traditional rivals South Fremantle defeated East Fremantle to secure a spot in the finals at league level.

Claremont took out the minor premiership for the second consecutive season and West Perth climbed into the top two, while Subiaco also returned to finals action after a strong finish to the season.

Peel Thunder, Perth and East Fremantle were also represented in the reserves and colts finals series, meaning seven out of nine clubs were in contention to claim a premiership in 2011.

Special thanks must go to AAMI for their naming rights sponsorship of the competition and recognition of individual performances through the AAMI WAFL Player of the Week and overall AAMI WAFL Player of the Year Award.

The \$5000 award was introduced to the WAFL last season as part of AAMI's naming rights sponsorship, with weekly prizes also awarded to stand-out WAFL players and their junior club or district Grow the Game fund.

The overall winner of the award was Luke Blackwell from Claremont with 22 votes.

The likes of Blackwell and other WAFL stars, along with the fantastic promotional work done by the WAFL clubs, attracted 199,002 spectators to home and away games throughout the season, which was the third highest since 1994.

Participation numbers have also steadily increased across all age groups in both metropolitan and country areas this year, while WA players continued to flourish at the top level, with a total of 31 WA recruits joining AFL lists for the 2011 season, including top two AFL National Draft selections David Swallow and Harley Bennell.

Season 2010 Sandover medallist Andrew Krakouer also enjoyed a remarkable return to the AFL and excited football fans around the nation after continuing his Simpson Medal-winning efforts from last year's thrilling WAFL grand final win with Swan Districts.

This year's draft promises to deliver another outstanding crop of WA talent to AFL clubs, with Swan Districts player Stephen Coniglio winning the Larke Medal for the best division one player at the Under 18 Championships and mature-age recruits being exposed through the new Foxtel Cup competition.

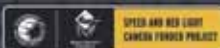
The Foxtel Cup was well-received by all involved and WAFL teams Swan Districts, East Perth and Claremont represented the WAFL strongly, with Claremont reaching the grand final against Williamstown.

All of these success stories can be attributed to those people who work in football and more than 40,000 volunteers who give up their time to ensure the sport grows and continues to offer a quality environment in which to play.

ON his way to playing in his second WAFL grand final in two years, Claremont midfielder Luke Blackwell shone in the home-and-away season to take out the Work Clobber/Steel Blue Player-of-the-Year Award.

Blackwell was the runner-up in last year's count behind Andrew Krakouer but his outstanding form again this season has led him to finish on top, three votes ahead of the fast-finishing Kyal Horsley from Subiaco.

The burning desire to play in a premiership side with the Tigers was one of the driving motivators for Blackwell who averaged 30.5 possessions this season.

Clutterbuck picked up votes in three out of the last four rounds to finish one vote ahead of Claremont's Alroy Gilligan and just two ahead of South Fremantle's Joel Palumbo and Perth's Haydn Busher.

There was no clear winner as far as a month out from the end of the season.

In just his second season of league football, building on his four games in 2010, Clutterbuck took on the responsibility of being named in the Royals' leadership this year and emerged the winner from a quality field.

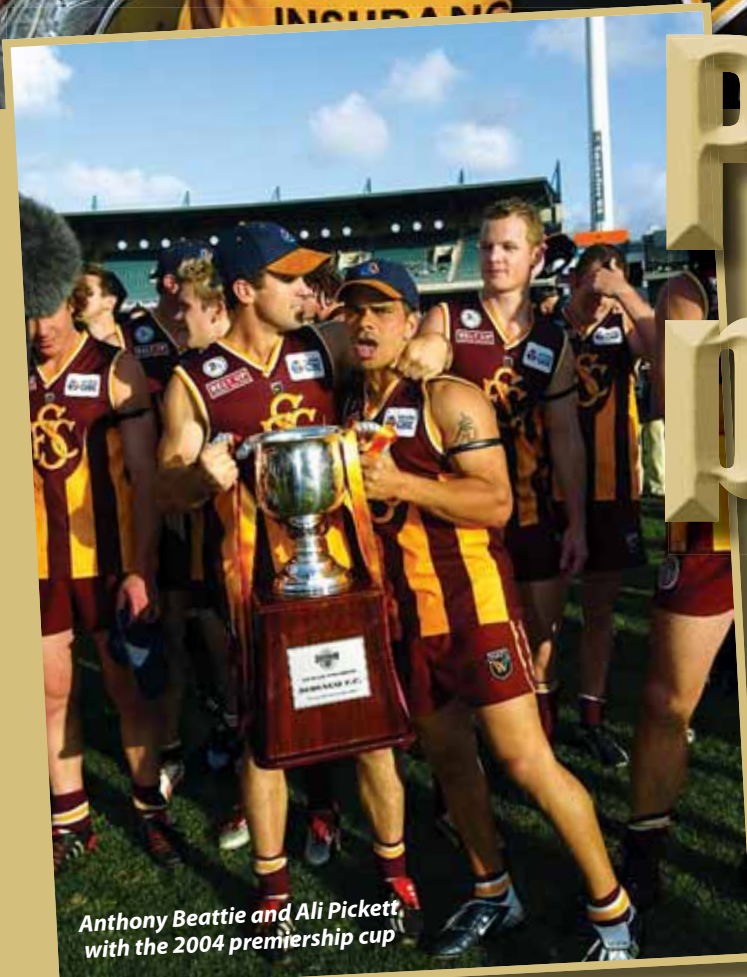

Feelings

PREPARING to line up for his seventh grand final in nine years, dual Sandover medallist Allistair Pickett said it's a totally different feeling for him in 2011.

"The last few times I've been involved in a grand final Subiaco has been the favourite," said the 38-year-old who will take up a fly-in, fly-out job on a mining site the week after the grand final.

"We were confident going into those games and had the belief that if we played at our best nothing was going to stop us."

Pickett played his first grand final in 2003 which resulted in a loss to West Perth.

The diminutive midfielder-come-half forward has provided WAFL fans with plenty of exciting moments as he danced his way out of packs and he did just that as he played his role in helping the Lions win the next four premierships they played in – 2004, 2006, 2007 and 2008.

They were back on that big day in September again in 2009 but fell at the hands of South Fremantle.

This will be the third time in the amazing Pickett grand final stretch that he has faced Claremont.

In the previous two encounters, 2004 and 2007, the modest and likable Pickett was presented with a premierships medallion.

But this season the Lions have surprised many pundits to earn the right to take on the minor premiers. It's not necessarily a thought shared by Pickett who admits it's going to be a tough assignment.

"This year Claremont has been so dominant and it is going to take a special effort to get over the line," he said.

"If we are not on our game we will get blown away. We've played them twice and fallen short twice this season but with a bit of luck and if the ball bounces our way like it did for Swan Districts and Andrew Krakouer last year you never know.

"They have got a potent forward line and a powerful midfield and really they are good all over the ground. They'll come out better for that grand final loss last year and they are going to be a mighty team on the day."

Pickett said while popular belief had the Lions finishing around sixth or seventh on the ladder, internally they have been working to push their season as far as possible.

The Lions' simple philosophy was that a more competitive second half of the season would win them the games they needed to push them into finals action.

Pickett credits first-time finals coach Chris Waterman and his coaching staff with turning the Lions into finals contenders.

"The coaches have tried a few different things like playing guys in different positions throughout the season," he said.

"The best example is the move of Kyal Horsley from half back into the midfield. It has been a massive bonus for us because he works hard both ways.

"Muddy has played the young blokes like Abe Davey and the form of Michael Rix where he was giving the midfielders first use of the ball was instrumental to our form.

"Muddy has been around football enough to try a few things and they've worked."

With a record like his, it is hard to imagine that Pickett wouldn't be a walk up start into the Football Budget's Top 25 of the Past 25.

THE SEASON THAT WAS 2011

ROUND 1

Season 2011 kicked off with reigning premier Swan Districts opening its title defence at home in a losing effort against East Perth.

Graham Polak and Mat Seal kicked four goals each, while Tony Notte kicked four for Swans.

The big talk of the round was Daniel Kerr's return to football and WAFL debut for East Fremantle. In his first match since tearing his hamstring tendon from the bone, Kerr started in the centre and racked up 20 disposals.

Overshadowing his successful return however was his elbow to Claremont's Luke Blackwell which prompted the league to re-examine its tribunal regulations.

Lost in the Kerr saga was Claremont's imposing start to its 2011 campaign, an 87-point win over the Sharks starring Ian Richardson (seven goals) and West Coast's Lewis Broome (five goals) and Blackwell (35 possessions).

Also making their debuts for the Sharks were brothers Rory and Brock O'Brien, the former Peel players who had an immediate impact with Brock kicking five goals on debut.

South Fremantle's Scott Thornton underwent emergency surgery after suffering a perforated bowel.

ROUND 2

South Fremantle started the season with a large injury cloud hanging over its head, having lost Sam Hunt (knee), Theo Adams (collarbone), Chris Bossong (knee) and Nathan Phillips (knee) during the pre-season.

Prized recruit Paul Hasleby had his debut stalled with a pre-season ankle injury and underwent surgery as the Bulldogs opened their season with a win over East Perth. In the heat captain Jaymie Graham started on the bench but had immediate impact in the middle in the first quarter, helping the Bulldogs to a lead that they maintained throughout the game.

West Perth picked up its first win of the season over Subiaco in thrilling fashion, leaving it to the final quarter to pull out the victory. While captain Jason Salecic, Mark Hutchings, Shayne Zanetti and Brent LeCras were important fourth quarter contributors for the Falcons, the first half belonged to Allistair Pickett. The dual Sandover medallist picked up 15 possessions and had a hand in three goals though managed only three disposals after half-time.

Swans Districts was unable to reproduce the success it had against Claremont in last year's grand final, falling to the Tigers thanks to a six-goal-to-one final quarter. Claremont's ability to find 11 different goal kickers stretched Swans who relied on the efforts of key forward Tim Geappen and the lively Jarrhan Jacky to produce most of its goals.

In 35 degree heat with extended benches, East Fremantle produced a blistering fourth quarter to outlast Perth, scoring nine goals to one in the final term. Ruckman Jonathon Griffin played a large role in the Sharks' win as did Leith Teakle with six goals and Brock O'Brien with four. Daniel Kerr started on the

wing and had an eight possession first quarter before being shut down by Brett Hodge and having little effect after quarter time.

Off the field talk continued to rage about the AFL's push for WAFL reserves teams with both Eagles and Dockers captains calling on officials to allow them to field teams to keep pace with their AFL rivals.

ROUND 3

Swans lost their third match to open season 2011. The last time reigning premiers lost their opening three games was in 1997 when Claremont dropped their first five games to finish eighth.

Perth managed its first win under coach Damien McMahon in an upset win over South Fremantle at Fremantle Oval. The Demons outplayed the Bulldogs for most of the match however it took until the final moments for them to finally pull through. Matthew Moody gave a stand out performance kicking four goals, including the match-winner at the 29-minute mark of the last quarter after receiving a free kick and 50m penalty as both teams fought desperately to win the loose ball.

Subiaco also won its first game of the season, grinding out the win against East Fremantle. The lead seesawed throughout the match but the Lions were finally able to put the Sharks away with a five-goal-to-two final quarter. Rory O'Brien continued a strong start to the year despite the loss, leading his side with three goals and 16 disposals.

Despite having all the early play, Peel lost its opening game of the year to Claremont. After looking like having a stellar year with 86 hit outs in just two games, Claremont ruckman Andrew Ruck injured his knee, leaving the Tigers without a dominant man in the middle.

Foxtel Cup action came to Patersons Stadium with East Perth becoming the first WAFL side to take part, facing North Ballarat. With the powerful ruck combination of Zac Clarke and Zac Beeck, releasing former three-time North Ballarat premiership winner Josh Smith into defence, the Royals advanced to the next round with a two-point win thanks to a last minute goal from Mathew Seal.

South Fremantle premiership player Kyle Hams switched to Swan Districts after leaving the Bulldogs to play country football in the pre-season. Hams, the twin brother of South and West Coast utility Ashton Hams, made his debut for the Swans reserves and was clearly pushing for league selection.

ROUND 4

Callum Wilson kicked six goals as South Fremantle bounced back with a hard-fought win over Peel. Losing Scott Delmenico and Anthony Collica during the week the Bulldogs were led by Wilson, who got the better of Peel's Peter Faulks, and retiring Gerard Wilkie in his 86th and final game for the Bulldogs.

Perth continued its upsetting ways, beating Subiaco and matching the number of wins the Demons had for the whole of last season. The Lions were let down by inaccurate kicking, unable to convert opportunities and keep up with the Demons in the final quarter.

In Luke Blackwell's 50th game Claremont overcame a persistent East Perth with 13 different goal kickers. Blackwell was well held by Brendan Lee, with only three kicks to half-time while Lee had 18 disposals by the main break.

East Fremantle fell victim to inaccuracies, falling to West Perth at home despite dominating across the ground during the first half.

Swan Districts opened and closed their Foxtel Cup campaign against Williamstown with an 8.7 to 2.6 loss, failing to kick a single goal until the last quarter. It took a free kick two minutes into the last quarter for Tim Geappen to finally kick Swans' first goal of the match.

During the week the nine WAFL presidents met and voted unanimously to oppose West Coast and Fremantle's proposal for introducing reserves teams into the State league.

ROUND 5

West Perth continued its unbeaten start to the year with a spirited win over arch rivals East Perth in the first derby of the year. One hundred-game players Dan Hunt and Ray Bartholomew celebrated their milestones with strong efforts in the second half, proving the fitness of the Falcons to run out games in style.

Claremont also remained undefeated, setting up a mouth-watering Round 7 clash between the top two, though the Tigers were made to work hard for the win over Subiaco.

Ominously in the reserves full forward Chad Jones gave the strongest indication he was ready for a league recall, after missing the end of last season with a nasty hamstring injury, with an impressive nine goals for Claremont, setting up a league return against West Perth.

Surprisingly the third team on an unbeaten run this week was Perth, stretching its run to three in a row with a win over Peel.

Kyle Hams was involved in a melee during the second quarter during his first game against his old side and twin brother Ashton, though Swan Districts were left with its premiership defence in tatters with its fourth straight loss anchoring it to the bottom of the ladder.

South Fremantle came out winners in the physical match, with Paul Hasleby kicking two goals on debut for the Bulldogs.

ROUND 6

Medibank Stadium co-tenants East Perth and Subiaco battled it out in the WAFL's first Good Friday match which attracted a bumper crowd. Subiaco got its season back on track through the emotion-filled atmosphere of the day.

The Royals fought their way back from a 36-point deficit to force a one-point lead in the last quarter before falling short. The late withdrawals of ruck duo Zac Beeck and Zac Clarke allowed Michael Rix to dominate the stoppages and give his midfielders consistent supply of the ball.

On the Easter/ANZAC day long weekend the port teams went head-to-head at Fremantle Oval, with South the winners in yet another classic derby match. Theo Adams made a return to the league side after a good run in the reserves, playing his first senior match in almost a year after heart problems. Lively small man Joel Palumbo won the Sir Hughie Edwards medal as best player on the ground as South Fremantle's ability to display more precise skills proved the difference between the teams.

After being down by just five points at the major break Peel had a horror second half

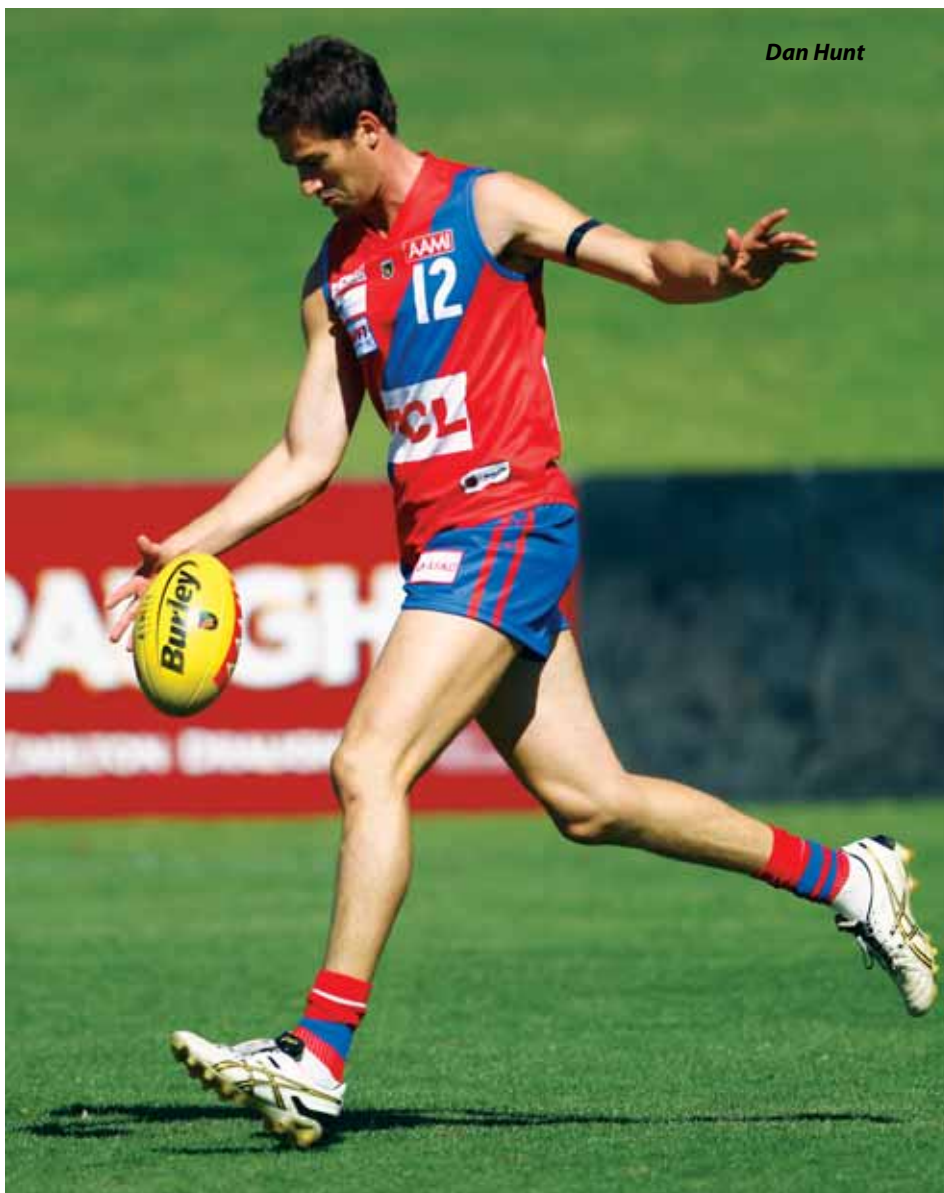
against West Perth, scoring just two behinds to the Falcons 13 goals 11. West Perth suffered a significant loss of its own with a hamstring injury to Dan Hunt, the defender having played a large role in the Falcons success so far in limiting the influence of opposing forwards.

Swan Districts finally got on the board with a win at home on ANZAC day, thumping Perth. Tim Geappen led the way with five goals as the focus of the Swans' attack. Clancee Pearce and captain Josh Roberts had 33 possessions each while Tom Roach had a game-high 38.

Claremont continued its winning start to the year in the Foxtel Cup, brushing aside Clarence by 71 points. The Tigers' premiership campaign also received a boost after ruckman Mitch Andrews was cleared to join them from West Perth as a replacement for the injured Andrew Ruck.

ROUND 7

South Fremantle posted a brave 13-point victory over Subiaco at Fremantle Oval after losing ruckman Jaymie Graham to a serious knee injury in the opening minutes. Michael Rix dominated the hit-outs for Subiaco in Graham's absence, but it was not enough to haul his side over the line.

Graham's season ended against Subiaco leaving the Bulldogs to try several different ruck combinations.

Peel slid to a 0-5 ratio despite putting a scare into the premiers in the first game at the revamped Bendigo Bank Stadium. Peel gave Swans a huge fright in the third quarter when kicking 6.2 to the Black and Whites' 1.4 to lead by 25 points at the last change. The Swans, who looked tired having played Perth five days prior, rallied to clinch the win.

Brock and Rory O'Brien combined for seven goals, starring in East Fremantle's come-from-behind win over East Perth. Both were looking to snap losing streaks, with just one win apiece from the opening six rounds. The win reignited the Sharks finals push, but they lost Jamie McNamara short term to a shoulder injury.

Two undefeated streaks went head to head with West Perth taking on Claremont. It was 28 years since two undefeated teams met this far into the season and it provided a riveting clash between the WAFL's strongest midfield and a stingy West Perth defence.

In their first match up last year both teams came into it unbeaten for the season, with Claremont getting the scalp. This time around, despite a five-goal run late in the game, it was the Falcons emerging winners, handing the Tigers their first loss of the season. The Tigers dominated the opening 15 minutes but their system started to break down under intensive defensive pressure.

The football community was in shock when Swan Districts ruckman Luke Adams was rushed to hospital and not expected to survive a Northbridge assault. He has since made a remarkable recovery.

ROUND 8

West Perth claimed another scalp in its winning start to the year, handing South Fremantle just its second defeat for the season. Andrew Gaff showed good signs in his first game for the Bulldogs and veteran Kris Miller had an impact but ultimately the Falcons ran circles around the limping Bulldogs.

Perth played its 500th game at Lathlain Park/Brownes Stadium in a losing affair against Claremont. The Tigers demolished the Demons led by Luke Blackwell and Chad Jones, the latter returning to his best with eight goals. Perth was well-served by Matthew Moody and Andrew McDougall.

Ashley Hansen proved to be the game-breaker for the Swans against East Perth, overcoming some struggles with accuracy to bag eight goals and remind everyone just how dangerous he can be. The game was tight all the way with both sides tiring in the fourth but Swans made the most of their forward 50 entries to finish the game.

East Fremantle moved within striking distance of the top four with an AFL-boosted win over Peel. The Sharks were enhanced by their AFL contingent, with no less than seven West Coast and Fremantle players in their line-up. Another four in the East Fremantle line-up had previously been on AFL lists and their experience was a telling factor against a youthful Peel side.

ROUND 9

East Fremantle boosted its finals hope with a 25-point win over premiership favourite Claremont at Claremont Oval. Inaccuracy in the final two quarters when they kicked 3.12 to East Fremantle's 6.1 proved costly for the Tigers.

West Perth was pushed all the way by Perth but ultimately continued its unbeaten start to the season. The Demons held a top four position earlier in the year but slid with three straight losses. Anthony Tsalikis was West Perth's major contributor with six goals.

Subiaco beat Swan Districts by 45 points at Steel Blue Oval. Blake Broadhurst finished with five majors, while Des Headland had a significant impact in a successful return to league football from another knee injury.

East Perth put six gloomy weeks behind them to thrash Peel by 60 points led by power forward Josh Smith who hauled in 13 marks and kicked six goals. The error-riddled Thunder mirrored what they had done in many matches by being competitive early in the contest before surrendering after half-time. Peel ruckman Phillip Pohlenz-Saw made a solid debut opposed to the returning Zac Clarke who showed some good signs after missing several matches with a hip injury. A feature of the match was the high marking with Peel's Scott Lycett and East Perth's Kayne Pettifer pulling in spectacular grabs in the second term.

ROUND 10

After a 7-0 start Peel got its first win of the season, defeating Subiaco with Ryan Herring playing a starring role kicking seven goals in the upset of the season so far.

It was the first time Peel had beaten Subiaco at Medibank Stadium and just the third win in 35 meetings.

Claremont rebounded from losing two of its last three games to score a come-from-behind win over South Fremantle. The Tigers trailed for the majority of the first three-and-a-half quarters before rallying to seal the win. Paul Hasleby kicked four for the home side who score just two goals to Claremont's eight in the final term. Mitch Andrews had a massive 60 hit outs, the highest game total of the season.

East Perth thrashed Perth by 69 points. Despite both teams having three wins the result lifted the Royals two places into sixth spot while Perth dropped to second last. The win was built on the back of Zac Clarke's dominant ruckwork where he had 21 hit outs, 26 possessions as well as nine marks and two goals. The Demons let the game slip away in the second half, with Josh Smith scoring all of his six goals after the main break.

East Fremantle continued its winning streak with a tight win over Swan Districts that hammered the Swans finals aspirations even more. Rory O'Brien continued his stand out year with 35 disposals supported well by Lewis Fasolo and Mark McGough.

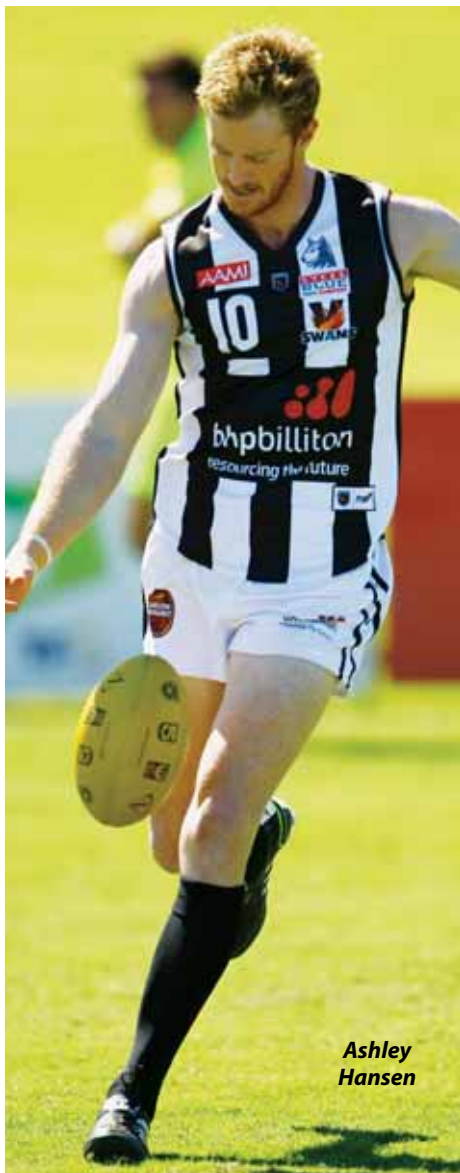
ROUND 11

Peel stretched South Fremantle to the limit but was unable to finish it off, the Bulldogs emerging eight-point winners in a twilight match at Fremantle Oval.

East Fremantle was again a thorn in West Perth's side, delivering the Falcons their first loss of the year and denying them what would have been a record 9-0 start to the season. Brock O'Brien kicked five goals with the Falcons unable to translate their dominance onto the scoreboard. Rory O'Brien was again the leading possession-winner with 33 disposals.

After losing captain Josh Roberts with a broken wrist, Swans felt the injury bug once again with defender Luke Miles rupturing his anterior cruciate ligament in his side's loss to Claremont. Ash Hansen kicked seven goals but the Swans were unable to maintain control of the match.

Perth put together a complete game, producing an outstanding final quarter to get over Subiaco. The withdrawal of Michael Rix allowed Andrew McDougall to run in the middle though the Demons were unable to take advantage of it. Back-up Lions ruckman Scott Douglas continued to grow

in confidence the longer the game went on, he got the better of McDougall after half-time and gave his side first use. Chad Cossom played his last game for Subiaco, retiring after having played 213 games for the Lions and winning four premierships.

East Perth survived a strong finish from Northern Territory Thunder to secure a Foxtel Cup semi-final spot with the win in Darwin. The Royals withstood a late charge from the Thunder, who had been unbeaten in eight North East Australian Football League games, to win the cutthroat match.

ROUND 12

Foundation Day weekend kicked off with Peel's second win of the season. The Thunder kicked eight unanswered goals in 15 minutes of the third quarter to set up the 10-point win over Perth. Both teams were battling to stay in the finals hunt, Peel having not played finals in its 14-year existence while it has been 13 years since the Demons played in September.

Peel's reserves received a lot of attention with the return of Fremantle's Michael Barlow. Nathan Phillips also made a successful return from injury, guiding an injury-hit South Fremantle to a gutsy derby win over East Fremantle.

The Bulldogs were without Toby McGrath, Andrew Gaff, Chris Bossong and Corry Amato from the team that beat Peel the week before, but still produced one of the games of the season. Brock and Rory O'Brien kicked nine of the Sharks 11 goals between them, Brock a lone focal point in attack for much of the contest with seven majors.

The other derby of the round had West Perth outrunning East Perth. The Royals appeared poised to post their third successive win after leading by as many as 32 points at the 10-minute mark of the third quarter, but not for the first time this season their leg speed faltered as the game wore on with the Falcons nailing the final seven goals to clinch the 12-point victory.

Claremont seemingly ended Subiaco's finals hopes with a 46-point demolition, outscoring the Lions 15-goals-to-six after quarter time. Subiaco followed the trend established against Claremont all season by starting hard and forcing a quarter-time lead but inaccuracy and a quickly worn down midfield left the Lions reeling. Claremont also spread their workload across several contributors. Only two players had more than 20 disposals and two fewer than 10.

ROUND 13

Fremantle ball magnet Michael Barlow made a stunning league debut in Peel's upset 21-point win over premiersip contenders West Perth at Bendigo Bank Stadium. Barlow had notched 20 possessions by half-time and finished with 33 for the match. The Thunder secured a 23-point lead at half-time and maintained that work ethic through the second half.

East Perth watched its finals chances disappear at the hands of Subiaco, but the loss was overshadowed by a head injury to Graham Polak. He was knocked unconscious for an extended period, appearing to hit his head on the ground after landing heavily from a marking contest midway through the last quarter. The injury led to him retiring from football. East Perth's lack of height in the ruck hurt them badly with Michael Rix taking charge on the ball against Hamish Shephard.

East Fremantle crept closer to a finals berth with a win over Perth, putting the Sharks three wins clear of the Demons giving them a handy buffer between them and fifth place. The Demons were brave for three quarters on the back of key duo Ross Young and Andrew McDougall though were unable to hold on to a three-point lead at the final change.

Swan Districts showed glimpses of its premiership form in a high scoring win over South Fremantle. After an even opening term Swans took control of the match and looked poised to thrash the Bulldogs when they were nine goals in front midway through the last quarter before South fought back.

Claremont continued to storm its way through the season, advancing to the Foxtel Cup semi-finals with a win over Northern Bullants.

During the week Ben Cousins made a low-key return to the WAFL, acting as a mentor to a group of young East Perth players.

STATE GAME

WA maintained its unbeaten record against Queensland, beating them by six points after a last quarter fightback by the visitors at Bendigo Bank Stadium in Mandurah.

The Maroons had not beaten the Black Swans in four meetings over the past 16 years, with WA thrashing them by 73 points when they last met in Townsville in 2008. The visitors kicked eight goals in the last quarter of the exciting State match to threaten WA's record of seven consecutive wins between the States going back to 1914.

Luke Blackwell was the stand-out player for WA and his 40 disposals in the centre were instrumental in his team establishing a 44-point lead early in the last quarter. Power forward Josh Smith's five-goal performance earned him the Simpson Medal as WA's best player.

ROUND 14

South Fremantle came out of the gates with a seven-goal-to-two first quarter to set up the win over East Perth and celebrate the 250 and 100-game milestones of Kris Miller and Theo Adams.

Miller was the first WAFL player to join the 250 club since Travis Edmonds achieved the feat in Round 10 of the 2005 season. He also has not missed a game due to injury or illness since the 2001 Foundation Day derby.

Perth caused one of the upsets of the season with a stirring six-point win over Claremont, confirming its status as a genuine finals threat. Jarrod Kayler-Thomson starred

in his 100th game for the club with 30 possessions and two important goals.

Over at Medibank Stadium Allistair Pickett turned back the clock with a five goal display in Subiaco's win over East Fremantle.

West Perth bounced back from the shock loss to Peel and without key midfielders Mark Hutchings and Matt Guadagnin outplayed Swan Districts. Ahead by 10 points at quarter time and 24 at half-time, the Falcons set up their 10th win of the season in the third quarter when scoring 5.3 and holding the Black and Whites to 0.4.

At the Royals high-profile recruit Kayne Pettifer left the club due to personal reasons.

ROUND 15

The defending premiers once again showed some life, with a 24-point win over Perth strengthening its finals hopes. Swan Districts controlled the contest, with quality performances by strong-marking forward Tim Geappen, midfielder Brett Robinson and no-nonsense defender Kyle Hams.

Subiaco showed its vulnerability without ruckman Michael Rix, going down to title fancy West Perth. In a scrappy affair at Arena Joondalup played in blustery winds amid heavy showers, the Falcons had too many options against Subiaco.

East Perth snapped a three-game losing streak against Peel, leading at every change and withstanding a last gasp effort from the Thunder.

At Claremont Oval NAIDOC Week kicked off with the Tigers and South Fremantle battling for the Jimmy Melbourne Cup and second place. Beau Wilkes stood out with six goals as the Tigers main target in attack in their three-point win over the Bulldogs. Midfielder Luke Blackwell also starred for Claremont with 42 possessions in a best-on-ground display. Andrew Gaff shone through the middle for South Fremantle, as did Kris Miller, who had 25 touches and kicked a goal that gave the Bulldogs the lead as the final quarter ticked into time-on.

East Perth veteran Craig Glancy announced his retirement, due to recurring hamstring injuries. Glancy was the last remaining player from East Perth's 2002 grand final win over arch rivals West Perth. At Perth the Demons finals chances were dealt a blow with key defender Aaron Zucconi banned for two matches for his hit on Beau Wilkes.

ROUND 16

Peel produced one of the boilovers of the season to surprise East Fremantle with a 25-point win. The Thunder set up the win in the second half when they kicked 10 goals to the Sharks' three, staying with their more fancied opponent all game much to the delight of the 2000 strong crowd at Bendigo Bank Stadium. Bradley Holmes was the hero with six goals for the day.

In Esperance Subiaco pulled off a thrilling win against South Fremantle. Goals to Clancy Wheeler, Blake Broadhurst and Brad Stevenson gave the Lions a lead early in the final term withstanding a late challenge to hang on for the win.

The Bulldogs injury curse continued with Hayden North injured in the warm up and Cory Dell'Olio taken off first with elbow troubles, coming back on and then helped back off after a clash of heads with Reece Blechynden.

The top of the table clash produced another stand out game from West Perth and Claremont with the Falcons ultimately extending their lead at the top of the ladder with a gritty six-point win.

East Perth came to the end of its Fostel Cup campaign, receiving a 71-point thumping from Williamstown in the semi-final.

ROUND 17

East Perth produced its most complete performance of 2011, dismantling Perth by 64 points at Medibank Stadium. Overcoming a shocking first quarter the Royals kicked eight unanswered second term goals to run away with the game.

Peel continued its upswing, ending the finals hopes of Swan Districts at Steel Blue Oval with its fourth win from the last five games. The Thunder dominated through the centre of the ground kicking seven unanswered goals and silencing the home crowd with an incredible 34-point quarter time lead.

Kristin Thornton was the outstanding player on the ground with 32 possessions but he had ample support from a brigade of midfield runners as well as a solid backline which conceded just three goals before Swans managed six goals in the final term.

At Fremantle Oval South Fremantle lost its fourth home game of the season, unable to

Claremont won through to the Fostel Cup grand final with a confident win over the Port Adelaide Magpies.

ROUND 18

West Perth showed vulnerabilities allowing a young Perth side to steamroll it and throwing open the premiership race.

The Demons led by just one-point at the final change but kicked eight last quarter

goals in the 29-point win. It was the second time in five weeks that Perth beat the top team after its six-point win over Claremont in Round 14.

East Fremantle survived a fighting comeback from East Perth to hang on by four points despite leading by as many as 36 points. The Sharks blew their opposition away in the first quarter with seven-goals-to-one though the Royals fought back with eight in the second term. Michael Swan and Garry Moss had 10 goals between them and led the comeback that fell heartbreakingly short.

Claremont also had a 10-goal combination in Beau Wilkes and Ian Richardson as it got up over Peel. In the Thunder's first big test since regaining form they kept pace until the last quarter, light years different from the side that was thrashed by the Tigers in Round 3 but unable to pull together four quarters.

Subiaco began its desperate climb towards the finals with a comprehensive 96-point win over Swan Districts. The Lions increased their lead at every change while the Swans looked lost without a confident target up forward. The loss dropped Swans to the bottom of the table, giving them a glimpse at an unlikely feat of a premiership to wooden spoon turnaround.

ROUND 19

East Fremantle recorded the highest WAFL score this season (175) and consolidated its spot in the top four in stifling Karratha heat, smashing Swan Districts by 102 points. The Sharks' AFL contingent was at its best, led by Chris Masten's 34 disposals and four goals.

A second-half onslaught from Claremont effectively sunk East Perth's season, the Tigers kicking seven consecutive goals in the third quarter to turn for home with a comfortable 52-point win. Beau Wilkes produced another high impact game but was reported for a heavy hit on Craig Wulff putting him in doubt.

Perth's finals drought extended into a 14th season while South Fremantle virtually guaranteed a return to September action with a hard-fought 15-point win at Brownes Stadium. The Bulldogs' midfield was too good with Theo and Reece Adams prominent, Ashton Hams busy and Ryan Cook a prolific ball-winner.

Subiaco kept its finals dreams alive with a windy 44-point win over Peel. Ruckman Michael Rix amassed a remarkable 55 hit-outs to play a critical role in his team's eighth win of the season. The Thunder stayed within three goals before falling in the fourth with the league's leading goal kicker in Blake Broadhurst revelling in the slippery conditions with five goals.

ROUND 20

Coached by former Subiaco mentor Peter German Williamstown claimed the inaugural Foxtel Cup over Claremont at Patersons Stadium. The Seagulls completed a clean sweep over the WA sides, having eliminated Swan Districts and East Perth earlier in the year. The Tigers were down at every change but put up a spirited comeback in the fourth that fell minutes short.

Despite trailing at all the changes Subiaco fought a sluggish start to get up over Perth. The 14-point win was the Lions' sixth from seven outings and moved them into the top four for the first time since Round 3. Perth opened the game hot, kicking six-goals-to-one but only scored another five over the remaining three quarters.

South Fremantle held on to win by 25 points at Arena Joondalup against West Perth in an injury-plagued affair though to the Bulldogs' relief it was the home side beleaguered by the curse. The Falcons were savaged by serious injuries that forced Josh Mellington (elbow), Caleb Shadbolt (hamstring) and Matt Guadagnin (broken leg) out of action before half-time. The home side was flat before the injuries however, unable to push past the energetic Bulldogs.

ROUND 21

Beau Wilkes produced another six-goal haul as Claremont regained top spot with the win over Swan Districts. The 53-point victory at Claremont Oval meant the Tigers displaced West Perth on top for the first time since Round 13. Ash Hansen was a reliable target for the Swans with four goals and teenagers Murray Newman and Will Shea each kicked three providing the Swans with some hope for next year.

A solid 18-point win over Peel improved South Fremantle's chances of staying in the top four with three rounds remaining and both Subiaco and East Fremantle waiting in the wings. Toby McGrath, in his 250th senior match, was a sure avenue out of defence for South Fremantle keeping the Thunder from gaining momentum in the second half. Despite being down by 35 at quarter time the Thunder rallied and kept fighting until the last.

Subiaco relied on an unanswered nine-goal final quarter to defeat co-tenants East Perth and sure up its spot in the top four. The Royals led early but were unable to counteract the Lions' midfield and the increasing influence of Michael Rix. Veteran Subiaco defender Aidan Parker made his 150th consecutive league appearance.

East Fremantle stayed in the finals hunt with a win over West Perth in Geraldton led by local boy Leith Teakle. Teakle kicked four goals in the forward pocket combining well with Richard Hadley in the last quarter. The win kept the Sharks in touch with Subiaco and South Fremantle ahead of a tough road home facing those two sides and the league leading Claremont.

ROUND 22

Swan Districts used an injection of youth to lift from the bottom of the ladder and damage South Fremantle's finals chances with a solid win at Steel Blue Oval.

Ash Hansen was once again complemented well by youngsters as the Swans exposed the Bulldogs' lack of pace.

East Fremantle built confidence ahead of the looming fight for a finals berth with a 45-point win over Claremont. The Tigers, missing Beau Wilkes through suspension, were let down by a quiet midfield. Rory O'Brien was the Sharks' best with 36 possessions and two goals and veteran Richard Hadley worked hard across half-forward. The victory meant East Fremantle leapfrogged its next two opponents, Subiaco and South Fremantle, into third place on the ladder.

Perth continued its unpredictable ways, beating Peel at Bendigo Bank Stadium in blustery conditions. Promising teenager Jaeger O'Meara was outstanding in his debut for the Demons, impressing AFL talents scouts at the ground to watch the 17-year-old Dongara recruit in his first senior match finishing with four goals. The Thunder were let down by wayward kicking and were made to pay for it in the second half.

West Perth slipped to a fourth consecutive loss with a 27-point defeat at the hands of East Perth. The Falcons lost four consecutive

games for the first time in more than seven years, the last time being from Rounds 5-9 in 2004. Their place in the top two was secured however with South Fremantle's loss to Swan Districts. Michael Swan and Josh Smith kicked four goals each as the Royals hit the lead early on and never looked back.

ROUND 23

Claremont handily dispatched Peel but watched Ryan Brabazon suffer another hamstring injury, putting his finals campaign in jeopardy. The Tigers dominated the game from the outset with Beau Wilkes and Chad Jones kicking five goals each, Jones' biggest haul since Round 11. Luke Blackwell amassed more than 40 touches for the third time this season, reaching a career-high 45 for the day, including a massive 30 kicks.

Subiaco will give Chris Waterman his first finals appearance in six years as a WAFL coach after accounting for East Fremantle. The win was the 24th time in the past 25 matches over a decade that the Lions have beaten the Sharks.

West Perth bounced back in its final match of the regular season with a 38-point win over Swans Districts. The Falcons defence was back to its best, with 150-gamer Dustin Burns playing well while Dion Fleay and Dan Hunt kept Swans big men Ash Hansen and Tim Geappen in check. The win guarantees a second semi-final match-up with Claremont.

Perth overcame the late withdrawals of key attackers Jarrod Kayler-Thompson and Matthew Moody to win a tight and entertaining contest with East Perth. Their eighth win of the year meant the Demons avoided the wooden spoon they picked up last season.

ROUND 24

The competition for the last finals spot came down to a physical derby between South and East Fremantle. In rainy conditions Bulldogs Kris Miller and Toby Bairstow led the home side to a comfortable win, ending the Sharks season.

The Bulldogs got the better of most of the match ups across the ground though Damian Hayward and Rob Young in the centre provided interesting competition.

Minor premiers Claremont head into the finals somewhat shaken after just getting past an undermanned East Perth. Missing captain Michael Swan, forward Garry Moss and leading goal kicker Josh Smith among others the Royals still managed to give the Tigers a scare.

Perth rallied to pick up its ninth win of the year, with victory over Swan Districts, after trailing most of the game. Swans kicked six of the first seven goals but tired as the game went on, allowing the Demons back into the game. The loss meant that last year's premiers finished with just six wins for the year and ended the season in eighth spot.

Allistair Pickett played his final regular season game in front of his old home crowd as Subiaco thumped Peel at Bendigo Bank Stadium. In a scrappy contest the Lions pulled away in the second half holding the Thunder to just two goals in the last three quarters.

SEMI-FINALS

Claremont made it through to its second consecutive WAFL grand final after belting West Perth by 85 points in the second semi-final at Claremont Oval.

Chad Jones, who missed last year's grand final loss because of an horrific hamstring injury, bagged six goals in the victory that was orchestrated by the versatile Trinity Handley, ruckman Mitch Andrews and ball magnet Luke Blackwell.

Luke Tedesco, Frank Stockley and Steven Browne were the major contributors for the Falcons.

That left the Falcons to book a preliminary final battle with Subiaco who beat South Fremantle by 85 points in the first semi-final at Medibank Stadium.

Kyal Horsley, who has had a magnificent year up forward for the Lions, was best on ground in a performance that produced three goals. Rhett Kerr kicked four goals and the likes of Danny Hughes and Darren Rumble showed an intensity and resolved to keep their premiership dreams alive.

PRELIMINARY FINAL

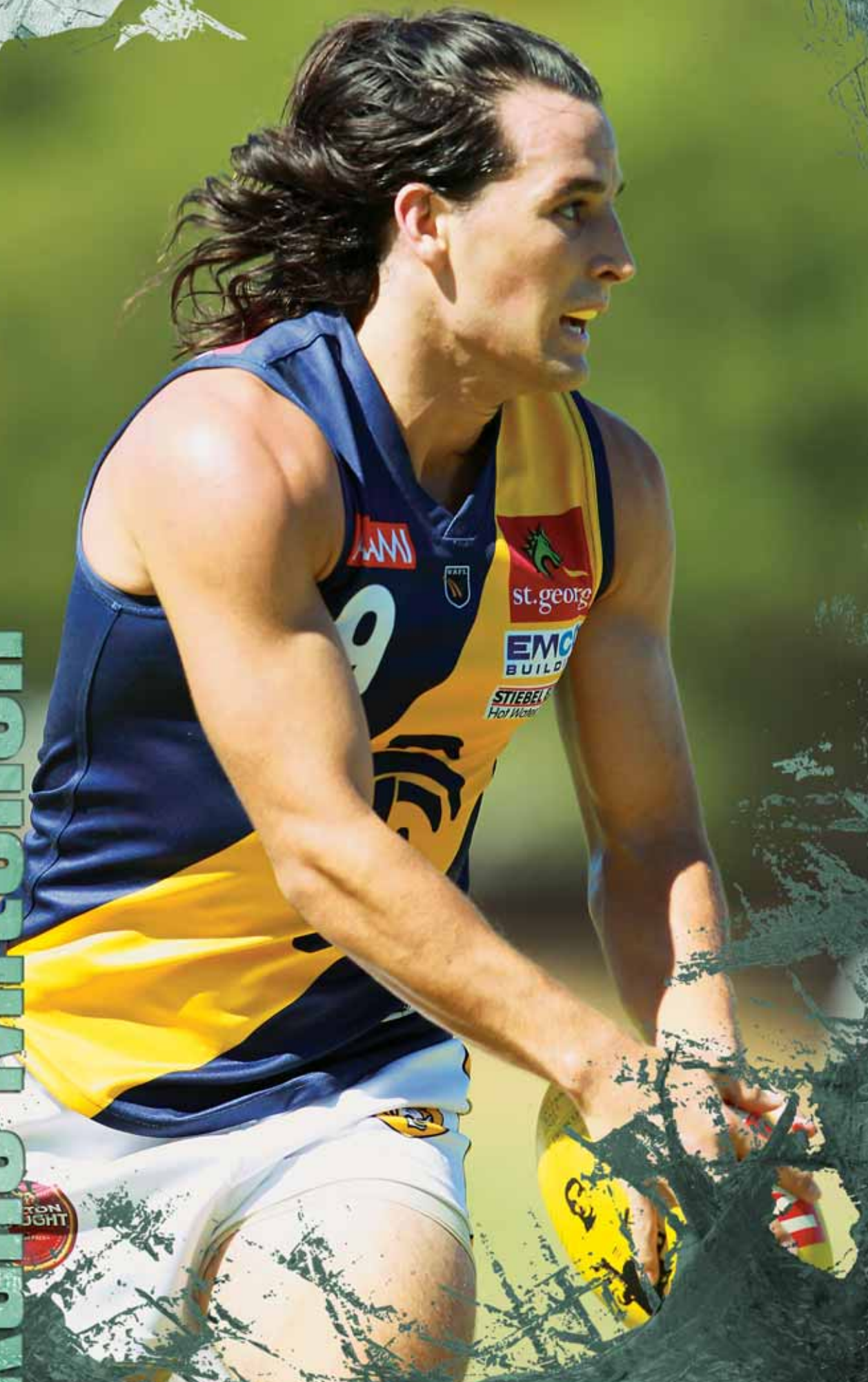

WAFL Collectables

In the last WAFL collectables for 2011, Sean Cowan looks at grand final memorabilia.

While this is the final edition of the Football Budget for the year, you can continue to contact Sean with any questions about the WAFL memorabilia you have tucked away at home during the off-season.

Grand finals are always great sources for memorabilia. From a player's jumper to the Football Budget, or even the Football Register you used to buy on your way out of the gate, people will always desire something that reminds them of the day their team won the flag.

Undoubtedly, the biggest collectable from grand final day is the Football Budget. Most often, the losing team's supporters will toss them in the bin on the way home. Supporters of the winning team will often keep them forever.

And, though there are several hardcore collectors of all Football Budgets, there are many more who collect only grand final editions. There are more still who only want the grand final Budgets from those matches their team won.

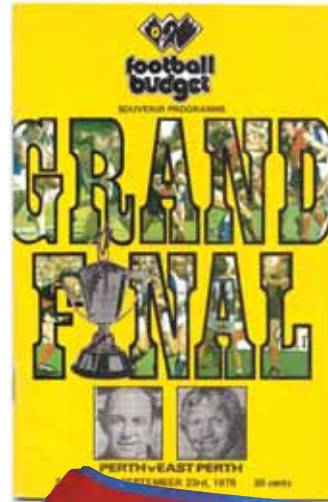
All that makes the prices paid extremely variable. In recent years, the prices paid for 1980s grand final Budgets have tumbled and the 1970s Budgets are now following suit. But if you have a 1950s (or earlier) grand final Budget in your collection, and it's still in good nick, then you can expect a nice price if you ever decide to sell.

The first grand final Budget was actually not called the Budget, but rather "WA Footballer" and was issued in 1921 for the match between East Fremantle and East Perth. It proved to be the third of East Perth's five premierships in succession.

I'd expect one of those would have to fetch well over \$200. Again, though, it's difficult to make an estimate on something that has perhaps never sold before.

As I mentioned earlier, grand final Budgets aren't the only memorabilia issued on grand final day. Back in the 1960s, the newspapers would issue photographs of the two teams in the paper and you could order a quality souvenir print direct from the publisher during the following week.

Pat, from Shelley, kept a few Sunday Times team photographs from the 1960s and they are now very collectable. Also collectable were the premiership posters issued by the papers to feature on newsstands.



This Weekend News Cardinals poster from 1975 was kept by Bill of Gwelup and is probably worth about \$50.

Pat kept this rosette featuring Barry Cable, which was sold at one of Perth's winning grand finals in the late 1960s.

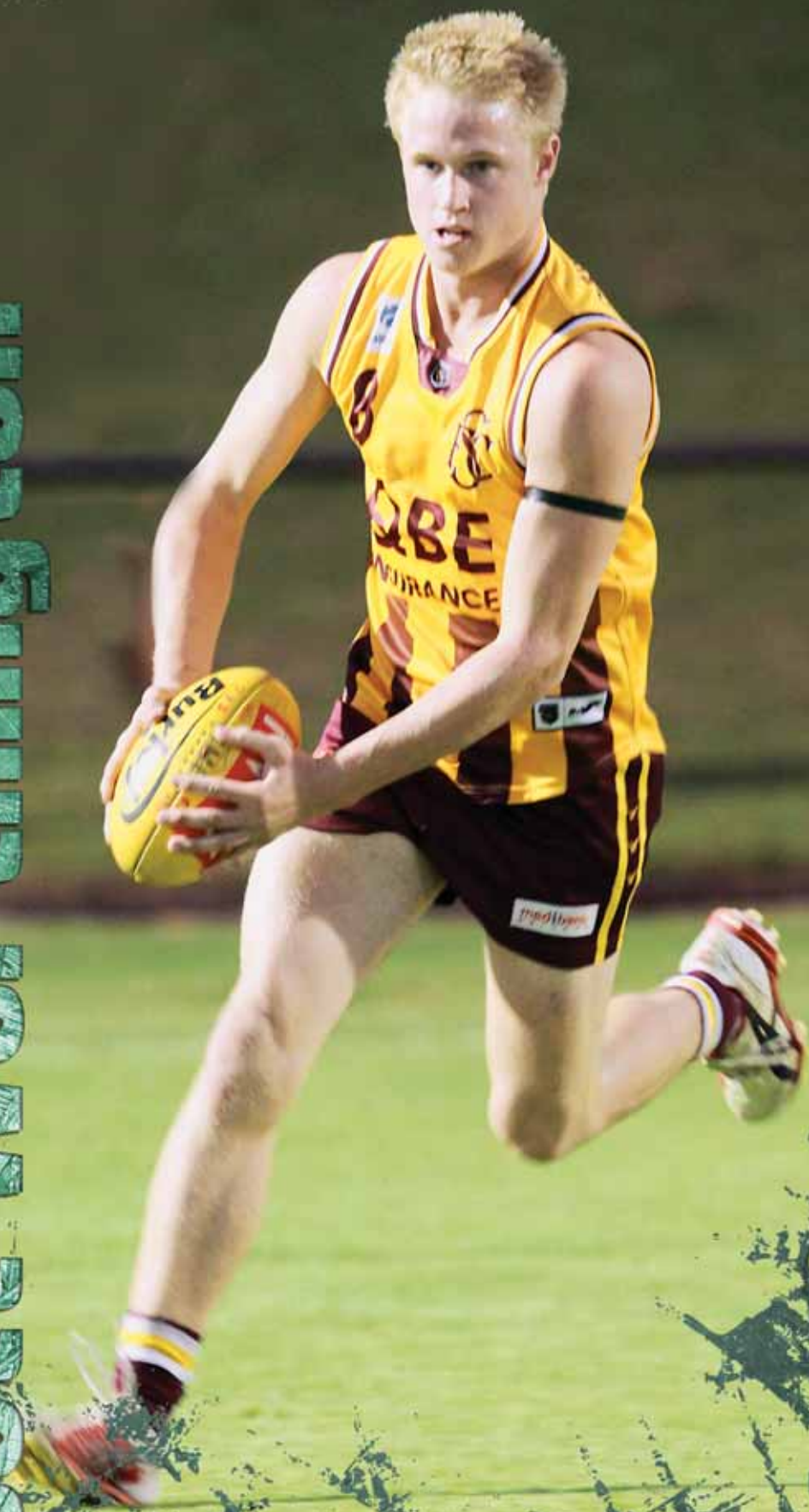
And, of course, there were the little pennants, which were waved by schoolchildren. Len, of Mandurah, kept his 1973 Cardinals pennant, though West Perth weren't able to take home the pennant that mattered on that day. It's probably not worth a great deal because most Cardies fans would be more interested in pennants from 1969, 1971 or 1975.

Finally, I'd like to thank everyone who read the column this year and, especially, everyone who wrote in with details of their cherished items. It's those emails which help to make the column interesting and keep the WAFL's history alive.

Physical battle of the top colts

A PHYSICAL and bruising contest the last time these teams met resounds loudly in Claremont coach Wayne Blackwell's psyche.

Minor premiers South Fremantle punished the Tigers in the second half of their second semi-final two weeks ago to go straight into the grand final, leaving the Tigers to fight a do-or-die battle in last week's preliminary final.

That was a battle the Tigers won against Subiaco and now they get a chance to claim a maiden 2011 victory over Arthur Maskos' highly-fancied Bulldogs.

"Our second semi-final against South Fremantle was pretty physical and a very defensive game," said Tigers coach Wayne Blackwell.

"The boys were pretty sore and leading up to the Subiaco game we had to limit our training to help with player management so they could get their bodies right and fresh enough to compete in another tough game of footy."

The Bulldogs finished the home-and-away season one game clear of the Tigers and they are a talented young team that Blackwell is not reluctant to praise.

"South are a very good side, I'm really impressed with them," he said.

"In the second semi I gave us a real chance with our best side but while our first half was good and ticked all the boxes it was a matter of sustaining it and we didn't do that in the second half.

"We kicked the first goal of the last quarter and we were 10 points adrift with 20 minutes to play when they blew us out of the water."

Causing Blackwell the most headaches this week is finding the right match-ups to give his team the best chance of holding aloft the premiership cup.

"Matching up with them is hard because their midfielders are so tall that they can play forward as well," he said.

"They've got some massive boys at centre half forward and full forward in Shane Kersten and Mason Shaw but their midfielders like Brendon AhChee and Haiden Schloithe can go forward and are good marking players as well.

"But it's a two horse race and you can only hope it goes your way on the day. We can match them this week we just need to sustain that effort over four quarters instead of just a couple."

The talent at Blackwell's disposal also has talent scouts salivating.

Tom Mitchell has signed a deal to join the Sydney Swans next year under the father-son rule. He is the son of former Sydney rover Barry Mitchell who has just parted company with Fremantle after three years as an assistant coach.

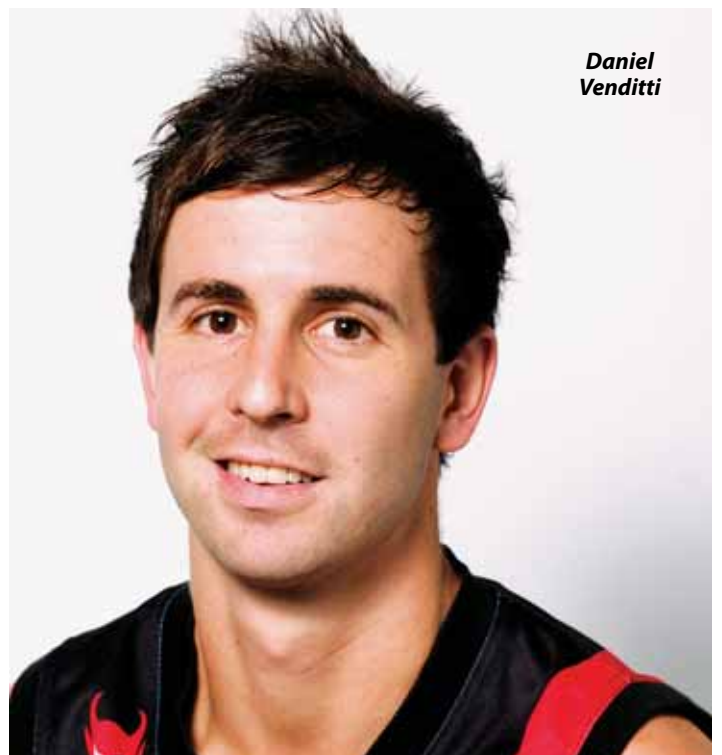

Men of influence:

WHEN it comes to men of influence, Claremont is spoiled for choice.

The Tigers have the Sandover medallist, an enviable number of versatile players who can play forward or back and a depth of talent that has enabled them to make the WAFL grand final decider after also playing off in the Foxtel Gup grand final.

Luke Blackwell, the hottest of favourites who claimed the Sandover Medal on Monday night, is the league's leading possession-getter who is spoilt for choice when it comes to leading options in the Tigers forward line.

If it's not Chad Jones or Beau Wilkes, it's Ian Richardson, Trinity Handley, David Crawford, Alroy Gilligan or Andrew Foster causing havoc for opposition defenders.

Then there's the defenders who can also be Handley or Crawford along with Tom Lee, Brandon Franz, Lewis Stevenson, Brett Jones and Andrew Browne.

Early Sandover Medal leader Kane Mitchell runs riot through the centre with Blackwell,

captain Clancy Rudeforth, Ryan Brabazon, Byron Schammer and Tom Swift all feeding off the work of the tap work of form recruit Mitch Andrews.

First half of the year:

Won 8, lost 2

Five wins to open the season had many pundits believing that Claremont would play in its second grand final in as many years – and they were right!

Their only losses in the opening half of the season came against West Perth (Round 7) and East Fremantle (Round 9).

Second half of the year:

Won 7, lost 3

A shock loss to Perth by six points in Round 14 also resulted in Claremont's lowest score of the season 8.12 (60).

The Tigers also scored their highest score of the season in the latter stages of the season, kicking 25.11 (161) in their Round 23 win over Peel. Potent forwards Chad Jones and Beau Wilkes each kicked five goals in that game, while first year player Jack Bradshaw kicked three.

Young guns:

Playing in two competitions in 2011, the WAFL and the Foxtel Cup, meant coaching staff needed to manage players even more scientifically than before.

It also gave more players a chance to get a run in the league side to allow members of the senior squad to rest when needed and make sure they were fit and firing come September.

Making the most of those opportunities were Lee who built on his four games from last year, as well as 2011 debutants Gilligan and Bradshaw

Lee has already been in the AFL system, drafted by Adelaide at No.60 in the 2008 draft. He was delisted at the end of the 2009 season, but on current form has again got recruiting staff talking whether or not a second chance is just around the corner for the 20-year-old.

Gilligan burst into the Tigers league side after returning from Richmond and played 19 league, one reserves and two Foxtel Cup games. His form resulted in being named the runner-up in the Football Budget's Rising Star award.

Bradshaw, the son of West Australian Football Commission chief executive Wayne, kicked three goals on debut in Round 19 and has not been out of the league side since.

The coach: A measured and level-headed Simon McPhee has played down the motivation that losing last year's grand final has given his team the impetus this year. Young guns:

The Lions headed into the preliminary final against West Perth without leading goal kicker Blake Broadhurst who was still suffering signs of a concussion sustained in the first semi-final.

Broadhurst's exit made way for Scarborough boy George Hampson who was playing just his third league game. And he wasn't fazed, kicking three goals from his 15 disposals.

Other youngsters who have stepped up and handled the big league this year include Justin Joyce, Rhys Waters and Ryan Wade.

Joyce has played 13 colts games this year and also squeezed in six league games and had 23 possessions on debut in Round 13 against East Perth.

Waters is another who has shuffled between colts and league level this year, while Wade has played just the one league game after being given an opportunity in Round 24. He had 14 disposals in that game including two goals as the Lions needed victory over Peel to ensure a berth in this year's finals.

The coach: Chris Waterman – second year coach of the Lions and first-time finals coach in the WAFL finals. Waterman took on a tough gig as the Lions were coming off a losing grand final in 2009 and several big guns retiring.

But his bleeding of young players and responsibility given to and handled well by the likes of Kyal Horsley and Blake Broadhurst has produced a grand final berth perhaps ahead of internal and external expectations.

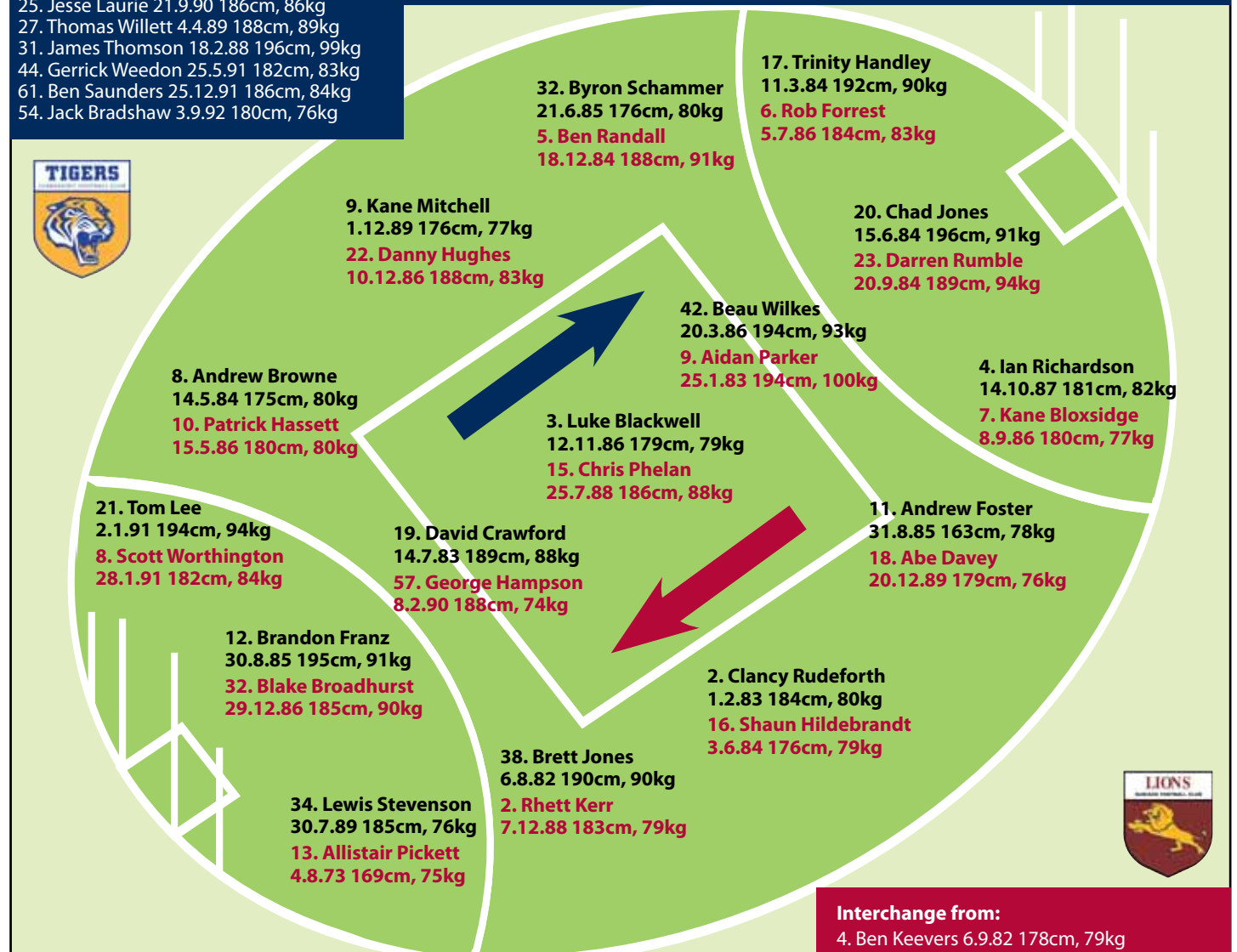

Two forces to be reckoned with

SUBIACO and Claremont have separately been a part of the last eight grand finals and this Sunday will face off in the decider for the third time in that period.

In their most recent grand final clashes, it has been the Lions who have prevailed, winning the premiership in 2004 and 2007 against the Tigers.

Claremont has remained consistent throughout the majority of the season, while Subiaco has been playing like its finals time for the last two months.

The Lions amazing recent run was influenced heavily by the dominance of Michael Rix, but losing him to a knee injury in the preliminary final has meant young ruckman Clancy Wheeler has had to shoulder the burden of getting the ball into the hands of a midfield brigade that includes Sandover Medal runner-up Kyal Horsley and Rhett Kerr.

Black, who turns 19 this coming December 25, played 16 senior games this year, from Round 2 through to Round 22.

While breaking into the finals line-up for the Falcons proved out of reach, he and the likes of Shayne Zanetti, Frank Stockley, Joe Morrow, Jordan Lockyer, Jay Tindall, Kody Manning and Shaun Bewick have shown enough vigour and promise throughout the year to indicate there will

be continued depth in the Falcons senior squad in 2012.

Last year: Won 11, lost 9 – finished 5th

This year: Won 14, lost 6 – finished 2nd

The coach: It will be a tough end-of-season review for third-year coach Bill Monaghan. Pin-pointing what happened in the second half of the season that led to them losing both of their finals matches and missing a golden opportunity to play in their first grand final since 2003 will not be easy.

Cook garnering respect

Men of influence: PROLIFIC midfielder Ryan Cook was one of the recruits of the season.

The 23-year-old headed to South Fremantle on the back of four years with Collingwood in an AFL career that yielded 14 games. His form this year, in which he amassed 501 disposals through the home-and-away season and in the first semi-final, might just have put him back on the radar of AFL clubs looking for a ready-made mature-age player to top up their list.

A State game berth for WA against Queensland highlighted the respect Cook garnered in the WAFL, with the Bulldogs describing him as a professional and committed athlete.

This season also yielded the 250th WAFL game for veteran ball magnet Kris Miller, who now has 259 games to his credit. His 106 games for the Bulldogs have come after 153 with East Fremantle.

Miller and Toby Bairstow, who is starting to shoulder a lot more responsibility with a lot more confidence in the Bulldogs midfield, were two of the

main drivers behind their team's last ditch effort to make the finals.

They were instrumental in getting the Bulldogs over the line against East Fremantle in the final round, but couldn't go any further after falling at the hands of grand finalists Subiaco in the first semi-final.

First half of the year: Won 7, lost 3

A first-up win over East Perth was followed by a thrilling one-point upset loss to Perth.

Four consecutive wins followed but in the last of that run the Bulldogs lost leader and ruckman Jaymie Graham in their Round 7 win over Subiaco. Graham badly dislocated his left kneecap, tearing multiple ligaments in the process and has since announced his retirement after 105 games.

Losses to finals-bound Claremont and West Perth followed before they regrouped to get the better of Peel and East Fremantle.

Second half of the year: Won 5, lost 5

Consistency remained a problem for the Bulldogs, when they were on a run they were a force to be reckoned with, but when they were off the boil the losses resulted.

Three losses followed by three wins were had on their road to the finals – and their first semi-final appearance was only guaranteed after they beat East Fremantle in the last round of the home-and-away season.

A loss to Subiaco in that first semi put paid to a premiership assault.

Paul Hasleby joined Graham in retirement.

Young guns: Kicking 52 goals in the home-and-away season playing as a small forward made Cory Dell'Olio one of the most dangerous players in the competition this season.

Now touted as a hot draft prospect, the 21-year-old has been invited to a WA draft screening. A stellar 2009 season was followed by a slower 2010 but Dell'Olio bounced back with a vengeance this year and became one of his team's more reliable go-to men.

Also having their shining moments in season 2011 were youngsters Joel Palumbo, who polled well in the Football Budget's Rising Star award, ruckman Damian Hayward and key defender Brendon Gulley.

Last year: Won 8, lost 12 – finished 7th

This year: Won 12, lost 8 – finished 4th

The coach: Seasoned performer John Dimmer got his team back into premiership contention following a disappointing 2010. The master four-time WAFL premiership coach again created an environment where talented youngsters could thrive in a team that also contained some of the WAFL's most respected veterans in Miller and Toby McGrath.

Men of influence: EAST Fremantle landed two of the recruits of the season when they snared Rory and Brock O'Brien from Peel for season 2011.

Rory was a prolific ball-winner and both he and Brock proved just how easily they could turn a game off their own boot.

The pair, along with Richard Hadley who returned to WA after stints with Brisbane and Carlton in the AFL, and dependable teammates Leith Teakle and Jamie McNamara put the Sharks in finals contention on the back of last year's top four berth from about Round 10, but fell just one game short.

Jonathon Griffin, Rob Young and Selby Lee-Steere were workhorses in the ruck, while West Coast listed player Koby Stevens averaged 22 possessions in his 19 games with the Sharks. Eagles rookie Tim Houlihan was also a reliable ball winner.

Young was one of those players the coaching staff could throw forward, back or in the ruck depending on match-ups. He played every game this year and seemed to mature into a hard-working player to be relied on in tough situations.

First half of the year: Won 6, lost 4

Young can never be discounted

Men of influence: YOU can never discount a good leader and one of those men is 2009 Sandover medallist Ross Young.

Working with a team that was trying to avoid winning a second wooden spoon, Young was one of three players who pulled on a Demons guernsey for every game this year and it's no surprise that he was also their leading possession-getter with 521 disposals. He also had the third highest tally when it came to marks for the Demons, with 114 for the season.

Michael Florio, Steven Armstrong, Drew Robinson and Jarrod Kayler-Thomson also proved to be ball magnets in a much-improved season for the boys from Lathlain.

Running rampant through the midfield where he fed off the ruck work of another two influential players, Andrew McDougall and Rob DeJongh, Young also benefitted from a hard-running backline.

Defenders such as Aaron Zucconi and Chris Billings rebounded with efficiency from a Demons backline that conceded 188 points less than last year and scored 201 points more.

First half of the year: Won 4, lost 6

Three consecutive wins in Rounds 3, 4 and 5 over South Fremantle, Subiaco and Peel gave Perth more wins than they had for the whole of last season.

The Demons were perched in the top four and making the most of season 2011 recruits such as Jarrod Kayler-Thomson (returning to the club from Hawthorn), Damon White (back in WA from the SANFL) and Aaron Zucconi who was back at the club after a year in the amateurs.

Unfortunately for the Demons White's season was over after just two games (at the end of Round 6) but they were still on track to record a turnaround season.

Second half of the year: Won 5, lost 5

Rounding out a solid season with three straight wins, over Peel, East Perth and Swan Districts, Perth garnered momentum as they plan for 2012.

Their second half of the season also included upset victories over finalists Claremont and West Perth in Rounds 14 and 18 respectively. The Demons strangled the Tigers in that game, holding them to their lowest score of the season, just 60 points.

Towards the end of the season Justin Bollenhagen was moved from Perth to Swan Districts, with Fremantle requesting the transfer of

their squad member, citing a lack of opportunities at the Demons.

Young guns: Hayden Busher, Jaeger O'Meara and Michael Florio were amongst the young guns who had the Perth faithful cheering with great expectation this season.

The hardest part of watching youngsters such as these three blossom in a Demons jumper is knowing that there is every likelihood they may not wear the jumper for many years in the future as they ply their trade on an AFL list.

O'Meara, who was named in the All Australian team at this year's Under 18 National Championships, and Busher have certainly been spoken about in football circles as being amongst the next crop of WA draftees.

At just 17 O'Meara has attracted plenty of talent scout attention and added to that interest with four goals in his league debut in Round 22. He is too young for the national draft, but can be recruited this year through generous draft concessions offered to new club Greater Western Sydney.

Busher, who has been coached by Damien McMahon at colts and league level for the past five seasons, is renowned for playing bullocking roles in attack. He has been overlooked in recent AFL drafts but this may just be his time.

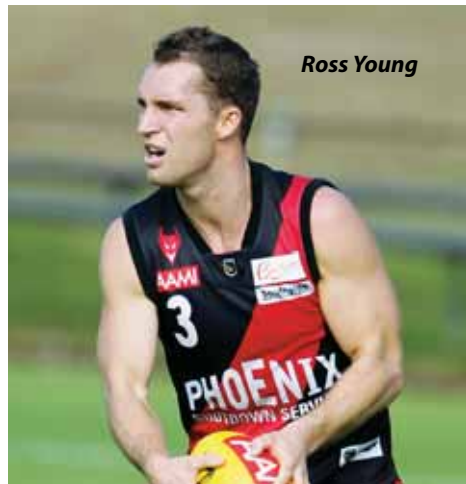
Last year: Won 2, lost 18 – finished 9th

Swans spine on song

Men of influence: ONLY four Swans played every game this season and they all had an influence down the spine of the ground.

Tim Geappen and Jarrhan Jacky up forward, Tom Roach in the centre and Tallan Ames in defence all worked tirelessly to prevent Swans from sliding from premiership glory one year to wooden spoon agony the next.

Ames and Roach were rewarded for strong early season form with starting 18 positions in the WA State side which played Queensland in June, while fellow Black Ducks Ashley Hansen and Graham Jetta were also amongst the Black Swans who started on the ground in that State game victory.

Geappen led the Swans in both marks (113) and goals (51) this season, while Jacky was a livewire who kept opposition defences on their toes.

First half of the year: Won 3, lost 7

Another youngster who impressed for Swans this year was Dayle Garlett.

Garlett, a cousin of Carlton's Jeff Garlett, was another WA player who shone at that 18s National carnival. Garlett is one of those players who is too young for this year's draft but he falls into the bracket of 17-year-olds who are able to be traded by GWS at the end of this season.

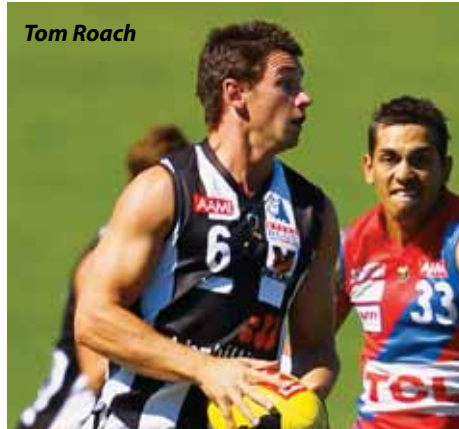
The Giants have access to four special 'mini-draft' selections which they are able to on-trade to other clubs in return for established players or picks in this year's draft.

Recruiting boom

Men of influence: BOOM recruiting for season 2011 should give Peel Thunder faithful plenty of hope heading into season 2012.

With a multi-million dollar revamped facility at Bendigo Bank Stadium and the strong form of several recruits this season, Peel's future has glimmers of hope.

It's been a long, hard road for the boys in Mandurah but if they can hang on to form recruits Kristin Thornton, Ashley Thornton, Bryce Thornton, Rhys Healey and Ryan Herring, more improvement should be on the cards.

Kristin Thornton was one of Peel's most influential players on his comeback from career disappointment and injury. He was delisted by the Sydney Swans at the end of 2008 after suffering an ACL injury, the same injury which destroyed brother Ash's career at West Coast. He was handed a lifeline after the Swans decided to pick him up in the rookie draft of 2008 but they delisted him again at the end of season 2010.

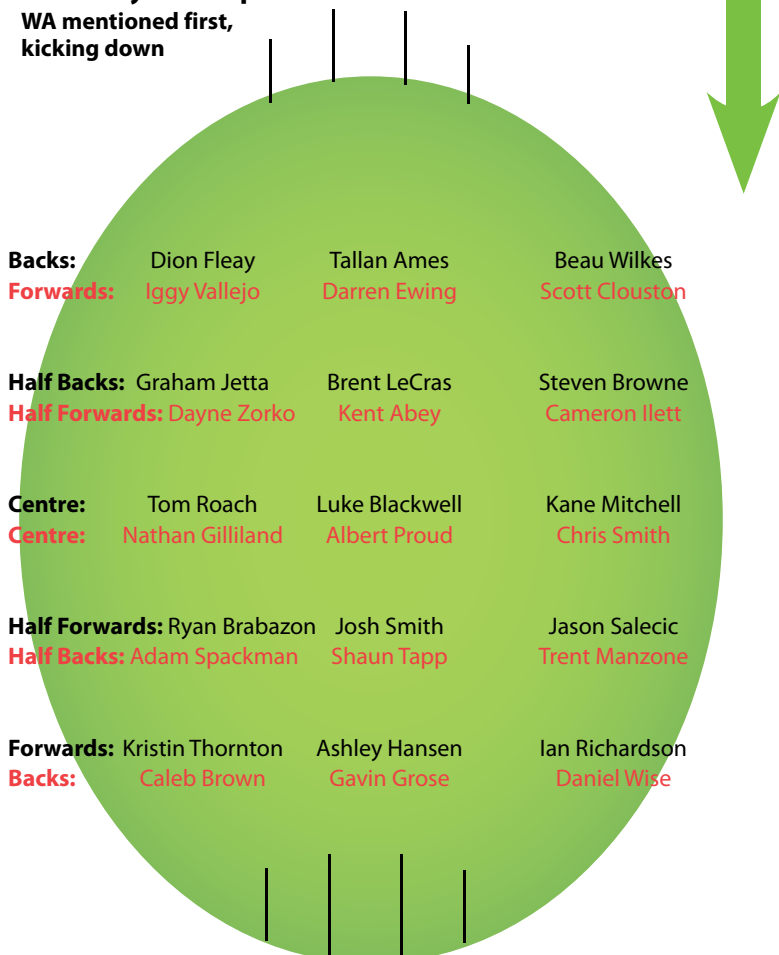

Big season for WAFL attendances

THE West Australian Football League recorded its third highest attendance figure for a season since 1994.

A total of 199,002 attendees were recorded for the 2011 AAMI WAFL Premiership Season, which was down just 1.1 percent on last year's 201,225 (or 25 people per game).

Another 50,267 were required at this year's finals series to exceed last season's cumulative attendance of 249,269, which included 11,855 at the semi-finals, 11,551 at the preliminary final and 24,638 at the grand final.

Sinclair congratulated his WAFL coaching, fitness and training staff on their year, saying they had done a great job.

"I thank all in umpiring for their efforts and look forward to consistent umpiring throughout the grand final," Sinclair said.

WAFC Umpiring General Manager Steve Hargrave said the performance of Sinclair and the coaching team had been outstanding particularly given that five promising umpires with league experience retired before the season started.

"We are fortunate to have passionate individuals who dedicate their time towards the on-going healthy growth of umpiring at the elite end," Hargrave said.

"We have also grown the Michael Ball Talent Academy which will prepare us for any future retirements.

"Adjudicating our great game is difficult and the professional approach taken by the entire WAFL Umpire Team ensures that our performance on the field meets the standard set by the players.

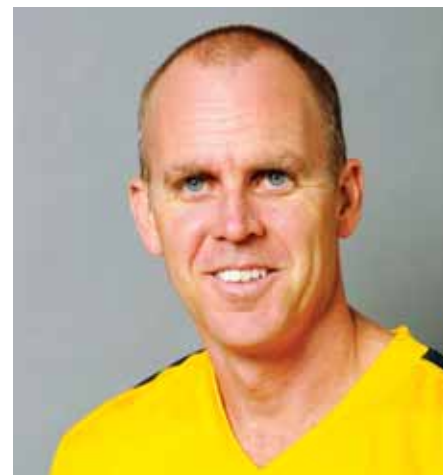

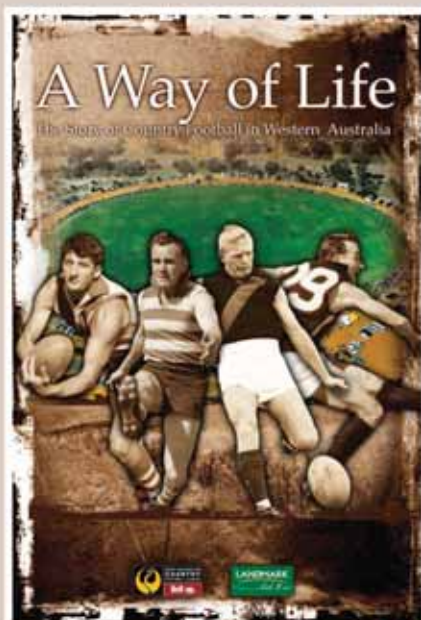

Over the last month we have seen some outstanding football played throughout the finals, along with some terrific grand finals and tight and tough tussles as clubs strive to create a piece of history. The season will culminate with the South West Football League grand final next Sunday, October 2.

The 2011 Landmark Championships featured 21 teams testing themselves against the other best players in country football.

One of the most exciting things to happen at the Championships over the past few years was the win of the Kimberley Spirit in the Colts Division, upsetting the South

West Football League with a one-point victory and exposing some talented young players along the way.

I expect some talented West Australian country players to be picked

up by AFL clubs in this year's National Draft. It's fantastic to see our country clubs continue to produce elite footballers as they work their way through the talent pathway to be part of the 16s and 18s State Academies, WAFL colts and senior WAFL football and then possibly be selected in the AFL draft.

Some of the challenges facing country football heading into 2012 will be a numbers game in our senior football competitions and as such the WACFL Executive will conduct a League Boundary Review. A number of meetings in late October will be held to discuss these issues with our League and Club Presidents along with the current state of football and where football could go in the next five or 10 years.

Having strong and viable competitions will be critical to any decisions to be made. We are also looking closely at the player remuneration research undertaken in 2010 and will hopefully be able to provide leagues and clubs with a guide on how to best manage the travelling and paid player issues.

In closing, it is great to see our game continue to grow regionally. The large number of young players registered with Auskick centres around the State gives us great hope for the future of country football. Remember there is no excuse ... Belt up!

University claim A Grade title

UNIVERSITY is the 2011 A Grade premier after scoring a 36-point win over Mt Lawley at Medibank Stadium last week.

Rarely challenged for the majority of the game, University hit the front at the 23-minute mark of the first quarter and never looked back, running out 10.17 (76) to 5.10 (40) winners in a physical contest.

Both sides fell prey to the blustery weather though University missed the mark without a breeze on many occasions.

University was plagued by inaccuracy early, kicking 2.11 before small forward David Crudeli found the goals and gave them a handy 22-point buffer.

Minor premiers Mt Lawley, led by captain-coach and Sandover medallist Shane Beros, fought back late in the term, but they too were inaccurate in front of goals and went into the main break down by 24 points.

At the bigger Medibank Stadium University thrived in the open corridors, beating the Hawks to space and at times running circles around them.

Both teams had stood out in the regular season, maintaining consistency in a sometimes unpredictable division and staying close in their match-ups earlier in the year.

On Saturday, however, University's speed and short passing game proved too hard for Mt Lawley to combat.

Echoing North Beach's exit the previous week, the Hawks had a number of older players who struggled to keep up with University's pace.

A strong Sebastian Ruiz grab in front of a rowdy crowd seemed to inspire Mt Lawley early in the third quarter but a goal on the siren to University's Harrison Garland again put the lead out to four goals going into the last change.

Both teams had stood out in the regular season, maintaining consistency in a sometimes unpredictable division and staying close in their match-ups earlier in the year.


Both sides struggled to get the important first goal in the fourth, the eventual breakthrough coming at the nine-minute mark to Nathan Hogg, putting University up by 31.

Two more goals to Crudeli put the game beyond doubt, with a late consolation goal to Clinton Gribble the only one of the quarter for the minor premiers.

Crudeli was awarded the medal as best on ground for his five-goal haul, while Matthew Breen and Shane Fleay also played well for University, and Dean Cahill and Beros worked hard for the Hawks.

The flag, University's 16th A Grade and 73rd premiership, is the first time since 2003 a team other than North Beach has won the major prize, and the clubs first since 1996.

University also won the reserves over North Fremantle while Trinity Aquinas prevailed in a tight contest against Wesley Curtin in the Phil Scott Colts.
